Letter Quoted

"Dear Mr. Reed, Do you love your wife and children? Do you deposit \$100 under locker two by Monday evening or your wife and children will be killed. Do help me God, I will kill your wife and children if it takes till 1950 if you do not comply."

Reed notified the FBI, and sent his wife and daughter to Louisiana while the investigation was under way. Although the letter referred to "children," Reed has only one daughter.

WASHINGTON, April 15 (AP)—Federal tax officials said today they will question more income tax returns this year than ever before.

Officials supervising IRS tax audits said their work on the latest crop of returns will be expanded regardless of what Congress does with the agency's budget.

This is in line with an announced goal of Commissioner Dana Latta to expand tax audits.

Only a small fraction of the 73 million returns filed each year are audited. About 61 million returns are from individuals.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The Democrats are now paying the price exacted by any political organization which sought to be "all things to all men" in order to win and hold power at Washington. Its many ready-bought elements are pulling it down for lack of any real agreement on basic political principles.

The present attack on senate majority leader Lyndon B. Johnson has been the last straw. The reasons therefore must be sought elsewhere. The important fact is that it is not directed against him personally, for he is not the enemy. It is directed against the Democratic party as a whole.

It actually constitutes a general broadside against the Democratic party as a whole. It is a broadside which is far more of a legislative blow than the two agree almost always on broad, general policy. And what Johnson does with respect to "danger and cloakroom" strategy, Rayburn consults with nobody, based on a few procedural matters, his word is law to the house Democrats.

SPEAKING OF ERRORS. Presidential News Secretary Jim Hagerty came out in a televised forum sponsored by Sigma Delta Chi the other day for more than a half hour correcting errors in newspapers and broadcasts. Preferably, Hagerty said, the correction should appear under the by-line of the man who wrote the original dispatch.

During this telecast, Arthur Schlesinger, Jr., a Harvard professor of history, made an erroneous statement which went unchallenged. In fact, Jim Hagerty, the man who despises error, confirmed the mistake.

Professor Schlesinger gave as one example of deficient news coverage "Communist China, where no American newspaperman can go without risking loss of his passport and proper privileges and where, as a consequence, as a nation we are deprived of any effective news coverage except what we can hear from foreign correspondents of other nations."

Mr. Hagerty might have set him straight in words like these:

"You do not read the right newspapers, professor. In August, 1937, the state department let down the bar against admitting United States reporters to Communist China and issued passports to representatives of 24 leading agencies and companies.

"So far—the Red-Chinese have admitted one of the authorized reporters, John Struhs, representing the Associated Press. The Reader's Digest. He made a 7,000-mile tour of Red China in the fall of 1938 and gave extensive reports in words and pictures to approximately 600 newspapers last October. He has another report in the Reader's Digest in January and in a telecast of color motion picture film on NBC the same month."

Mr. Hagerty might have continued; and he did not pick up Mr. Struhs's passport or cancel his privileges. On the contrary, government officials reported his courage and enterprise in getting this news to the American people."

"But what Jim Hagerty did say was this: 'You would like to see American newspapermen and their reports in the world... rather than depend upon the reports of other people, but this is the situation at the time and I can't argue with it.'"

It is understandable that a professor of history might feel that way, because his reading of current events is spotty. But Jim Hagerty should know better. Therefore his error is more serious than Schlesinger's and we suggest he correct it.

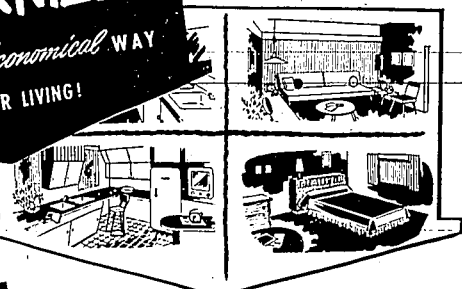

He is innocent of their fears that he may become involved with a girl. (Girls) Pooh. He has no use for them. Nor does he understand their fear of his running on the highway.

If they tried to tell him their fears for his safety, he would lose patience with them and angrily cry out against their lack of faith in him. He would insist that he knows all about such ways, but that he will not follow them. Not he. Others pitch-in—NO.

Parents have to go through this state of misunderstanding for a while, mustering what understanding, patience and strength they can until the child, with enough experience, form some degree of steadiness of habit, to allow them driving experiences in
