## AFL-CIO Council Calls For 35-Hour Week; Will Ask \$1.25 Pay Minimum

PUERTO RICO, Feb. 23 (AP)—The AFL-CIO executive council called on Congress today to take immediate steps to reduce the present 40-hour work week to 35 hours. The statement, adopted at the current winter meeting of the labor standards act, said that with nearly five million jobless now, the need for shortening the work week is obvious. AFL-CIO President George Meany said, "We must either reduce the work week or shoot some substantial portion of our working population."

## 1 Children Killed in U.S. Week-End Fires

Fires killed 31 children, all of them in their homes, during a week-end. Ten of the young victims were from Massachusetts. A United Press International count showed at least 40 persons died in fires in cities and towns from coast to coast. A gas stove fire in a house trailer near Culvers, N. J., early today killed the four children of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Henderson. The mother, Eileen, suffered second degree burns trying to rescue the children. The most disastrous blaze occurred late Saturday when a mother and her seven children died when flames destroyed their four-room frame house at Crystal City, Tex.

## Auto Traffic Toll Hits 31; 2 More Dead

A week-end toll of 31 deaths on the highway deaths over a week-end boosted Idaho's traffic toll to 31—seven more at this time last year. The latest victims were Mrs. Joan Man, 18, Nampa, who was killed in a freak car-horse mishap today, and Mrs. Alice Nagel, 42, who died in an auto accident in north Idaho Saturday. In Canyon county officers, Mrs. Waltman was killed when she was struck by a horse, which dashed into a two-lane highway intersection west of Nampa. Two vehicles dodged the animal, struck the horse, threw Mrs. Waltman high into the air. She was taken to Mercy hospital where she was treated for shock. Her 38-year-old daughter, Mrs. W. T. Hill, 7, was treated for cuts and abrasions.

## Auto Wrecks Kill 14 People in West State

CHICAGO, Feb. 23 (UPI)—A series of accidents over the week-end killed 14 persons and injured others. Five members of a family of six were among the victims. The car, loaded with transient workers, crashed head-on just south of last night—six persons lost their lives in the crash which involved the cars to almost half of the original sizes. Six others were injured, two of them critically and others seriously.

## Persons Killed in Florida Crash

CALAHAN, Fla., Feb. 23 (AP)—A crash of an automobile and truck near here today killed three persons and injured others. The crash occurred shortly after 10 p. m. The 1956 model car in which the victims were riding was headed south on U. S. highway 90. The car, driven by J. T. Hill, 30, along with his wife, Betty, 28, and two children, Walter Hammonds and Floyd Hammonds, both 10, possibly have been 30-year-old twins, were killed in the crash. The other car was a 1956 Buick and Francisco de La Fuente, 24, was killed.

BRASILIA, Feb. 23 (AP)—Brazil's official new ambassador to the U. S. is expected to be announced today. The Brazilian government, responding to an inquiry from Washington, ended its agreement to appointment of the ambassador to head the embassy here.

## Lawyers Discuss Warren, Court's Communist Acts

CHICAGO, Feb. 23 (UPI)—The house of delegates of the American Bar Association opened its mid-year session today and ABA President Ross L. Malone said he was sorry that Chief Justice Earl Warren had dropped his ABA membership. Malone said he had urged Warren to reconsider, but Warren declined. A wide range of issues was covered in the resolutions facing the house of delegates. The resolutions must be approved by the house before they become policy of the ABA. Among those awaiting action was a resolution proposing congressional action to clarify recent decisions of the supreme court of the United States on cases involving communism.

## Legislators Urged To Change Makeup Of Highway Board

BOISE, Feb. 23 (AP)—Idaho's highway board was described today as "more interested in super highways than in feeder roads" and the state legislature was urged to revise board makeup. Under consideration in the senate was a bill which would increase membership of the board from three to five. Appointive power would remain with the governor but his selections would have to be with the advice and consent of the state land board. Idaho's present chief executive, Gov. Robert E. Smylie, is a Republican. The land board is controlled by Democrats.

