Judge Thinks Ruling to Set Courts Policy

Carver reviewed Idaho's traffic law history, pointing out that in 1921 legislators set a mandatory one-hour speed.

Under the 1953 changes, "the speed alone constituted an offense," he said.

Session and installation of new officers will take place at the May 8 meeting.

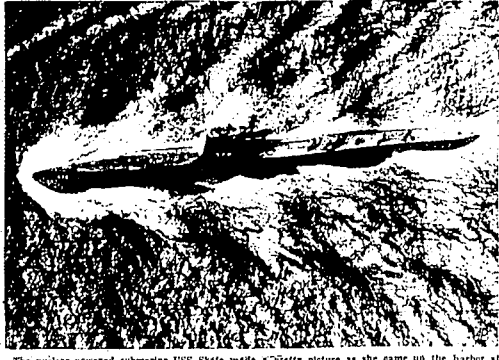
Plans for a school for exceptional children to be held in one of the new rooms being built on at the Peabody school in Rupert were explained by Meyer.

### TV Showing From Space Not Far Off

BALTIMORE, Md., April 9.—Dr. John P. Hagan, director of the Vanguard project for the national aeronautics and space administration, freely predicted yesterday that the time isn't far off when a television program may be seen halfway around the Earth.

But it will be a few years, he cautioned, before astronauts can come on watching the broadcast show from New York while eating their breakfast in London.

"If a satellite is placed in orbit about 22,000 miles above the Earth," he explained, "a period of revolution will be one day.

Thus if it is over the equator and traveling eastward, it will remain over the same spot indefinitely because the Earth rotates beneath it at the same speed.

"Such a fixed satellite could be of maximum use to transatlantic radio and TV programs, relay messages to ships at sea and serve as a link for international commercial traffic."

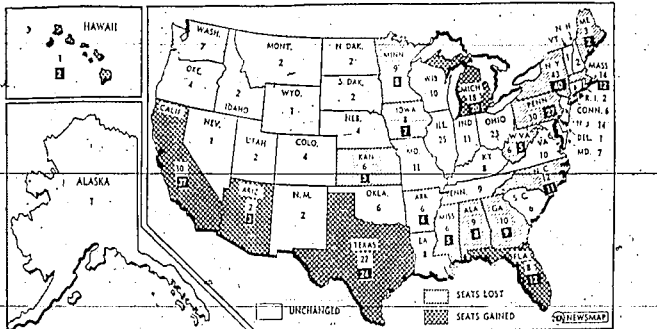

# Congress to West ern After Changes



Congress will go western in 1960. Because of population shifts and the granting of statehood to Alaska and Hawaii, 13 states face loss of seats in the U.S. House of Representatives. Presidential electoral votes the total of house plus senate seats would also be lost. But six other states may gain. That's the estimate of the U.S. census bureau, predicting the results of 1960's nationwide census. Newswatch is based on that prediction and reflects a westward trend in population and political influence. (Black figure is present number; white figure is new number. If changed.) (California stands to be the biggest gainer with seven, though New York will retain the largest number despite losing three. The redistribution of seats, however, will not take effect until the 1962 elections. First presidential election in which the change may be felt will be in 1964. Although 19 seats will be lost, only 13 will be gained by other states. That is in order to bring the number of house members down to 435, the total fixed by law. Pennsylvania will follow New York and California.

### Power Tieup Talk Pending Solon Review

WASHINGTON, April 9 (UPI)—Officials of the department of interior and the Bonneville Power administration have promised to submit to the committee on the Pacific Northwest power hookup pending a review of the plan. Representatives of both government agencies made the committee yesterday at a hearing in Washington which was called to consider plans currently under way between BPA and the Pacific Gas and Electric company for construction of power transmission lines between California and the Northwest.

Engle Makes Charge

Sen. Charles McNary, who advocated for the hearing, said the government "apparently is trying to get the matter away from private interests."

Engle and Sen. Richard L. Neuberger, D. Ore., and Thomas D. Walsh, and Thomas H. Kochel, R. Calif., said the sense of irritation and recrimination should be conducted an "exhaustive study of the proposed power exchange. They said Congress should determine whether transmission lines, should be built by private interests or by the federal government.

