Committee Asks Ban for Secrecy Of Solon Payroll

WASHINGTON, April 27 (UPI)—Four Republicans today called for the "veil of secrecy" be removed from congressional payrolls so the public will know which congressmen hire relatives and under what conditions. Representative N. Friedel, D. Md., chairman of a house administration subcommittee concentrating on the payroll program, defined the term "one way or the other." He declined to define just when it would begin. The subcommittee began hearings on the proposal by opening its doors to reporters at the last minute. The session originally was to have been closed. Subcommittee hearings on the "veil of secrecy" are a result of newspaper disclosures about congressional life payrolls. House payrolls are now open for public inspection, but they list only names and salaries of employees. No other information is given. John E. Henderson and William E. Minshall, both Ohio Republicans, urged approval of a proposed resolution which would state publicly if any of their relatives or business associates work for congressmen. The legislation also would require such information as the nature of the work, when he works and what hours. Rep. John F. Baldwin, R. Calif., proposed a similar measure but expanded it to include details on the rental of district offices back home. Soviet Troubles Seen if West Holds Steadfast at New Meet

The west holds steady in a conference, trouble some days in the future for Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

His two latest notes to the U. S. are coming fairly close together. He said that the U. S. has been sitting tight over Berlin and Germany since the war. There is a distinct possibility that the move was planned early as a diversion to cloak red activities elsewhere.

The announcement brought an immediate sense of crisis. A few days later, Khrushchev moderated his tone, saying a state would be taken in Berlin for six weeks. The magic date would be May 13.

This changed the sense of crisis to a feeling of hope or what might be called a "strategic atmosphere." Khrushchev had heavily upon his hope. He had a week to go for a summit meeting.

As the weeks rolled by, the sense of crisis in western ranks over the approach to the summit may have been somewhat relaxed. Khrushchev had something significant might have been the meeting.

This brief even was developed into confidence that the U. S. and the world communist movement might be able to reach an agreement. For Khrushchev, however, the summit has to be a gamble. If he fails to win any significant concessions, he may also have to apply tactics to aggressive communist states which do not get along with the direct Soviet military support in the long run, unless Germany can be neutralized, communist domination will be inhibited. It can be only indirectly inhibited in the long run.

House Likely To Alter Bill About Labor

WASHINGTON, April 27 (UPI)—A key Republican said today the proposed labor reform bill probably will be reworked by the house to provide tougher curbs on labor leaders, and a "conservative bill of rights" for rank and file union members.

This approach came from Rep. Carroll D. Keenan, D., senior Republican on the house labor committee, which is expected to whip up the legislation into shape for house floor action.

The legislation is not likely to reach the house floor before mid-June.

Senate Bill (H.R. 1017) Keenan accused as ineffective the labor reform bill which the Senate passed on to a subcommittee. He said the senate was handicapped in efforts to write a good bill because the many senators are presidential candidates trying to cater to national labor leaders.

"We won't have that trouble in the house," Keenan told a reporter. "Labor lobbyists privately conceded that the house would pass a greater challenge than did the senate to their efforts to keep the bill in a simple acceptable to organized labor. A senate-passed labor reform bill OK'd in the house just now."

Senate OK's Reform

The labor reforms approved by the senate include periodic secret elections of union officers, disclosure of union finances and banning of ex-convicts from union posts. Handling of union treasury funds and loans of union funds to union members also would be restricted.

But Keenan claimed that the senate bill failed to outlaw "blackmail" picketing or impose restrictions on secondary boycotts. The senate rejected those union-opposed proposals by votes of 60 to 30 and 20 to 41, respectively.

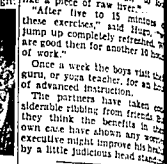

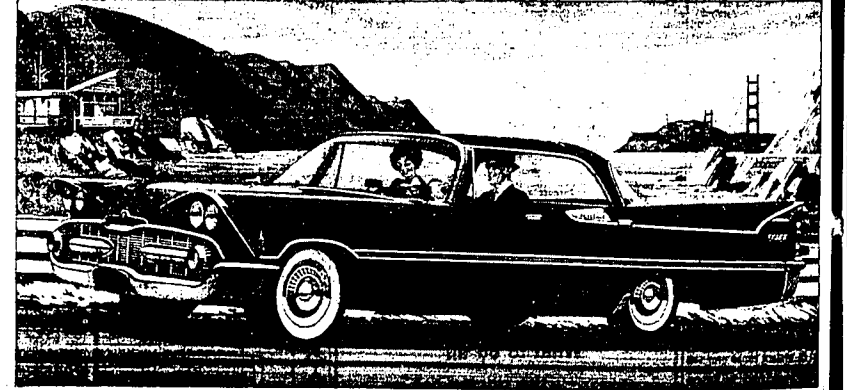

New Tamed Viruses Now Under Study

WASHINGTON, April 27 (UPI)—The new tamed viruses were reported today as a possible new approach to the study of previously unacquainted viral diseases.

