U.S. Navy Searches Russ Fishing Vessel at Sea in Probe Over Broken Cable

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27 (AP)—A U. S. navy team took the unusual step of boarding a Soviet trawler on the high seas Thursday, but found nothing to link the vessel with recent breaks in trans-Atlantic cables. "No indications of intentions other than fishing," was the finding. The quick negative report, issued by the navy here a few hours after the boarding was announced, lessened the potential impact of the incident on already touchy U. S.-Soviet relations. There was no immediate indication how Moscow might react. Nations jealous of their sovereignty often resent the boarding of their ships by men of another nation.

War Danger Grave, Solon Tells Senate

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27 (AP)—Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D., Conn., warning that the Soviets may trigger a war over Berlin, urged yesterday an intensive 90-day program to alert the nation for any eventuality. "I do not believe the country is prepared—that the people are prepared—that they know they are on the threshold of grave disaster," Dodd told the senate. On the other hand, three Republican senators said after a talk with President Eisenhower that firm plans have been made to meet any Soviet move to force the western Allies out of divided Berlin. No details were given. Dodd said he questions not so much the adequacy of U. S. armed forces as what he termed the unpreparedness of the people for possible conflict.

Africa Leaders Are Held in 'Emergency'

SALISBURY, Southern Rhodesia, Feb. 27 (AP)—A steady stream of native politicians was rushed into confinement behind barbed wire today as the British rulers of Southern Rhodesia pushed a roundup of African nationalist leaders. Despite the proclamation of a state of emergency in Southern Rhodesia and the banning of the African National party, both that territory and neighboring Nyasaland and Northern Rhodesia were reported quiet. The detention camp hurriedly set up at Bulawayo, 230 miles southwest of Salisbury, was rapidly filling. The government pressed a hunt for other leaders of Rhodesia's leading African nationalist organization, blamed for riots last week in Nyasaland.

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Feb. 27 (UPI)—New York Yankee slugger Mickey Mantle ended his holdout today by signing a 1959 contract calling for a salary of \$40,000, a raise of \$5,000.

Cent Boost in Tax Of Smokes Passed In Revenue Drive

BOISE, Feb. 27 (UPI)—The Idaho house today gave overwhelming approval to a one-cent boost in the state cigarette tax. It voted 45 to 9 for a bill which would raise the tax from four cents to five cents a pack. The bill now goes to the senate. It was an administration measure, designed to produce \$1,200,000 additional revenue in a biennium. There was little debate on the cigarette tax measure. Chairman J. W. Monroe, D., Nez Perce, of the house revenue and taxation committee, which sponsored the bill, and house minority leader W. D. Eberle, said they were not sympathetic to raising money via the excise tax route but since the governor had asked for the measure and the revenue was needed they would vote for it. Rep. Leo Handy, D., Minidoka, opposed the bill because he said it failed to provide a tax on cigars.

VALLETTA, Malta, Feb. 27 (UPI)—Rioting and fires broke out at the British navy dockyard here today when 6,000 Maltese dockworkers received notice that a private British firm is taking over the yard. Police used tear gas against the rioters. Flames could be seen from the center of the city across the bay from the dockyard.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Feb. 27 (UPI)—Kansas City, Kans., today was selected as the site for a proposed 5 million dollar agricultural hall of fame. The executive committee of the hall of fame made the decision in a two-hour meeting today, picking the Kansas site over Springfield, Ill., in an unanimous vote.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27 (UPI)—The Democratic national committee today rejected bids from Chicago and Philadelphia for the 1960 national convention, clearing the way for the selection of Los Angeles.

JODRELL BANK, England, Feb. 27 (AP)—A dozen technicians tuned up the world's largest radio telescope today to track another U. S. attempt to put a space vehicle into orbit. A Jodrell Bank spokesman said the space shot is expected Saturday or Sunday.

Chance Reported Slim For Changing Refuge

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27—Despite a memorial from the Idaho legislature asking the federal government to turn the Lake Walcott refuge over to Idaho, the fish and wildlife service apparently will continue to manage the area, according to Sen. Henry C. Dworshak. Senator Dworshak says he has received approval from federal and state wildlife agencies to schedule a meeting to discuss expanded use of the Lake Walcott area behind Minidoka dam. The senator further reported that Ross Leonard, director of the Idaho fish and game department, has informed him the state is not interested in taking over management of the refuge.

