Twin Falls County Faces Record Budget Soaring To Nearly Two Millions

Twin Falls County officials estimate it will cost nearly two million dollars—a new record—to provide county residents with a host of services during 1959. The tentative 1959 budget, approved Tuesday afternoon by the three-member board of commissioners, provides for a maximum spending program of \$1,915,795 by 11 county departments, an agricultural fair board and the Magic Valley Memorial hospital board. County Clerk T. W. Stivers says this year's budget is the largest ever approved for the county, topping by nearly \$210,000 the previous record-high budget of \$1,705,977 approved a year ago.

Earmarked for expenditure at Magic Valley Memorial hospital is a total of \$1,038,845, compared with actual hospital expenditures during 1958 of \$941,501 and a 1958 hospital budget of \$921,565. A total of \$876,745 was budgeted for the hospital in 1957.

Except for approximately \$60,000 paid into the hospital fund from a one and one-half mill property tax levy, the majority of funds needed for hospital operation are obtained by the hospital itself in fees. Hospital revenue in 1958 from patient services and other income totaled \$978,200.

Second largest item in the budget is the \$169,200 for the county poor fund, below actual 1958 poor fund spending of \$171,120 and the 1958 budget figure of \$183,200. A total of \$128,300 was budgeted for the poor fund in 1957.

The commissioners' budget provides for \$161,870 in 1959, compared with \$122,995 actually spent in 1958 and \$161,720 budgeted for 1958. In 1957, the commissioners' budget totaled \$171,700.

Budgeted for the assessor's office during 1959 is a total of \$82,870, compared with actual 1958 spending of \$82,870.

Budget Total Lacks Luxury, Board Asserts

A tentative county budget calling for a record maximum spending program of nearly two million dollars in 1959 is regarded by the county's three commissioners as an effort to provide necessities but not luxuries.

Commenting on the budget's \$1,915,795 total, Russell C. Larsen, commission chairman, said, "What we need in this county we'll have to find the money to pay for. What we want we'll have to wait until the money's available."

Although the 1959 budget calls for a maximum spending program exceeding 1958 county expenditures of approximately \$1,650,194, Larsen and his two fellow commission members, Henry Crow and Harold Lancaster, regard the new budget as representing every effort to hold spending in line with actual county needs.

Ike Says Demos Have Budgetary 'Schizophrenia'

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (UPI)—President Eisenhower said today that Democratic congressional critics of his 77 billion dollar balanced budget had what he called budgetary schizophrenia. He said they were on all sides of the budget.

The President made it plain he would not have any part of a making his budget a political football. He told his press conference that the Democratic attacks on his budget came from so many different angles that he could not escape the conclusion that his opponents had budgetary schizophrenia.

(Webster's new international dictionary defines schizophrenia as "a type of psychosis characterized by loss of contact with the environment and by disintegration of the personality. It includes dementia praecox and some related forms of insanity.")

Eisenhower firmly rejected the idea, as voiced last night by Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson, that his budget was politically motivated and invalid.

The President also provided these other news highlights:

—The new department and the department of health, education and welfare are looking into the possibility of providing public school education for at least some of the more than 5,000 children of armed forces personnel in Norfolk, Va., where the schools are closed in an effort to prevent court-ordered integration.

—In response to a question, Eisenhower said he would like to see repealed the constitutional amendment limiting presidents to two terms. This would not apply to him, but he said he thought Americans should have the right to choose whom they please for the presidency.

State Demos Might Try to Take Part of Governor's Powers

BOISE, Jan. 21 (AP)—Senate Democrats indicated today they may be ready to try to take from Republican Gov. Robert E. Smylie control of some of the agencies of Idaho's state government. Sen. J. Ray Cox, jr., D., Kootenai, in a speech on the senate floor, challenged the legality of appointment of departmental attorneys outside the office of the attorney general. He mentioned specifically the office of tax collector, for which Harold A. Raunquist is general counsel.

"I am wondering," Cox said, "where the authority lies for the tax collector to hire a general counsel."

He said records of the state auditor showed Raunquist was being paid from the state's general fund at a salary rate of \$600 per month. He added, "I think we had better clarify the rights of the office of the attorney general and determine whether these departmental offices have the right to hire their own attorney."

"I think we should determine, too, if illegal salary payments have been made and whether they can be recovered."

Smylie is the only Republican among the eight elected state officials. There have been indications that efforts might be made by the Democratic-controlled legislature to transfer to other state officials control of some agencies now under direction of the governor.

Sen. Glenn E. Bandelin, D., Bonner, said the legislature is "in a position to do what the constitution intended us to do." He said he had ready for introduction a bill which would shift the office of tax collector from the governor's control to the control of the state auditor, "where it should be."