Experiments have shown that the viruses can be developed to grow best at higher temperatures than the wild viruses. Dr. Albert B. Sabin reported. Their potency can be made to vary according to the temperature. A nationally known researcher at the University of Connecticut has also reported his report for the annual meeting of the National Academy of Sciences.

He said the findings might open the way to such things as:

- 1. Developing improved strains of virus for use in the recently developed polio vaccines of the "live" type.
- 2. A live virus vaccine contains viruses that have not been chemically killed. Instead they have been weakened so they are unable to cause infection. They retain their power, however, to excite the creation of antibodies, which can give a person immunity to a disease.
- 3. Developing weaker strains of the viruses responsible for a variety of human and animal diseases against which there are no vaccines at present. The weaker viruses would be used to tamed viruses to vaccines.

Dr. Sabin is one of the developers of the still-controversial "live virus" vaccines against polio. These have not yet been approved by the public health service for extensive field-testing in this country.

He said the new findings about the genetics of polio viruses were an outgrowth of the research that produced the viruses now employed in such "live virus" vaccines.

Bird Trouble

WASHINGTON, April 27 (UPI)—The supreme court has asked congress again for money to "birdproof" its white marble court building.

But the lawmakers are afraid that if the dirty birds—starlings and pigeons—are chased from the court, they will fly one block west and nest on the capitol.

Congress so feared this migration last year that it turned down the court's plea for \$23,000 for electronic equipment to drive the birds away.

Nation's Teacher Shortages Ease Some in Critical Fields

WASHINGTON, April 27 (UPI)—An increase of 28 per cent over the nation's teacher shortage in 1958. There will be 4,723 new month ending somewhat in the critical teachers, up 27 per cent, and 2,905 fields of science, mathematics and new foreign language teachers, up foreign languages, the "National" 23 per cent.

NEW YORK, April 27 (UPI)—Former President Harry S. Truman, who has no desire except to see the kids, will be the first of a three-day series of lectures to college students today on a subject that has never been taught by professors—the U. There will be a different panel of six students at each lecture and the interviewers will brief each morning with the former chief executive to have an opportunity to meet him and line up their "give-and-take" questions.

Truman had expressed a desire to speak primarily to undergraduates but about 400 undergraduates will attend the lecture. The group will include 150 freshmen and 100 sophomore students from Columbia college, 50 from Harvard and 100 from other undergraduate colleges for women and upper colleges from selective colleges in government, history and economics.

Sham Battle Touch Is Noted In Senate Vote on Labor Bill

By IRL E. WILSON
WASHINGTON, April 27 (UPI)—There was a sham battle touch to the close-vote Senate maneuver on labor legislation. The stratagem was exposed, of course, when Sen. John F. Kennedy, D. Mass., was reported to have abstained from the vote. Kennedy's absence was noted by his ambition to become president of the United States.

Kind of labor legislation it shall pass, if any. A kind of dead-fall trap awaits the labor bill in the house of representatives. A dead-fall is a death drive when it works, which it usually does if the trap has been set properly. This deadfall was set last January in the house labor and education committee. That is the committee which will consider any bill the senate may pass. Back there in January Kennedy was one of the few union members who were not immediately heard from on the subject of Kennedy, Humphrey and the common "right to work" bill. Moon Center Believed Full Of 2 Metals

WASHINGTON, April 27 (AP)—The moon's interior is generally lined with iron and nickel embedded ages ago by crashing meteors, three California scientists have concluded. The conclusions were reported today by Dr. Harold C. Urey, a Nobel prize winner on behalf of himself and two fellow scientists at the University of California, La Jolla. They told the annual meeting of the National Academy of Sciences that he and his co-workers have concluded there are more ladles of iron and nickel in areas extending to the north and south poles of the moon than in areas facing toward and away from the Earth. This concept, said Urey, would tend to explain a bulge that is known to exist on the surface of the moon, figured to range from one-half to one-fourth miles high. Urey said the new concept of the moon's internal structure is at variance with previous ideas that the moon was formed from a mixture of very small particles and that it later melted down for a while and ultimately assumed a uniform composition. Under the new idea, the moon grew from "some tens of hundreds of thousands of separate accumulating masses"—and never underwent a melting process.

U.S. Youngsters Plan Pole Flight

CHICAGO, April 27 (UPI)—Forty-six youngsters who wrote prize winning essays on "what the flag means to me," today were embarked on a flying trip to present a flag to Alaska's governor and set a North Pole precedent. The children, seven and eleven grade winners of a statewide and local association essay contest, left by air yesterday for Juneau, Alaska, where they were to give Gov. William A. Egan the first 40-star flag ever flown in the Midwest, and a personal letter from Illinois Gov. William G. Strickland. A sponsor said they also would try to work in a flight across the pole, thus making them the first contingent of American youngsters to turn the trick. The local association, which picked up the tab, said the group included 10 adult chaperones, two Alaskan grade school students returning home after a one-week Chicago vacation, a doctor and a registered nurse.

