Four Die as Jet Bomber Crashes Near Idaho Base

MOUNTAIN HOME AIR-FORCE BASE, April 3 (UPI)—The air force today set up a board of inquiry to look into the crash yesterday of a B-47 jet bomber that took four lives. The Stratofortress from Davis-Monthan air force base, Ariz., crashed and burned on the runway near the base, about 10 miles from the base, after a low-altitude maneuver. The crash killed four men: Col. Herbert I. Shingles, jr., commander of the 43rd bomber wing at Davis-Monthan; Capt. James R. Hartler, 33, first lieutenant, 1st aircraft commander, survived by his widow and two children; First Lieut. Oscar B. Tucker, Jr., 28, St. George, Va., survived by his widow; and Capt. Charles A. Walker, 30, Newton, Kan., survived by his widow and two children.

Several bodies were found near the crash site. A board of inquiry determined whether the men were thrown out after the plane hit the ground or whether they had been ejected before the impact.

Base officials said that the exact nature of the emergency landing the crew could not be determined immediately but it was reported that an engine problem was malfunctioning. It was also learned unofficially that the degree of emergency reported from the plane indicated that the pilot apparently thought he could reach the air strip.

The stratofortress was on a training mission. The crash occurred in remote scrubland about 20 miles from the base. The wreckage was not until three hours later.

Officer Cleared of Charge He Bumped Six Enlisted Men for Vacation Flight

TOKYO, April 3 (AP)—The U. S. air force today cleared a lieutenant colonel of charges he bumped six homebound enlisted men on a transport plane so he and his family could fly to Hawaii for a vacation.

But an air force investigating officer charged the lieutenant colonel, Charles Platt, jr., Brookline, N. Y., with "conduct unbecomingly in the confidence" which caused the "admission" error that was blamed for the bumped men.

The air force did not say specifically what had happened but said that the lieutenant colonel's flight was frustrated by the presence of Platt's command. The six enlisted men were all on emergency leave because of death or illness to close relatives.

The six enlisted men were all from Tachikawa air base, just outside Tokyo, on March 28.

Water Defiance of Soviet in Germany Set at NATO Meet

WASHINGTON, April 3 (AP)—The North Atlantic Treaty Organization council concluded its debate on the Berlin crisis today with one foreign minister after another outlining steps that the West offers to drive the West out of the divided city. The western powers were reported to have stiffened their policy line for negotiations with the Soviet Union beginning at Geneva May 11 on the Berlin dispute, and problems of German unification and European security.

The 15-nation council on the second day of its 10th anniversary conference here also developed support for proposals to create a United States machinery for direct negotiations between communist East Germany and West Germany over unification.

Italian Foreign Minister Giuseppe Pella said this could be done in a non-governmental all-German committee.

West German Foreign Minister Heinrich von Brentano is understood to have said that his government would be prepared to approve some kind of low-level talks with East German representatives on problems of arranging free elections throughout Germany on the basis of the principles ordered by the United States, Britain, France and the Soviet Union.

The United States secretary pledged new full use of its nuclear, atomic and bomber striking force in Europe and North America if military action ever became necessary.

Joint Road District Plans Not Favored

The Agricultural division of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce Thursday night voted down a resolution to consolidate all highway districts in the county into one unit, but favored further study of the proposal. At present there are four separate highway districts in the county. They are the districts of Buhl, Filer, Twin Falls and Mirthwood. Each is responsible for the county roads within its boundaries. Twin Falls district is the largest and also receives the largest share of money allotted—over gasoline taxes and license fees.

Floyd Lincoln made a motion that the resolution be approved as favoring consolidation. He said that the highway district commissioners are in favor of such a move if the other districts are in favor of it. It would provide for a more economical operation and better roads in some of the smaller districts.

LONDON, April 3 (AP)—Three little boys were sent down to a "dungeon" in a test of their courage in a test of their courage yesterday. They found it not exciting.

NATO Naval Chief Worries Over Reds' New Missile Sub

NEW YORK, April 3 (AP)—The gray wastes of the Atlantic today cloak a silent, never-ending struggle for leadership in naval power.