Corn Support Prices Listed By Area Aide

SHOSHONE, Feb. 27—The price of the 1959 corn crop will be supported at a minimum national average rate of \$1.12 per bushel, according to Chairman Eugene Alexander of the Lincoln county agricultural stabilization and conservation committee.

Under the new program, which takes effect in 1959, corn produced anywhere in the United States that meets quality and storage requirements, will be eligible for support at the same national average rate, with adjustments for grade, quality, location and other factors. There will be no acreage allotments and no designated commercial area for corn. This program was provided by law and approved by more than 70 per cent of farmers voting in a referendum last November.

Under the program in effect for the 1959 crop of corn, the national average rate is \$1.36 for farmers who complied with their corn allotments and \$1.06 for commercial area producers who did not comply with allotments.

Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

"Could you suggest something a distracted mother could do to impress a small boy with the necessity of washing his hands, closing a door so it is not heard down the block? Just the simple ways of home life? If I've told him once I've told him a thousand times—No soap."

Top suggestion: Sit down and take a long breath. Think of Job and his bulls, or of some one with worse troubles than those of having an active child about the house. Look at the funny sheet. Forget him for a while and take time out to laugh. That will release the tension that is distracting a much tired mother.

It is necessary to tell a small boy or girl the same thing over and over until the idea takes hold and becomes a habit. Children are much like plants in that they are developing root growth beneath the surface. For a time there seem to be no growth and development whatever. Then one day a promising bud appears and the first stage of a habit appears.

Every mother has experienced a sensation of surprise when a neighbor has said, "I wish my youngster was as well behaved as yours. I talk and talk but it's no good but your boy takes off his hat when he comes in, says, 'How do you do?' How do you do that?"

Sometimes parents, especially fathers of small boys expect too much of them too soon. It takes a lot of telling to reach a small boy's mind when the idea is one for which he is not physically and mentally ready. Tell him and tell him again to stimulate the readiness but don't demand results before the time is ripe for them.

To make certain the telling registers, make sure of the child's attention. See that he stops what he is doing and looks at you. Speak slowly and clearly. If it is very important that he acts on what you tell him

This results in stains from the oil in your skin and—in the case of your beard—a scraping that causes the tie to fray. This fraying and staining can also ruin the knot of a four-in-hand or Windsor tie.

The first step to tie protection in this case is to make sure that you have a clean, close shave before putting on a necktie. A little powder or after-shave lotion is some protection against the skin oils staining the tie. For men who have extra heavy or fast growing beards, it is best not to buy pure silk ties because they are especially prone to beard fraying. Men who shave at 8:00 find their ties last much longer (8:00 in the morning and then have a heavy beard by noon will find that they would not be as easily damaged by the beard.

