# 65 Believed Dead in Crash of New Jet Powered Airliner in New York East River; 8 Live

NEW YORK, Feb. 4 (UPI)—A new American airline jet-powered Electra airliner missed its La Guardia airport runway in fog and rain and plunged into the East river just before midnight last night, apparently killing 65 of the 73 persons aboard. A passing tugboat plucked nine persons from the water and the wreckage. One died later in a hospital. By mid-morning, 20 more bodies had been recovered from the shallow, muddy waters

## Soviets Switch Plan, Release U. S. Convoy

HELMSTEDT, Germany, Feb. 4 (UPI)—The four-truck American truck convoy held by the Russians since Monday was released tonight after about 56 hours detention. The release of the four U. S. army trucks which had traveled 110 miles down the autobahn from West Berlin to the Soviet checkpoint here at Helmstedt came at the end of a day of hectic activity. It came after a hurried conference here between Findlay Burns, state department advisor in Berlin, and Lieut. Col. M. F. Markushin, political advisor to the Soviet army headquarters in East Berlin.

## Senate Agrees to Lower Voter Age

BOISE, Feb. 4 (AP)—The Idaho senate voted today to lower the legal voting age from 21 to 19. It approved a resolution to submit such an amendment to the voters. It has yet to be acted upon in the house. The proposal was approved 32-8, receiving two more than the required two-thirds majority. Proponents argued generally that young people at 19 are mature enough to vote. They noted that military service begins at 18 and that 18 also is the legal age for marriage. Opponents contended that by lowering the voting age pressure also might develop for lowering other legal ages, notably that for the legal consumption of alcoholic liquor.

## Watch Governmental Affairs, C. of C. Told

Businessmen should take a vital interest in governmental affairs from the local to the national level, members of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce were told Tuesday night at the annual meeting of the group held at the American Legion hall. Speaking to about 300 persons attending the dinner-meeting Jordan J. Crouch, vice president of the First National bank of Nevada, Reno, warned businessmen to be careful that "things are not jammed down your throats" by governmental officials. The speaker further urged residents of Twin Falls and Magic Valley not to let happen here what occurred recently in an Iowa city. He related a story of how some officials from a large industry visited a city in Iowa and finally decided not to locate there because none of the residents they talked to on the streets or elsewhere had anything good to say about their city or area. Crouch said he had spent many happy moments in the Magic Valley area in days gone by and believed it to be one of the best places in the world in which to live.

## Smylie Asks State Legislature To Grant Investors Tax Break

BOISE, Feb. 4 (AP)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie asked the Idaho legislature today to give big out-of-state investors a tax break. "Idaho is obliged to import capital. This is not a matter of choice," the governor declared in a major message delivered to both chambers. Unless tax laws are changed, Smylie warned, "many prime sources of investment capital" have indicated they will dry up their lines of credit into Idaho.

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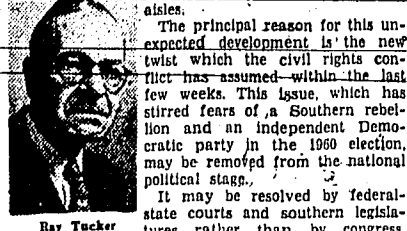

**TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG**

**WASHINGTON**—The various infernal disputes which threatened the Democratic party with disastrous divisions only a few months ago are disappearing in the Capitol Hill. There is more harmony within their oversized majority than there is on the Dirksen-Halleck side of the senate-house aisles.

The principal reason for this unexpected development is the new twist which the civil rights center has assumed—within the last few weeks. This issue, which has stirred fears of a Southern rebellion and an independent Democratic party in the 1968 election, may be removed from the national political stage.

It may be resolved by federal-state courts and southern legislatures rather than by congress, which has no jurisdictional status in any event. Even Governor J. Lindsay Almond, Jr., Virginia, the citadel of "massive resistance," concedes that minimum school integration is inevitable.

**LIMITATION TO ACTUAL INTEGRATION**—The South, although reluctantly, indicates that it can live with this problem. Under pupil placement acts like that in Alabama, which has been upheld by its fact by the supreme court, actual integration in the schools can be limited severely by criteria tests.

