Test Case Filed Against F. Firm by Three Utah Stations on Rebroadcast

A suit filed in federal district court in Boise Wednesday afternoon by three Salt Lake City television stations to prevent their signals from being used by a Twin Falls community television system will have far-reaching national results, the local system's operator said Thursday. W. L. Reiter, named in the suit as operator of Idaho Micro-TV, Inc., says the question of whether community TV systems can rebroadcast original TV signals without compensation to the sender has never been determined legally. Reiter points out that community TV systems operate throughout the country. A decision in the local case will bear directly on similar community antenna operations all over the country.

The case is "historical," Reiter feels confident the legal battle will eventually be won by the stations, but he is not sure of the final determination.

The three Utah stations, KUTV, KJZZ and KSL-TV, asked court to declare their broadcast stations as station property which may not be rebroadcast without their consent.

Reiter, in applying to the federal communications commission for a license to rebroadcast signals entering Magic Valley from Utah, stated he intended to pick up signals from the three Salt Lake City stations as well as several other stations in the area.

Reiter asked the commission to let him build a \$700 receiver to get the signals.

Approval of Reiter's FCC application is expected any time he says.

The suit is filed in the federal district court in Boise, Idaho. It is captioned as *Three Utah Stations vs. W. L. Reiter*.

House Upholds Veto of R. A. Bill, Vote Is 280 to 146

WASHINGTON, April 30 (UPI)—The house, by a four-vote margin, today sustained President Eisenhower's veto of the rural electrification administration bill. The action kept intact Eisenhower's record of never having a law enacted over his veto. The house roll call vote was 280 to 146 in favor of overriding, but this was four votes short of the required two-thirds. The senate on Tuesday voted to override the veto 60 to 37, two votes more than the minimum required.

It takes a two-thirds vote of both house and senate to override a veto.

After the president learned of the vote, he said through Press Secretary James H. Doolittle: "I am deeply gratified by the vote this morning in the house of representatives sustaining the veto."

Some Democrats joined 112 Republicans to sustain the president. Six Republicans voted with 274 Democrats to override the veto. A major factor in determining the outcome was the fact that the 18 Republicans who originally voted the bill down had five votes to override the veto. Of the remaining 31, nine voted to sustain the veto and two were absent.

In contrast, four of the five Democratic House members voted to oppose the bill April 15 voted today to sustain the veto.

The vetoed bill would have given the federal government authority to extend the life of the power over lending policies of the rural electrification administration (REA).

Idaho's Road Board Plans Two Parleys

BOISE, April 30—The Idaho highway board voted today to hold hearings on three highway matters in southern Idaho next month.

A hearing will be held May 23 at Mountain Home on a proposed highway project on U. S. 30 north. This proposal is not part of the interstate highway system.

Cattle Disease Report Slated

CONTACT, April 30—Results of a statewide survey tabulating the incidence of anaplasmosis among Nevada cattle will be given at the Knox Creek field day May 7. The Nevada experiment station is located 13 miles south of Contact.

Dr. Kenneth Kuttler, department of veterinary science, University of Nevada, who has conducted the survey, will state why anaplasmosis is spread by blood-sucking insects such as ticks, mosquitoes and flies, and through use of unsterilized surgical instruments used in minor surgery on the farm.

Once an animal becomes a carrier of the disease, Kuttler says it remains a carrier for the rest of its life. This does not prevent use as human food, since the disease cannot be transmitted to humans.

Power Struggles May Be in Progress Now in Red China

An interesting power struggle may be going on inside the Chinese Communist party, but it is not clear.

At least that's one interpretation being placed on the various new appointments made when Mao Tse-tung stepped down as president or chairman of the People's republic and put in his place Liu Shao-chi, the man generally regarded as red China's No. 2 communist.

The job of chairman of the People's republic primarily is a ceremonial one and Mao in no sense relinquished his real power as No. 1 when he gave it up.

But, like Mao, Liu also has other jobs. He is a member of the all-powerful Central committee of the party, a member of the politburo, and the first secretary of its secretariat, and honorary chairman of the all-China Federation of Trade Unions.

Altogether, the power he wields is second only to that held by Mao.

Students of Chinese affairs see in his most recent appointments three portraits of the future.

—There will be no important change in overall Chinese policy.

—The rapid pace of economic development will continue, with special emphasis on the 25,000 communes which have engulfed more than 600 million Chinese peasants.

Liu is heir apparent to Mao.

Those who see a power struggle going on inside red China believe it is a fight between "realists" on the one hand and party ideologists on the other. The former believe the communication program, including the communists, has gone ahead the fast for China's own good and that it is being planned.

The ideologists, on the other hand, demanded a firm-line-for-the-better that all would fall into proper place without supervision.

