## "Very Poor" Water Year Seen For Farmers on Salmon Tract

HOLLISTER, April 1—The water outlook for the Salmon tract for 1969 is "very poor" with a forecast of 44 inches of water per acre, Morrin Nelson, snow survey supervisor for local, forecast Tuesday night at the annual forecast meeting at the Hollister Grange hall. ### Redemption Of Bonds for Idaho OK'd

BOISE, April 1 (UP)—The state board of examiners yesterday authorized the redemption of one-half million dollars worth of state building bonds. The action will pave the way for issuance of that amount in new bonds to provide funds for construction authorized by the 1958 legislature.

The examiners approved the plan of Mrs. Ruth G. Moon, state auditor, to retire one-half million dollars worth of bonds on July 1, reducing to 1 1/2 million dollars the total of state bonds outstanding.
