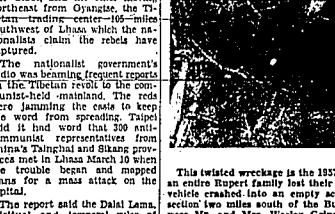

### Puzzles Case Ends With 12 Men Arrested

WASHINGTON, March 24 (AP)—The FBI has cracked an international puzzle which allegedly obtained more than \$45,000 by getting advance solutions to crossword puzzles in newspapers across the United States.

FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover announced the arrest of 12 Americans who had sold and fraud charges have been filed in this country and two Canadians now across the border.

**Dummy Paper Used**  
 Operatives of this "far-flung" puzzle, as Hoover described it, used a dummy newspaper arranged in a dummy bank in Canada to trick the puzzle solvers out of two New York feature puzzles—Superior Features Syndicate and General Features Syndicate.

American members of the ring reported the solution by telephone, and collected more than \$15,000 in prizes between last November and February.

All 12 agents were in on the alleged scheme, arresting four persons in Oregon, three in Michigan, two in Pennsylvania and one each in Indiana and Wisconsin. A twelfth arrest of an Indianapolis man was made in extradition studies.

Charges were filed against Joseph Dymally, 30, London, Ont., and Arthur Dismann, 34, Fort Stanley, Ontario, and a lesser study case can be extradited for trial in the United States.

The FBI said ringleaders in Canada took the bulk of the winnings, while their American henchmen kept their shares.

All 12 were charged with using the mails and long distance telegrams to defraud eight newspapers. They also were charged with conspiracy to defraud.

**MUST WE THEMBLE?**  
 —America and its allies, hoping and evidently believing that the war with Russia will be over in a few months, are charting moves for every contingency. Are we preparing in the right way?  
 Debates rage among the Western powers as to this score, and each nation as well as the issues are still unsettled.

We offer firm assurances we will enforce Western rights in and to Berlin, if Khrushchev and his East German minions should do anything to "enforce" their "rights" to oust us. What does "enforce" mean? Does anyone think red soldiers bent on blocking us would fly to within 100 feet of our Tommy guns if we sought to smash past checkpoint barriers and run the 110 miles to Berlin?  
 And so would thousands of others as our convoys raced along a vulnerable shoulder front strung through hostile territory.

Once the Russians get into the fray, as they would, we would quickly feel their crushing superiority in conventional arms. Secretary of Defense McNair says we would inevitably resort to nuclear weapons, presumably against the other side.  
 At any point might the conflict get out of hand, and lead Khrushchev and President Eisenhower to signal the big bombers for hundreds of American and Russian cities?

This we cannot even guess. But we can speculate about how ready we're for such combat if it came.  
 Our military might we've got the man. Our bombers in sufficient force to strike swiftly and decisively in retaliatory blows against Russia.

We have no operational long-range missiles now, and we have no intermediate types on foreign pads.  
 Probably the Russians don't have operational long-range missiles yet either, but many reports believe they are well ahead of us. The menace is compounded by their massive conventional force, their hundreds of submarines and tens of thousands of manned planes.

What's worst happened, we would seem to need flawless timing, superior judgment, and an immense amount of good luck to hold even or better against such military might.

They spite the great disparities. Mr. Eisenhower says we're all right, our forces balance the Russian threat, and we don't have to rush to close the missile gap.  
 Critics challenge his confidence, but we've not one more day, pretend if Congress tomorrow voted five billion dollars more for nuclear missiles and other weapons and upped army manpower that in any Berlin crisis they would come in the next few months or direct.

New defense strength, especially in complex missiles, can't be delivered in a time line in quite the order. A tantalizing time line is inescapable.

The chief benefit would be psychological. Allies wondering how much really stands behind our vows to hold Russia in check, and Russia wondering how fresh notes that we don't intend to yield it a commanding strategic position.

Our whole political-diplomatic-psychological approach to the Russians in the world would seem to need drastic re-employment.

We need to get on the offensive, throwing out new ideas, programs and policies in a steady stream which would give us a lead over the Soviet masters back on their heels.

We seem to lack daring, imagination, inventiveness. Our rigidities and our defensive postures stand out because we show the world little else.

How long must we tremble at the thought of summit meetings, sure that only the Russians can emerge the winners but that the conference tables and the propaganda front?

It is encouraging to note that President Eisenhower and Prime Minister Macmillan stand ready to propose a Big Four meeting with the Russians in early July or August. Let's hope that we follow up such a proposal, not with skepticism and fear, but with determination and brilliant leadership.

There, on that great platform, we would have a continuing opportunity to prove to all men of good will not our superiority particularly but our ability to contribute to the peace and stability of the world—a nation which wears a crown of leadership it could not thrust off if it would in these deeply-troubled years.
