Idaho Senators Again Vote to Kill Bill to Set Up Legislature Council

BOISE, March 9 (AP)—The Idaho senate defeated today for the second time a bill which would have established a state legislative council. The action came as the lawmakers worked slowly through the third overtime day of their 1959 session toward a recess expected to begin tonight. Many observers predicted that the session, which completed its statutory 60 days last Thursday, is unlikely to adjourn before tomorrow. The vote to kill the legislative council measure was 23 to 14. It previously was defeated in the senate 26 to 15 and was revived for another run. The house passed it earlier with little opposition.

Senate objections to a legislative council were based on two contentions: that it would usurp the functions of the legislature; its cost—set at \$20,000 in the first two years—is likely to increase steadily. "This is a measure," said Sen. Howard Hechler, D., Miss. Parson, "which is going to take legislative authority away from the legislature itself in the drafting of major bills."

He noted that Kennedy is speaking in favor of the measure. "I am somewhat fearful that if we pass this bill, we will have legislated the legislature out of business."

Russian Changes His View

BERLIN, March 9 (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev said today Russia has no objections to the western powers' "and perhaps some neutral states" maintaining a minimum of troops in West Berlin, a statement the Soviet premier made this morning in a speech to a mass communist rally in East Berlin.

He said that West Berlin would be guaranteed complete freedom of movement if the West accepted Russia's proposal that it should be free to send in as many troops as it wished. "There is no treaty to the freedom of independence of Berlin or a minimum of troops in West Berlin," Khrushchev said. "We have proposed that the six states should guarantee it."

"We also have no objections to the United Nations joining in this guarantee," he said. "The United States, Britain, France or neutral states should maintain a minimum of troops in West Berlin."

It was the first time Khrushchev had said that West Berlin should be guaranteed complete freedom of movement if the West accepted Russia's proposal that it should be free to send in as many troops as it wished.

Iraq Nationalists Rebels Claim Army Marches to Crush Red Government

BEIRUT, Lebanon, March 9 (AP)—Iraqi nationalist rebels claimed today their army is marching on Baghdad to crush the communist-influenced government of Premier Abdul Karim Kassam. Kassam's warplanes bombed Mosul, a major oil center 220 miles northeast of Baghdad that is the seat of a revolt led by Col. Abdul Wahab Shawaaf, apparently without decisive effect. A war of words raged between radio Mosul and radio Baghdad. The smoke-screen of propaganda veiled military movements, but showed bitterly the antagonisms between leftist followers of Kassam and military men who lean toward the Arab nationalist movement.

The government in Baghdad is simmering unrest had broken into open rebellion less than eight months after Kassam led the bloody coup that killed King Faisal and destroyed his pro-Western monarchy July 14, 1958.

PARIS, March 9 (AP)—British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan today began a swing around the capitals of his major allies in search of a western policy to take into negotiations with the Soviet Union. Arriving in Paris to confer with President Charles de Gaulle, Macmillan is expected to negotiate on Berlin. The Soviets accept that these immediate problems—Berlin, Germany and so on—ought to be settled by negotiations.

Macmillan said, he conceded there are wide differences between the West and the Soviets. He said in view of this, it is all the more important for the western allies to coordinate their common policy and purpose.

In East Berlin, Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev held a surprising meeting at Khrushchev's invitation with West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's chief political opponent, Socialist Party Chairman Ernst Thälmer. The meeting, held in the Soviet embassy in East Berlin, started West Berlin papers speculating that Paris was Macmillan's first stop to report to President Charles de Gaulle on his talks in Moscow with Khrushchev. The prime minister returns to London tomorrow night by air.

Armed Force of U. S. Said Strongly Alert

WASHINGTON, March 9 (UPI)—Gen. Omar Bradley, U. S. Army chief of staff, today said that America's armed forces are "strongly alert" in every circumstance to meet the Berlin crisis.

The Illinois Republican took sharp issue with statements by Sen. Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson that the United States will not "sharpen" its light of the Berlin situation.

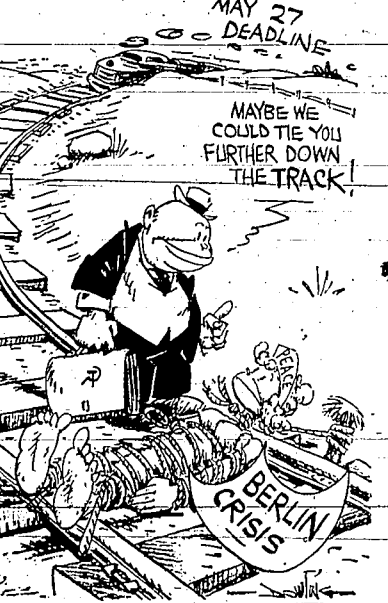
They were to take off again today, about two days behind schedule, after new tires had been secured for the van. Their journey had been slowed earlier by the snow storm which belted the Midwest last week.

PARIS, March 9 (UPI)—Some 2,500 workmen are preparing a site in the Algerian desert for a French atomic-bomb test, a correspondent of the newspaper Journal de Dimanche reports.

President Charles de Gaulle has announced that France intends to go ahead with construction and testing of an atomic bomb. No date has been announced for a test, however.

Khrushchev's Boldness May Get Him Berlin Summit Talk

WASHINGTON, March 9 (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev, temporarily frustrated in his desire for a summit conference, is forcing the western allies into a kind of summit meeting of their own.

In the end, by their boldness, he may get the meeting he wants. Khrushchev has made it plain he considers foreign ministers a bunch of errand boys who hide around, split hairs and waste time on problems which only the top man can solve.

That's why he first balked at a foreign ministers meeting to discuss the crisis he himself created. His demand the western allies get their troops out of West Berlin by May 21.

By their necessity—because the crisis is so major—the West's top men have had to move up front to handle it, leaving their foreign ministers in the shadows.

West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer and French President Charles de Gaulle have already met to discuss plans, map positions, British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan goes to visit them this week, then he comes here to see President Eisenhower.

Their foreign staff will be doing a lot of paper work but the top men will have to agree on the broad policy.

The fact that Secretary of State John Foster Dulles has been in the shadows is a physical accident. He has been hospitalized with cancer.

"Such is the present situation Eisenhower would have had to assume the up-front role since any final decision, which might mean shooting or its avoidance, would have to be his."

Dulles' illness put the whole foreign policy load on Eisenhower. Dulles carried a big part of that load when he was well. His Tuesday news conferences were an instrument for outlining broad American foreign policy.

Dulles could field the detailed questions thrown at him, thus making it easier for the President at his Wednesday news conference. Eisenhower couldn't have the detailed knowledge possessed by Dulles, the specialist.

But the British foreign secretary, Selwyn Lloyd, has almost disappeared from view under the commission stirred up by Khrushchev. He may be handling details for Dulles, but Macmillan is doing the talking.

Yet the four western allies want a foreign ministers meeting to discuss Berlin and Germany. After saying what he thought of foreign ministers, Khrushchev agreed to their meeting, but gradually.

He made it plain he didn't think much good could come of it and in the end the top men would have to get together if there was going to be any solution at all.

If the foreign ministers meet, they will have to agree on the broad policy.

and most likely they will, and if they stall too long to nullify Khrushchev, he can shut them off and come close to forcing a summit meeting by starting to push for a Berlin showdown in a hurry.