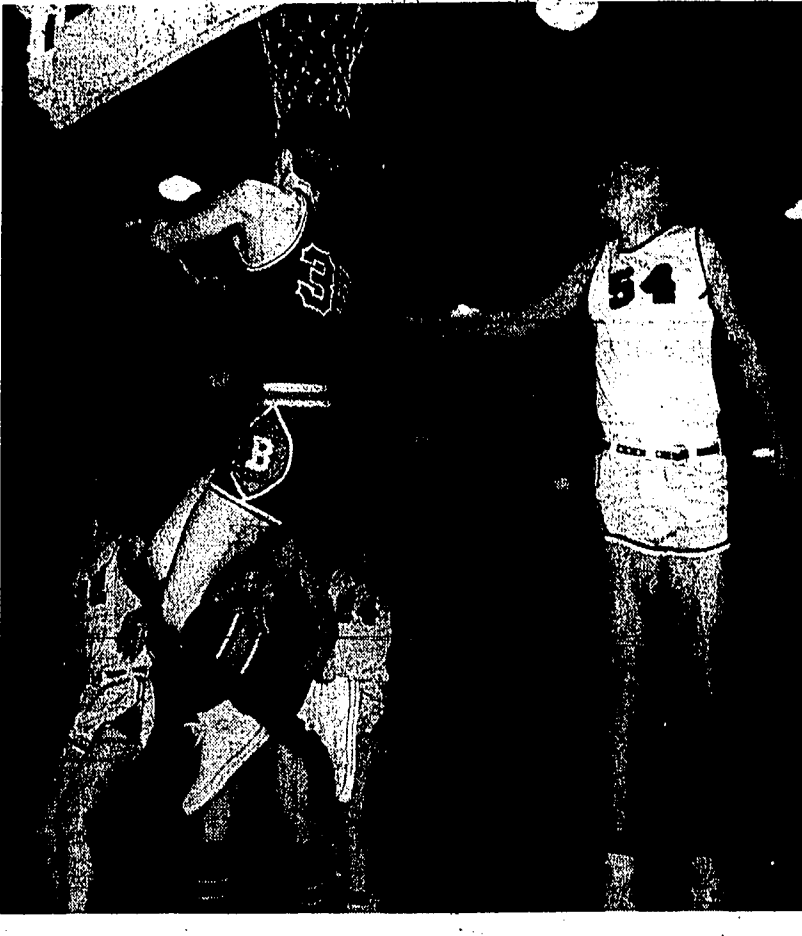

LUERNE VALLEY, Calif., Feb. 27 (UPI)—Rene Belbenoit, 69, whose book "Dry Guillotine" about notorious Devils Island was credited with being instrumental in closing down the French penal colony, died yesterday of an apparent heart attack. Belbenoit, an escapee from the penal colony who became an American citizen in 1956, was found dead in the clothing store he owned in this southern California desert community about 25 miles northeast of San Bernardino. He is survived by his widow, Lee Gumpert, and a son. The book "Dry Guillotine" tells of Belbenoit's experiences at Devils Island and his hardships during his 1935 escape. It was translated into nearly a dozen languages and was credited with presenting such a horrible picture of French justice to the world that the colony was abolished.