Listed to the side of the realists, according to this theory, has been Premier Chou En-lai who, next to Mao, has been the name best known to the West.

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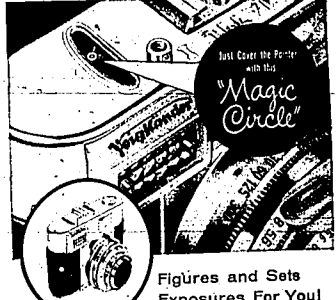

Russians and Allies Agreed About Parley

WARSAW, April 30 (AP) — The Soviet Union and her communist allies have announced their agreement on the Soviet platform for the Geneva conference.

Foreign ministers of the Warsaw pact powers and the deputy minister of communist China ended a two-day parley on the East-West foreign ministers' meeting next month with a communique declaring:

- 1. Renunciation of Germany must be achieved by Germany themselves with no interference from outside.
- 2. A peace treaty with Germany or settlement of West Berlin's future must not be made dependent on solution of the European security problem.
- 3. Poland and Czechoslovakia must be accepted as full participants at the Geneva conference and the summit meeting expected to follow next summer.
- 4. West Berlin should be made a demilitarized "free city" guaranteed by the big powers and the United Nations; the peace treaty proposed by the Soviets for Germany should be approved at once.

Four Teachers Hired; Summer School Plans in T.F. Outlined

Four more teachers have been hired for Twin Falls schools, reports Suppl. Ernest H. Ragland. Janet Lee Johnson, graduate of St. Olaf college, Northfield, Minn., will teach business education at the high school; Mrs. Lalaine Huthrie, who taught at Burban, Calif., last year, will teach fifth grade; Charles D. Farmer, who has a BS degree from Kansas State Teachers' college and is a lifetime member of the Idaho State Teachers' association, will be in charge of the summer school.

Four Teachers Hired; Summer School Plans in T.F. Outlined

There will be two sections of elementary summer school, each four weeks long, beginning June 1 and June 29. Class periods will begin at 8 a.m. and run for 90 minutes. Classes will be held five days a week and the length of the school day will be determined by enrollment. Classes will be limited to 15 students.

enrollment. Classes will be limited to 15 students.

Enrollment fee of \$10 per class will be charged, but the fee covers textbooks and workbooks. Pupils may enroll between May 11 and June 1 for the first session and up to June 29 for the second session.

Superintendent Ragland points out specifically that attendance at the summer school will not entitle a student to promotion to the next grade level. He said further information about the summer courses is available from Bickel Principal Jay Anderson, who will be director of the summer school.

Driver training will be included in the junior high school and high school summer school.

Other classes will be typing, word problems, U. S. History II, U. S. History I, grammar and government. Students in ninth, 10th, 11th and 12th grades may enroll now or may register June 1 at the high school. Superintendent Ragland said. No enrollments will be accepted after the first week of the summer session. The school will run from June 1 to July 18 with classes six days a week.

Attendance for 90 hours is required for a summer school credit. Tuition for junior high school and high school students is \$10 per course, including book rental. Credit will not be given for driver training and only one credit will be allowed for each course. Students who will be in the eighth grade next year may take typical but will not receive credit.

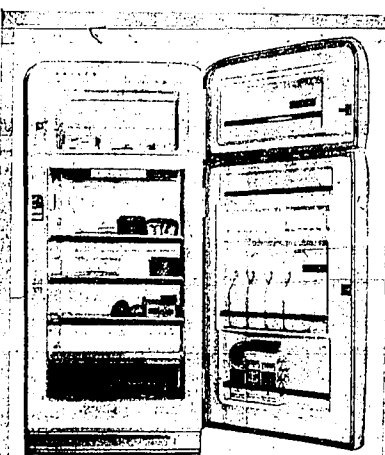

Hank Talks Racing; Chooses Filly as 1959 Derby Winner

By HENRY McEMORE
I saw my first Kentucky derby in 1920, and after a whole week in the saddle I didn't believe I'd ever seen the winner.
That was "Omaha's" year, and I called him unashamedly, but he was the big boy from Belair and was about as pretty a chunk of horse flesh as ever came rolling over the stretch.
For I had a pretty good bet riding on him, made with the books two weeks before, after seeing him all but jump over horses from the 1/16th pole to win the Wood Memorial.
"Omaha" along with "Laytin," who was Ben Jones' first derby winner, are the only derby winners I ever picked in many years of covering the run for the roses.
Some of my choices finished by candlelight, so far back that no

one would have been surprised had their jockeys sent up distress flares. And one of my picks—"Granville"—I believe threw Jockey Stout at the gate, and was out of the race even as the bell sounded.
My 1959 derby selection—and remember it is a unashamed bet from my pick—is a filly. If she turns the trick, C. V. Whitney's "Silver Spoon" will be the second ever to beat the colts to the wire in Louisville.
The one and only girl to turn the trick, as you well know, was "Regret," and that was a distant

44 years ago. And, coincidentally enough, she was owned by Harry Payne Whitney, C. V.'s papa.
It was my custom, when covering the derby, to work out a lead in advance for any colt that had a chance. I was with a press association and when you work for one of those you gotta work fast. When the winner hits the wire you start your story. There's no time for meditation.
Somewhere back in the 30's a filly, and a good one, named "Nellie Plang" was the favorite. I had a lead—a first sentence, anyway—ready, in case she came minging home.

