Almost Every Family in U.S. Will Be Affected by Social Security Changes

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Virtually every family in America will be affected by major changes in the social security law which have gone into effect today.

These changes were voted by Congress at its recent session, and were signed into law by President Eisenhower on Aug. 29.

The social security administration worked overtime since then to prepare detailed interpretations of the new amendments, and to apply them to the millions of individual cases involved.

Here is a summary of the most important changes, and how they will affect you. Additional information on specific situations may be obtained from local social security offices.

The social security tax deduction from your paycheck is now bigger. The tax for both employers and employees went up from 2 1/2 per cent to 3 per cent.

And it applies to the first \$4,200 as it does now. The net effect of these two changes for people who pay the maximum will be to increase the annual bite from \$94.50 to \$120.

The tax on self-employed persons likewise goes up on Jan. 1, from 3 1/2 to 3 3/4 per cent, and the ceiling goes to \$4,800.

The higher taxes will affect 74 million people.

The 12,300,000 people who receive monthly old age survivors and disability benefits (OASI) will receive bigger checks, starting in February.

The increases will average about seven per cent.

Payments to retired workers aged 65 and over ranged from \$30 to \$108.50. Under the new schedule, they range from \$33 to \$118 a month.

Benefits for eligible dependents and survivors also will be increased by the same percentage. For example, a retired worker and his wife, both over 65, are eligible for a maximum monthly benefit of \$174 compared with the present \$162.80.

The increase in OASI checks will be made automatically. No one has to apply for them.

There are about 5,800,000 people who receive public assistance checks based on their need, regardless of whether they are covered by the social security insurance system.

Each state runs its own public assistance program, and fixes the amount of benefits to be paid. The federal government contributes part of the cost under a complicated formula.

The new amendments make three important changes in this program:

1. For the first time, federal contributions will be based in part on the relative wealth of the various states. The poorer state in per capita income, the larger the federal contribution.
2. About 200 million dollars in additional federal funds will be pumped into the overall program.
3. The maximum payment in which the federal government will share is raised to \$65 a month for the aged, blind and disabled, and to an average of \$30 a month for dependent children.

While the states retain a wide discretion in managing their public assistance programs, experience indicates that most of them will raise their monthly checks by a few dollars each to pass along the additional federal money.

An extra 15 million dollars will be distributed among the states to improve and expand child welfare services. For the first time, children in city slums and other urban areas will be eligible for federally-aided services on the same basis as rural children.

There are about 400,000 people in the U.S. who are eligible for social security payments.

The social security administration is trying to locate them to advise them of their rights. They won't unless they file claims.

First, the worker needed to have social security credit at least five out of the 10 years before he became disabled.

And second, he had to show that he had been working at a job covered by social security for at least one and a half out of the last three years before he became disabled.

The second of these requirements has been abolished. Any disabled worker who was turned down because of it should immediately file a new application.

The new legislation liberalizes the conditions under which survivors' benefits are payable to parents who were dependent on a worker covered by social security.

Previously, dependent parents were not eligible for benefits if the deceased worker also was survived by a spouse or child. Now dependent parents who survive an insured worker are entitled to benefits regardless of whether other members of the worker's family are drawing survivors' checks.

There are about 60,000 such dependent parents. Social security is having a very hard time locating them. They must file applications to get their checks.

Under the old law, a child must have been adopted at least three years before an insured worker died in order to be counted in figuring the family's survivor's benefits. That restriction has now been eliminated. An adopted child counts like any other child, regardless of the time of adoption.

In the past, disabled children over 18 years of age qualified for benefits as dependents only if it was shown they had been receiving at least half of their support from a retired or deceased parent who was covered by social security insurance.

