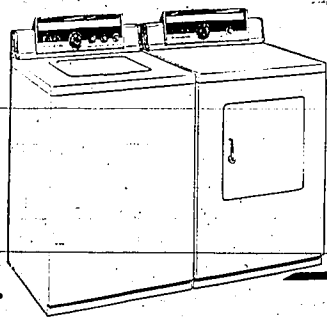

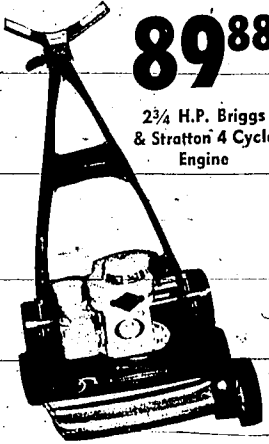

The 35th Idaho legislature is over, and so far as we are concerned it will go down in history as a weak sinner.

From all we have read since the session adjourned, the Idaho State Journal at Pocatello is the closest to the truth.

While the Pocatello newspaper was referring particularly to the legislature's cowardice in not adopting a sales tax which "has been postponed" and "is inevitable."

Although there has been a serious need in Idaho for drastic action to curb the record-breaking toll of death and destruction on our highways, the legislature all but closed its eyes to the course of action recommended by Governor Smalley.

It made no difference to the legislature that Idaho is one of the few states in the nation permitting 14- and 15-year-olds to drive cars.

The legislature's failure to correct this situation was another example of political cowardice.

It's true the legislature approved adding 15 patrolmen to the state police force, but that was only one of a number of different actions necessary to cope with the problem.

In spite of all the talk about "holding the line," and the harm that would come to the state's economic and industrial development by increasing income taxes, the legislature did just the opposite.

That Idaho's income taxes were already the highest in the country was not only a secondary consideration.

Economy Car For Ford Set In '60 Model

DETROIT, March 12 (U.P.)—Barring changes in the market for smaller automobiles, Ford Motor company will introduce an economy model car during the 1960 model year, "this could be sometime this fall."

If introduced, the car will be in competition with other economy cars, including those expected to be produced in this country by other American manufacturers.

A letter to shareholders, signed by Henry Ford II, president, and Ernest R. Borch, chairman, said: "Several years ago the company started to study the growth and nature of the demand for economy cars in the United States. In addition, it has been studying the development for some time a car that would be competitive in this market of the American market."

It then added the company plans to introduce the car for 1960 bearing market changes "of other circumstances."

The letter did not describe the model or refer to it as an "economy car." However, industry sources expect it to be smaller than current popular models.

Tuesday, L. L. Colburn, Chrysler president, said a news conference his company had held prior to a smaller car on the test tracks, but has not yet decided whether to put the car on the market. He limited the Chrysler decision will depend on what General Motors and Ford decide to do.

The only comment from General Motors has been that the corporation has continued its studies of the demand "in order to be prepared to produce a smaller car in this country if a demand for such automobiles develops "which gives promise of being both permanent and profitable."

Committee Says Trees in Twin Falls Need Dormant Oil Spray Right Now

"Dormant oil sprays are needed on Twin Falls deciduous trees if they are needed now," Warren said at a meeting of the city trees and beautification committee Wednesday afternoon. He outlined four important items for owners to determine, the insect for which they are spraying, the insecticide for the problem, proper timing and good coverage. Charles W. Newby stated it is important for people to know why a dormant spray is necessary. If applied now, it will help rid the trees of scale for the rest of the season, he said. "Tree diseases prevalent in the area include elm leaf beetle, San Jose scale, oyster shell scale and European elm scale. All have been found in Twin Falls. A dormant oil emulsion is recommended for all of these tree infestations."

Asked about the experience of the test area sprayed last year, Newby said some of the persons contacted wanted to repeat the spray program, while others did not.

"More people do not spray this year, the insects will cause great damage later in the season. Entomologist Kenneth Gibson pointed out. It also will be more difficult to control the infestation later and will require more than one spraying operation, he said. Cost of spraying with the dormant oil is from \$2.50 to \$4 per tree, depending on the size of the tree. The treatment is not recommended for any of the evergreen variety, Daigh reported. Daigh recommended four fundamental in choosing trees for planting, framing, shade, back ground and display. Selection should be made according to the need for shade, foliage, flowers and clematises, he said. Ten good trees for Idaho are:

Norway spruce, red oak, European linden, sycamore maple, English oak, mountain ash, white birch, maine green ash, sugar maple and blue ash. Local established nurseries can also recommend types which will do well in the area, Daigh said.

The committee recommended that a reputable concern be called to handle planting, spraying, pruning or other needs of residents. The committee included W. A. Cottrander, chairman, H. O. Lyster, Daigh, Gibson and Bruce Walker.

Six Convicted For 'Plotting' Against U. S.