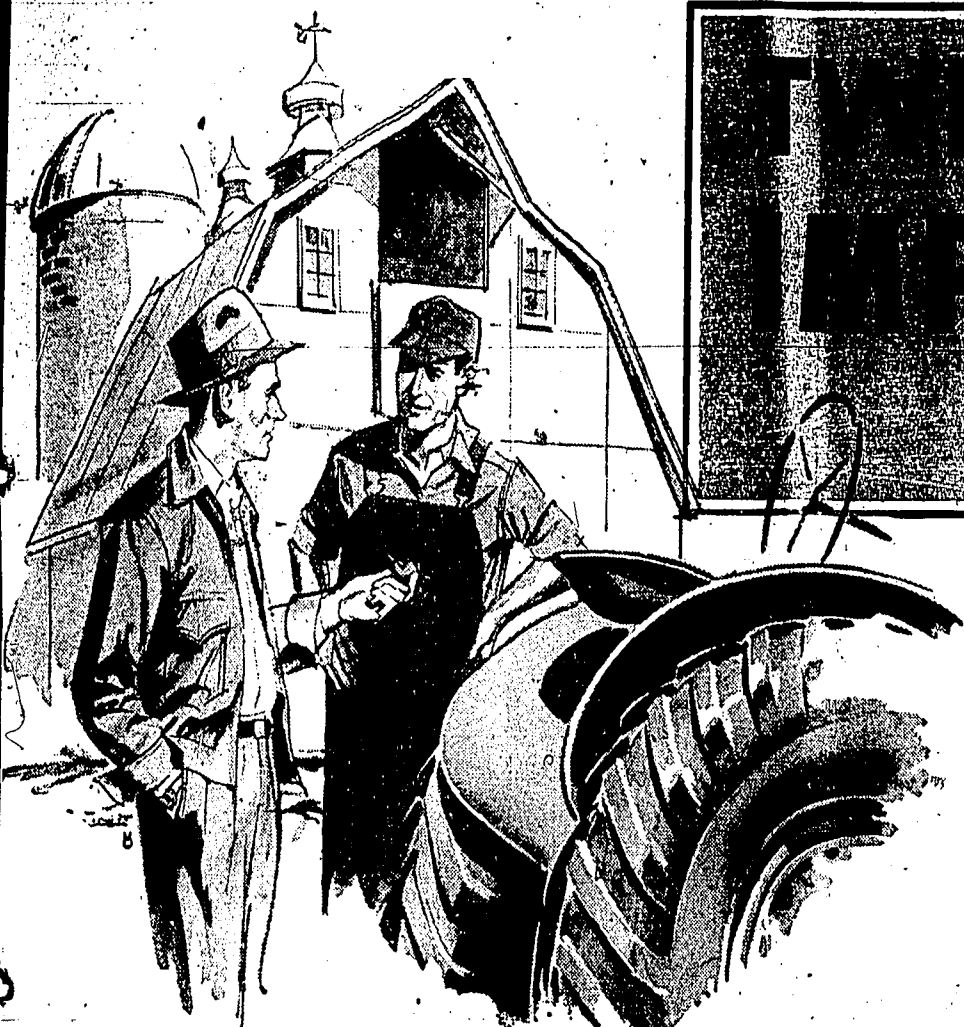

Italian Court Has Modified Payment Law

Involves Husband
 The case involved a husband who was brought to court by a grocer after his wife had run up a huge bill on foodstuffs and had charged the amount to hubby.

The court upheld the grocer.

"The bills that a wife runs up must be limited to within the earning power of the husband."

Wife Buys Food
 "In this instance, the wife bought solely foodstuffs and an amount which appears reasonable for an average daily sustenance," the judge said.

The husband had to pay the bill. But the judge added that if, the wife had charged things "for her own personal use, such as an excessive amount of cosmetics, jewelry, a fur coat or perhaps an automobile, then the husband would not be held liable to pay."

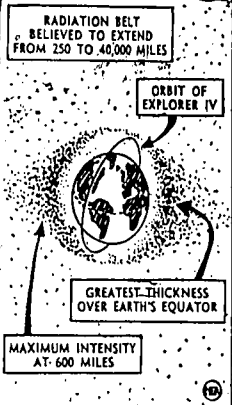

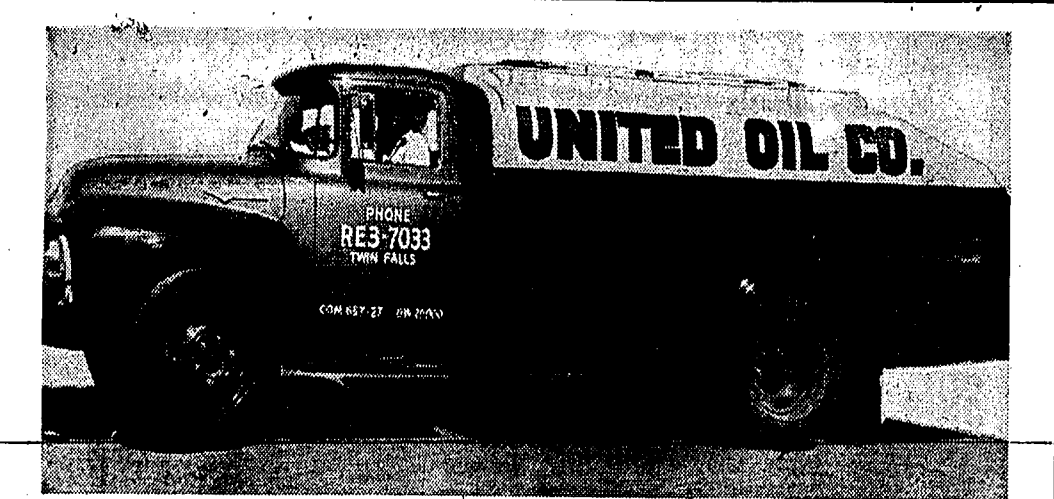

Teachers Are Rehired for Area School

RICHFIELD, Feb. 27—All Richfield teachers were rehired by the school board at a special meeting this week at the high school.

At the annual trustee election April 14 the district will vote on an additional two-mill levy. Gonda Sluder, school board clerk, reported \$91,000 as the amount the Richfield district operated on this school year. For the coming school year the approximate figure will be \$88,800.00, because of decreased enrollment.

Richfield is now assessed 33 1/2 mills for schools, of which 25 is for the general fund, six and one-half for bonded indebtedness, and two mills for capital outlay.

Terms of two trustees expire at the April 14 election. Mrs. Gonda Sluder, clerk, has served eight years from zone two. L. T. Sanders, board chairman from zone three, has served two terms. A third trustee will be elected to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. Hays Vaden, who has moved from zone five to the town of Richfield. The term is for two years.

Holdover members of the board are Mrs. Thurman Hansen, zone one, and Max Behr, who was elected last year to serve the two-year unexpired term of Eugene Freeman, who has moved to Twin Falls.

Board members discussed transportation problems for the north end school bus route, where some children are required to ride the bus for an exceptionally long period each day.

