U.S. March Output Sets New Record

WASHINGTON, April 16.—The Federal Reserve board reports today that the nation's total economic output has set a new record for the month, and that the rate of increase during the recession has been maintained.

The board's report, which is based on the seasonally adjusted figures of industrial production, shows that the output for the month of March was 1.4 percent above the level of the same month in 1947-48.

The report also shows that in February the output was 1.1 percent above the level of the same month in 1947-48, and compares with a 1.0 percent increase in January.

The board said production of steel, automobiles, and other goods in March was 1.2 percent above the level of the same month in 1947-48. However, it said that the output of durables, however, was 1.1 percent above the level of the same month in 1947-48.

Former teams from international China, Italy and the Netherlands hurried borrowed American jet planes through dizzying precision maneuvers in a bright, sunny sky.

Seated with him in the hushed crowd of some 4,000 persons—all with some special interest in aviation—were air force Secretary James Douglas and the air force chief of staff, Gen. Thomas G. White.

Three huge delta-wing Vulcan bombers of the Royal Air Force, flown here from England, roared past revealing stands all low altitude in low-speed and high-speed runs, led by Air Vice Marshal G. A. Walker.

The top U. S. aerobatic teams—the air force Thunderbirds and the navy Blue Angels—darted through their amazing air feats.

Aside from its flawless performance, the air show—part of a World Council of Flight in progress at nearby Las Vegas—was distinguished by realistic demonstrations of military tactics, something not possible in the international air shows held over populated areas of Europe.

"DISENGAGEMENT"

Slogans always have played a big part in political and diplomatic argument. So it should be no surprise that currently a term like "disengagement" stands high on the "deter" list of the list.

The trouble with slogans is that they are shorthand for often complex ideas that suffer mightily when they are squeezed down.

Disengagement in Central Europe, the argument runs today, and we may mean by ease tensions between East and West.

To begin with, any nuclear ban affecting a median zone between East and West would immediately put the West at grave military disadvantage.

Secondly, when it comes to 1,500-mile-in-range nuclear weapons, the obvious advantage is obviously a relatively narrow neutral zone.

As for freezing, thinning out or pulling back ground troops, the problems are at least two.

One is that the Russians and their minions already enjoy a great edge on the ground and would only enlarge it, percentage-wise.

For another thing, any limitation or reduction of arms, either nuclear or conventional, raises the old, painful but necessary question: How can we get the inspection required to assure adequate enforcement of any arms agreement?

There has been a sticking point through most of the recent days of negotiation with the Soviet Union. If we could get a truly enforceable agreement, why simply disengage in a buffer zone? Why not get the whole way and have general disarmament?

Disengagement is a good idea. But it is not yet clear that it is much more than that.

LESSON FOR ASIA

No habitable land on earth is more remote than every day in the mountains of Tibet. It is a measure of our concern for all free men that we are able so readily to muster sympathy for the rebels now bravely battling red Chinese suppression.

To us there is an inevitable tragic parallel between the blows of the Chinese fist in Tibet and the Russian fist in 1958 in Hungary.

We find no joy in either of these violations of freedom. But there is a small bit of solace this time in one thing: Communism's inhuman and irreligious cruelties are being laid bare in this occasion in the heart of Asia. Millions of Asians here, though they cannot see, what is going on close by. They are stunned and shocked.

When the Soviet heel was ground into the faces of the Hungarian freedom fighters, the Asians did not recoil they do not go down all far away. And blinded by their hate of colonialism, they had developed an automatic habit of rejecting as suspect all reports emanating from the Western colonial powers or their friends (including the United States).

But they are not misjudging the size and character of the danger the communist tyrant poses in Tibet. Red deprecations against Tibetan religion, symbolized in the Dalai Lama, have simply underscored their callous purpose.

India, Burma, Indonesia, these and others are learning there is more than one brand of imperialism. The lesson is so complete when they grasp that the Moscow-Beijing variety ranks with history's worst.

GOOD NEWS

The world of medicine has been increasingly troubled in recent days as the growth of virus and bacteria strains resistant to antibiotics. Dangerous outbreaks of infection in U. S. hospitals have highlighted the problem.

It is wonderful news, therefore, that a new scientific breakthrough in the penicillin field promises a curb on this trend.

A team of scientists working in Britain has managed to produce the basic substance of penicillin by precise chemical synthesis, with the result that its nature can be endlessly varied to yield antibiotics likely to be effective against many organisms now resistant.

Also probable is a series of cures of diseases heretofore not touched by penicillin, and there is said to be prospect that penicillin derivatives can be found for persons allergic to the type now available.

