



PROTECTING THE INDIVIDUAL

We in America, and all the free world, have many fears as we look upon the harsh menace of Soviet and Chinese communism.

But if someone should be watching us from another planet, he might have one great fear for us that we perhaps do not ourselves feel It is this: That in combatting the en-

creachments of the totalitarian state, we may either consciously or unconsciously copy some of its techniques and attitudes.

At first encounter this though may outrage us. But we have to face the fact that it is possible. To fight the massive assaults of communism on so many fronts, we Americans are engaging more and more in sweeping national endeavors that tend to blot out lines of individuality.

Archibald MacLeish, Harvard professor, author, poet and playwright, voices concern that American education may suffer from this very sort of thing.

Writing in the Saturday Review on the question "What Is a True University?" Mac-Leish takes note of the pressures upon us to turn out more engineers, scientists and other specialists to compete with the Rus-

He fears that if we really should respond to these pressures and develop a sort of production-line system of education, then we will be on the road to destroying the heart and essence of American life.

That essence is that the nation exists to protect and encourage and help bring to full flower the human individual. When we try to manage individuals for the purposes of the nation, when we press them into a common mold of specialism or whatever, we are yielding the crux of our freedoms.

For all the strain of communist competion, we must preserve that essence. We must cling to ways which foster and dignify in-dividuality. And we must trust that out of the rich resource of free-humans given their chance to grow and think as they wish, will come the skills and leadership to stand off even the sternest competitor.

To do otherwise, to try to put out specialists.

like automobiles or doughnuts, might be for us to discover that the thing we have fought against is here—in our midst—without either subversion or invasion.

STRENGTHENED SPIRITUALITY

For a long time the world's moral forces have been under battering assault from other, powerful-forces-cast-loose by the great upheavels of the industrial-scientific revolu-

Spiritual leaders everywhere have decried this weakening of the moral structure. They have been alarmed particularly by the blunt attacks of godless communism as its-menace

has mounted throughout the globe. Many farseeing churchmen, thoroughly aware that the great religions bear heavy responsibility for preserving and advancing the moral tradition, have wished that the world's churches could move more urgently to combat the countering forces of material-

Pope John XXIII now establishes himself s one such churchman. He has announced his intent to call an ecumenical council in search of greater Christian unity.

Vatican sources say the Pope was thinking mostly of drawing more closely together the Roman Catholic church and the Eastern Orthodox church, which separated more than 900 years ago.

But it is striking to note that Pope John's announcement stirred cautious interest in almost all high spiritual circles in the West-

With few exceptions they suggest that free men of good will have much to gain from a coming together of Christian forces everywhere. A common front for Christendom is seen as a massive step toward the rebuilding

of the shaken moral structure. What these leaders want, they plainly indicate, is not union under one church or another, but unity, a coalltion of interest and purpose that can more effectively advance the cause of spirituality and morality every-

Pope John has found a responsive chord among these men who feel an aching need for greater moral power in the world. Clearly, an opportunity of high importance may be at hand to strengthen and toughen the fibres of the free, moral spirit within men.
