72,000 Acres to Be Reseeded in Region

BOISE, April 8 (UP)—A program aimed at reseeding with grass nearly 72,000 acres of southern Idaho land to help control the bare landscape was approved yesterday by a bureau of land management advisory committee.

The land will be reseeded to grasses in an effort to wipe out weeds and control the spread of virus, which is harmful to beans, sugar beets, tomatoes and other crops.

William Matthews, range and forestry officer for the BLM, said the committee recommended reseeding these areas:

- In the Boise district—34,230 acres between Orchard and Glens Ferry.
- In the Burley district—18,000 acres in the Bering area south of Twin Falls.
- In the Pocatello district—19,000 acres from King Hill to Hazelton.

The project will cost about \$300,000, Matthews said. The funds must be appropriated by Congress.

Shortage of Water, Soil Moisture Told

BOISE, April 8 (UPI)—A shortage of soil moisture and inadequate irrigation waters in some areas of Idaho was reported today by the U. S. department of agriculture and weather bureau. "In the general area south of the Snake river (plus some counties north of the Snake, near the Oregon line) dryness is being reported," the bulletin said. "Irrigation water supplies are generally adequate with the exception of the Salmon tract area in Twin Falls county and in parts of Clearwater county."

The bulletin also said that agricultural field work in lower elevations of eastern Idaho was about 10 days ahead of normal while progress was near normal in the north.

There is a seasonal lack of Idaho's agriculture; dry weather has retarded growth of range feed and non-irrigated crops in some areas. Seeding of spring grains, legumes, sugar beets and onions is nearing completion in earlier areas. Seeding of spring grains, legumes, sugar beets and onions is well along in earlier areas. Other crops include—potatoes, peas, lentils, corn, sorghum and alfalfa and spraying for insects. Fruit is nearing blossom stage in commercial areas.

In the north, major activities included machinery and fence repair, spreading of manure and commercial fertilizer and limited amount of seedbed preparation.

Progress is considered about normal in the southern portion of the state. Winter grains are in good condition. Fruit is nearing blossom stage in commercial areas.

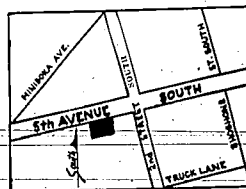

WASHINGTON (NEA)—A national aeronautics and space administration committee today announced that the humane law great test case passed by congress was amended to protect animals sent to outer space.

What the good news is, is that the law now says that no more money be appropriated for the launch of any satellite until its scientists built into their satellites an apparatus that would provide an automatic mercy mission for any animal sent to outer space.

Russia's Travels Route Reopened Court Order Enjoins U.P. On Cars Use

WASHINGTON, April 8—The State Department said yesterday it has informed the Soviet Union that the closed travel route it closed to foreigners last week. ANOTHER WELFARE PROGRAM

Washington research office of the Council of State Chambers of Commerce has called attention to the latest gimmick in high financing by the federal government, proposed in the so-called Area Redevelopment bill.

The bill, recently passed by the senate and now pending in the house banking and currency committee, is being strongly attacked by the Council of State Chambers of Commerce as "another welfare program" because it would make available to the benefit of certain favored areas selected on the basis of arbitrary criteria.

The council pin-pointed three significant facts for the people's enlightenment:

1. A total of 24 states (including Idaho) will receive nothing under the proposal although they would be contributing to its tax cost.
2. Of the 20 states that would be eligible to participate only 11 would receive more in benefits than they would pay as their cost of the program.
3. And of these 11—the two major industrial states of Michigan and Pennsylvania—funds paid out of the federal treasury from general revenues collected from all states, pay more than the benefits they would receive.

The 217,300 industrial jobs that the legislation's sponsors hope to develop through the urban loan program alone could require a total federal investment of \$2,119,000,000, the council pointed out. But, it added, the bill provides only 100 million dollars which would be "only a small start and would generate demands for a far costlier program."

Legislative measures providing federal financial assistance to economically depressed areas have been seriously considered by congress for many years without any definite action. Such a program passed both houses in 1958, but was disapproved by President Eisenhower on the grounds that the bill assigned major responsibility for developing depressed areas to the federal government instead of to local citizens as he had recommended, and because it provided financial assistance for certain purposes which the President thought would be better handled by state and local governments.

The bill currently under consideration by congress is similar to the one which the President vetoed last year.

As stated in the declaration of purpose of SB 722, its sponsors expect that the federal aid provided in the bill will create new job opportunities in depressed areas without substantially reducing employment in other areas. They expect that new permanent jobs will be created by putting up new or better housing, industrial plants, facilities in distressed areas. The apparent theory behind this supposition is that present lack of credit is the primary obstacle to development of new industry in these communities. Another reason for declining to aid industry in some of these areas, according to the sponsors of SB 722, is the inadequacy of public facilities such as water supply and sewage systems. So, they also would have the federal government help finance such facilities as a further inducement to industry.

Like many of the government's welfare programs, SB 722 is loaded with discrepancies and discriminations at the expense of taxpayers generally.