As a result, northern demagogues of either party will not find it politically profitable to exploit this issue and inflame the voters soon or late. It will become as dull and as irrelevant a campaign topic as prohibition.

Moreover, a gradual settlement will eliminate the customary rows at the party's 1970 convention. It may be possible to frame a platform without any mention of civil rights. It will have become a local and judicial rather than a national issue.

**SUAVE POLITICAL MOVES TEMPER FEUDS**—For the same reason, the disappearance of racial and sectional bitterness may temper personal and factional feuds among the candidates, such as have marred recent conventions. They would be chosen not on the basis of their civil rights beliefs and prejudices, but on their qualifications in other fields—economics, administrative ability, experience and background in foreign affairs, etc.

In fact, should this emotional and disruptive issue vanish from national politics, the Democrats might nominate an outstanding man from the South—Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, Texas, Sen. Richard B. Russell, Georgia, or Sen. Albert C. Gore, Tennessee.

In this prospect lies a great advantage for Dixie. Once the racial issue is defanged, there would be no reason why a Southerner should not aspire to the presidency. Only this divisive question kept such men as Sen. Harry F. Byrd, Virginia, and Sen. James F. Byrnes, South Carolina, from a presidential nomination and possible election.

**RAYBURN, JOHNSON STRENGTHEN PARTY'S POSITION**—On several other questions, the Rayburn-Johnson leadership has strengthened the Democratic position. They have prevented northern liberals from confirming Eisenhower-Nixon forecasts that they would be "wild-eyed radicals."

The Texans have quelled inchoate revolts on rules and committee assignments with the "kid glove" treatment, satisfying everybody. In both respects, they found that the rebels were content with half a loaf.

Party leaders have also acted to repudiate other GOP campaign charges—namely, that a Democratic congress would sell out to "labor, the socialists and the spenders." There will be no attempt to revive the new deal. Their only differences with Eisenhower will center on the amount of money to be spent on new deal projects which he has accepted in principle. They will boost budget proposals by five billion dollars at the most.

Despite parliamentary splinterings, there is only minor disagreement on the kind of labor legislation needed to eradicate corruption and bossism. In view of the widespread demand for reform, neither side can make political capital on these issues.

**AS FAR AS IT GOES**  
 President Eisenhower's labor bill is better than the one introduced by Senator Kennedy (D-Mass.). However, we do not believe that the President's bill goes far enough.

Both Mr. Eisenhower and Senator Kennedy would give rank-and-file members a greater voice in union affairs. Both strike at collusion between employers and union agents. Both call for strict accountability of union funds. Both would set up regulations to keep racketeers out of union office.

The big difference between the two measures lies in their approach to the secondary boycott and certain types of picketing. The President wants tight bans on such activities. Senator Kennedy, on the other hand, does not mention them at all. Indeed, he criticizes Mr. Eisenhower for including such provisions in anti-corruption legislation. But is this wrong? The way to curb corruption is to prevent every possible abuse of power.

That is why we say the Eisenhower bill makes no mention of further curbs on union spending for political purposes nor does it propose ending organized labor's immunity from the anti-trust laws.

Senator Goldwater (D-Ariz.), who has long advocated restriction of political spending, says that the move would be impractical at this time. Perhaps he means that it couldn't be written into law. The same reasoning might also apply to the removal of anti-trust immunity.

We would, nevertheless, like to see an attempt made now to pass such legislation. The labor problem—or, rather, the problem posed by some leaders of labor—calls for action on more than one or two fronts.—Salt Lake Tribune.

**HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE**

**IF Eleanor Roosevelt's party should elect her ticket in 1960, the attorney general probably would be Paul Ziffren, a Los Angeles lawyer, who landed there from Chicago where he took politics as an honor student in the Jake Avery school.**

Ziffren of course would fire J. Edgar Hoover from command of the federal bureau of investigation and give it to some person acceptable to Mrs. Roosevelt, Westbrook Pegler's son, Jimmy, who lately moved to abolish the house committee on American activities, and Congressman Manny Celler, New York, who has advocated the same thing in a different form.

