New Finding May Answer Earth Riddle

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., March 31 (AP)—Discoveries made in the past few weeks may help solve one of the earth's greatest riddles—a team of scientists reported yesterday.

And this is the possibility of producing radio-made magnets for the study of magnetic materials. Instruments in rockets, satellites, guided missiles and electronic-brain controlling machines.

Use predicted.

It is even conceivable that they could use the findings to generate a form of "magnetic magnetism" to produce a wide magnetic material.

Physicists at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and the Army's Ordnance Research Laboratory, Cambridge, Mass., told the discoverers.

The "radio-made" discovery was made at determining the structure of atoms in the three elements—iron, nickel and cobalt.

More specifically, the scientists wanted to find the arrangement of electrons which orbit around the nucleus of an atom—atoms responsible for the phenomenon called magnetism which has puzzled scientists since the discovery by the ancients.

Neutrons, used by the scientists to bombard the material, and from the way the material reacts, they deduced the shape of the atoms.

They also found that the iron atoms may be distorted in a certain way, but the nickel and cobalt atoms are like baseballs with blisters, six or eight in number, on the surface of the sphere, and these blisters may be compared to the bumps on a basketball, but much smaller.

Nevada Gets Highest Tax Per Resident

WASHINGTON, March 31 (U-P)—Nevada collected more taxes on a per-capita basis than any other state last year, the census bureau said yesterday.

Nevada collected \$140.66 for every man, woman and child in 1958, compared with \$137.26 for the next highest state of Washington. New Mexico was third with per capita tax revenues of \$137.05.

New Jersey had the smallest per capita tax revenue—\$51.45. Nebraska was next with \$57.04, followed by New Hampshire, with \$51.02.

On the per capita spending side, Delaware outranked all the states its general expenditures figured out to \$298.26 for each inhabitant. Wyoming was second at \$285.79 and New Mexico third at \$242.17.

California received the largest amount of revenue from the federal government last year—more than \$47 million dollars. Next came New York at nearly \$24 million and Texas, \$25 million.

Revenues were up in 44 states while spending was up in 48, the reports said. Forty-four states increased their outstanding debt during the year.

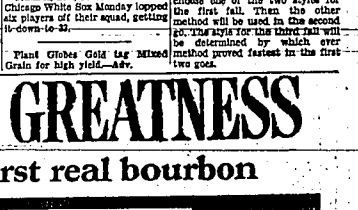

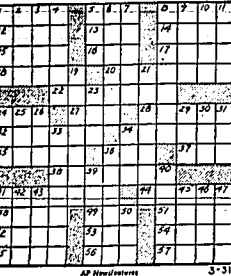

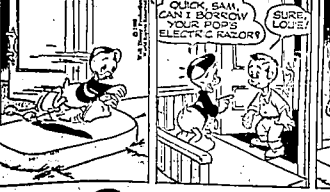

2 Prisoners Convicted of Killer Count

GALT LAKE CITY, March 31—An all-male jury today convicted two Utah state prison inmates of first degree murder in the killing of another prisoner. The next day a third defendant, Jose Garcia, 16, will go on trial for the brutal knife killing of Verner in a prison suite last Aug. 24.

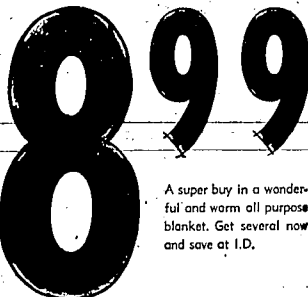

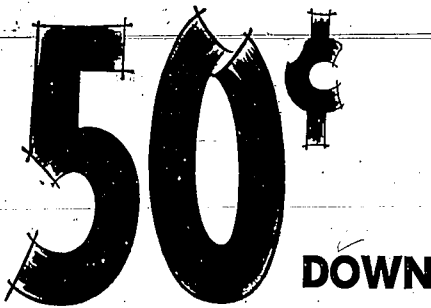
