Russian Says Man Some Day Will Move to Moon, Planets

WASHINGTON, April 23 (UPI)—Soviet science writer predicts that man will land on the moon some day and will extend the conquest with an artificial atmosphere. Complete with artificial atmosphere, the man will be able to live on the moon. Having done that, other scientists say, it will be necessary to make the moon a base for human beings. Astronauts will be able to live on the moon, Venus, and possibly Mars. Ultimately, using energy released by antineutrinos, he will be able to travel to other planets. These predictions are made by Zetel in an article published in the Soviet journal "Pravda" at the moment, the moon is already being reached. PHIL NEWSON, UPI Foreign Editor, writes: A glamorous ballerina "put a spotlight on the threat of a Latin American revolution in the making on page one this week. She is Dame Margot Fonteyn, honored by the British crown for her contributions to culture. Her husband is Roberto Arias, former Panamanian ambassador to Britain, now sought diligently by the Panamanian government as a potential revolutionary leader. The couple are dressed up from the bottom of the sea. It is a story which, it drawn out to a violent end, must also involve the United States, because of the United States' vital interest in the Panama canal. The Arias family plot is one of a series which interested parties have accused the Fidel Castro regime in Cuba of encouraging, if not actually fomenting. TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLWIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON — Rep. Oren H. Harris of Arkansas has sponsored legislation on behalf of special agricultural products which are threatened by the epidemic of nepotism on capital hill, the result of an Indian-Indian-Indian government.

LET'S HAVE THE TRUTH

Nothing could be more irresponsible than ill-founded, alarmist talk involving the dangers of radioactive fall-out. But a good deal of evidence is turning up which clearly doesn't fit the emergency alarm.

Testimony of what is known as surprisingly high amounts of the dangerous by-product, Strontium 90. Recent reports have it that this material falls to earth much faster than was earlier thought, and is therefore not in the stage of relatively harmless decay imagined.

Another notion knocked out not long ago was the idea that the spread of fall-out is pretty even around the earth. It seems now that it tends to touch the land with maximum impact to those regions from 25 to 50 degrees north or south latitude. This of course includes the heavily populated areas of northern United States.

The real extent of the peril represented in these newer findings is not all clear. What is plain is that the fall-out problem is more acute than we had believed, and that we need intensive new studies both on its impact on the earth and its effect on human beings either directly or through their food supply.

Fall-out, too, is not the only troublesome problem associated with nuclear experiment and production. The disposal of radioactive wastes is mounting concern.

At that stage when our civilian nuclear power program is well along, we will have to get rid of some 50 million gallons a year of so-called high-level radioactive waste. Nobody conversant with the problem imagines for a second that it will be a simple problem.

Feeling increases in this country that the atomic energy commission is not the agency to sit in judgment on these vital questions of national and world health. As the development of nuclear power cannot come to this issue with detachment.

The U. S. public health service, long respected for its balanced study of matters affecting the general health and related questions, would seem to be a sensible agency to charge with this inquiry. If not the body, then some special group which would necessarily draw heavily upon the service's experience and background.

Enough danger signals have been raised to justify immediate and exhaustive attention to this terribly pressing question.

NEED POSITIVE THINKING

There is a difference, we must hope, between being negative and being realistic. And the distinction must be kept constantly in mind as we prepare for the forthcoming ministers' meeting at Geneva next month.

We must get there with the positive intent of putting forward sound solutions for Berlin and Germany, and of making their worth evident to a world eager for peace and sanity.

There has been more than enough of our assuming we can only lose propagandistic battles to the Soviet Union. And the business of winning them begins with believing you can win.

Yet going to Geneva, and probably on to the summit, with a positive outlook does not mean going with fantastically unreal hopes of what may be accomplished.

As this country's evidence now seems overwhelming that there will be no agreement between Russia and the West on the reunification of Germany.

This is and must continue to be not only a German but a prime Western goal. Nevertheless, the prospect for the forthcoming year or thereabouts is virtually zero.

Red Chinese Attack on Tibet Hurts Cause of Communists

The depths of the reservoir of ill-will which the red Chinese have succeeded in building for themselves in Asia may take years to measure.

Just as ruthless suppression of the Hungarian revolt caused irreparable damage to the communist cause in the western world, so red Chinese attacks on Tibet are causing the same damage in heretofore

unconquered areas of the Asian world.

The Dalai Lama, deposed by the Chinese as temporal ruler of Tibet, remains a spiritual leader to millions of Asians who worship him as the reincarnation of the Great Buddha.

Buddhism is the predominant religion in Asia, and so it was a body blow to communist propaganda.

Or they may have wearied of the bar of attrition which Tibetan

against them since 1953 with heavy losses to the reds in both manpower and supplies. Those losses may have become so high they felt they had to act regardless of other consequences.

Of it may be a measure of their confidence in their timetable of conquest.

Whatever their reasons, they have made it clear to an ever-increasing number of Asians that the communist plan has no place for a way-of-life different than the communists' own.

And as result, the danger flags have gone up in Indonesia, Burma, Ceylon, South Viet Nam and India.

New Drivers' Licenses Are To Be Issued

BOISE, April 23 (UPI)—As soon as additional equipment is installed, the state law enforcement department will begin issuing a new type embossed tamper-proof plastic driver's license to all motorists.

This was revealed yesterday by state law enforcement director Earl E. Koehler after receiving word that the state board of examiners had approved the acquisition of a new unit of equipment. The department now has one such unit and it is being used to stamp out the fool-proof plastic licenses for drivers under 21 years of age.

These include both new and renewed licenses. Now, said Koehler, anyone eventually will be able to obtain a license, regardless of age. Reason behind the use of the plastic license, which is embossed with lettering spelling out the necessary information on electrical-operated machinery similar to a teletype, was to prevent youthful drivers from altering age and addresses.