With "Regret" in mind, and how her name had stood for so long, all alone, among the names or colts in the list of derby winners, my first sentence if "Nellie" was to be:
"The little lone lady has company at last!"
I won't be using it, so if any sportswriter thinks it is good enough, he is welcome to it.
Of course, "Silver Spoon" may never get to the post. Fillies are contrary any time, but especially so at this time of the year, and Whitney may not send her to the post.
Too, colts aren't very courteous

when they start thundering around the track, and a filly, lighter and featter than her brothers, always runs the risk of getting hurt, thus sacrificing her chances against her own sex later on.
But you can also bet that if "Silver Spoon" is fit, Whitney, being the type of sportsman he is, will have her alked and saddled and coming on the track when the band plays "My Old Kentucky Home."

Dutch Freight Ship Reaches Chicago First

CHICAGO, April 30—A flag-bedecked Dutch freighter carrying a cargo from the old world came to Chicago today, making a niche in the maritime history of the new world.

She is the 553-ton Prime Johan Willem Friso, easy victor in the momentous race to become the first large-scale ocean-going vessel to sail the rebuilt St. Lawrence seaway through the Great Lakes to Chicago.

New Era Marked

The ship's arrival heralds a new era in transportation, opening up the Midwest to big ships.

A gala celebration, including a parade and banquet, awaited the Friso here, similar to the whooping Milwaukee port on last night when the ship docked there.

Chicago and other Great Lakes ports beam at the opening of the seaway because they hope it will inaugurate a great business boom.

The 4,000-ton Friso was one of the first through the locks which became the first through the locks when the seaway opened Saturday.

American Ship Beaten

The Friso beat her nearest competitor in the westward race from Montreal—the 409½-ton American freighter Santa Beatrice—by some 200 miles.

A roaring welcome by some 15,000 persons greeted Capt. James Klein and his crew when the Friso docked at Milwaukee 90 miles north to become the first foreign freighter to tie up at a Lake Michigan port after sailing through the new waterway.

The Friso carries a cargo of wine, artificial flowers, glassed wood, toys, wind-up watches, glass, farm implements and dies.

Bank Report Shows Retail Trade Boost

SALT LAKE CITY, April 30—The First Security Bank of Utah, Idaho and Wyoming retail trade, up about 10 per cent in the Inter-mountain area.

In First Security's monthly bank letter these other points were mentioned:

Non-agricultural employment is up five per cent in Utah, three per cent in Idaho.

Cattle prices are at seasonal peaks but crop prices are generally down and portions of southern Idaho are hard hit by drought.

Construction is up 10 per cent in Utah for the first quarter and 26 per cent since last year.

Lumber production is 24 per cent above last year in Idaho.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 30 (AP)—A middle-aged lonely heart club operator, who raced his 1948 Buick through downtown streets with a policeman pinned to his car, was sent to jail for four months yesterday.

Space Bands Of Radiation Said Deeper

WASHINGTON, April 30 (AP)—The natural band of space radiation which could imperil space travel extends at least 10 times further north than previously thought, Dr. James Van Allen said yesterday.

He said estimates of the band's extent were revised on the basis of measurements by the first U. S. satellite.

Belt is Area Like Doughnuts

Van Allen, of the State University of Iowa, in the periodical discovery of the radiation belt recently two separate belts which hour suspended like doughnuts around the Earth, but with openings above both the North and South Pole regions.

Van Allen said measurements radioed back from the Pioneer IV space probe, while en route to its orbit around the sun, tentatively indicate that:

• The outer limits of the Van Allen radiation belt extend, at least at times, to an altitude of 52,250 miles from the earth, compared with an altitude of 32,600 miles, as indicated by Pioneer III. The latter soared to an altitude of some 10,000 miles before plunging back into the Earth's atmosphere.

New Distances Told

Thus, Van Allen told a space symposium sponsored by the National Academy of Sciences and the American Physical Society, new dimensions of the belt are tentatively estimated this way:

• The radiation belt extends 10,000 miles above and extends about 100 miles from the Earth's surface to space. This is the same as previous estimates.

