Bonds Sale in Area Declines

Sales of U. S. savings bonds in the district are down more than 10% for February, compared with the figures for the same month a year ago, says Chairman Guy H. Sawyer.

February sales in Idaho were \$70,131, with the third district figures \$20,003, compared to \$71,559 in 1938.

Idaho Falls county sales totaled \$28,227 for February, says E. H. Hager, county auditor. A. P. Beemer reported figures of \$21,524 for the month total. In Cassia county, Orval V. Anderson said sales were \$2,714. Jerome county had a sales total of \$1,874, according to chairman A. V. Hall.

Alan Schubert, Gooding county chairman, lists total sales of \$1,400 for the county in February.

Says county treasurer, Ernest B. Taylor, D. Bird Smith, Lincoln county, said sales there totaled \$527. In Camanche county, \$3,525 worth of bonds were sold, said Charles Boggs.

Morse Labor Plan Is OK'd

WASHINGTON, March 19.—The senate labor committee yesterday voted 13 to 0 to adopt a new approach to Sen. Wayne Morse, D. Ore., to end the union's hand in labor-management dispute cases.

The vote was to accept the principle of Morse's proposal, subject to drafting of language by the committee staff.

The proposal would be a substitute for a revision already in the Kennedy labor control bill directing the National Labor Relations board to handle all cases coming within its jurisdiction. The board has repeatedly said it does not have the staff to do this.

The vote came as the committee continued with consideration of Post-Hartley law amendments in the bill of Sen. John F. Kennedy, D. Mass.



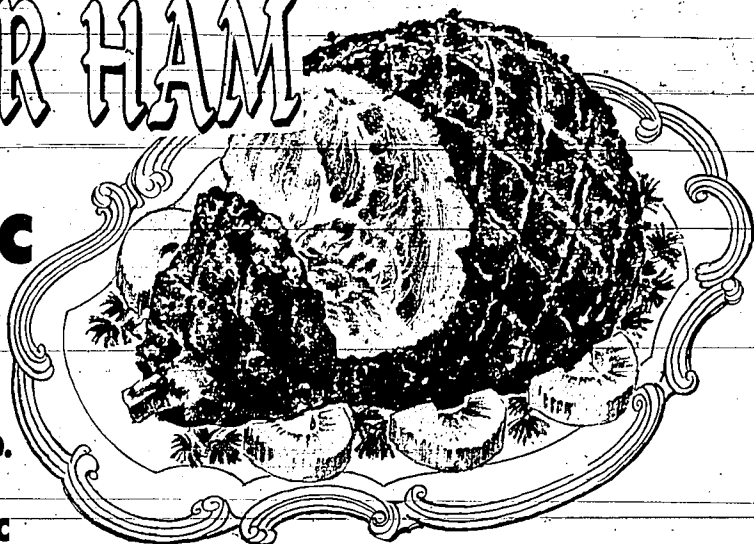

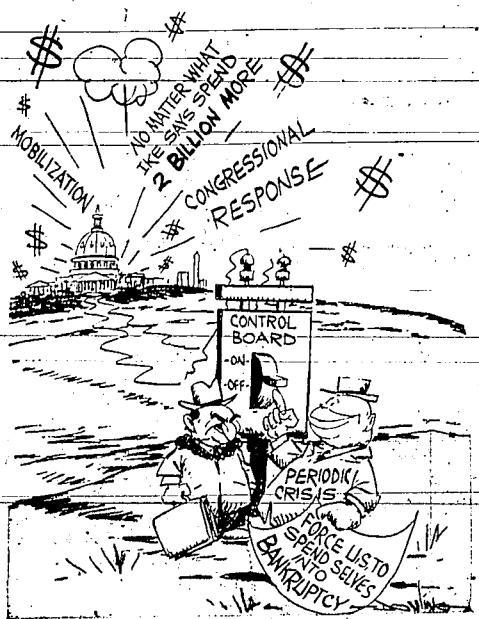

Thousands Prepare to Keep Eye Out for Deadly Tornado

KANSAS CITY, Mo., March 19 (UPI)—Thousands of volunteers from Canada to the Gulf of Mexico will scan the nation's skies in the coming months for the spore-bearing, rope-tailed clouds which mean tornadoes and death and disaster.

This season has been forecast as a severe one.

Don House, chief of the government's severe storm warning center in the city capital of the tornado country, today estimated the number of volunteer spotters at "something over 10,000."

Each weather bureau in vulnerable areas sets up its own warning system, he said. In addition, communities too far from weather bureau to be protected by their

network of volunteers organize similar protection, under weather bureau guidance.

From 50 to several hundred volunteers will participate in each area, House said.