With an additional unit, the department could produce automatically as many as 1,000 licenses in an eight hour shift. He said it was economical to operate. The equipment because of its speed during day-time shifts could be run through the machine at night to produce a minimum of attention and produce the licenses.

The equipment also automatically prints an identical copy of each license on a card which goes into the department's files.

U.S. Having 'Baby Boom'

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—A new baby boom apparently is under way. Marriages are on the increase, too.

A record number of births for the month was tallied in February. The national office of the census reported today. This followed a record for any January a month earlier.

The 328,000 February births ran 3 1/2 per cent higher than those in the same 1952 month.

Births in January and February totaled 670,000, up 2.3 per cent from the corresponding 1952 figure.

Marriages have increased after a drop attributed in part to the 1952 recession.

There were 61,000 marriages in February, compared with 60,000 a year earlier. The January-February total, 117,000, compared with 110,000 in 1952.

He had paid the \$100 maximum registration fee, court records showed.

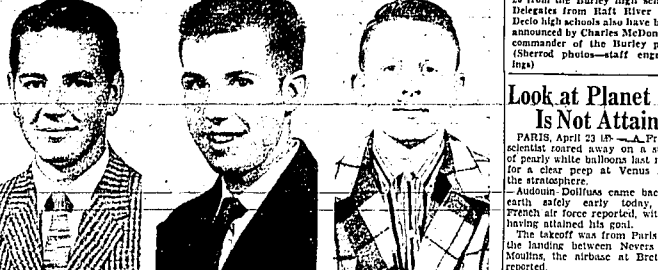

Russ Propaganda Suddenly Starts Praising Khrushchev

By WILLIAM L. RYAN Associated Press News Analyst Soviet propaganda has begun a sudden new "massive buildup" of Nikita Khrushchev. The plaudits are hearty—but not quite—as extravagant as those showered upon Stalin in his later years.

It seems to indicate Khrushchev has taken a grip on the top rung of his ladder to the pinnacle of power. This, however, will not be achieved until he is universally recognized as the only true prophet of communist theory.

If he pants this down, he will become an even more formidable antagonist for the West in the dangerous political war to come. Still, there are intonations, precedents shattering—twists to the build-up. Is Khrushchev, even now, wholly secure? He could have had to order the campaign—and even push it on the communist party—for reasons connected both with internal politics and external policy.

The excuse for the adulation was Khrushchev's 60th birthday anniversary. The anniversary was last Friday, when no attention was paid to it in the Soviet press. Two days later a great shower

of greetings burst in the papers, many by party notables. On the third day, as if in response to a prod—there was yet another burst of headlines, this time from the satellite countries. It all looked like the result of an afterthought in the Kremlin.

Not even Stalin got special treatment on odd-year birthday anniversaries. Communist practice has been to limit such tributes to decade anniversaries.

This week Moscow broadcast provided intimate biographical notes on Khrushchev's family. This was extraordinary for Soviet propaganda, which up to now has usually avoided mention of the family lives of communist leaders. Moscow's foreign affairs heads seemed to be trying to make Khrushchev's family life appear a wholesome, family type.

Justice Directs Robinson To Agree to Defend Title Against Basilio in 15 Days

NEW YORK, April 23 (AP)—In a precedent-setting decision, supreme court justice Earl Warren yesterday directed Sugar Ray Robinson to agree within 15 days to defend his midweight championship against Carmen Basilio or face loss of the title. The court upheld the power of the state athletic commission to vacate a title. The judge also said the commission could choose the challenger for a fight and could fix the date for such a fight.

But Justice Stewart ruled the commission could not require its own rules, have the authority to pick the title.

The commission's determination is modified to the extent of directing it to give Robinson 15 days from the date when it enters into an article of agreement to defend his championship against Basilio. The commission must fix the date of the fight and the date of the title defense.

On April 3, the commission had ordered Robinson to sign by noon April 15 for a title defense against Basilio, the former champion and now a member of the Chicago-based National Y. Y. Robinson denied the commission's order and said the title would be vacated.

The commission said it had taken no action because the 28-year-old New York fighter had defended his crown within six months, as was required by the commission. Robinson had fought since he regained the title from Basilio on March 25, 1958.

There is a possibility Robinson will appeal to a higher court.

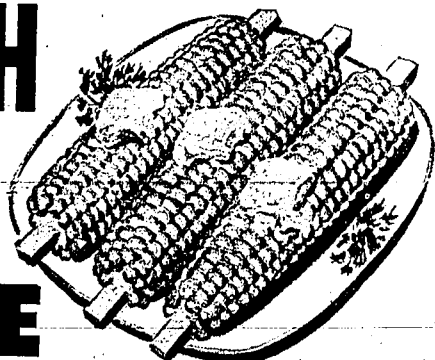

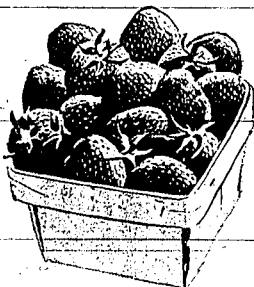

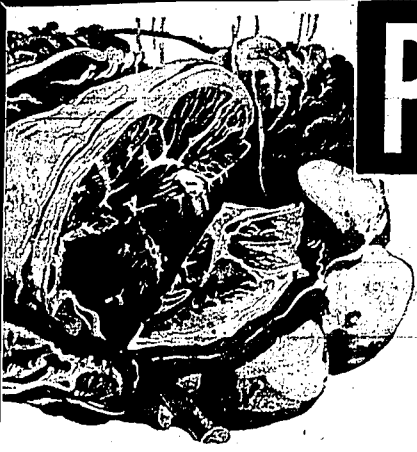
