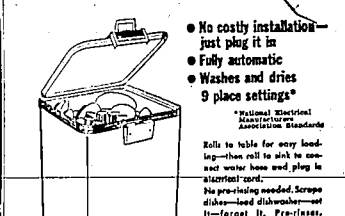

U.N. Agency Says Returned Hungarians Treated Rough

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., April 6 (UPI)—The International League for the Rights of Man charged yesterday that 6,000 refugees who returned to Hungary under promise of amnesty following the 1956 revolution have been jailed, exiled to work in Russia or executed.

The league, a consultative agency accredited to the United Nations, submitted documentary evidence to U.N. Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld, including one case of a man turned back to Hungary by letters allegedly from his wife, who actually had been killed trying to follow him to freedom.

Persecution of the returned refugees has been rampant, the report indicated.

Roger Baldwin, chairman of the league, submitted evidence that many repatriated refugees have suffered through official discrimination against their relatives and friends.

The evidence was prepared for the league by the Hungarian National Revolutionary committee in exile, headquartered in Paris, and was based on certified statements and testimony available at its Vienna office.

The league committee reported that "all those who have returned and are presently in prison or internment camps had received previously at the Hungarian legations of the countries where they were a letter of amnesty" promising them complete forgiveness.

It said the amnesty promise was meant for at least 6,000 who returned. Some returning refugees who possessed technical skills were called to the Soviet Union, the committee reported.

The documents submitted to Hammarskjöld contained sworn statements of several cases.

One told of Lenz Istvan, who escaped from Hungary in January, 1957. Istvan was lured back to Hungary purportedly written by his wife. Actually, she was shot and arrested while trying to follow him across the border.

Istvan returned in July, 1958, with an amnesty letter written by the Hungarian legation in West Germany. He was arrested four days after his return.

In September, he was tried for spying for "Western Imperialists," sentenced to death and presumably executed.

Palmer Blasts Out

AUGUSTA, Ga., April 6 (UPI)—Art Wall, jr., figured he had to shoot a 66 in the final round to win the Masters—and he did just that yesterday with one of the most fantastic finishes in golfing history. The 35-year-old pro from Pocono Manor, Pa., who has been burning up the winter tour, really poured on the heat in the home stretch with five birdies in the last six holes to take the masters title with a total of 281—four strokes under par. It took a lot of dice and a pro pressure was terrific for the slender, solemn-faced, 165-pound Wall, who hit his game on the 18th hole and finished the final round six strokes behind co-leaders Arnold Palmer, the defending champion, and Jay Leonard, the veteran Canadian pro.

There were 12 other golfers ahead of him when he started Sunday's play, including eventual runner-up Arnold Palmer and Jay Leonard, who played a dandy one. He was playing a half-hour ahead of Leonard and Middlecote. Wall, using his uncorked backswing, had covered the front nine in 34 strokes, but he knew Palmer could catch a 36, so he still was five strokes off.

He was teeing off on the 13th hole when he heard the crowd. Palmer had bogeyed the par three 135-yard hole—the hole on which Palmer won the Masters last year. "That gave me hope," Wall said. "I said to myself, let's get going."

He got going all right—three birdies in a row, then a par and then two more birdies. On the 400-yard par four 11th hole—where he had a 20-foot putt from the flag and sank the putt for a birdie. Then came the vital 200-yard hole, which he birdied and easily knocked it in for another birdie. Big Count of Steelhead at Dam Reported

BOISE, April 6—Recent reports that 10,000 steelhead were counted crossing the power dam at Lexington to spawn in the Clearwater river, a slight dip, an average of about 100 fish per hour, caused a big count on 30 years to recall gloomy predictions that the big salmon trout were doomed to extinction.
Rose Leonard, state fish and game department director, says those early fears resulted from faulty fish numbers built into the dam's design. The count of the hundreds of steelhead ascending the river to spawn were reduced.
Weakness in the fish passageway over the dam were corrected five years later and this, together with restrictions on the down-river commercial catch, caused the resumption of spawning activities of the steelhead trout.

The only count of more than 1,200 was the highest reported this spring, and has been topped only one time previously when 1,253 were counted one day last October. It said Democrats do not advocate spending for "its own sake," but it denounced President Eisenhower's "inadequate and shortsighted" budget recommendations in the domestic welfare field.

"We are not growing enough. We are not providing economic justice for all our people," the statement said. "President Eisenhower's program says that, in order to fight inflation, we must default on all three of these fronts. This is ridiculous."

GOP Forces Hope Jobless Total Is Less

WASHINGTON, April 6 (UPI) — Administration officials hoped today that a report on March unemployment would blunt Democratic and labor demands for multi-billion dollar spending programs to spur the economy.

The government was expected to issue a report tomorrow showing that the number of jobless in March declined by about 300,000 from the 449,000 unemployed in February. This would be more than the normal seasonal drop.

A Democratic advisory committee charged last night that the United States is headed for disaster unless the Eisenhower administration stops trying to balance the budget without balancing the economy.

In a special statement on unemployment, the 27 Democratic party leaders called for new programs for schools, housing, medical care, transportation facilities, "mass sources protection" and atom clearance.

Similar demands for government action were expected from the AFL-CIO conference on unemployment opening here Wednesday. More than 100 union leaders and unemployed workers planned to attend the one-day meeting.