U. S. Said too Suspicious of Some People

NEW YORK, April 27 (UPI)—Americans are too prone to suspect and criticize anyone not publicly and avowedly anti-communist, Fidel Castro told United Press International in an exclusive interview here prior to his departure for Canada.

"This attitude is not understood to Latin America," said the tall Cuban prime minister.

Resentment Told

"Many people who are not communists resent being treated by Americans, and this breeds friends for America."

Castro's remark even makes friends for the cause of communism.

Luis Barral, Cuban consul general in New York, underscored Castro's point.

"Why, for instance," he asked in Spanish, "do you have only an occasional whisper of Spanish news?"

"Do the American newspapers ever print a picture of our prime minister shaking hands with the Russian ambassador?"

He also asked a picture of him shaking hands with Mr. Nell H. McElroy, American secretary of defense.

U. S. Friendship Wanted

"Cuba wants and needs the friendship of the American people," he said earnestly. "Close misunderstandings should come to an end. We need more American visitors—more tourists."

His English was understandable but elementary. Referring to the prime minister's occasional difficulties with verbs and nomenclature for the right word, Dr. Raul Chuliez commented with a smile:

"The comandante has always had a good ear for free speech."

Castro criticized some news dispatches from Cuba as inaccurate, but then you have a picture of a completely free press. Reminded that some foreign reporters had been threatened with violence in person and by telephone following some of the prime minister's public condemnations in Cuba, Castro said:

Writers Are Safe

"But that was never done by the government. Foreign reporters are safe and the government of Cuba will see that they continue to be safe."

"We are no more responsible for the threats of individual hotbeds than you are for the fact that my life has been repeatedly threatened on this tour, or so I am told by your security people."

First Sale

CHICAGO, April 27 (UPI)—You can finally buy that second-hand automobile you've been looking for.

It went on sale today through a Chicago Daily News classified advertisement.

"Bargain special of the automobile," the owner says.

The University of Chicago is selling the 200-ton beaton because it now uses larger ones in atomic research. It originally cost \$450,000.

A university official said, "We will negotiate about the price with prospective buyers. We don't know what to ask for it since, to our knowledge, there has never been a sale like this before."

Trouble Still Expected on Berlin Issue

WASHINGTON, April 27 (UPI)—Army Secretary Wilber M. Brucker warned today that the West still can expect trouble in Berlin at the end of May.

Brucker, just back from a 10-day European trip, said Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev had done nothing to "automatically" ease the May 27 deadline on his "set off" ultimatum to the West.

Last November, Khrushchev said Russia would take steps to get the western allies out of Berlin if such steps had not been made voluntarily by May 27.

Few Germans Back Reds

Brucker also told a news conference that no more than four to 15 per cent of East Germans would support the communists in "real secret elections."

He said he was assured on high authority during his visit to Berlin that the "East German people are not sympathetic to Germany under its heel."

He said that Russia could make use of the three East German divisions only by marching them to battle with guns at their backs.

Power to Be Shown

Brucker said U. S. military strength in West Berlin will be made "visible" as the May 27 deadline approaches to discourage any effort by Soviet "volunteers" to foment local disturbances.

Brucker refused to speculate on whether Russia would make trouble along the 110-mile convoy road from West Germany to West Berlin. But he said the U. S. Seventh Army in Germany is "as ready as an army could ever be. It is poised to defend against any act of aggression."

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Seven Die in Puget Sound Boat Mishap

SEATTLE, April 27 (UPI)—"I prayed, oh, how I prayed," stammered Janet Wilks, 16, after her rescue yesterday from a clippy Puget Sound. "I kept asking God: 'Please save me, help me; I don't want to die like this.'"

"How are the others?" Janet asked as she lay beneath a pile of blankets. Then her rescuers told her that seven of her boating companions died in the chilly waters when their pleasure cruiser capsized one and one-half miles off Alki point. Four others were saved with Janet. All are from Tacoma.

"I guess I was terribly lucky," Janet said.

The tragedy occurred shortly after the 12 persons, seven adults and five children, started on a 25-mile trip from Tacoma to Seattle. When the 43-foot Lota Ann approached the South Seattle shoreline, strange gusts pushed waves across her stern.

"The backside tilted and the boat went over on its side," Janet recalled.

Seven of the occupants were thrown into the water. The other five were trapped below deck.

Several shoreline residents witnessed the mishap. The coast guard was notified. Several unidentified men rowed to the scene in dinghies, braving gusts of up to 30 knots.

A marine helicopter from Seattle's Sandpoint naval air station was the first to reach the sinking craft.
