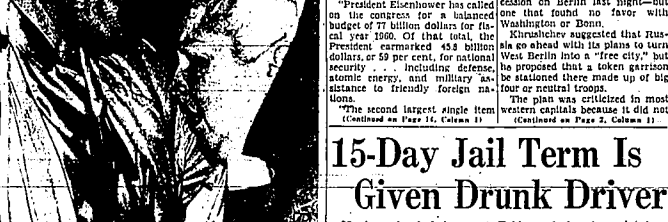

# Budge Warns U.S. Faces Bankruptcy if Spending Over Budgets Continues

WASHINGTON, March 10—Alarm over continued growth of the nation's debt was expressed today by Sen. James Budge, R., Ind., who declared, "Anyone who manages a budget knows that you can't spend what you don't have without ending up bankrupt." Budge pointed out that the United States is the world's best credit risk, but it is losing its popularity with investors. He emphasized that the interest only on this nation's enormous debt is more than twice as much as the total administration budget for fiscal year 1960. Following is a list of Representative Budge's address.

"I would like to talk today about something that affects all Americans... the budget of the United States government. In connection with the budget for fiscal year 1960, which is the administration's financial plan for the period from July 1, 1959, through June 30, 1960, I want to stress the ever-growing impact on all of us of our nation's budget. ... our interest payments on the national debt, ... and why we must maintain a balanced budget. ... President Eisenhower has called on the congress for a balanced budget of 77 billion dollars for the year 1960. Of that total, the president earmarked 45 billion dollars for the military, for national security, ... including defense, ... and military assistance to foreign nations. ... # City Gives Approval For Annexing Tract

The Twin Falls city commission Monday night voted to annex a block of undeveloped land to the city. Residents living in the area had protested the annexation and one charged that the commission's action was taken without reading or giving formal discussion to a protesting petition filed with the board's chairman. By a six to one vote, the board entered an ordinance of annexation and the land would enter into the city's Fairbanks subdivision, located just north of Falls avenue west on Blue Lakes boulevard north. Commissioners Chester Larsen voted against having the ordinance read, but later voted approval of an amended ordinance which would allow the city to annex the Blue Lakes boulevard north. There are three residents in the new northern area. A petition drawn up by the residents and commercial property owners was submitted along with reasons for the protest. Copies of the petition were given to Chairman J. T. Davis and the chairman of the planning and zoning commission. Last week Mrs. Constance Lelaer, city clerk, advised the commissioners that the protest had been filed and the chairman of the committee which accompanied the petition. At that time, Chairman Davis said it was not necessary for him to read the protest until the matter had been acted upon by the planning and zoning board. ### Heart Attack Proves Fatal To Executive

NEW YORK, March 10.—Arthur Hutton Goetz, 57, president of the Western Electric company, died of a heart attack yesterday after making his way unaided—and already in the throes of the seizure—into a medical office.

The company which Goetz had headed since 1956 is the manufacturer and supplier of the Bell telephone system. He had been associated with the organization throughout his 42-year career.

Shortly after lunch, a spokesman said, Goetz suffered a heart attack in his Broadway office. After the height of the seizure passed, he left his office without attending assistance, the spokesman said, and took an elevator down to the company's third floor medical office.

An electrocardiograph there showed the heart attack. But before a coroner's inquest was arranged, a second attack claimed his life.

CAIRO, March 10.—Events last week show Sudan may have a political explosion in the next few months, possibly sooner.

The incidents are:

1. Sudanese nationalism, violently anti-British, moderately pro-Western.
2. Arab nationalism, violently pro-Western, neutralist, internationalist.

Bring these two violently against each other and you have the political equivalent of atomic fission—that is, a big explosion.

Premier Ibrahim Abboud, army commander who seized power in November, established a crisis inside his army last week. He is a Sudanese nationalist.

But he was forced to negotiate a settlement among the delicately balanced divergent elements in his regime—the Sudanese nationalists and the Arab nationalists.

Telephonic reports from Khartoum, the capital, indicate that all is quiet now. Disgruntled army units have withdrawn from the capital.

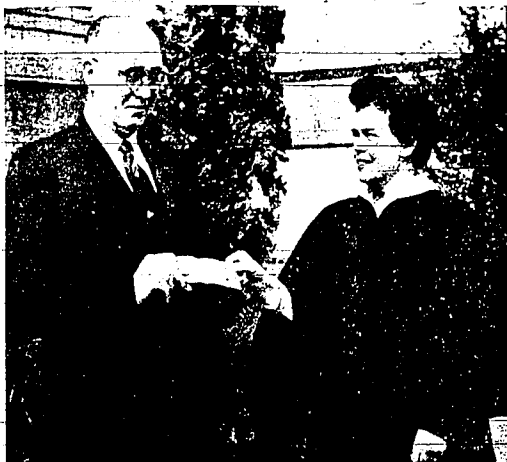

### Burley Methodists Break Ground for \$55,000 Educational Wing for Church

BURLEY, March 10.—About 150 persons attended the groundbreaking ceremony for the new \$55,000 educational building of the Burley Methodist church following the Sunday worship service.

The service opened with a prayer of dedication by Mark Moorhead, church lay leader. Dr. Con Annett, chairman of the official board, conducted similar ceremonies that began in 1917 by another group of Methodists when plans were being made for the present church building.

Eugene Moorhead, chairman of the board of trustees, spoke briefly, noting the country was rich in natural resources, "but it is the human resource that counts."

Dr. Annett, who spoke of his early childhood and his time as a Sunday school teacher, Glenn Byrd, the only known charter member of the church living in Burley, said that in 1908 the location of the Methodist church was on 1400 Oakley avenue, across from the present Christian church.

The Rev. Richard H. Yost said the new building would "represent a link of Christian strength against the onslaught of lawlessness, immorality and ungodliness. It will be a mark of spiritual growth, faith and labor." The pastor concluded by pointing out, "Let us realize that when this building is completed, our labors have only begun."

Before the minister broke the glass ground he led the congregation in a responsive reading. He was followed in the ground breaking by eight others who included Dr. Annett, Eugene Moorhead, Glenn Byrd, Ernest Bertram, Glenn Byrd, Berryman, R. J. Hucklebar, building commission chairman, Dr. B. V. Holcomb, pastor emeritus of the ushering board, Mrs. Con Annett, president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, Mrs. Hester, preacher, the contractor, and Cecil E. Jones, architect from Twin Falls.

The robot choir, who sang as a group to the right of the ceremony, then sang "The Doxology" under direction of Mrs. Marvyn Pearson.

Work began Monday in the removal of trees and shrubs by the city of Burley to public parks. The service was without cost to the church, but it was begun on actual construction by Forester in the removal of fence painting. Monday evening a crew of men built concrete steps and drainage pipes of the church. R. J. Hucklebar, and the minister, dismantled the outdoor fireplace to make room for an excavation 16 by 30 feet for a furnace and storage room.

The building, to be of modern wood and steel construction, will be 56 by 105 feet, located on the lots to the north of the church building. Construction cost has been set in excess of \$55,000 with-

It will have seven classrooms, one of which will be provided with a sliding partition, and an auditorium on the west end of the building 23 by 50 feet with a stage in the north end. The auditorium will also have buffet serving facilities and an accordion type sliding partition.

The building will contain three classrooms. There will be separate clothes closets and storage space in each classroom with a center hall separating the classrooms.

Lighting will be provided by windows on the east and south sides as well as under-sky-lighting.