Soviets Told to Pay Debts If They Want Trade With U.S.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 (AP)—When Anastas I. Mikoyan visited the United States this month, talking with businessmen from coast to coast, he made a big pitch for American trade with the Soviet Union. This week he got a public answer. This, in effect, was it: If you want to trade, let's trade, but why don't you pay your bills first? Mikoyan, Soviet first deputy premier, is the Soviet trade boss. Here he conferred with his opposite number, C. Douglas Dillon, undersecretary of state for economic affairs. It was Dillon who gave the answer. Broken down, it goes like this: The two countries can trade, all right. But the Soviet Union which is extending credit to underdeveloped countries with which it trades, wants this country to let the Russians buy here on long-term credits. Thus, in talking about trading with the United States, the Soviet Union is acting like an underdeveloped country itself although it is the No. 2 economic power in the world. Moscow can't get those long-term credits—although Mikoyan laid them down as a precondition to trading—for a couple of reasons—it owes this country a big chunk of money, and until it pays up a law forbids further credits. The Russians could do business—if they want to—on a pay-as-you-go basis, Dillon said. But he noted that the Soviet Union is the only major country with which "we have been unable to reach a settlement of

Old Mother Earth's Shape Is Actually Somewhat Like Pear

NEW YORK, Jan. 29 (AP)—Old Mother Earth is actually a little pear-shaped.

She's a bit bulgy in the south, and pointed in the north.

This hidden truth was discovered by Tiny Vanguard, the grapefruit-size U. S. satellite launched last St. Patrick's day.

Vanguard's discovery was announced yesterday to the American Physical Society by Dr. J. A. O'Keefe, Miss Ann Eckels, and R. K. Squires, national aeronautics and space administration.

Vanguard permitted scientists to draw an accurate new picture of the Earth because the satellite travels so high above the Earth's air, and in a very precise, trustworthy orbit. But there are little wobbles in her

more weight than the thin crust presumably could support, Dr. O'Keefe and Dr. Robert Jastrow, also of NASA, explained to newsmen.

This indicates the Earth's interior is not so plastic as many scientists have assumed.

Some mechanical strength is needed to support the pear-like dome in the north, and the bulging in the south, the scientists said.

Slow convection currents moving through the mantle—the material between the Earth's liquid core and the upper crust—might be an explanation for the shape.

Taxes Aid for Self-Employed Is Under Way

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 (UPI)—Congressional tax writers soon will begin a drive to give major tax relief to self-employed persons, it was reported yesterday.

The drive will start so early in the session that backers figure the legislation has a good chance of passing the White House this year.

Self-Employed to Be Helped

The tax relief proposal — which would allow self-employed persons to defer payment of taxes until 1960 on 10 per cent of their earnings which they voluntarily place in a special fund. The maximum amount on which tax deferral would be set at \$2,500 a year.

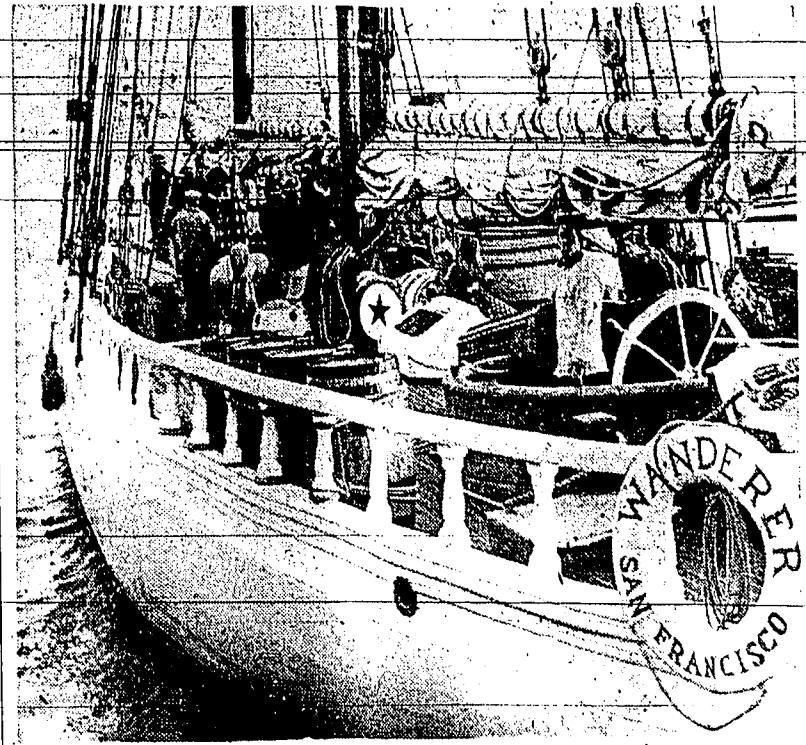
Members said the bill would be passed up for a vote within the week or two in the house ways and means committee, which initiates all tax legislation. It was reported as a foregone conclusion that the legislation would be approved.

