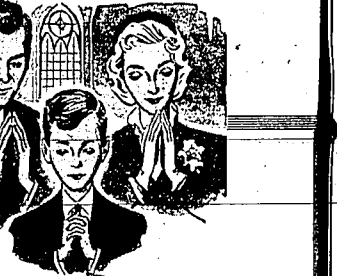

For the second time in less than three years the world is being reminded that men will fight, even though they be almost barehanded, rather than yield merely to foreign conquerors.

And for the second time in less than three years the free world is forced to stand still by white communitarian guns put down a bid for liberty.

Whereas Hungary was well-known to the world, Tibet is a never-never land in the minds of most westerners. Yet Tibet's culture reaches deeply back into antiquity, and its people are willing to fight for it. It's an old story, forever retold around the world.

Tibetan opposition to the communists has been nurtured through the past several years by a trial report described as mere-ly like to fight interference. But now it is described as a national movement, though one which is directed against Chinese rule.

"Our religion is going, our race is going. We are going to be wiped out," says the brother of the Dalai Lama, Tibet's spiritual and temporal ruler.

For hundreds of years, Tibet has been a prize fought for by its own chiefs, by Chinese emperors and warlords, by groups from India, and by the British.

At different periods the country was under Chinese overlordship, from the time of the Manchus until 1911. Both China and India have made deep impressions on its culture. A measure of independence was established by the British.

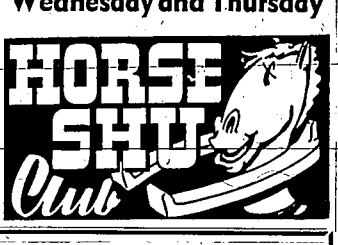

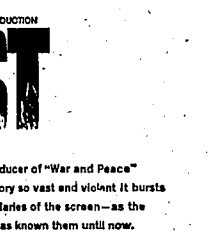

2 Legislators Talk at Area C. of C. Meet

WIDLEY, March 25—State Sen. **Walter Hanson**, Minidoka county, and State Rep. **Charles Chubb**, Blaine county, were the featured speakers at the Burley Chamber of Commerce meeting Monday noon.

They gave brief reports on their respective legislative houses.

Sen. Hanson admitted that the legislature "made many people unhappy" but justified its action by pointing out that it is the kind of system we have with its "double provision." He stated that there were more amendments than at any previous one.

Speaking of public school legislation, he said the way the state of Idaho is handling its school problems is "one of the best in the nation."

He said 75 of them are now levying the maximum in school taxes permitted by law. The only source pointed out, is the legislature every two years offered encouragement to those in Cassia county working for a consolidation of this is the first time the state of Idaho county that came to Minidoka county when it consolidated its road district a few years ago.

Representative Chubb commended the "little" tax increase bill, ultimately defeated in the overtime session, received more pressure than any other bill brought before either house. He said it was a "house" bill and that it was not a "real" legislative defeat in the senate.

He characterized the "whole session as one of compromise," adding that more bad legislation was passed and more good lost because of the labor bill than for any other reason.

Commenting on the proposed sales tax, Representative Chubb asserted that if the tax bill had been printed in time and could have been read by the public it might not have appeared so bad as a piece of legislation, and conversely it would have been cracked up as "law."

E. R. Blauer, Burley-Rupert district, manager of the Amalgamated Sugar company, reported on the effect senate bill No. 1, now being considered in committee in Washington, D. C., would have on the local sugar industry. This bill would normally eliminate the company's ability to market its product in the eastern markets, he said.

Blauer pointed out that to sell sugar in the greater population areas was a "must" because the sugar company produced six hundred-million pounds of sugar in 1958, of which only 40 per cent is consumed in the areas in which the sugar is produced, and that 20 per cent is sold in areas from Chicago and east.

The balance of 46 per cent is sold in the Pacific Northwest and areas east and south. Blauer noted many other sugar companies of the West would be adversely affected by this proposed legislation.

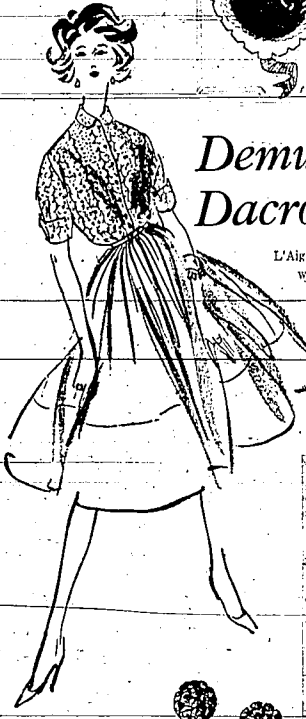

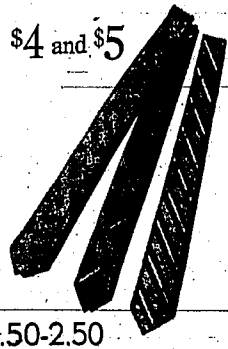

Care of Your Children