Dr. William A. Pearl, Bonneville administrator, told the committee that the negotiations between BPA and PG & E were already "well advanced." He said he had no intention of signing a contract with PG & E until we were convinced that PG & E would provide the best development.

Plan Described

Under the PG and E proposal the company would buy second power "dump" power from BPA in the Northwest and distribute the electricity to its customers in California. The agreement also would provide that any excess power which accumulated in California would be supplied to the Northwest.

Pearl and Assistant Interior Secretary Fred G. Aandahl agreed to halt further negotiations with the company until the subject has been debated in congress.

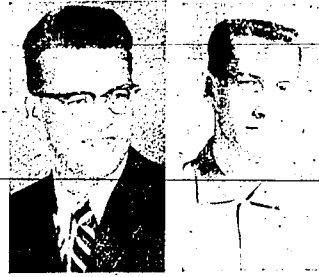

## Legal Group Finds Justice Is Not Equal

NEW YORK, April 9.—Every schoolchild who ever murmured the oath of allegiance to the United States has heard its guarantee of justice for all. But yesterday a group of lawyers was raised that the concept was really applied to all Americans. ## Spring Is More Springlike; Business, Employment Rise

NEW YORK, April 9.—Spring is acting more like an spring. Auto dealers say they've sighted a spring pickup in car sales—something they haven't seen for several years.

The total of the unemployed has dropped as it should in the spring but badly muffed last year. And consumers, notably the ladies, are spending more.

The good news about the return of an old-fashioned spring comes from several sources and some of them could be suggested of a ting of wishful thinking and may be propaganda. But mostly they add up to a pleasant spring song indeed.

Auto dealers say they haven't seen a sales pickup in the spring since the auto makers stopped bringing the new models out in late winter and started offering them before the first frost instead.

The administration is jubilant because unemployment in March scored one of its biggest drops for the season in several years. But labor leaders stress that the total still is higher than is deemed normal.

Part of the march of men back to work is due to the general business recovery and to the opening up of outdoor jobs.

Part is due to the spurt in steel output due to users worrying about a steel strike this summer—and that, too, is part of the spring pattern in these years when a new labor contract is coming up. And part of the March gain in employment is that the early Eastered merchants to hire clerks.

Merchants report contentedly that women are behaving like women in the spring and bought a lot of finery for their children and themselves.

Men's wear dealers are less jubilant. They report that men are following their usual pattern. Most apparently are putting off buying summer suits until hot weather makes their winter duds uncomfortable.

But consumer spending as a whole is following a springlike trend. The commerce department says it is now running at a 300 billion dollar annual clip, up four billion from the winter months.

And the sap of confidence is rising in the veins of businessmen themselves. The department says that spending for new plant and equipment is being more than it at first expected.

One thing for sure, it's a lot better spring than last year. More like the good old days.

Of course, there's one bad habit showing up, too, in the spring: various governments often raise taxes. And this year, they're as springlike as ever.

### Iraq's Oil Is Forced Into West's Camp

As communications lines grip the Middle East, the most pressing question is, what happens now to Iraq's oil?

An important question because Iraq sits in the middle of the great Middle Eastern oil pool and the great Middle Eastern oil pipeline. It is the world's sixth largest oil producing country.

This correspondent, on a recent trip to Baghdad, put that question to Dr. Hashim Jawad, Iraq's ambassador and spokesman. His reply was: Iraq is in the West's camp.

"Iraq's ties are with the West. Most of our income comes from our oil goes entirely to the West. Our pipelines are directed westward. At the present moment, no one can prevent the future course of the Iraq government."

American news correspondents and American business agents are being driven out of Iraq and prospects there now appear dim indeed.

As far as oil is concerned, there are three elements which today force Iraq to maintain its ties with the western nations.

**Pipelines Go to West**

One is the oil pipelines. The pipeline handling Iraq's oil runs from Iraq to Syria and thence to Mediterranean outlets in Syria and Lebanon. There is no pipeline in Iraq or any of its satellites which carries Iraq's oil to the Persian Gulf.

A second, and compelling one, is the fact that Russia at this moment has no particularly good western oil. Russia is itself an oil exporting nation and has immense and still untapped oil reserves of its own.