This could be one of the biggest advances in medicine since the antibiotics were first discovered. The British researchers merit the heartfelt thanks of humanity everywhere.

Good Roads, Horsepower, Ruled Safest

WASHINGTON, April 16 (UPI)—

A three-year, nationwide study of automobile accidents has listed two popular myths about highway safety.

One is that modern superhighways are more dangerous than ordinary roadways.

The other is that high horsepower can be blamed for many accidents.

The reverse is true in both cases, according to the U. S. Bureau of public roads, which has completed the most comprehensive research project on highway safety ever undertaken.

The bureau found that modern controlled-access highways are "at least two and one-half times safer than ordinary highways."

Some of the best sections of controlled-access highway, such as those found on major turnpikes or in the growing interstate highway system, have accident rates only one-fifth as great as the national average for all highways.

The bureau's study showed that the accident rate, per vehicle mile of travel, is sharply higher than the national average on highways that are less than 24 feet wide.

The bureau's study covers 1,700,000,000 vehicle-miles of actual travel, by all types of cars and drivers over a many-year period.

One finding, which the bureau itself described as "somewhat surprising," was that lower horsepower cars had "consistently higher accident involvement rates than the higher horsepower cars."

Cars with less than 110 horsepower had the highest accident involvement rates for day and night travel.

Their accident rate was "exceptionally high" at night, the bureau said.

The study, however, for any comparison that "the greater the horsepower, the greater your safety."

The bureau offered no interpretation of these findings, but safety authorities say that a certain amount of reserve horsepower increases a driver to excessive speeds, particularly at night.

It can be a hazard.

The bureau's analysis of no significant relationship between make of car and accident involvement rate, other than the matter of low horsepower.

But it demonstrated a close correlation between a car's age and its probability of getting into an accident. Cars less than three years old had much lower accident rates than older cars.

Those more than 10 years old had an accident rate 250 per cent higher than new cars.

The bureau's report, more than three inches thick in mimeographed form, contains hundreds of other findings that will doubtless be studied closely by highway planners, automobile manufacturers and state officials.

Here are a few examples:

1. Skidding is a "far more serious factor" in highway accidents than ever before.

It is generally realized.

2. There is urgent need for models of cars.

3. Seat belts would greatly reduce the number of injuries and deaths in automobile accidents.

4. Americans should be persuaded to install and use them.

5. The public now seems unwilling to pay for seat belts or submit to the inconvenience of using them.

6. Considering the much higher accident rates of younger drivers, states should consider raising the minimum age for driving licenses.

7. A central clearing house should be set up so that each state can check, before acting on an application, for a driving license, whether the applicant has had a license, revoked or suspended in any other state.

8. Safety education must hammer home to all drivers the truth that "it can happen to you!"

A recent survey revealed that nine drivers out of 10 rated themselves as "above average" in driving skill, and unlikely to have an accident.

This kind of complacency keeps drivers from exercising the constant alert, intelligent care that makes for true safety on the highways.

Trumpeters' Dizzy Spells To Continue

NEW YORK, April 16 (UPI)—Ideally, trumpet players should be flat on their backs while blowing prolonged loud high notes. Alternatively, they should wear pressure suits which orchestra conductors could inflate by pushing a button just before the music called for that kind of exertion.

These ideas emerged from the first scientific study of the strains of trumpet-playing which are said to be incomparably greater than those of playing any other musical instrument. Trumpet players often feel dizzy after a half or two in the musical atmosphere and sometimes "tuck out."

The scientist who arrived at the ideas acknowledged that neither was practical since it would be difficult to provide couches rather than chairs for orchestral trumpeters or to costume them differently than other musicians. Trumpet players will just have to keep on feeling dizzy occasionally.

Dr. M. Faulkner, associate professor of music of the University of California, Santa Barbara, a professional trumpeter, was both the guinea pig and a full scientific participant in the study, with Dr. E. P. Sharpey-Schafer, a London medical scientist.

Sharpey-Schafer measured Faulkner's pressures while sustaining high loud notes for 17 to 20 seconds without drawing breath. He measured the pressures within Faulkner's chest and on his circulating blood for comparison with the fluctuating pressures of his lungs across the mouthpiece of the instrument.

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Newest Polio Vaccine Used By Russians

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., April 15.—More than 100 million children already have been vaccinated with a "live virus" polio vaccine originally developed in this country but not yet adopted for extensive field-testing here.

This was reported yesterday by Albert Sabin of the University of Cincinnati, one of the developers of the original vaccine.