## Russia, Britain Agree to Work On New Cultural Affairs Treaty

MOSCOW, Feb. 23 (UPI)—Russia and Britain agreed today to begin work on a new cultural affairs treaty linking the two nations. British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan and Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev decided at their first formal conference to put the job of writing a cultural agreement in the hands of a special committee, authorized by concrete result of Macmillan's summit visit to Moscow. The two leaders conferred for two hours and 25 minutes.

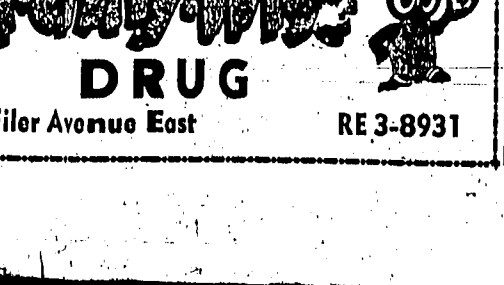

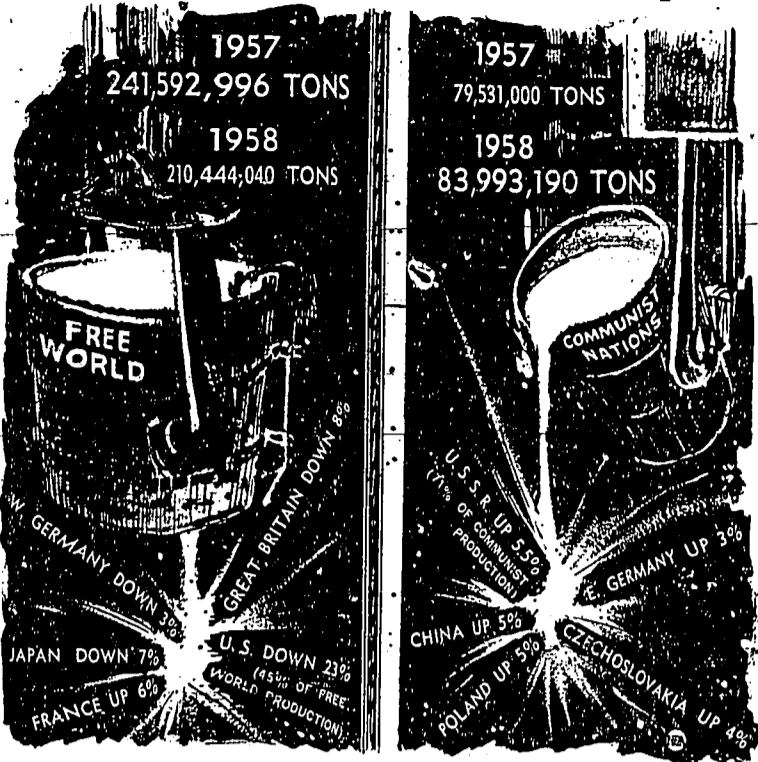

3,300 Attend LDS Meeting Held in Area

BURLEY, Feb. 23—Approximately 3,300 persons attended the two sessions of the stake quarterly conference of the LDS church Sunday. Noyal P. Baker, president of the Burley stake, opened the morning session, saying that wherever commissions are given, blessings are attached and love feeds upon kindness and courtesy. His remarks were followed by talks by three missionaries, Gary Yeagon, Marlow Yost and Lowell Beckstrand, who spoke on study, prayer, joys of the true gospel and obedience. President Burdell T. Curtis, first counselor of the stake presidency, spoke of the influence of the gospel, and of the founders and preservers of the nation. Edward G. Raring furnaces of the free world have produced over 210 million net tons of ingot and casting steel in 1958, a drop from the previous year, according to Steel magazine. Of top five free world producers only France registered an increase, while the only communist country that fell off from 1957 was North Korea.