A third is that presently Iraq's oil almost exclusively goes to the western nations.

### Dew Line to Be Extended



Planned extension of the Distant Early Warning (DEW) line across Greenland will give added protection against attack, according to the defense department. The 27-million-dollar project, known as the DEW Line, was approved by the cabinet in Greenland. When completed the radar warning system will extend from the Alaskan islands, around Alaska, across Canada and over Greenland.

### Missile Photo Nets Unusual Shot of Moon

WHITE SANDS MISSILE RANGE, N. M., April 9 (AP)—A "range" camera was used in shooting for the moon, but that's not what they got in an unusual shot of a Lancer missile.

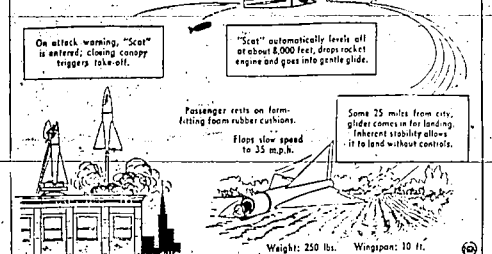
The missile was nowhere near the moon, but the 36-inch lens on the big movie camera which took the shot happened to catch the face of the moon—just as it passed—the face of the day-out moon.

The long lens pulled in the background, making the moon appear enormous and as if the rocket was about to land on it.

Equipment used in taking the picture was an IGO camera—except ground optical receiver—including a Mitchell high-speed cinematograph through a 96-inch focal-length lens at f/2 on black and white 35 mm. motion picture film at a speed of 60 frames per second.

The camera was developed at Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md., in 1951. It is mounted on a modified navy machine gun mount and is operated manually by two men from a permanently fixed location.

### Escape Plane Under Construction



In a secluded hangar at Eagle Mountain national guard base, Texas, an unusual aircraft is being constructed. Called "Seat," its purpose is to get key defense people out of crowded cities in event of an atomic attack. Builder: Robertson Aircraft Corporation, has divulged few details; but artist's conception shows how "Seat" is intended to work. Capable of taking off from the top of a building or even a parking lot, "Seat" is designed to be completely automatic once its passenger enters. It will have only two controls: a button to lower flaps when landing, and a control stick with limited movement—for psychological reasons. "Seat" is essentially an escape device. Like a parachute, it offers a much better chance than remaining in an atomized city. The project is not a government-sponsored one, though civil defense officials are reported to be interested in the idea.

### Adenauer Makes It Plain He Will Not Leave Public Life

Chancellor Konrad Adenauer has made it plain that while he may be retiring from active politics, he has no intention of retiring from the affairs of West Germany.

He speaks of the presidency as a "broken line" with a gap in position containing full possibilities for continued influence.

He also speaks with certainty of the continuation of his foreign policies by his successor as chancellor.

He speaks of those policies as "appealing interest in the West German international position, not a complete withdrawal from the world of one-man-at-a-time."

Adenauer, with his unyielding faith in the possibilities for a co-operation with Russia, has taken leadership in that community of type which is almost unbelievable for a German so soon after World War II.

When the allies sponsored a constitutional convention in Bonn in 1948 with a view to establishing an autonomous West German government, Adenauer was just one of a group of steady-looking old men. They were expected to act primarily as arbiters until the younger and more democratic forces could be mobilized for the purpose of government.

Some fighters flew menacingly above the stage of the convention to Berlin that summer as the American planes broke the Berlin blockade. Europe was full of fear.

Max Reimann, West German leader whose gray plaid suit contrasted with the somber black of most of the older men, appeared to be the only truly vigorous delegate at the convention.

But Adenauer took over. He fought Reimann tooth and nail, and the influence of communism in West Germany was soon killed. The old man then proceeded, over the years, to make peace between Germany and France. He won the East, and in return gave his hand of German cooperation to the rest of western Europe.

He forced reluctant Germans to accept rearmament and a full place in the defense of the whole community which they had so often attacked.

He made peace between Monnet and Robert Schuman, and Paul-Henri Spaak and all the others who dreamed of a united Europe, to make the first and subsequent steps in economic cooperation.