Legislation Is Same

The legislation is identical to a measure which cleared the committee by an 18 to 7 vote last year but was overwhelmingly approved in the face of objections from the treasury that it would be an "undesired group" of taxpayers.

Proponents for groups pushing for tax relief legislation figured the bill would pass this year would be a simple time to force Senate action before the 86th congress convenes in 1960, even if Chairman F. Byrd, D., Va., of the Senate finance committee attempted to block a vote.

Air Force's Red Tape Snarls Plans to Retire K-9 Veteran

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 (AP)—Our readers who love dogs and hate red tape probably will want to hear all about the case of Blitz and his soldier pal.

Everybody else might as well stop right now.

Here's the story, for you prod and antiblack people:

Back in August, 1957, a German shepherd sentry dog named Blitz was bitten by a rabid fox in France. He recovered and was restored to duty with Airman 1st. Tom Rhodes, who's from Indian Head, Md.

In July, 1958, Blitz was back on the sick list. He was losing his sense of smell and a veterinarian certified him as unfit. Let Rhodes have him for a pet, the vet suggested.

Hold, cried some officials at the base in Toul-Rosiere, France. These officials pulled the rule book. They pointed to air force regulations which order the destruction of any dog found unfit for sentry duty.

Now enters the compassionate vet, again. He signed a death certificate for Blitz. That ought to have ended things.

But no. Here enters a military detective. He detected that Rhodes was still buying dog food.

Clank, clank. The legal machinery went into action. Rhodes was found to have secreted Blitz, and a summary court-martial fined him \$75 for "making a false official statement."

Rhodes already had paid \$180 to have Blitz flown back to the United States on a commercial airliner.

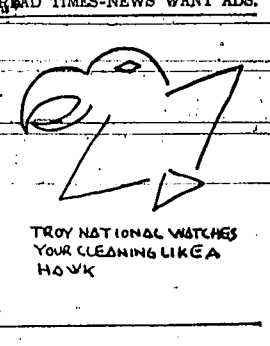

Prepared Foods Boost Budgets



The costs of prepared pre-cooked and ready-mixed foods will push up your food budget in 1959, say department of agriculture economists.

Prices of New Prepared Food To Go up, Say Manufacturers

NEW YORK (NEA)—The price trend on groceries is up. You won't eat your 1959 quick cake, bread and soup mixes without paying a little more for them. Nor can you expect more built-in maid services in your processed foods without giving that "built-in maid" more take-home pay.

On unprocessed foods, especially pork, poultry, fresh citrus and fresh vegetables and potatoes, and possibly eggs, all in large supply, retail prices may average about the same or even a little lower than in 1958.

The exception will be coffee, now on the price toobag. These are conclusions drawn from statements made to NEA by six of the country's giant food companies.

P. M. Jarvis, president of Swift and company, world's largest packers, sees the food industry faced with increasing costs all along the line.

Paul Gerol, president of Pillsbury company, one of the two leading manufacturers of quick mixes as well as flour, expects increases in prices of some foods.

