



THAT DEADLY VETO

When experts agreed at Geneva last sum mer that detection of nuclear explosions is feasible, hopes rose for the first time in years that a serious effort at banning A and H-bombs might be in the making.

The current-talks among the United States, Great Britain and the Soviet union, also at Geneva, have been designed to follow up that encouraging lead. For the most part they have proceeded in the shadow of seemingly bigger news, and seldom have caught head-

But now an element has been injected which demands attention from us all, With great reluctance we must accept the fact that it casts grave doubt on the ultimate willingness of the Russians to agree to any kind of really effective nuclear test ban-not to mention a general nuclear disarmament.

The element is the veto.

Russia has presented to the conferees a list of seven issues which it insists a nuclear control commission should have to agree upon unanimously. A veto by either Russia, Britain or the United States would, under this plan, block control steps in any of these fields.

The practical meaning of this is that the procedures proposed for policing a test ban could be hamstrung at every important stage.

The Kremlin wants a veto over the hiring and firing of any technician needed to operate the detection system.

It wants the right to say "no" on the send ing of inspection teams to investigate possible sneak explosions reported by the network of detection stations.

It wants the privilege of barring any action by the control commission based on finding of inspection teams.

And it wants the chance to block the make ing of any accusation by the commission that a nation has violated the ban-or has even obstructed the commission's operations.

With the memory of Russia's tens of vetoes in the United Nations still fresh, with the long record of armistice violations by the Communists in North Korea an equally forceful reminder, how can we imagine that anything but total obstruction and subversion of a test ban plan would follow if the veto were allowed?

The Kremlin's veto proposition is a device either to kill the Geneva talks outright or to produce a completely unenforceable and hence useless nuclear test ban,

DOWN, BOY, DOWN

We have a hunch that a certain idea, whichseems pretty zany at first glance, may start a wave of enthusiasm that will sweep the world,



DEALING WITH BAD CHECK PASSERS

One way to relieve pressure on the state penitefi-tiary—now at a peak—might be to change the rules so as to stop admission of bad check passers to its accommodations.

A step in this direction might be taken with en actions of senate bill 168 which was introduced in the Idaho legislature Wednesday to classify the writ-ing-of-an insufficient fund check as a misdemeanor; punishable by jail sentence or fine, instead of as a felony, punishable by a prison term.

Among 619 inmates, setting an all-time high for Idaho prison population according to a recent count there were 102 serving sentences for writing insuf-ficient fund checks, and 128 others doing time for forgery which generally is a bad check charge.

Prior to about 10 years ago there were no inmates serving terms in the Idaho prison for writing in-sufficient fund checks, because then, as is now pro-posed, that was an offense rated as a misdemeanor.

Just as turkey stealing was legally designated as a felony in Idaho some years-ago-when depredations of that kind were particularly troublesome, so had check writing has been designated as a crime punish able by incarceration in the state prison because it was hoped the stiffer penalty might be an effective deterrent and because law enforcement officers were having so much trouble with bad check writers that it may have been felt the old law was inadequate.

But experience indicates that the new law dealing with this effects of the state of

may have been felt the old law was inadequate.

But experience indicates that the new law dealing with this offense as a felony isn't working out very well either. One reason for that may be that the penitentiary lacks facilities for keeping all its inmates at work, so that some of them may regard a prison sentence as a sort of social security measure affording an easy way of getting food and shelter.

The ten-year-old change in this law hean't perceptibly curtailed bad check writing operations, nor has it relieved law enforcement officers of onerous problems in dealing with them, Quite as often now as before, probably the bad check writers' victims attempt to use the police and prosecutors as collection agencies. They don't want to put the "poor chap" in prison; all they want is their money.

Whether the convicted bad check passer were committed to the county jail, or to the penitentiary, might not make very much difference, except certainly the pressure on the prison would be relieved if such offenders were no longer committed to its keeping. On that account and under all the circumstances a reversion to the old order would be a good thing.

What's plainly evident, though, as J. Edgar Hoover pointed out the other day, is that "in the battle against fraudulent check passing, the "cictim" represents the principal hope of success." If the "victim" can be alerted and placed more on his own responsibility, individually and collectively, to protect himself against this plague, then certainly the worthless check passer's work will become more difficult and his profits small and there will be best possible assurance that he will cease to flourish.—Boise Statesman.