The claim that the major obstacle to industrial redevelopment of depressed areas is lack of credit does not make sense. There are a dozen common sources of funds for such industries.

The fact that Michigan would enjoy a lion's share of any government redevelopment plan is significant in itself. Michigan has the largest number of housing units on a costly state welfare program.

Partly as a result of going bankrupt, the state is practically broke, at least to the extent of having to appeal to its largest taxpayers to make payments in advance so that it could meet its most pressing obligations.

Meantime Walter Reuther's United Auto Workers union has put the screws to the auto manufacturers in Michigan to the point where the entire industry is getting jittery. Decentralization of industry is one of the big mass movements nowadays to get away from all this concentration of union power. There are plenty of buyers in Michigan and small, which have capital to invest, but which hesitate to take such a gamble because of ever-mounting taxes, the demands of labor, ever-increasing inflation and the "red-baiting" for ever-mounting extravaganzas by the federal government.

But instead of recognizing the real causes for the slumps in employment and the hesitancy to invest, our government is launching development programs that are pouring more money down the drain.

According to the Council of State Chambers of Commerce, one of the states that would pay plenty and get nothing from the new redevelopment plan now under consideration by congress.

This state would pay out \$5,510,000 to create 10,000 depressed industrial jobs and receive \$293,000 from the proposed \$100,000,000 loan. Under the headings showing what portions of these benefits would return to the different states, Idaho, receives nothing but blanks.

ROGERS IS FOR NIXON'S 1960 NOMINATION

In almost every issue administration controversy involving their concern, Rogers has had the backing of the press. He is a member of the New Jersey, secretary of law. This too has found it out with the ultraconservative Strauss-Burnfield-Benson factors in many cabinet arguments.

ANTITRUST SUITS FILED BY JUSTICE DEPARTMENT

WASHINGTON, April 8—The Justice Department today announced that it had filed antitrust suits against several companies and individuals.

The suits are the first of a series of cases that the department has filed in the past few weeks. The suits are aimed at what the department considers to be violations of the antitrust laws.

WASHINGTON, April 8 (UPI)—That housing bill which was expected to pass the House next week by Feb. 1 probably won't get there for several more weeks, according to congressional sources.

Runoff Vote Set to Name Boise Mayor

 In three southern Idaho municipalities Tuesday produced a new mayor for Idaho Falls, and the need for a runoff election in the present mayor and the political trophy in Boise.

The four-man majors race in Boise casts produce the major excitement in Tuesday's trio of municipal elections, a forerunner of voting which takes place in 23 in the state's 42 second class cities and 143 villages. In Boise, a newcomer to politics, real estate man Robert Day, outpolled his other three opponents but was far short of the overall majority necessary to nail down final victory.

He will face Mayor R. E. Estler, seeking his fifth term, in a runoff on April 21.

Day received 2,095 votes to Estler's 1,203. The mayor had a close call, beating out Dan Turpin, former mayor of Twin Falls and Piler, by only 44 votes. Turpin had 1,250.

Low man was Gordon Elchman who received only 1,100 votes.

The two incumbent Boise city councilmen were retained to office by the voters. They are Harold T. Jones and Harold T. Jones.

Idaho Falls voters chose a new mayor, W. J. O'Neil, who defeated incumbent John Rogers, 5,182 to 4,451.

In Nampa, Mayor Thomas A. Leupp and two incumbent city councilmen, Early Antrim and Alex Hunter, were re-elected.

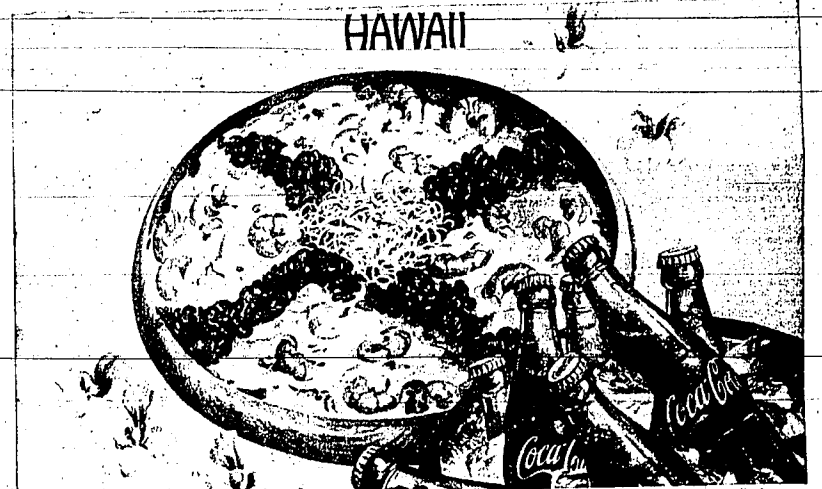

Bomber Test Is Slated for Lower Levels

SEATTLE, April 8 (AP)—Pacific Northwest test pilots who may be started by a low-flying B52 bomber in the next six weeks were told by the Boeing Airplane company today there's no cause for alarm.

Half a dozen low-level test flights will be made by one of the giant bombers over Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana during a 45-day period starting Friday, the company said.