Cassia Residents Get Easter Seals

BURLEY, Feb. 27—Easter Seal appeal letters have been mailed to 3,500 homes in Cassia county, according to Mrs. Jess Parsons, trustee for the Crippled Children's society.

Idaho contributions last year enabled the society to help 707 children and adults in all parts of the state, Mrs. Parsons said. These children have such handicaps as speech and hearing difficulties, congenital defects, heart defects, cerebral palsy and crippling and defacing from accidents.

There are 18,000 school children in Idaho with speech and hearing difficulties, and nearly 4,000 with orthopedic handicaps who need assistance. More than 81 per cent of all funds raised are spent in Idaho for direct services, education and research, Mrs. Parsons said, and 25 per cent of the amount raised is earmarked for direct care service in that county.

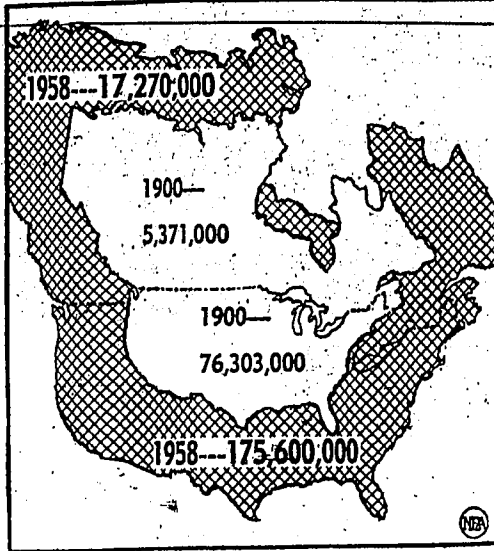

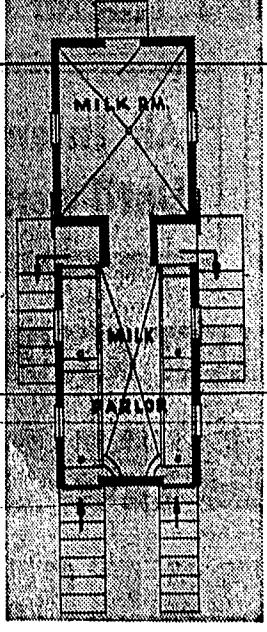

"You have to love a profession that has been so good to you."

Chevalier, who quit a dubious future in a thumbtack factory to become the most durable song-and-dance man of his time, retains a charm that is financial as well as physical. Nearly 30 years ago he

was making \$20,000 a week, and today is more solvent than the French government, or the American government, for that matter.

Seated in the living room of his hotel suite, Chevalier was the picture of timeless, old-fashioned sport. He wore a smart plaid suit whose pattern looks as if it had been woven in Braille. His spring-blue eyes crinkled in a ruddy complexion.

But at 180 pounds, his agile frame gave a slight hint of portliness.

"If I were intelligent, I would weigh a little less," he sighed. "But I am getting at a moment in my life when it is hard to refuse to eat a little more, or drink a little more, if I feel like it."

"To give way to all the bad instincts that we all have—that is what defeats most people. When I see young artists who are broken by liquor and things like that it makes me sad."

"I am not a moralist—ah, no—I only know what is good. I know you never run a risk of doing less of anything tempting, and you al-

ways run a risk in doing too much of anything."

"Too much of anything is too much—whether it is virtue or vice."

Chevalier is immensely pleased over the international success of his latest movie.

Despite his light-hearted air, work has been a religion with him. His art is endlessly rehearsed.

But the old boy, now minus his famed straw hat, still wears life like it was a flower in his buttonhole.

"Take exercise? Ah, no!" he shook his head. "But I stopped smoking 25 years ago, and I drink very little."

"Whisky is the best drink—when you can indulge it. It gives you a lift. So," he laughed, "So you must not drink it until you fall down."