The vaccine already sold in this country has been called "Polio-Soviet" because it is made by the Soviet Union.

The vaccine differs from the "killed virus" vaccine, which is given by injection.

The Sabin-type vaccine, given by mouth, is made of living but "attenuated" polio virus. It is a "live virus" that is so weakened that it is incapable of causing infection.

In theory, at least, a live virus vaccine might confer longer-lasting immunity than a dead virus vaccine. Some scientists who use the live virus vaccine are conducting research before adopting the live virus vaccine as a potential hazard.

Russia Posts New Gain in Productivity

THE Soviet Union continues to gain on the United States in the production of four basic industrial items—steel, coal, petroleum and electric power.

The dynamic still produces less than the United States and much less than the United States currently makes.

These conclusions are the latest statistical report issued by the Soviet government in Moscow.

The dynamic aspect of the production competition between the two nations continues to be a major American recovery from the recent recession and recent new peaks in the American industry the Soviet Union nevertheless continues year after year to increase its production of basic industrial commodities.

Thanks to a long period, the Soviet Union continues to creep up on the United States in output of these commodities.

The United States Statistical Administration in its regular quarterly report to Soviet economic progress gave figures on the output of many items during the first three months of the current year.

These gave a first opportunity since the demise of the U. S. B. R. when the United States at a disadvantage in comparison to the two nations in important economic fields.

Army May Build "Floating" Tank

WASHINGTON, April 15.—The Army is looking into the possibility of building a light tank that can lift itself up to five feet off the ground and travel over all types of terrain.

Paul D. Dean of the army's ordnance tank automotive command at Detroit told the house committee yesterday that the tank still is in the research stage but that studies so far are "extremely promising."

It was the committee's third straight day of taking a look at developments of radically new war machines based on what scientists term the ground effect principle—the ability to rise a short distance off the ground by water or air pressure.

Mercy Killer Is Sent to Hospital

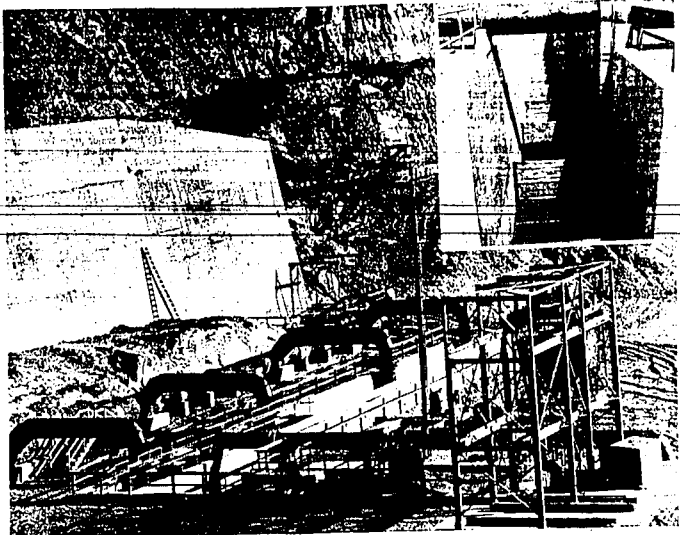

Hope has been in the detention ward of Philadelphia General hospital since March 20.

Complex Structure at Oxbow Dam Built to Outguess Fish

OXBOW, April 15.—A complex structure designed to outguess fish for conservation of adult salmon and steelhead is ready for operation at Idaho Power company's Oxbow dam project.

This structure is the second of two Oxbow fish facilities intended to give upstream-bound salmon and steelhead safe passage around the utility's new Snake river hydroelectric development.

It was built at a cost of more than \$800,000 by Idaho Power according to recommendations of federal and state fishery agencies.

Located beside the Oregon spillway at the upper end of the brown-water "ladder" where the 100,000-kilowatt project is under construction, the new fish facility is a standby structure. It will operate when abnormally high stream flows in the Snake require water to be released through Oxbow's spillway.

On such occasions, it will handle any adult migrants that might swim upstream beyond the project's other facility, an \$800,000 installation that already is in operation at the lower end of the lower Snake river. The dam is part of an elaborate two-way conservation system on which the utility is spending more than five million dollars in compliance with its federal power commission license.

The new structure also includes an experimental downstream-migrating facility that has been operated since Oct. 1, 1958, in Brownlee dam reservoir.

Seven specially equipped tank trucks maintain a so-called "taxi" service for the fish around the project, hauling seaward-bound migrants downstream and the adults upstream to continue their migrations.

