Hard Nevada Quake Draws Few Reports

WENDOVER, Nev., March 23 (UPI)—The strongest earthquake in America since December, 1954, in Nevada last night, apparently left no damage in Idaho.

The quake, first recorded at 11:11 p.m. (PT) at the University of California seismograph station at Berkeley, was felt over a wide area, but reports were received from only local sources.

The northern county sheriff's office at Loveland, 20 miles north of Reno, said it received a few reports of rattling but not sharp "good-sized" quakes.

A "good-sized" quake, 60 miles west of Reno, the center of numerous quakes during the past few weeks, was described as "very mild."

The Washoe county sheriff's office at Reno, about 200 miles west from here, described the event from there as "very mild."

"They also said they only a few quakes," said the Humboldt county sheriff's office here and no calls were received at 10 Paradise valley office near the Idaho-Nevada border.

Dr. Dan Tocher, Berkeley seismologist, said the quake measured 6.5 on the Richter scale and it lasted for 20 seconds.

Report Given on Earnings of People In This Area During Third Quarter

Wages totaling \$125,925,033 were paid to 14,800 non-farm Maga Valley workers during the third quarter of 1958, according to figures released Saturday by the state employment security agency.

Included in the total are 756 employees of the federal government who were paid \$26,174 during the July, August and September last year.

Excluding federal employees, non-farm employment totaled 12,823, with wages during the three months totaling \$100,272,000.

Employees are grouped by the agency into seven major categories: mining, construction, manufacturing, which includes food processing, lumber and other transportation, communication and utilities, wholesale and retail trade, finance, insurance and real estate, and other miscellaneous.

Men and women employed under the wholesale and retail trade category, a total of 692, outnumbered employees in any of the other employment categories, a long-established trend in Blaine Valley.

In Twin Falls county alone, 20,412 men and women held positions in business classes under the wholesale and retail trade category.

Blaine Valley employment for the remaining categories was: mining, communication and utilities, food processing, 1,624; construction, 1,425; transportation, communication and utilities, 1,374; manufacturing not involving food processing of lumber, 722; financial, insurance and real estate, 588; lumber manufacturing, 216; and mining, 111.

Leading the area in total non-farm wages paid during the quarter was Twin Falls county, with \$29,684 paid to 6,993 workers, including \$31,039 paid to 173 federal employees.

Blaine county federal employment, outnumbered that in any other area county, totaling 453, 3,000 services and miscellaneous, 142; transportation, communication and utilities, 127; finance, insurance and real estate, 49; lumber, 10; food processing, 10, and other manufacturing, 11, with no employment there under the mining category.

Jerome county figures are, total, 1,073; wholesale and retail trade, 317; food processing, 174; construction and transportation, communication and utilities, 160; finance, insurance and real estate, 80; food processing, 171; other manufacturing, 70; transportation, communication and utilities, 47; finance, insurance and real estate, 29; lumber, 11; and mining, 5.

Twin Falls county figures are, total, 6,910; wholesale and retail trade, 2,925; food processing, 956; service and miscellaneous, 909; transportation, communication and utilities, 828; construction, 475; finance, insurance and real estate, 257; lumber, 61; and mining, 5.

A SERIOUS GAMBLE

Russia's Khrushchev may be bluffing, but since we can only guess that he may be, we must be prepared for him to act in earnest.

We can't deal with this man by trying to be with every wind of his thought and utterance. He blows hot and cold, alternately threatening and extending a hand, cooling peace in the breath left over from a promise to destroy us if we cross him.

Dig for the irreducible minimum, the unchanging heart of his aims, and you find they appear to be these:

1. To sign a peace treaty with East Germany, now, whether or not the West agrees to confer with him.
2. To cancel all Western rights in Berlin, and in access routes to the city, with the signing of that treaty.
3. To prevent the reunification of East and West Germany if it means an end to Communist control of the eastern land.

These are the direct points of conflict with the West.

We say we have full rights in Berlin and the access routes, deriving from wartime conquest of Germany.

Though Khrushchev says an East German treaty will end those rights, he leaves a big door open. He does not say plainly what the Kremlin or its German puppet may do to abrogate those rights in a concrete, physical way.

Off and on, he menacingly tells us we must get out. But the German reads us again and again they will not try to blockade us as was done in 1948-49.

This is the big bargaining ground on the Soviet side. If the puppet leaders are true to their word, they do not say plainly what the paper thing and there will be no physical crisis, no war.

We are at sharp odds, too, on the reunification issue. We insist on a plan that will protect a Berlin thereafter largely stripped of armed forces.

The bargaining ground here is the idea, liked by the Russians and sometimes considered by some Western diplomats, of a confederation of the two Germans after each has signed treaties with the other.

Aggression's present view is that under East Germany still Communist, Berlin's freedom would be put at the mercy of never-ending subversive pressures, heightened by the overbearing might of great red armies just a few hundred miles to the east.

If Khrushchev is not bluffing, then at some point or other he would have to move to block our way into Berlin. Then the question would be how to respond.

But there are two reasons why he could be bluffing.