Before adjourning until tomorrow the senate approved the nomination by Smylie of the five members of the state board of health. Confirmation of all five was unanimous.

Three bills were introduced in the senate, including one to make service by members of the state highway board at the pleasure of the governor. Under present law the board members can be removed only for cause.

Another bill would increase the legal minimum driving age from 14 to 16 with unrestricted license available only to those 18 and over.

The house passed the first bill of the session, a bill to amend the law relating to the opening days of the legislative session, which was passed in the opening days.

Only one of the three bills met any opposition. It would increase the annual maximum salaries of mayors of first class cities from \$7,200 to \$10,000 and of councilmen from \$1,200 to \$2,400. It passed 41 to 3. Voting against it were Reps. Willford Dregg, R., Caribou; Mark Farmer, D., Bingham, and Alan Shepard, R., Ada. There was no debate. The bill would affect officials in 1961.

Trading stamps were back before the legislature with a bill intended to make sure nearly everybody in the sparsely settled Gem state could go to the redemption centers.

State Sen. Don Fredericksen, D., Gooding, assured a revival of the trading stamp issue in the 35th legislative session by introducing his bill in the senate yesterday.

Another controversial issue cropped up in the house when Rep. Robert Leneghan, D., Bonnett, introduced a bill designed to adjust the initiative law along lines favored by the successful opponents of last November's "right-to-work" bill.

Fredericksen's bill requires that a firm can't distribute trading stamps in any county of 3,000 population or more unless it operates a redemption center in the county. Each center must carry at least 90 percent of all the items for which the stamps may be redeemed.

The bill differed from another measure for which there was some pre-session support among legislators. This measure would require that the value of all unredeemed stamps go to the state.

Republicans said they didn't like two of the initiative amendments, though they said they believed the law needed some clarification.

Rep. W. D. Eberle, R., Ada, said Republicans on the state affairs committee didn't like one provision which he said would require circulation of petitions to gather signatures in at least 28 counties, and another that Eberle said might allow intimidation of signers unless there was safeguards.

The initiative and referendum bill provides that signers be registered voters, and that any citizen may go to court to keep the measure off the ballot. These were contentions advanced by right-to-work opponents in a Boise court suit which they lost.

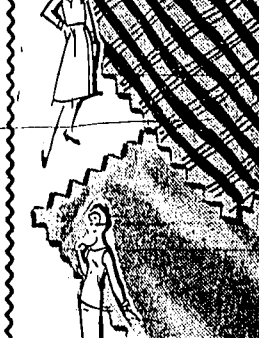

Sorrels said a farmer told the group he believed gold was buried on his property.

"This aroused Jones' curiosity," Sorrels said. "He said he went to a banker to find out what he would have to do if he found gold."

The banker sent Jones to a lawyer, who drew up a contract with Jones.

Jones, who said he had only seven cents in his pockets at the time, signed the contract, figuring he didn't have anything to lose.

Later, according to the secret service, people started pestering Jones about his gold find. It got so bad Jones moved from East Texas to Corsicana to avoid questions.

However, the questions started again 10 days ago. This time Jones talked about his alleged find.

Ego of Man Is Injured; Whip Mystery Ends

NEW YORK, Jan. 21 (UPI)—Twenty-first century science has been deflated by positive proof that man invented a "machine" thousands of years ago which exceeds the speed of sound.

That machine is the whip and it was already invented when man entered the annals of history. The deflating proof was provided by three scientists of the U. S. naval research laboratory at Washington.

Whip Crack Photographed
 They photographed the top of a bull whip at the instant it cracked. The pictures showed the sound waves which produced the explosive crack, like the shock waves a jet plane sets off which are audible for miles around, as it crosses the sound barrier.

Not content with that, the scientists worked out mathematics to prove that the great technological triumphs of the 20th century, which permit a vast and rapid multiplication of energy from a small beginning, had been anticipated by the inventor of the whip, whoever he or she was.

Towel Will Do Trick
 Moreover, they made it possible for anyone to knowingly crack the sound barrier by exceeding the speed of sound in the privacy of his own home or wherever. All that is needed is a wet towel, a belt or some other long, narrow, flexible object—and the ability to crack it.

It had been supposed generally that the crack of a cracked whip was produced by its tip doubling back and slapping itself. The pictures demonstrated that at the instant of shock waves, the tip was only slightly curved. It reached a maximum velocity of 1,400 feet per second. Sound travels at 1,100 feet per second.