Oxbow's newest fish facility will handle migrants by means of a concrete structure that extends more than 200 feet from its entrance to a collection trap at the upper end.

This deep, channel-like structure is the facility's "ladder"—and no name could be more appropriate. The water flows through the structure toward its entrance to attract migrants, a series of ascending "steps," or pools, that rise a total of 15 feet will be created by timber weirs at-

psychology to outguess the migrants. It must flow at certain velocities to keep the fish climbing, but it cannot be fed into the ladder so forcefully that it disturbs them.

This problem is theoretically linked by intricate diffusion chambers at the bottom of the ladder. Here specially built devices take the incoming water before it rises gently upward through a slotted screen.

Water to operate the facility will be supplied by a web of pipes and valves. Main artery of the system is a pipe that tapers from 60 inches to 48 inches in diameter. Stretching beside the facility, it will carry water from the spillway to six smaller pipes.

Five of these are 30-inch-diameter pipes that will feed the water into an auxiliary supply channel, from which it will flow into the ladder's diffusion chambers. The other pipe is a 30-inch-diameter tube that will carry water to the trap at the upper end of the ladder.

Quiet Drug May Help Stutterers

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., April 15.—At least one of the tranquillizing drugs may prove to be a new and useful aid to stutterers, a University of Washington researcher said yesterday.

Dr. Audrey H. Holliday, assistant professor of pharmacology, reported promising results in reducing muscular tension associated with stuttering by employing a drug called meprobamate.

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Dulles' Resigning Not Likely To Alter U.S. Foreign Policy

Even if this were not true and inevitable, the reliance of President Eisenhower on the judgment of John Foster Dulles, and the completeness of his indoctrination by the good gray secretary, would insure against any change now.

The emotion displayed by the President when he announced the secretary's resignation was additional testimony, if any was needed, to the personal as well as professional reliance Eisenhower had placed on Dulles.

Christian A. Herter, the odds-on choice of those who think they know who will succeed Dulles, has a reputation as a man who does his own thinking, and who has not always put emphasis on the same points which Dulles has.

But he, too, has had many years of Dulles indoctrination, and is reported to have worked well with Eisenhower in carrying on the Dulles policy during the latter's illness.

The Dulles resignation marks the practical if not the definitive

end of something that would fit very closely into what the British call their career diplomatic system.

With them, career men in government are not only the non-political experts who hold continuing diplomatic positions. Their top leaders tend to be career men in the sense that John Foster Dulles has been a career man, devoting himself to study of and participation in foreign affairs for a lifetime.

Dulles' six years as secretary of state was merely the climax of something that began during World war I.

History's judgment of Dulles cannot be written yet but one thing is sure. He served during a period when a great war was almost always a possibility, and it did not occur.

He worked and traveled indefatigably.

But he is not dying from wear and tear on the job. He may be dying because men devote so much more of their attention to the conflict among themselves than to prevention of disease.

Red Measles Vaccine Has Worked OK

SAN FRANCISCO, April 16 (UP)—A vaccine which gives protection against red measles, one of the most widespread of the infectious diseases, has been produced experimentally.

The vaccine is made from the virus which causes distemper in dogs.

It has been used beneficially on about 200 youngsters and has protected them for at least three years but it is not ready for general use.

Dr. John M. Adams, who discovered this peculiarity of the disease, told about the work before the American Academy of Pediatrics. Dr. Adams is at the University of California at Los Angeles medical school.

In the initial test, Dr. Adams said, 185 children in a California state mental hospital were vaccinated.

Another 1,100 youngsters were left unvaccinated for purposes of comparison. Three years later an epidemic of red measles struck the hospital neighborhood.

Only three of the vaccinated youngsters were sick. Among the unvaccinated there were 70 cases of measles.

Space Flight Seen Reason To End War

DALLAS, Tex., April 16 (UP)—Space expert Andrew G. Haley predicts that space flight may be the key that will avert a third world war.

He thinks space flight will bring nations closer together and impress upon them that from a political standpoint war is impractical. He predicts that the United States will have a manned satellite circling the Earth within the next 18 months.

Haley, president of the International Astronautical Federation, spoke at the space symposium of the Southwest. He is considered a foremost authority on space flight.

Space Effect Seen

"By no realistic standard of reasoning can space flight have any other effect but that of urging saner alternatives to the classical hot report of international politics," Haley said.

He said it is difficult to try and determine the long-range benefits of space flight beyond our present civilization, but there are many immediate benefits that are as obvious as the sun.

"To begin with, space flight cannot help but make still more apparent the impracticality of nuclear war."