### Police Brave Indigestion to Uphold Tests

NEW YORK, April 9 (AP)—New York policemen who temporarily gave up both their dinner and the society of their fellowmen for science and the greater glory of the department.

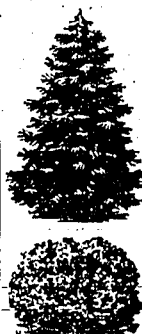
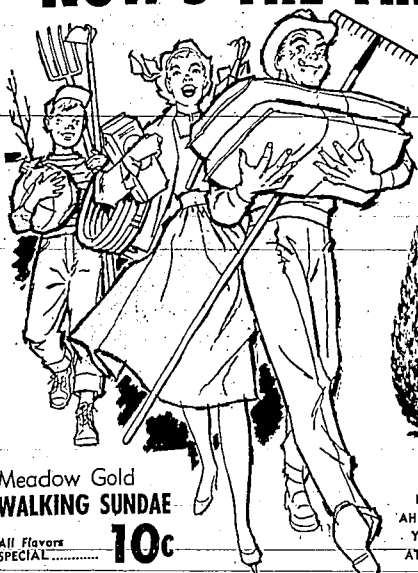

### Indian Agent Is Speaker at T. F. Women's Meet

Frell M. Owl, superintendent of the Fort Hall Indian reservation, addressed the women of the Twentieth Century club at their luncheon meeting Tuesday at the Turf club.

Owl, a member of the Eastern Cherokee band of North Carolina, has been associated with the bureau of Indian affairs for more than 20 years and has been superintendent of the Fort Hall agency since 1924.

According to Owl, because of their unique spirit of independence and cultural differences, Indians have made slow progress in integration and it will take considerable time before this will be brought about as it takes several generations before a satisfactory adjustment can be made.

He noted it was just 70 years ago the blanket war ended and 131,000 Indians were prisoners of war in Mexico. Scalping and horse stealing were still honorable.

The narrowing of the reservation boundaries, Owl said, brought disastrous effects to the morale of the Indian and the Howard-Wheeler act was a stepping stone to the economy of the Shoshones and Bannocks at Fort Hall.

In theory the Indians were to become farmers and little thought was given to their culture. They have no previous experience and opportunity to learn, no machinery and a concept that farming was a woman's job. All did not succeed. He added many years must pass before the Indian can be assimilated into the white race.

Among the 2,600 Indians at Fort Hall, Owl said, are 1,000 of distinct cultural groups. The full bloods, who retain social customs and languages, and at the other extreme, the mixed bloods who have adjusted to the white race and a desire for the better and have intermingled but are still proud of their heritage. The largest group are the partially adjusted. It still lies in the future when they will utilize what they have.

# Steelworkers' Chief Plans to Ask for Paid 3-Month Vacation Every 5 Years

WASHINGTON, April 9. — In 1910 steelworkers put in 70 to 80 hours a week to earn \$150. Now, nearly 20 years later, they do a 40-hour week. This means more ease and more working money. Says a steel worker's union spokesman: "It's not just pay, it's ideas."

Just the day after, Steelworkers' union President David J. McDonald said he had learned of a vacation plan which, he said, Australia would try to adopt in its steel industry.

"Steel employers' under the Australian-style 'fringe benefit' will be asked to pay for a three-month vacation for workers every five years."

McDonald says frankly "it's a device to shorten the work week and help spread a dwindling number of jobs among the workers."

With steel plants now approaching 100 in this country, McDonald says, thousands of steelworkers will be left out of the vacation plan which still has not been rehearsed because of new production efficiencies.

"This happens every time we have a recession in the steel industry," he said. "Less manpower is needed. There is nothing we can do about it. This is progress. But we can find ways to keep people working during the recession."

McDonald's vacation plan and its expected wage increase and pension plan will be a major point of contention. The industry is showing every sign this year of looking for increased production and employment. The steel industry is "hell-bent on fomenting a strike," McDonald says. "The industry is deliberately promoting strike talk to stimulate scarce-bunking of its products."

But later caravans of visitors roamed the streets, including one with a car that had a sign that read "man prohibition" on top of it.