Hoover is aggressively anti-communist. La Boca and the Eaglet are theoretical anti. But Hoover would have plenty of time between election and inauguration in which to choose a future career fighting communists and crime.

He would turn in his papers and his badge and get going at last, having weathered many a political pop and the rising and recurring smears of political agents who can't find anything as bad in the works of the red underworld as they readily see in the patriotic functions of such men as Hoover, Joe McCarthy, Pat McCarran, and a long roster of loyalist Americans.

Hoover has had many offers ere now, but he preferred to play out his hand in a remarkably austere observance of a code which nowadays is discredited more flagrantly by the Roosevelt's themselves than by any other family of profiteers in public trust and the election returns.

One remembers, on this point, that hardly had Roosevelt been sworn when his wife and daughter bunched their melodious prose into Louis McHenry Howe's pack and watched the old peddler shuffle off to Collier's in New York on a full-time forcing mission.

George T. Bye, the author's agent who was the household tripe-commissioner for many years thereafter said that Louis was put out of joint when he learned that stuff about babies and the sublime beauty of marital felicity had much stronger pull with editors than his own practical, saty political stuff.

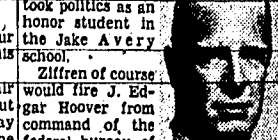

Time waters the dollar down most curiously, happening in our own lives to the American dollar. There is an old slang saying that "money talks" and it still does. But there was a time when the U. S. dollar didn't merely talk. It shouted in a voice admired and feared—around the globe.

"This is no longer quite so true. The 'almighty dollar' no longer is almighty. It has developed laryngitis. While other currencies have been building up muscle—such as the Swiss franc, the German mark—the dollar has been losing weight.

If a man had lost as much weight, comparatively, as the dollar has, he would be in a hospital bed calling for blood transfusions and an oxygen tent.

Postwar inflation has swept all countries to varying degrees. The creeping inflation in the United States has gone on so steadily that it is only occasionally we are sharply reminded that, while we have more money in our pockets now, it doesn't have the same value.

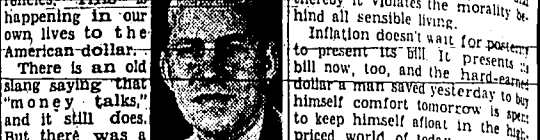

### New Eyes See Good in Dark; Heat Detected

NEW YORK, Feb. 4 (AP)—In the dark of night you now can see a man light a cigarette over five miles away—even if the light of his match is too weak to carry that distance. In pitch dark, you now can see the tip of a finger more than half the length of a football field. This strange ability to see in the dark is ours because science has given us a new set of eyes that can see heat.

**Devise Is Precise**  
They are so precise that they can detect temperature differences of a few hundredths of degree some five miles away.

A set of these infra-red or heat-sensitive eyes rides in the nose of the lethal U. S. navy Sidewinder missile. Fired from one plane at another, it seeks out the heat of its target's engine and homes in on it, hardly ever missing.

Along the Atlantic missile test range, huge missile nose cones burning their way back into the Earth's atmosphere can be spotted and tracked by infra-red eyes in the dark of night.

Actually, infra-red devices operate fairly simply in principle. As a light meter registers the amount of light coming from a source, the infra-red device measures the amount of heat.

Right now the biggest uses of the heat-sensitive eyes is military. Devices carried by drone aircraft will be able to scout over enemy lines. These devices will read where enemies and men are concentrated and will be a valuable aid in stripping away enemy camouflage.

**First Test Was In '58**  
The first time infra-red successfully detected an approaching ballistic missile on the U. S. range was on May 18, 1958, when the army using Aerojet-General corporation equipment spotted a Jupiter test missile.

After that aerojet scientists tracked the Soviet's Sputnik III in its orbit with an infra-red detector.

He was a clinical instructor in pathology at the University of Oregon medical school, Portland, in 1953 and 1954.

Key Phase of Atlas Firings Is Completed

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., Feb. 4 (UPI)—The air force fired its 20th intercontinental Atlas early today to close out the key phase of the Atlas missile's development.

The Atlas missile was the last in the Atlas "B" series. In this phase the Atlas was tested with all three of its powerful rocket engines, designed to give it a 6,300-mile boost.