Some experts on Russia feel he wants a summit meeting above all and uses this tactic as the only card he has of getting it. He is anxious to step deeply immersed in an internal struggle for power, needing the big crisis and the big meeting to pull himself through.

It could also be bluffing, not to get a summit meeting but in the out conviction that if he presses far enough he will yield at least to his demands.

These days his words often ring with tones of superiority. He meeks us for daring to frighten him, he says he'll break his law that bumps him, that he'll crush capitalism in any war.

Who he, even if he were nervous about his own power, brandish a big stick so boldly if he did not think ours was growing critically smaller?

SCATTERED STRENGTH

The Eisenhower-Herter estimate of the strength of the military forces built with American financial and economic assistance has not impressed veteran members of the worried legislators of house and senate, including Republicans as well as Democrats.

Both have frequently mentioned that, although weak with respect to conventional forces in central and West Asia, we have a ground army of approximately 5,000,000 men.

That sounds formidable, but a breakdown of the numbers shows, in view of Russia's ability to mass billions of men, that 5 million men in East Germany, nearby satellites, and in Western borders.

The Western forces are scattered all over the globe. According to the most accurate compilation available, the United States has: 100,000—South Korea, 700,000—Formosa, 400,000—NATO, 100,000—North Africa, 400,000—unavailable France; Middle East, 400,000; Southeast Asia, 200,000; the domestic United States, 700,000.

Another 200,000 are stationed at air and naval bases in North Africa, South Arabia, Spain, the Middle East, etc. A large percentage of these troops are not fighting troops. And it is doubtful if all these nations would contribute any contingents in a global war. Only a few have taken aid in Korea.

Views of Others

LEGAL PADDLING GAINS

Triggered by a shooting incident in a classroom in which a high school teacher's skull was cracked by a bullet, the state legislature recently adopted a bill permitting corporal punishment in schools.

The law gives teachers the same "authority" over children as parents, in school and to and from school. A similar bill has been filed in the Colorado legislature.

Meanwhile, a Memphis, Tenn., judge who upheld a high school principal's right to paddle errant students, reported he has received 100 telegrams from all over the country approving his action. The Memphis principal paddled 14 boys and parents of one had him arrested.

The lower house of the New York legislature has passed a much-debated bill to give New York City public school teachers the right to use "reasonable force in a moderate degree" in disciplining their pupils.

The New York bill, which must pass the senate and be signed by the governor, would supersede a New York law of education by law prohibiting corporal punishment. Other states have also given teachers the legal right to employ reasonable force.

At a hearing on the bill a 16-year-old Manhattan high school girl complained that students at her school "used the paddles and paddled the teachers. She said she felt she was entitled to education without these disruptions.

Teachers are not to be giving teachers authority to act physically against wayward students may not solve the real problem of discipline. The school is the place where the young man should be taught to defend themselves and to keep order.—Salt Lake Tribune.

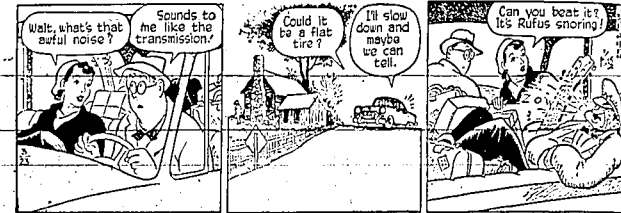
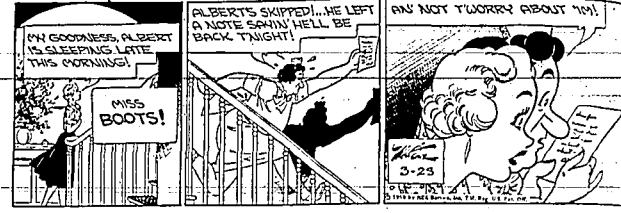

ICBM's Nose Cone Search Unsuccessful

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., March 22 (AP)—A highly advanced ICBM nose cone first up 5,000 miles through space was given up for lost in the Atlantic today.

The air force abandoned the little cone to the depths after a two-day search wound up yesterday with no results.

A huge Thor-able rocket blasted the cone close to the intercontinental range in about 30 minutes early Saturday, but a fleet of C-54 planes and ships failed to find it.

It was learned that a malfunction in the recovery package, probably the tiny radio transmitter, stymied the recovery effort.

It was the sixth attempt to retrieve one of the elusive cones without success. However, good instrumentation reports—received on the cone's blinding reentry through the Earth's atmosphere at speeds close to 16,000 miles an hour.

The Thor-able, a first stage Thor intermediate range ballistic missile coupled with a Vanguard, performed its job perfectly in burr the knob-shaped cone to an impact area near Oregon Island.

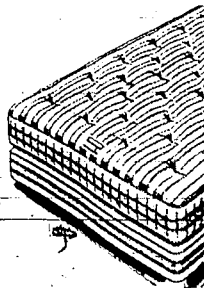

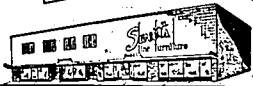
