County Firms Show Gain in 4-Year Period

Manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers in Twin Falls county have increased by two per cent in the last four years, according to statistics prepared by D. E. Smith, district manager of the Salt Lake City office of Dun and Bradstreet, Inc.

The firm's reference book for January, 1959, lists 801 such concerns in the county as compared to 782 in January, 1955. The book lists only manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers. Not included are such service and professional businesses as beauty and barber shops and stock and real estate brokers.

All communities in the county show an increase in listings. Buhl has 115 listings as compared to 113 in January, 1955, for an increase of six per cent. Piler has 38 for 1959, compared to 32 for 1955, an increase of 18.75 per cent. Kimberly increased from 31 to 40, an eight per cent increase. Twin Falls listings rose from 547 to 577, an increase of five per cent.

Budge Urges Federal Tax, Spending Cut

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 26—Appearing on a nationwide radio show Sunday, Cong. R. H. Budge called for a reduction in federal spending and federal taxing, saying that the federal government is now engaged in many activities which could be carried on better at the state and local level.

Representative Budge, during debate with Rep. Hale Boggs, D., La., charged that more than 50 per cent of the states' tax dollars are lost going through the various agencies of the federal government.

"The leading question for the program was on the economic outlook and whether a 'balanced budget' must come first."

Representative Budge said, "If the budget cannot be balanced in times of economic prosperity and expansion then obviously it can never be balanced. The role of the federal government then must be changed so that it completely controls the economy by means of direct government expenditures and government controls. This can be done, of course, to only one place... state socialism."

Budge denied that the United States is lagging behind Russia militarily, saying the U.S. can now fire ICBM's more than halfway around the world with ease. He added, "Obviously, it is no advantage to fire one all the way around the world."

New Lincoln Penny Goes Into Circulation Before Schedule

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26 (AP)—The new Lincoln penny is in circulation a little ahead of the Feb. 12 schedule.

Nearly 40 million of them are pouring out of the Denver and Philadelphia mints to federal reserve banks and commercial channels.

Truckloads of the new one-cent piece, a feature of the sesquicentennial Lincoln observance, began moving to the 24 federal reserve banks and their 24 branches eleven days ago. The reserve institutions will send them along to 12,000 commercial banks across the country.

However, the treasurers' office here also a distributor, has had the Lincoln pennies for a week.

But Director William H. Brett disclosed the earlier-than-scheduled distribution of the new coppers after a Cleveland coin dealer reported he got one from an acquaintance who got several in Washington.

The original announcement said a supply of the coins would be ready for distribution on Lincoln's birthday, Feb. 12. But Brett said the shipment had to start out several weeks ahead in order to have the coins in people's pockets on Feb. 12.

The new penny, replacing the old Lincoln coin that had been minted for 49 years, makes no change on the face and its portrait of Lincoln. The new reverse side shows the Lincoln Memorial and above this, following the curve of the border, the words, "United States of America." Below the memorial, also following the curve, appears the denomination "one cent."

Fund Earmarked For Use in Idaho

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26—Cong. Hiram H. Budge reported today that President Eisenhower's budget for fiscal year 1960 contains \$8,470,191 for the department of interior in Idaho, compared to an appropriated \$7,754,747 for the department in Idaho during fiscal year 1959.

The President's budget also contains an additional amount, for the bureau of reclamation, of \$3,230,285 to be spent jointly in Idaho and adjacent states compared to \$2,119,781 for fiscal 1959.

Women Urged to Greater Roles in U.S. Public Life

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26 (AP)—A Soviet male scientist predicts that greater participation by women in political, economic and professional fields would strengthen the United States.

Dr. Ivan Arlobolevsky, a specialist in automation, and one of three Soviet scientists who have just completed a month's tour of this country visiting scientific institutions made the comment at a news conference.

The scientific trio, guests of the American Friends service committee, a Quaker organization, also included Dr. Alexander Vishnevsky, a heart and chest surgeon and director of the Moscow Society of Surgeons; and Dr. Alla Masevich, an astrophysicist who coordinated observations on Soviet Sputnik satellites. All urged extended contacts between American and Soviet scientists.
