



can't expose a man to television cameras for a solid hour, as we did Soviet Deputy Premier Anastas Mikoyan, without learning a good deal about him. And what Americans saw and heard can hardly be a cause for cheering, or even modest hopes.

The real news was not what he sald about Berlin, or Germany, or the cold war. It was the disheartening revelation of the Russian water power and rivers and harbors development. It communist pattern of thinking.

Magnified under the glare of TV close-ups, this was a genuine shock. Terribly clear now is-the fact that we are not just poles apart from the Soviet Union, but are traveling in totally different thinking orbits.

Mikoyan answered almost no question directly in his appearance, but it misses the point simply to say he ducked and dodged.

He offered answers which may seem perfectly valid to Russian reds. By the Kremiin's accepted standard of double-think-turning facts upside down, giving them any meaning —it made sense to say we thát suits purpose are at fault everywhere and Russia nowhere. not even in repressed Hungary.

Watching Mikoyan at work you get the idea, however, that something more than double-think is involved. He seemed to turn almost instinctively from straight dealing on any topic-except thank you and goodby.

One could not help but be reminded here of documented diplomatic-accounts of Russian diplomacy in the 19th century, long before the communists gained power.

Western diplomats then were in wide agreement that Russian; diplomats regarded lying, duplicity, broken promises and all the other devices of distrust as the vital tools of their trade. The Russians were notorious throughout Europe as being totally untrust-

No one imagines the communists have any respect for truth. But in their formal prac-tice of deception as the rule of life, they appear only to be compounding a duplicity already firmly fixed in the character of Russlan government.

As a Russian and a communist, Mikoyan did not let tradition down.

He left with us the big question: "How do you negotiate reasonably with men who believe that because they lie to gain their ends, everyone else must surely lie, too?"

### NIXON'S FAUX PAS

Vice President Nixon did not show his usual good political sense in the method he took to leak the fact that he had made his decision as between the liberal and conservative factions of the Republican party. It may be that the strain and embarrassment inherent in his position led him into this strategic blunder.

He called in for a so-called off-the-record interview a few newspapermen with whom he has been especially friendly, and vice versa. Although he did not say directly that he had made the choice attributed to him. it was obvious from reports of the get-together that such was his purpose. Oddly, hardly a single one of the selected group saw the implication or significance.

Although sometimes helpful to reporters these affairs are frequently dangerous for

the principal, and for obvious reasons. Somebody is likely to get the wrong impression from a spontaneous talk, and to misquote or misrepresent the official holding the quote or misrepresent the official holding the conference. It so happened with regard to the additional help. Certainly there is much to be Nixon's statement on our military status vis—sald on the inefficiency which would result in such a transition... a-vis Russia, giving Senator Symington a chance to trip up the vice president. The latter, of course, had to explain that he had been misunderstood.



"Weather warfare could be so applied that the operator of the modification could not only damage his conceasit, but essans undemaged.

fication could not only damage his opponent but escape undamaged himself—something that might not be said of the multimegaton thermontclear blasts," Anderson said. He made the remarks in a speech prepared for a symposium on weather modification sponsored by Resources for the Future, Inc., a research and educational agency supported by the Ford foundation. Anderson and two top meteorologists urged intensive further research on the weather technique which was envisioned as a potential boon to mankind as well as a possible weapon.




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