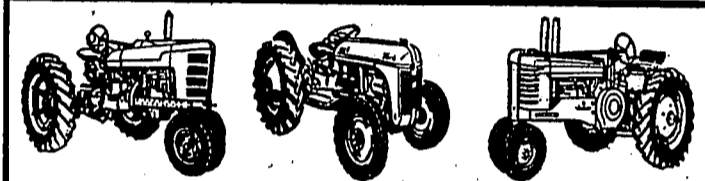

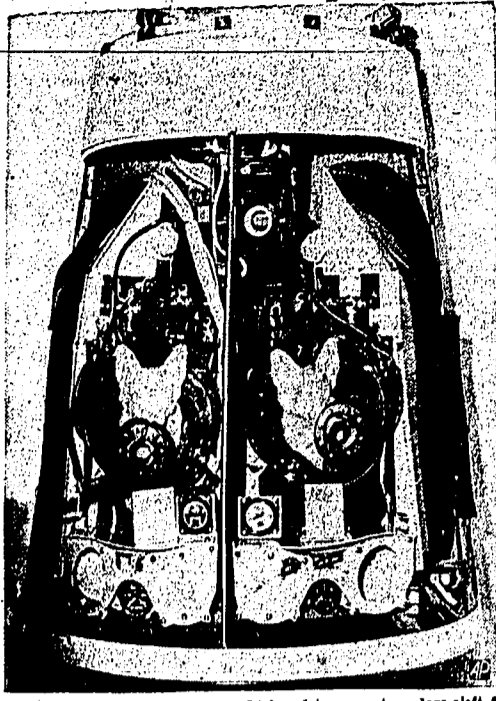

Bull Grading Tour Set for Part of Area

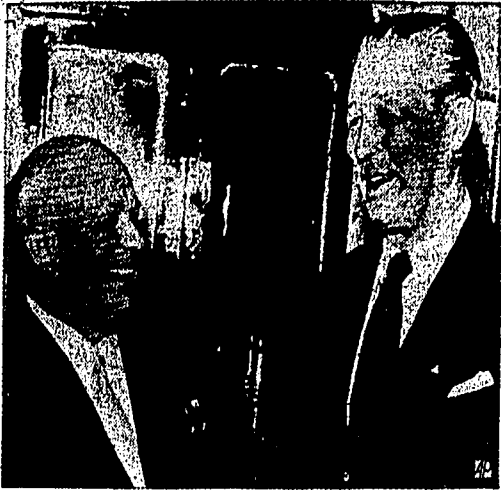

Reading Books Does Not Help Henry 'Grow' Green Thumb

The moment it was decided we were to have a vegetable garden this summer, I raced to the library and asked for all the books available on the subject.

It was an ambitious order, for gardening, it seems, ranks with Lincoln, sex, the Civil war and medicine in popularity with authors.

I took a carload of books home, confident that by the time I had read them all I would have a thumb as green as a parrot's tail, and would be whooping it up for higher subsidies for farmers, better farm roads and more rural electrification.

Now I am not so sure. None of the half a hundred books I brought home is for the beginner. The authors assume that the reader has grown a few things in his life, and has a working knowledge of soil, drainage, phosphates, dwarfs, giants and nitrates.

What I wanted was a gardening book done in simple terms, like those books on bridge that start off: "There are four suits—diamonds, spades, clubs and hearts—and there are 52 cards in a deck."

For example, we had decided that our main crop would be green peas. They are my favorite vegetable, as well as the wife's, and as good as the frozen ones are, as nice as are the ones from a can, they can't compare with the tiny ones, cooked as soon as possible after they are picked, as far as we are concerned.

The books were of little help to a novice. For example, one said the traditional time for planting was St. Patrick's day—provided you lived in a climate about that of Kansas City, Pittsburgh or Boston.

Unfortunately, I don't live in Kansas City, Pittsburgh or Boston. I could make it up there by St. Patrick's day, but it surely would keep me hustling. But what assurance would I have that when I got, say, to Boston, I would be able to find a house right away that had a yard big enough for a pea patch?

The more I read, the more I knew that any hope we had of growing peas was out of the question.

"In many places," the book said, "soil needs lime to grow peas. A pH of 6.5 is exactly right, though a pH of 0.5 on either side of that figure is good enough."

Is that so? How helpful! Just what does "pH" mean? And even if my back yard was solid pH, how would I go about finding out if it were 0.4, 0.3 or 0.99? Can you buy a machine that, stuck in the ground like a thermometer in a roast, determines the pH?

Another paragraph: "What do members of the pea family, the legumes, need of nitrogen in the soil?" Search me. Maybe legumes need enough hydrogen to float a balloon, and maybe a whisper of nitrogen will make them curl up and yell uncle!

I'm mighty glad that, in our enthusiasm for pea raising, we didn't throw away the can opener, or set our minds too solidly against the frozen variety.