Adm. Jerauld "Jerry" Wright, top sea dog for the North Atlantic Treaty organization, has a new worry — reports that the Soviet Union is developing a submarine that can launch a guided missile with an atomic warhead.

"They can convert a number of their existing submarines to that purpose," he said grimly. "The defense of North America from the threat of attack by guided-missile submarines is occupying a good deal of our attention."

This and a multitude of other problems in the day-to-day race for supremacy at sea are under constant study by 10 NATO officers at Wright's headquarters at Norfolk, Va. He is proud of the fact it is the first and only allied naval force of different nations into a coordinated task force.

Western Allies Require Four Months to Agree to Be Firm

WASHINGTON, April 3 (UPI)—It has taken Western allies about four months just to reach a point where they agreed on an understanding on the Berlin crisis.

"They had been agreed for some weeks on willingness to negotiate with the Soviet Union to settle the crisis peacefully. But if they knew much less being agreed on—what they want to negotiate, it's still locked up in their heads."

Chancery are they don't know yet, and won't until they've done some more weeks of talking. All of which is pretty good evidence that the West is not united.

How thoroughly allied policy in Europe has been frozen for years and how thoroughly it is unprepared to meet a sudden twist in events like the one pulled by Khrushchev.

The Allies haven't lacked time for plenty of discussion since last November.

British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan, after conferring with Chancellor, visited President Eisenhower, President Charles de Gaulle of France and West Germany's Chancellor Konrad Adenauer.

This vista seemed something less than fully satisfactory from the standpoint of allied unity. Reports of disagreement between Britain and the United States were also being eye-to-eye—looked out.

There still were the foreign ministers of the United States, Britain, France and West Germany met for two days before the North Atlantic Treaty organization's 15-member nations opened their session here.

As late Thursday afternoon it was reported with Western allies that they were concentrating on solving the Berlin situation even after the cost of delaying unification of Germany.

To put it another way: There have been reports the British were for making concessions to the Soviets to get over the Berlin hump. "Then Thursday night, NATO spokesmen sought to pin a pic-

Now talk of reunification through free elections seems to have disappeared from the speech of Western spokesmen. Actually, the idea of uniting the two Germans through free elections has been unrelentingly from the beginning.

The reason: The Soviet Union is against it and this year Khrushchev again brushed aside any such idea. And no wonder. East Germany is a Russian satellite. Moscow isn't going to chance losing anything it has in hand.

It would lose East Germany in any free election set up to choose a single German government which would decide whether it wanted to be pro-West or pro-communist.

There's a good reason to believe the 18 million East Germans would vote against any communist government with communists which was runned down their throats. But even if they were pro-West Germany.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., April 3 (UPI)—Construction of the first U.S. postoffice to be operated by pneumatic tubes and automation was started yesterday.

Postmaster General Arthur E. Flemming launching the project, said the plant will be far ahead of anything in the world. His said it will serve as a model and laboratory for developing automatic postoffices in other major cities.

Lease Set In 1960
The 20-million-dollar project being built by Inteco Systems, Inc., New York, a subsidiary of International Telephone and Telegraph corporation, will be leased to the federal government in September, 1960. It will serve more than a hundred postoffice branches and postal stations in Rhode Island and southeastern Massachusetts.

Crates of unsorted mail, trucked in, will start trips through the three-story plant on conveyors. A dial setting will send each crate to its special destination. One operator in control tower will handle crates.

Work By Machine
A separating machine with electric cells will remove parcels, large envelopes and rolled mail. Mailing machines will surface-continue heads will face letters the same way, and will turn them so that the stamps are in the right position for canceling. Unstamped mail, or mail with extra stamps, will be sorted out for hand-canceling.

Neatly stacked, the letters, will drop one by one on a conveyor belt and an operator will punch the proper code number for each address. A machine "memory" men will drop the letters into the proper bins for bundling and loading—into outgoing—casks. An operator will take the bundles to operation—will sort-and-distribute mail arriving in sacks from distant cities.
