Treasury Gets Funds Needed But Officials Are Concerned

WASHINGTON, March 2.—The Treasury is having trouble borrowing the billions he needs to stay in business.

No one doubts he'll get the money he requires, one way or another. The question is: What price will he have to pay—in terms of dollars, economic difficulty and possible inflation?

If the price gets high enough, financial crisis could develop, Treasury officials say they're optimistic but their concern is apparent.

The government's plight was dramatized last month when nine billion dollars of loans supplied by private lenders came due. Like any period debtor, Uncle Sam asked his creditors to renew the loans. As encouragement, he offered them new and more generous terms.

The lenders—banks, companies and individuals—had a choice. They could renew their loans for one year and collect 3 1/2 per cent interest or renew for three years and get four per cent. Historically, these interest rates are very high. In some cases, they were more than double the rate paid on the original loans.

Nevertheless, two billion dollars of loans were not renewed. The lenders wanted their money back. Uncle Sam had expected a sizable demand for cash—but not this much. He didn't have the funds to pay off the maturing loans and was forced to make an emergency borrowing.

This meant he was able to get only the credit he needed only on the second attempt. He had expected to get enough the first time. It was a sobering experience for the world's best credit risk.

What went wrong?

There can be no precise answer since the results represented decisions by scores of lenders who didn't put their reasons in writing. Treasury officials are inclined to blame "technical" factors. However, they concede some of the responsibility belongs to these other

...more ominous factors:

1. Fear of rising interest rates in a period of economic recovery.
2. Fear of inflation.

If an investor believes inflation is the "wave of the future," he doesn't want to tie up his money in a government bond—a treasury security—that would depreciate in value. Mrs. Moore aptly wrote in common stocks or real estate, hoping their value will keep pace with inflation.

All interest rates tend to rise in periods of inflation. Lenders need more incentive to make a loan since they'll be paid back in dollars of diminishing value.

Meanwhile, the federal reserve board has been restricting credit—in effect, holding down the supply of money available for lending. The board has done this in hopes

Haiti Leader Talks of U.S. Aid for Area

PAUL PRINCE, Haiti's president of this small nation, which is striving to avoid nation, two large neighbors, has been quoted Press International.

Prinze, a doctor who has spent the last five years in the United States, said he believes the United States should take immediate steps to assume full responsibility for maintenance of the windows of the nation's capital, which is on a hillside over Port au Prince harbor toward Cuba on the distant horizon as he spoke.

Prinze planned a meeting in Cuba, former Gen. Louis Delvalle, president of Haiti, for a revolutionary invasion attempt in Haiti which would be made within 30 days.

Prinze, a candidate in the last Haitian presidential election, has a background of two "bebeuses" (drunkards) from Haiti and Castro's Cuban revolution.

Prinze has not included Haiti in the Caribbean countries where his government has pledged to assist in establishing a free trade area.

Prinze has stated his positive intention to aid in an attempt to restore President Jean Francois Duvalier to the presidency of the Dominican Republic on the same island where his father stands between the Caribbean and Cuba.

Dr. Delvalle's Warning

"Our concern at the moment is the possibility that Haiti may move first in an attempt to look us before we are ready," Dr. Delvalle told the United Press International in Port-au-Prince.

"Before we move we want to make clear our demand for United States supervision of Haitian elections," Dr. Delvalle, a quiet-spoken, neatly dressed man with a grey beard and hornrimmed glasses, addressed his fellow presidents of Caribbean nations.

"It is time for every leader to think in terms of civilization rather than war and invasions. The important battle should not be against one another but against illiteracy, poverty and disease," he said.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., March 1 (UPI)—Three small children perished in a flaming house last night. Their screams were heard as a fire blazed next door.

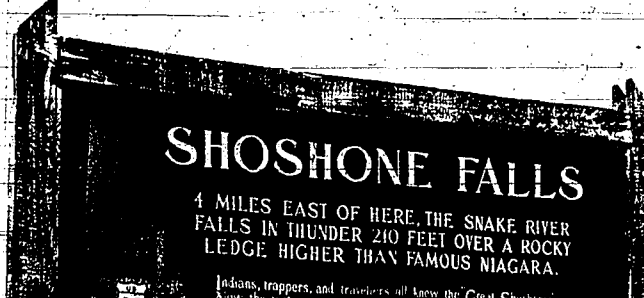
Acting Deputy Fire Chief Robert T. Mortary blamed the fire on oil space heaters which are scheduled to be outlawed in Springfield.

South and Border States to Tell Race Problems at Meet

NASHVILLE, Tenn., March 2 (UPI)—School officials from southern, southwestern and border states will tell the federal civil rights commission here March 2 and 3 about their own problems in initiating and carrying out desegregation.

The integration conference, the first one ever called by an agency of the federal government, was set up to obtain first-hand information on actual problems of opening previously all-white schools to Negroes. The civil rights commission will use the information for its Sept. 9 report to the President and the congress.

But state school superintendents from the deep South indicated almost unanimously that they would not attend. Invitations were turned down by State Superintendents Thomas D. Bailey, Florida; J. M. Blidsoe, Mississippi; Charles P. Carroll, North Carolina; Frank Stewart, Alabama; and Claude Purcell, Georgia. Purcell said he showed his invitation to Georgia Attorney General Eugene Cook for "checkmate."

One of those who will tell the commission of integration experiences is city school Superintendent William H. Oliver, Nashville. There schools are in the second year of a grade-by-grade desegregation program.

The start of integration here in 1957 was marked by violence that included the dynamiting of the Hattie Carter elementary school. The integrated high school at Clinton, Tenn., was damaged by dynamite last fall.

John A. Hannah, chairman of the civil rights commission, said his group feels it must obtain all available information about the situation.

South American Attention Urged

NEWARK, N.J., March 2 (UPI)—Gov. Robert J. Meyner called last night for increased trade, political and cultural relations with South America.

The Democratic governor, who returned from a South American tour last Friday, said on his weekly television show that one of the major U.S. diplomatic failings in South America seems to be that "we make them feel neglected."

"We sometimes give much more attention to Europe and the remainder of the world and fail to turn our attention to their needs," he said.

125 Chased From Homes by Wreck

DANVILLE, Ky., March 2 (UPI)—Some 125 persons, evacuated yesterday after a freight train carrying chemicals from the atomic energy commission was derailed, were allowed to return to their homes in nearby Geneva early today.

Explosions, apparently set off by the impact of the crash, caused fires that burned out of control in the 20 detached lots of the southern Kentucky community because they didn't know what the cargo contained and feared further explosions.

"An AEO spokeswoman at Oak Ridge, Tenn., said the chemicals were highly inflammable but not radioactive.

Two railroad employees were hospitalized after inhaling chemical fumes and five firemen were treated for exhaustion.

A new volume in Harman's author-Vardis Fisher's "Testament of man" series, is "My Holy Satan." It portrays the search for truth against all odds including torture and death. Background of the book is the Middle Ages and the Inquisition.