A few recruits, new this season, were released from tornado duty when the ground observer corps was disbanded by the air defense command. Some government units, among them the state of Illinois, have "adopted" the ground observer corps organization for tornado service, House said.

But overall, the number of airplane watchers who have turned to tornado watching is small, he said.

Volunteers operate on no fixed schedule. They are assigned no

hours in weather bureau systems, each simply promising to keep an eye on the sky when he can, and alert the nearest weather bureau when he sights trouble.

"Once trouble is suspected, the weather bureau goes into a reverse operation in which it telephones spotters in the imperiled area. Requests to mount an intensive watch are speeded by the use of cross land and pin-point maps detailing the locations of volunteer spotters."

Many communities have tornado warning systems of their own, in which the weather bureau has no detailed knowledge, House said.

Idaho Use of Fertilizer Is Gaining Fast

The amount of commercial fertilizer registered for use in Idaho in 1958 was about a third greater than it was in 1957, County Agents say. "Eighty-five per cent of the fertilizer is used on the main crops," said Chirry P. Palmer, an agricultural specialist of the University of Idaho extension service.

The total was 125,000 tons. The figure is based on tonnage tax collected by the state department of agriculture. In 1957 the tax was paid on 90,400 tons.

Investment in fertilizer last year was more than 10 million dollars. Eighty-two per cent of the fertilizer was dry chemical material. Liquid chemical accounted for 18 per cent.

About 20,400 tons of actual plant nutrients were used for farm purposes in 1958, compared with 20,200 tons in 1957. Most of the increase was in nitrogen and phosphorus. One-third of the total nitrogen was in liquid carriers. About 10,000 tons of nitrogen were used in 1957, about 10,000 tons in 1958, but still remained a small factor on the fertilizer situation, Daigh noted.

Main carriers of total nitrogen were ammonium nitrate, ammonium phosphate, ammonium sulfate, ammonium superphosphate, urea, and urea ammonium sulfate. The phosphorus carriers were ammonium phosphate, liquid phosphoric acid and single superphosphate. It is stable.

"Correct fertilization is one of the best investments a farmer can make," Palmer said. "It is not uncommon to get 43 in return for every dollar spent for fertilizer when the right kind is applied. A soil test is the best guide."

The revised standards for oats which go into effect June 1 will be used for price support purposes for all 1959 crop oats, the county agricultural stabilization and conservation office announced.

Oats grading No. 4 because of test weight only under the new standards will be eligible for price support at a one-cent per bushel discount from the basic rate for No. 3. The minimum test weight for oats grading No. 4 under the new standards is the same as the minimum test weight permitted for oats grading No. 3 under the old standards.

The national average price support rate for No. 3 oats will be 50 cents a bushel. County rates will be announced later.

Hearing on Burns Creek Dam Are Continued by Committee

WASHINGTON, March 19 (Special)—Hearings on plans to construct Burns creek re-regulating dam in Idaho were continued before the senate interior committee.

Practically the entire opposition to the project centers on a proposed coalburning steam power plant planned in western Wyoming, by Utah Power and Light company.

The power company strongly objected to the Burns creek dam, saying that it would be 99 per cent power and only 1 per cent irrigation.

Joining Utah Power in opposition were the Utah and Wyoming coal producers and the United Mine Workers representing the miners in the area. All three groups indicated they preferred the private coal power plant.

'Retaliation' Plan for U.S. Is Criticized

MOSCOW, March 19.—(UPI)—The massive retaliation doctrine adopted by the United States in 1950 in the Korean war has had "burdenously harmful" consequences in our foreign affairs, Charles B. Marshall told the annual Foreign Conference on causes of war and conditions of peace today.

Marshall, staff member of the Carnegie endowment for international peace, said America could have mustered men and material to win the Korean war but instead "let the war settle out ambiguously."

"After the war, we cut our ground forces and as a substitute turned to the massive retaliation doctrine," he said. "It was a horrible doctrine, and all the government's attempts to ally the consequences have not availed. Our spokesmen in foreign policy have been left in the plight of the bushman who, on being given a new boomerang, went out of his mind trying to throw the old one away."

"Being short of appropriate capabilities, we had to stand by during the episode of Hungary in 1956. Then, after having chosen to place our reliance on prodigious weapons, we attacked the peace and reduced the scope of development being second to our adversary in these respects as well as in conventional forces," Marshall said.

"The obvious requirement is to restore, as we can, our power to choose a power we have suffered to decline through detection—so that in the longer run we shall be able to make better choices that will be foreclosed to us if we go on letting things run along as we have," Marshall said.