Harold W. Confort, president of Borden company, leading processors of milk and milk products, foresees the need to pass on to the consumer, particularly in many manufactured dairy products (cheese, ice cream, canned and nut-free milk), some of the added costs of processing.

Rising costs of processing and distribution, labor, faster budgets for advertising and research to meet "fierce" competition, are some of the factors destined to push up retail prices.

"Although we have held the price line for the past 18 months," Gerol said, "we feel a new spurt in the nation's economy will result in a new series of pre-cooked frozen food items."

The company's president, Charles G. Mortimer, by-passing comment on the expected rise in grocery item prices, said, "Vitality is a key factor in new foods introduced. It certainly is in the many new foods we've introduced in the past few months."

Last year Campbell Soup company spent over five million dollars on research and development. "In 1958 we introduced three new soups and several new frozen products," said B. Murphy, the president.

BAKE at 450° for 20 to 30 minutes. **MAKES** 16.

Prepare... 2 large apples, pared, cored and sliced into eight wedges.

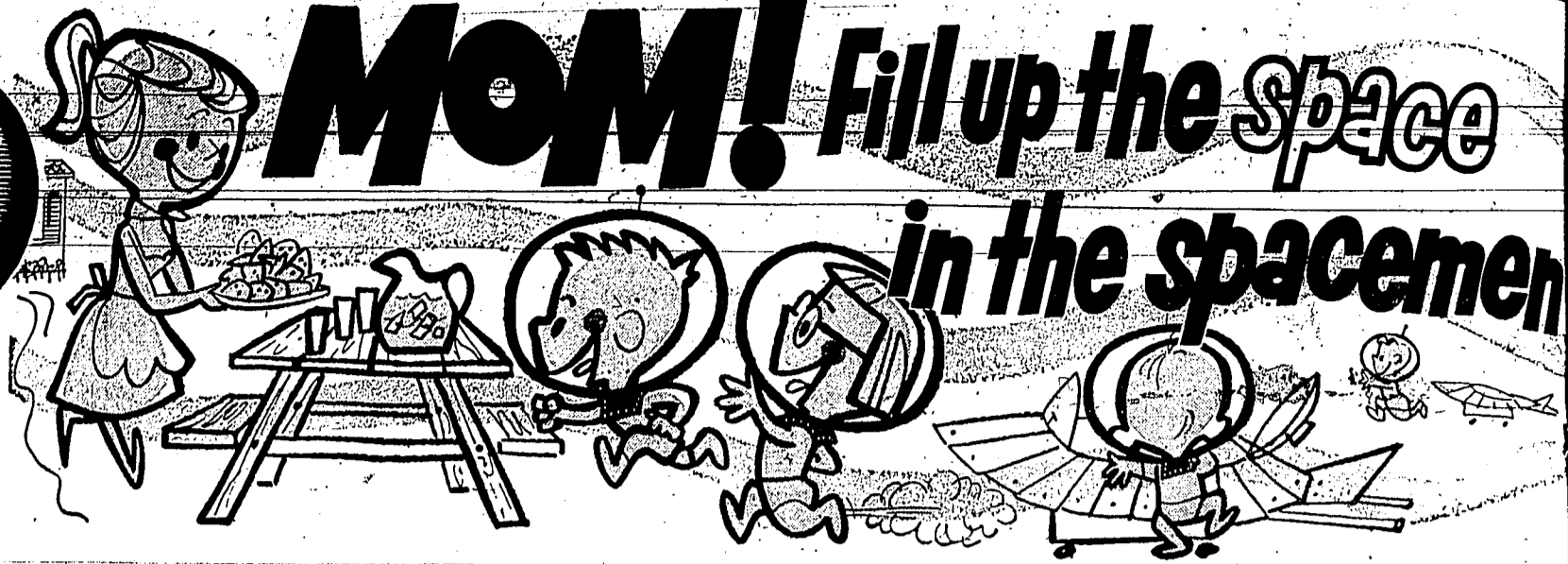