Van Heflin's Ambition Is to Remain Actor; Boyle Reports

"The nature of our work puts us in an artificial atmosphere," he observed. "Even a second-rate actor's face is better known to the public than the top men in other fields. But this is only a peculiarity of the profession."

"The greatest danger an actor faces is that he may take himself more seriously than the part he plays. There are a few who read their lines and begin to believe it."

Van Heflin has managed to stay as normal as they come. He and his wife, actress Frances Neal, have been married 16 years. They have two daughters and a son.

"I've saved my money," Van said cheerfully. "If they ever tell me, 'We're tired of seeing your face,' well, it won't break my heart. I can risk the rest of the way as a passenger, and pay my fare."

Heflin believes in realism.

His latest role called for him to wear a beard. Van disdained a false beard, took the time to home-grow his own beard, completely without handkerchiefs or mustaches. He hated to part with it.

"You can always tell an actor with a phony beard," he said, grinning. "He won't let his hand near it for fear it'll drop and ruin his face also looks constricted, and he wears a forced smile."

Oklahoma-born Heflin was brought up in California, had considerable difficulty making up his mind whether he wanted a career in the theater or before the camera. After 13 weeks on Broadway, he went to see for two full years, rising to the rank of third mate.

"One morning I woke up in San Francisco broke," he recalled. "I had been told the night before, and couldn't even remember where I'd been. I decided I'd be a bum all my life—unless I was in the theater."

Problems for Schools Told By PTA Panel

A panel composed of Dr. Stanley Heywood, Idaho State college; Ezra Moore, superintendent of schools at Burley, and John Barker, former state president of the Idaho Trustees association, spoke on current school problems to a small group at a meeting Monday night of the Junior High School PTA.

Moore pointed out that Idaho is spending less per pupil for education than any other state west, of the Mississippi river. He said the goal of the Idaho Education association is to at least gain the average for the 11 western states.

Dr. Heywood brought out the importance of good teacher preparation for higher educational standards and quoted from the Dr. Coant report on current educational problems.

Barker, speaking on education proposals before the legislature, pointed out that rates for assessed valuation vary greatly throughout the state, but that equal dollar expenditure would not be the answer to the problem of equalization.

Answering a question as to his philosophy regarding President Eisenhower's proposal to develop national educational standards, Dr. Heywood said he would rather the states were stimulated to participate in raising their educational standards.

A discussion of "dispensing with the frills" was summed up by the panel as reverting to the responsibility of the parents.

Curtis Eaton moderated the panel, with Norman MacIntosh as program chairman.

New Manager Is Transferred To Hagerman Fish Hatchery

PORTLAND, Jan. 21—Adrien F. Bernier, manager of the fish-cultural station at Willard, Wash., since July, 1956, is being transferred to Hagerman, Ida., fish-cultural station as hatchery manager, Leo Laythe, regional director of the bureau of sport fisheries and wildlife of the U. S. fish and wildlife service, announced today.

Bernier will replace Jack R. Chipman, who has retired after 32 years of service with the bureau of sport fisheries and wildlife and its predecessor agencies.

The Hagerman station is one of the region's largest trout producing stations and distributes fish in the states of Idaho, Nevada and Oregon.

Bernier has been with the fish and wildlife service and its predecessors since 1932, when he started work as an apprentice fish culturist at the Northville, Mich., station. He came to the West in 1935 and was stationed successively at the Birdsview, Wash., station, Yellowstone park trout hatchery in Wyoming, and the Spokane fish cultural station.

When the upper Columbia was blocked to salmon migration by the construction of Grand Coulee dam and hatcheries below the dam to replace some of the lost runs, Bernier, in February, 1942, became superintendent of the station at Winthrop, Wash., where he worked on the propagation of salmon and steelhead trout. This station later established the rainbow trout brood stock which provides a large share of the rainbow trout eggs for the basin region.

In 1955, Bernier was assigned to Courtland, N. Y., to attend the fish and wildlife service's training school on trout nutrition. On completion

of a year's training in July, 1956, he became manager of the Willard station.

Cost Counted on "Free Elections" Here During 1958

The term, "free elections" may apply to a voter's unhampered right to cast a ballot but it overlooks the actual expense involved in providing general elections in the county every two years.

Spending figures for 1958 released by the county commissioners show \$14,720.82 was spent on county voting in the August primary and November general elections.

Of this total, \$8,558 was apportioned among election officials. Another \$1,422.25 went to precinct registrars. Printing and other expenses amounted to \$5,740.57.

In January, 1958, when the commissioners were preparing their budget — election expenses are included in the commission budget — they budgeted \$20,000 for the election, indicating they felt election expenses would run higher than they did.