The firing followed by 11 hours the second attempt to fire the Atlas missile, the Titan ICBM. The Titan launching was thwarted at the last second when a malfunction developed in the 60-foot missile.

Flare lights pierced the clear sky as the Atlas blasted off at 3:01 a. m. (EST) shattering a thick ice coating formed by the sub-zero liquid oxygen in its tanks.

The Atlas made a smooth start and climbed with gradually increasing speed into a star-filled sky. After about two and a half minutes the missile's two booster engines appeared to burn out as planned, and the Atlas continued under power for another full minute.

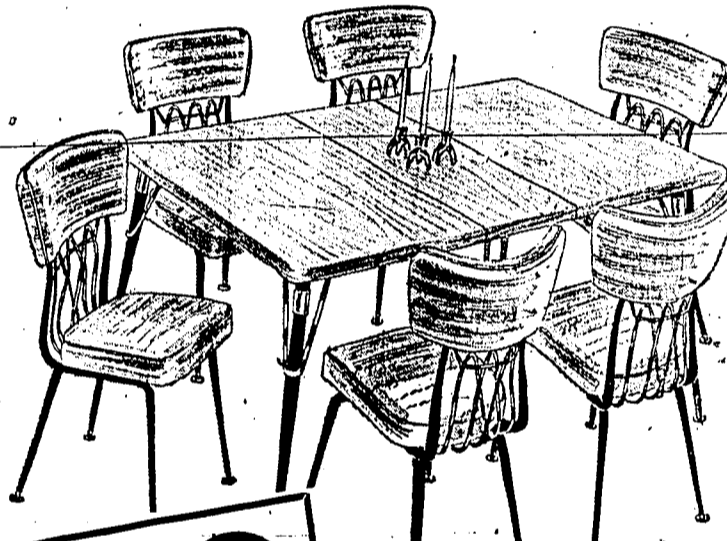

# Peaceful Application of Atomic Energy Given Attention of Top U.S. Officials

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4 (Special) U.S. atomic energy officials are giving top attention to peaceful applications for nuclear explosives. Leaders in congress, state departments and the atomic energy commission have given atomic blasting mission and importance in diplomatic first-rank with the Soviets and in technical programs at home.

Petroleum recovery from huge oil shale deposits in Utah, northwestern Colorado and Wyoming have received highest priority under "Project Plowshare" of the AEC. The shales, the commission reported this week, "are believed to be the largest untapped oil reserve in this continent, if not in the world."

By setting off atomic or hydrogen devices deep underground in shale beds, the commission believed large rock masses would be fractured and oil released by the heat of the explosion. The resulting petroleum could then be recovered by conventional pumping operations.

So important is Project Plowshare that the U.S. has so far resisted including such peaceful blasts in atomic test ban talks in Geneva. State department officials recently indicated here that the U.S. considered a blanket prohibition of all explosions most unlikely. The Russians, they pointed out, were the first to announce plans for peaceful blasts. Before the Soviets detonated their first bomb 10 years ago, their propaganda machine described the moving of mountains, shifting of rivers and excavation of vast lakes with nuclear explosives.

The United States has proposed close scrutiny of such peaceful blasts, and apparently is prepared to reveal the atomic explosives themselves to international inspection.

Sen. Clinton P. Anderson, D., N.M., chairman of the joint committee on

atomic energy, says he sets no important objection to allowing observers to inspect Plowshare devices. "I don't see how we could have exceptions to the test ban without it," Anderson said.

If carried through, such revelations would represent a major shift in U.S. policy. Hyper-sensitive security regulations still cover every detail of even the crude early devices used on Japan, although Soviet scientists obviously understand the techniques involved.

Contracts for a tunnel for Plowshare tests in Colorado oil shale are under way, the AEC reported here. Completion date is estimated for early fall. According to the agency, cooperative agreements have been reached with the bureau of mines and plans have been made to invite oil industry participation in the project.

Commission Chairman John McCone said at a recent press conference that peaceful explosions could begin as soon as late spring on a variety of plans. Detonation of a 10-kiloton device in the Salado salt basin, about 25 miles southeast of Carlsbad, N. M., is planned. In a test designed to investigate possible power and isotope production.