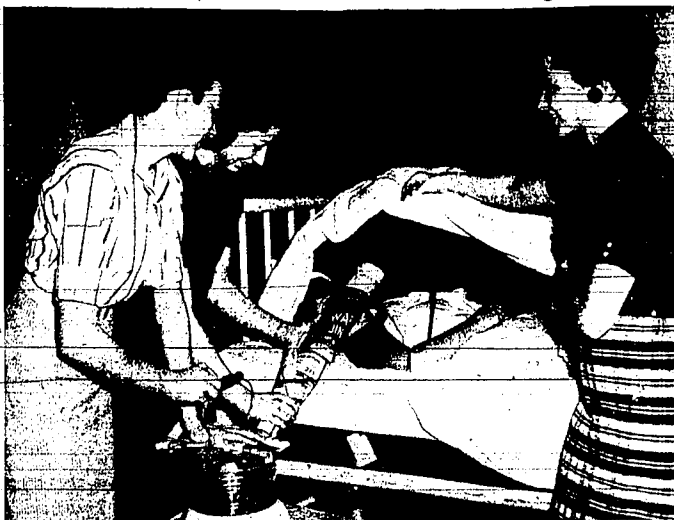

Another one is his duty in the mail carrier's fighter squadron at a Naval air station. He was a mail carrier with the Marines in the Korean war.

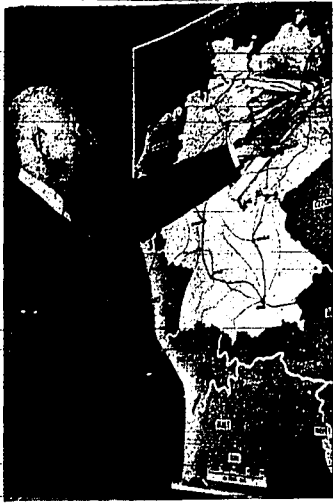
He's Also Band Leader

New Missiles Mentioned in Ike's Speech

WASHINGTON, March 19 (UP)—Two advanced types of missiles for use by fighter interceptor planes against enemy bombers are mentioned in President Eisenhower's list of missiles in the present and projected arsenal.

The new Falcon gas air-to-air missiles—the Gar IX and Gar XI—were among the President in his radio-TV address Monday night. At the Pentagon, spokesmen declined to discuss the new weapons, which the President listed as still in development.

The odd-numbered designations for the new series indicate that they will have radar control to steer them into an enemy bomber formation. Even numbers designate heat-seeking infrared type systems.

All the Falcon series so far designed or in the arsenal use conventional warheads. They have a range of several miles. The Falcons are produced by Hughes Aircraft company at Tucson, Ariz. plant.

The air force now has only one atomic warhead air-to-air weapon mentioned by Eisenhower in his short-range weapon in a rocket which follows the path on which it is aimed.

The present Falcon missiles are relatively small, about six feet long and weighing about 100 pounds. Secret can be carried under the wing of a plane. The five series mentioned by Eisenhower may be larger with a considerably longer range and packing a greater punch.

Indian "War Party" Arrives In Washington With Petition

WASHINGTON, March 19 (AP)—Among other things for the Indian Commissioner Glenn L. Emmons. Waitkes (Mad Bear) Anderson, a Tuscarora who has been leading the fight for recognition at the United States Capitol for years, said Eisenhower would be breaking a treaty of 1794 signed by George Washington if he refused to receive the Indians. Anderson said Emmons has "gone out of his way to disrespect" Indians and treats with them—"We consider him an enemy." Indians in New York have been disputing with the state over income taxes and use of reservation

Nasser Joins Dulles and Tito On Soviet Public Enemy List

By J. M. ROBERTS Associated Press-News Analyst President Gamal Abdel Nasser of the United Arab Republic, in treating the true value of Kremlin pronouncements that its economic aid for underdeveloped countries is given without political strings. Nasser found the strings invisible until he started disagreeing with something the Soviet Union wants. land for the Niagara power project. Now he has joined John Foster Dulles and Marshall Tito on the communist list of public enemies. For many years, ever since Britain and France repudiated Turkey's rule of the Middle East, with a group of states lacking the power to stand alone, Egypt, Saudi Arabia and Iraq have been in competition for Arab leadership. Primarily it was a personal competition among the kings. Cairo had the widely powerful Moslem university; Arabia had

Mecca, the spiritual center of Islam; and Iraq had Baghdad, the once great historical capital. Arabia and Iraq had the oil. Nasser, attempting to organize a great pan-Arab movement to put himself and Egypt on top, has never been able to get at the oil. When a nationalist revolt occurred in Baghdad last year, much akin to the one he staged himself against King Feroz in Egypt, Nasser thought he was in. He had received much help and was promised more by international communism, because he represented a thorn in the side of the western powers. But any place that is full of

trouble and material wealth, especially any nearby place, is of great interest to the Kremlin, also. Let's not get any ideas about expanding the UAR in this direction, Khrushchev says to Nasser. The Egyptian lacks the power to accomplish his aims, but can't give up publicly. Now, if the usual pattern is followed, he is about to be strangled by the stigma of economic aid. Having been emboldened to break with the West, he is scuttled by the East. The West, following its usual practice of loving anyone who opposes communism, will now take Nasser back to its bosom for the sake of expediency. Two reversals of policy can be expected. The Soviets won't build the Aswan dam, and the United States will.