DENVER, March 12 (AP)—Three men and three women, protesting their innocence, were convicted last night of conspiring to advocate the violent overthrow of the U. S. government.

They were not sentenced immediately. Lawyers for the six said the verdict will be appealed.

U. S. Dist. Judge Lee Knous granted their motion for five days in which to file for a new trial. Fines ranged from \$5,000 to \$20,000—the largest amount for Arthur Bary, 47, of San Jose, Calif.

The six were convicted in 1955 on similar charges but that verdict was reversed by the 10th U. S. circuit court of appeals, which ordered the case retried without the charge mentioning communism.

The charge against a seventh defendant convicted in the first trial, Lewis M. Johnson, 38, of Boston, Mass., was dismissed at the request of government lawyers.

In addition to Bary, the defendants are his former wife, 34, Denver; Joseph Scherrer, 39, and his wife, Mala, both New York City; David Zepelin, 33, Denver, and Patrick J. Blau, 47, El Paso, Tex.

The maximum possible sentence is two years' imprisonment and \$5,000 fine for each.

Small Change Reported for Work in U. S.

WASHINGTON, March 12 (U. S. P.)—The nation's job picture remained about the same between January and February. Approximately seven of every 100 workers were unemployed.

A new government jobs survey put out by the commerce department showed that both employment and unemployment rose slightly in February. Unemployment amounts so small they were regarded as negligible.

February employment was 62,712,000 up 15,000 from January and an increase of 74,000 from February 1935. Unemployment totaled 4,749,000 up 25,000 from January and an improvement of 100,000 from the recession month of February last year.

"This stability," the report said, "marks the usual seasonal pause between the heavy winter contraction in employment and the normal spring expansion in economic activity."

The ratio of unemployment to the entire labor force was 7.7 percent in January. When adjusted for seasonal factors it was 6.6 percent. From its recession peak of 11.4 per cent last August the seasonal ratio declined to 5.3 per cent in November 1935 to 6.1 in December, declined to 6.0 in January and rose to 6.1 again in February.

These figures prompted a statement from A. F. O. President George Meany contending, "The logic for government action is growing worse." Meany added, "We can't afford to wait any longer for government action to relieve the suffering of millions."

President Eisenhower indicated at his news conference he would stand along with a short extension of the emergency jobs benefits plan due to expire March 15.

Democratic leaders are seeking a year's extension. Eisenhower refused to oppose an extension beyond July 1. That would avoid action in employment and a precarious balanced new budget.

LONDON, March 12 (U. S. P.)—Keeping your mouth shut is good way to stay healthy, says a British doctor.

"During rush hours people stand with their noses and throats as close together as 12 to 18 inches. Yet Londoners do not unduly susceptible to infectious diseases," he said.

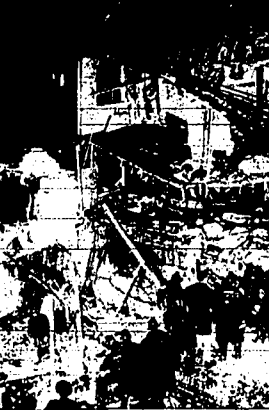





Laws Protect Newsmen for Many States

By KENNETH WHITING Associated Press Staff Writer "While reporters for newspapers, magazines and television should have the same safeguarded relationship with news sources as responsibility with clients and doctors with patients," an Illinois lawmaker introduced a bill to amend the state legislature. The proposed law, by Rep. Michael Ziskind, D., Chicago, is part of a widespread move to extend protection to reporters who refuse to name the source of the news they gather.

Florida Told They provide that (1) no newspaper, publisher, editor or reporter shall be compelled to disclose the source of information committed confidentially; (2) persons who gather, publish, broadcast or televise news could not be punished for criminal contempt for refusal to disclose news sources; (3) newspaper, radio and television personnel could not be compelled to testify before any court or government agency; and (4) news reporters would have immunity from disclosing sources only if they had obtained access to the source without having been identified to the source.

There states already have laws which are generally similar and five of them, Pennsylvania and Ohio, are adopting legislation to extend such protection to radio and TV reporters.

The bill was introduced by Rep. Frank West, R-Twin Falls, and is expected to pass the legislature. It would also change the date of the general election from the present date of the first Tuesday in November to the first Tuesday in November of the following year.

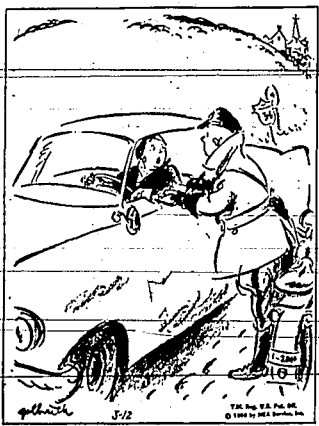