New Sextant Is More Accurate

CEDAR RAPIDS, Ia., Feb. 23 (UPI)—A newly developed radio sextant, said to be 10 times as accurate as present marine compasses, could revolutionize modern naval warfare, its designers said today. Dr. Gene Warner, head of the radio astronomy group at the Collins Radio company, said the device can track the moon and sun continuously under all weather conditions and is a "major breakthrough in navigational systems." Its importance, he said, lies in its ability to pick up extremely weak radio signals from the moon, whose total power is 1/500,000 billionth of the power of a small Christmas tree light. Collins research official, Dr. David McCoy, said secrecy-shrouded experiments since late last summer at Feather Ridge observatory near here had yielded the first continuous tracking of the moon in history.

### Infants' Footprints Can Become Real Value for Parents; Importance Told

WASHINGTON, (NEA)—Not even the world's best baby photographer can turn out a memento that's as valuable to proud parents as the hospital record of their infant's footprints.

The importance of this unique document made headlines recently when a Bossier City, La., couple called on the federal bureau of investigation to find out which of their 5-year-old twin daughters was which.

The girls looked so much alike that mom and dad were in a constant state of confusion trying to tell them apart. To complicate matters, the twin's favorite household prank was to use each other's name.

Finally, the parents decided it was time to settle their problem. They asked local detectives to take footprints of the girls and match them with those on their birth certificates. But the four sets of prints looked as much alike to the police as the twins' smiling faces.

Finally the detectives mailed the prints to the FBI's identification division, Washington. This branch of the famed law enforcement agency identifies disaster victims, locates missing persons and straightens out baby mix-ups as a public service.

Within 15 minutes the highly skilled ID experts spotted differences in the prints and solved the parent's dilemma.

It's case like this that cause FBI officials to emphasize the importance of hospitals footprinting babies. They explain that the rule of no two people having the same fingerprints also holds true for footprints.

Footprinting is usually used for infants since their fingers are too small and flexible to make clear ink impressions. But agents explain that unless a baby's prints are taken before he leaves the delivery room there's no fool-proof way of settling any future question about his identity. This is true even if the hospital uses special name tags.

Most hospitals fix identification tags onto the wrists or ankles of newborn infants. But there's always the possibility that the tags will come off and be put back on the wrong babies.

One Washington woman was convinced that this had happened when she arrived at a local hospital to claim her baby. The infant had been kept there for several days of additional treatment after the mother had been discharged.

When the woman was handed the tot, she insisted that there must be a mistake. It didn't matter that both the baby's crib and identification bracelet were marked with the right name. The infant was simply "too ugly" to be hers.

Hospital officials made a fresh set of the baby's footprints and took them, along with their own records, to the FBI. A quick check proved beyond a doubt that the two sets of prints were identical. The woman had no choice but to take the "ugly" tot home.

Despite the numerous infant identifications that have been made with footprints, critics often claim that the system is completely unreliable. They argue that in many cases what was supposed to be a print turned out to be nothing but a blob.

FBI experts, however, insist that all necessary identification lines are on the feet of every newborn baby. They explain that smudges are the result of hospital personnel not knowing the right way to take footprints.

That's why FBI officials urged that local police agencies volunteer to teach hospital technicians the proper technique.

Agents also recommend that nursing schools offer a special course in footprinting. They explain that they don't advocate the system as a replacement for name tags but only as an extra protection against mix-ups.

Footprinting infants has become standard policy in numerous hospitals throughout the county. In several states it's required by law.

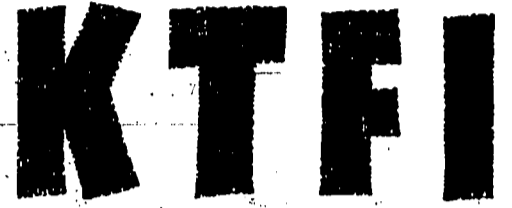

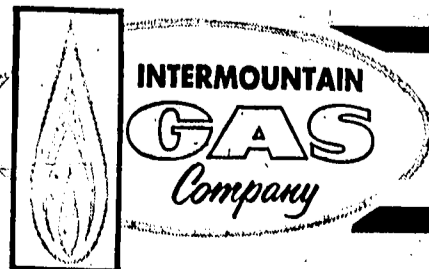