"Indeed, the technical and scientific standards required for cooperation with the private sector in planetary operations are so high that if these capabilities are applied with hostile intentions to the narrow confinements of one planet, the prospect of mutual annihilation would become a reality more likely than it is already."

Mileage Industry Predicted

Haley predicted that the missile industry would undergo a phenomenal growth in the near future and would become the largest industry in the world in terms of employment, operational expenditure and capital investment.

He predicted to newsmen that the United States probably would have a man in orbit around the Earth within the next 18 months, and that by 1964 humans would be riding around the moon.

But he said effective space exploration is still probably some 25 to 50 years in the future.

"The limiting factors are entirely human," Haley said.

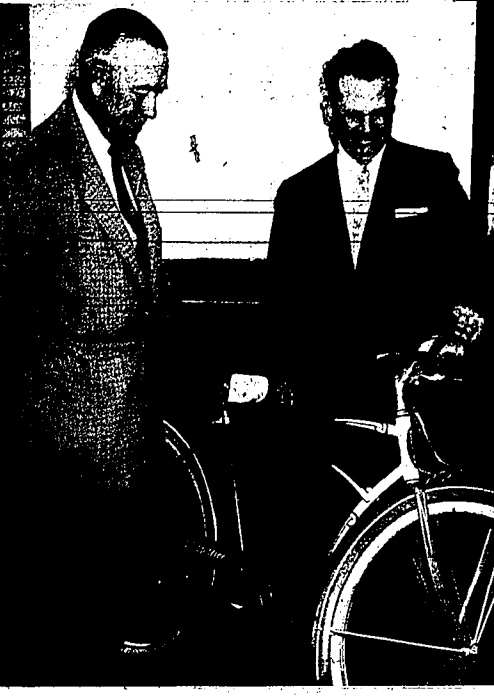

People's Hidden Resentment Expressed in Bizarre Illness

NEW YORK, April 16 (UP)—People who often put their resentments into the language of "organs," such as "the gives me pain in the neck" and "what headache this job is," it is not surprising their hidden resentments get expressed in the same language—in bizarre illnesses.

So advised an authority in psychosomatic science in giving doctors who think of people as "machines" operated by their bodies and chemistry. A close-up view of how very complicated people can be when they produce physical symptoms of illness which have mysterious meanings to their emotions.

And doctors can fall for it because "most physicians have been trained to view the patient as a physico-chemical machine," continued Dr. Robert L. Fantuzzo of the Mayo clinic and foundation, Rochester, Minn.

"The symptoms make no sense if you consider the body only a 'physico-chemical machine.' A close-up view of how very complicated people can be when they produce physical symptoms of illness which have mysterious meanings to their emotions."

These patients don't recognize it but their physical symptoms are caused by the difficulties they have had or are having with other people and their personal adjustment. They get personal advantages in expressing these conflicts in terms of illness rather than by recognizing them for what they are.

For one thing, "the physically ill person is excused from responsibility, blame and failure and is treated, at least for a time, with sympathy and kindness." For another, he can pass all responsibility on to the doctor if he develops his difficulties "in terms of the physico-chemical machine."

"The doctor could talk directly to the patient's mind and hidden feelings and make the patient aware of their inappropriateness to the present situation," and to the degree he succeeds, "and will diminish the patient's anxiety and give him an opportunity to become more nearly adult."

But "the physician is a product of the same culture that produces the patient. He hesitates to listen to a patient's recital of intimate personal events and feelings."

Anyway the power of suggestion is greatly over-rated. If patients with emotional problems could be cured of their difficulties by suggestion, so many would continue to inhabit physicians' offices.

These patients don't recognize it but their physical symptoms are caused by the difficulties they have had or are having with other people and their personal adjustment. They get personal advantages in expressing these conflicts in terms of illness rather than by recognizing them for what they are.

Amygdala Hansen Citizens Report Journal

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., April 16 (UP)—If you are overeating and piling on fat, your amygdala may be out of kilter.

This tongue-twister is the name of an area of the brain—actually a group of nerve cells—underlying the gray matter.

A team of Northwestern university medical school physiologists claim that they had found evidence suggesting that this area may be a previously unknown "feeding center" in the brain controlling food intake and body weight.

What the physician should do is simply tell the patient his symptoms are not due to any organic illness and then explain they come from his unrecognized emotional problems—which somehow he must solve.

Some will see the point and these can be encouraged to talk about themselves to a spouse, a friend, a minister, a priest, a psychologist, or a psychiatrist.

Others won't and "in such cases, the patient always should know that he is free to get another opinion."