Farmers Told Sales Data on Wool Needed

Chairman Carl Boyd, chairman of the Twin Falls county agricultural stabilization and conservation committee reminds wool producers to be certain that sales documents they have received for wool sales during the past year contain all the information required under the wool incentive payment program. It is particularly important, Boyd states, that the sales documents show the true net sales proceeds including deductions made for freight and other marketing charges. The county ASC officer within the program is administered has the authority to adjust sales proceeds when charges are not shown. Where false information is filed, both the producer and the wool buyer are subject to penalties. Producers will be eligible for payments to be made this year under the 1958 program for wool and unhorn lambs marketed not later than March 31 this year. Later marketing will be eligible for payments under the 1959 program. Applications for payment under the 1958 program must be filed not later than April 30 at the county office. This cutoff date is necessary to permit a final accurate calculation of the average price received by farmers for wool during the 1958 marketing year. When the average price received for wool is known sometime this summer, the payment rate will be announced and payments will be made to growers, Boyd stated.

Richard Lowe volunteered to chairman the Athletic award project.

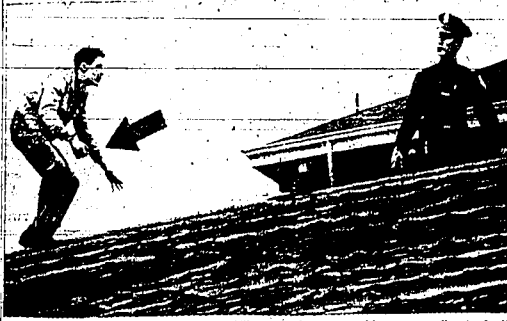
The club voted to award Gerald Dellinger a plaque recognizing his efforts as a coach in Jerome.

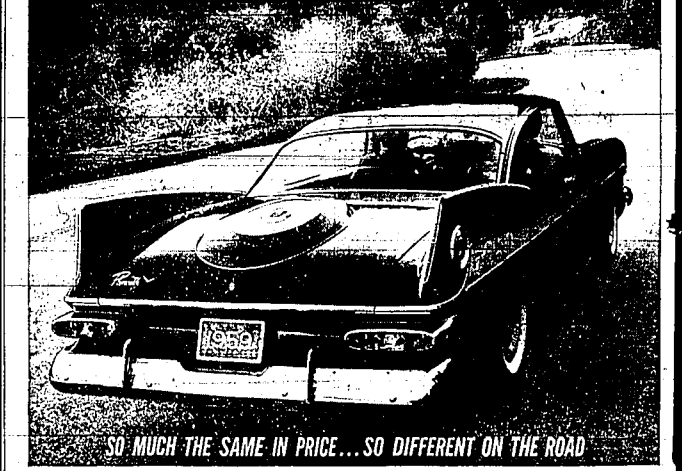

U.S. Support Of Crops Not "Major" Item

WASHINGTON, March 19 — Government farm payments were not a major item in the record farm cash receipts received in Idaho last year, Sen. Henry Dworshak reported today. He said net income for Idaho farmers per acre increased nearly \$300 last year.
Dworshak said the total for all farm products in Idaho during 1958 was \$401,600,000 compared with \$372,674,900 during 1957. Of this total only \$122,000,000 or about 25 per cent came from government price support payments. These included \$172,000,000

for soil conservation, \$4,556,000 under the sugar act, \$14,000 under the wool act, and \$3,172,000 under the wool bank program. Dworshak said the 1958 government payments were 4 million dollars less than during 1957.
Dworshak showed a cash receipt gain of nearly 8 million dollars in going from \$170,654,000 in 1957 to \$178,622,000 last year. General farm receipts gained 25 million dollars from \$187,701,000 in 1957 to \$212,620,000 during 1958.
The Idaho gains were in line with national farm cash receipts which jumped from \$17 billion dollars in 1957 to \$4.2 billion dollars last year.
Idaho farmers had an average net income of \$3,731 in 1957 and \$3,500 last year. Gross income increased from \$10.6 billion in 1957 to \$11.6 billion during 1958.
Dworshak said a sharp rise in receipts from potatoes and for soil conservation, \$4,556,000 under the sugar act, \$14,000 under the wool act, and \$3,172,000 under the wool bank program. Dworshak said the 1958 government payments were 4 million dollars less than during 1957.
