





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EISENHOWER REPUBLICANISM

In his first year in the White House, President Eisenhower more than once described himself as conservative in money matters and liberal in questions of human welfare. To some, at least, this became the definition of an "Eisenhower Republican."

The way things are going today, however, some of the President's critics are asking: "Is Eisenhower an Eisenhower Republican?"

They are asking this principally because he failed to give support to GOP senate liberals who sought unsuccessfully to block Sen. Everett Dirksen's elevation to minority leader, and because his comments since the November election have heavily stressed econ-

The truth is, of course, that Mr. Eisenhower has always gone along with the dominant conservative managers of his party in house

From the outset of his first term, he dealt with them as his main liaison with the legislature. Liberal Republicans privately assailed him and his White House staff for letting them down. Some used this as excuse for ylelding the fight entirely to the entrenched conservatives

As for his philanthropic bent, probably little is changed in that department, either.

To practice both liberal welfare policies and fairly stringent money policies would seem on its face almost contradictory. Most felt the President meant he favored welfare -advances-providing they could be managed without waste, and so long as ample funds were on hand.

It should have been apparent that the test would come when funds were tight.

-The-time has come, with a 12-billion-dol lar deficit impending this year.

Mr. Eisenhower's response to this situation has been to show his conservative side, since basic money matters are involved. It is not exactly easy to be both liberal and conservative at the same time, at least not as the President seems to define those terms.

Whether the President in this vein is in tune with voters who put in a heavily liberal questionable. There is congress may be 'little doubt he is in tune with his own thinking of a few years back. We are seeing his conservative face because he thinks the times call for it.

POLITICAL REFLEX ACTION?

The revenue needs of a government at all levels have been rising as the country has grown and its problems have become more complex. Right now government officials all lover_the_map_are_looking for ways_to-dig_up more, not less, money.

Most experts scanning the federal govern-ment's horizon can see nothing but a steady continuance of the upward curving budget The President himself acknowledges this is the long-term trend.

Yet Mr. Eisenhower still feels, in the face of this long-run prospect, that he can reasonably offer hope in 1960 of a tax cut all along

The assumption he must make is that the government, with the aid of congress, produce a balanced budget at around the 77-billion-dollar-level for the fiscal year starting

The President knows the current year deficit is going to come to something like 12 billion_dollars...He_plainly_is_taking the extremely optimistic view of the federal government's immediate financial future. Many believe there is almost no hope of avoiding a deficit next year, perhaps as big as four bil-

lion dollars. Probably Mr. Eisenhower, in offering the bright hope, is simply following a course that most American political leaders - except in the dire straits of war-regard as inescapable

for them. Promising a tax cut is almost as common in politics as quoting Thomas Jefferson and Abraham Lincoln. Taxes are not something a politician feels he can just allow to exist as they are. To suggest reduction is second nature reflex action.

If repeated expressions of hope for a tax cut can sustain our morale, it ought to be soaring. But in fact it's likely to be just a bit frayed before the real thing comes along.

COUNT OF RED NOSES

The Soviet Union is about to learn some things about itself that it hasn't known for at least 20 years. These concern the size and make-up of its population.

The last time Russia took a census count the total came to a little more than 170 million people. After that check in 1939 it began running off occasional estimates, the highest of which placed the population

somewhere around 220 million. Then the Soviet authorities took a hard new look and decided they were overshoot ing. Three years ago they offered a cut-down

guess of just over 200 million. If it should turn out that the real figure assuming the Russians announce it is anywhere near this total, then the popula-tion spread between Russia and the United

States will be little more than 25 million. That's not much of a margin for a nation whose propagandists would dearly love to stress vastly superior numbers as part of an image of superior Soviet strength. One can't help wondering if, whatever the spread, they won't double it just for luck.