Energy stored in the salt, as heat from the nuclear device, might be released in a controlled manner by the use of a transfer agent such as water, carbon dioxide or nitrogen, the commission said. It then could be turned to industrial or electrical power use.

In addition to the reduction of oil shale, the AEC foresees the extraction of petroleum from tar sands. The heat released by nuclear blasts is believed sufficient to lower the viscosity of the oil sufficiently to allow conventional recovery. The Athabasca sands, in Canada, are among the world's largest.

In mining, the commission said nuclear blasts might be useful in breaking up low grade or inaccessible deposits, with minerals then recovered by leaching. An early test of such an application was indicated.

For major excavation, the com-

mission foresees large volumes of earth and rock moved by nuclear explosives. "at costs below those of conventional methods."

One New York engineering company is currently studying results of underground tests at the AEC's Nevada test site, in the hope of using atomic explosives to dig a long-planned sea level canal across Panama. Other schemes include the commission's plan, apparently serious, to excavate a harbor on the northwest coast of Alaska.

So far few objections have been raised to such peaceful atomic blasts. One, last week, came from Rep. Daniel Flood, D., Pa. Flood, quoting Morgan G. Huntington, president of the RNB corporation, Salt Lake City, said the projected AEC blast in Colorado was based on a "gross miscalculation." It would create a "flying mountain, scattering radioactive rocks over a wide area, float a carbon black cloud, produce a devastating aerial hydrogen explosion in the wake of the first blast, and after all of this would produce no oil for the commercial market."

Representative Flood slugged at the AEC both for lagging behind the Soviets and Great Britain, he said, in nuclear development, and for "glossing over" the hazards of nuclear experiments.

Commission experts quietly discounted any real fear of danger from peaceful explosions. They pointed out that the Rainier test in Nevada in 1957 and a second shot, 10 times more powerful, fired last October, merely raised some dust from the surface of the mesa in which they were fired.

Although reports from last fall's test were not complete, the AEC claimed that it was ready to continue Project Plowshare with what it called "utter safety"

Her appointment results from the resignation of Judge Lorna Lockwood, of the superior court of Arizona, who became national public affairs chairman of the BPW club.

The western region is composed of Arizona, Montana, Idaho, Oregon, Washington, California, Nevada, Utah, Alaska and the territory of Hawaii. Miss Hawk is now a member of the national board of directors which meets in Las Vegas, Nev., in July, followed by the regional meeting at Phoenix, Ariz.

She asks legal separation but no division of community property. Mrs. Galley asks the court to direct her husband to pay all debts incurred by the couple.

### Public Revolt For Economy Sought by Ike

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4 (AP)—President Eisenhower and his congressional lieutenants appealed to the people yesterday to rise up against excessive spending.

By that they meant spending in excess of the 77 billion dollars Eisenhower has proposed for the fiscal year beginning next July 1.

Rep. Charles A. Halleck, Indiana, the Republican house leader, told reporters after a two and one-half-hour conference of GOP congressional leaders with Eisenhower: "It is high time that the people of the country who believe in this budget make their voices heard."

**Ike Shares View**  
Did Eisenhower share that view? reporters asked. "He did—definitely," Halleck replied.

Were Eisenhower and the GOP leaders in congress proposing that the public write letters to their congressmen?

Halleck replied that he, as an anti-spender, didn't need any letters himself, but he did think it would be a part of good government. If people who believe in the Eisenhower budget would say so.

Sen. Everett M. Dirksen, Illinois, the senate Republican leader, joined with Halleck in saying that those who advocate greater spending should be saddled with the responsibility for it.

**Demos Blamed**  
Halleck got specific, saying Democratic proposals in the fields of housing, airport construction, and aid to education would exceed administration spending limits by billions.

In housing, for example, Halleck complained that the Democrats are calling for spending \$1,675,000,000 to \$2,350,000,000 more of the taxpayers' money than Eisenhower has proposed.

Sen. John Sparkman, D., Ala., said he is sure his \$2,925,000,000 housing bill will get through the senate without reductions.