• The outer belt extends at about 52,250 miles and extends to 52,250 miles or 18,750 miles farther than indicated by Pioneer III.

It was announced at the end of the association's meeting that Iowa, Nebraska, North Dakota, Missouri and British Columbia are either near agreement or had already decided on joining the western agreement on truck licensing reciprocity.

California, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Washington and New Mexico already belong to the agreement, which provides for appointment of truck registration fees on the basis of mileage operated on each state.

Fred Gulick, Topeka, Kans., said the western plan has been in operation for more than three years and has proved workable. In expressing acceptance, he said, "It is a step towards improved relationships between the states in a national effort to solve a problem of interstate commerce."

Charles M. Oliver, Carson City, Nev., was elected first vice president of the association's western division. Florence Oakes, Junction, Ariz., was elected second vice president, and Robert Koch, Olympia, Wash., secretary-treasurer.

PORTLAND, April 30 (AP)—Oregon centennial exposition officials were told yesterday by a report that the exposition's main building was a fire hazard.

Portland Fire Chief Hal Simpson called it one of the most hazardous ones he has for that kind of occupancy.

The exposition and International Trade Fair are scheduled June 10 through Sept. 17 at a site north of Portland. The main building, a J. I. State fire marshal authorized its use after some building changes were made.

29 States Having Financial Troubles; Raising Taxes Found Usual Remedy

By CHARLES STAFFORD Associated Press Writer

"More than an eastern Kentucky civic leader said, "we should secure from the United States and apply for foreign aid."

He was discussing remedies for the ailing economy of his area, where mechanization and depression in the coal industry have caused widespread unemployment.

The nation's program was delivered tongue-in-cheek, but many a state official would not deny that a check of state budgets by The Associated Press indicates that 29 states are encountering some measure of financial difficulty today.

Higher taxes are the common remedy.

Cigarettes are a favorite target of the revenue hunters of 1959. Sales and income tax increases also are common.

Withholding plans for state employees are to be applied to production by curtailing tax dodgers, have been adopted by Utah, Massachusetts, South Carolina, and New York.

New York raised its tax revenue 230 million dollars. The Pennsylvania legislature is studying Gov. David L. Lawrence's proposal for an additional 237 million in taxes to balance the record-breaking biennial budget of \$1,997,000,000. The lawmakers have already raised the three per cent sales tax to 3 1/2 per cent, making it second only to Washington state's four per cent.

Getting a new tax program approved is an easy matter. The Minnesota legislature adjourned April 24 after 3 1/2 months of work without finding the \$4 million dollars needed to balance Gov. Orville L. Freeman's proposed 470-million-dollar budget.

The governor, who has recommended increases in liquor, cigarette, tobacco, iron ore, gifts, inheritance and income taxes, called the lawmakers back into special session the very next day to finish his job.

In Massachusetts, Gov. Foster Purcell's efforts to balance his \$450-million-dollar budget have been touched off a fight within his Democratic party. He proposed that the Democratic-controlled legislature enact a sales tax.

However, the No. 1 plank in the Democrats' campaign platform was a stand against the sales tax. Gov. Edmund G. Brown, California, a Democrat, has asked a politically astute legislature to cancel cigarettes, oil and gas and increase

Embezzler Sent To Jail 6 Years

FLORENCE S. C., April 30 (AP)—John Wesley Streeter, a bank vice president whose half-million-dollar embezzlement was uncovered after a one-cent bookkeeping error, was sentenced to six years in prison yesterday.

Streeter was in charge of the Chevrolet branch of the South Carolina National bank until last October, shortly after the bank installed a new bookkeeping system.

The one-cent error turned up and bank officials, in trying to determine what was wrong with the new system, found enough details to prompt a full investigation of Streeter's accounts.

The audit showed \$31,000 missing over the 25 years of his employment.

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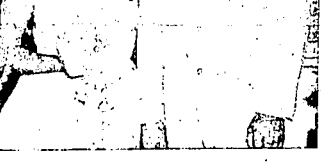

New Larger Delta Rocket Is On Order

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)—The national aeronautics administration let a contract this week for a new satellite launching vehicle called the Delta.

The space agency said it would build 12 of the three-stage rockets over the next two years and would use them to put satellites weighing up to 250 pounds into orbits 300 miles above the Earth, out to send 100-pound probes farther into space.

The Delta vehicles will be built by Douglas Aircraft, Inc., Santa Monica, Calif., for a total of \$24,067,500.

Stages Have 3 Stages

The rocket will consist of three stages:

1. A modified air force Thor intermediate range ballistic missile.
2. A revamped version of the liquid-fuel engine built by Aerojet-General corporation, Sacramento, Calif., for the second stage of NASA's Vanguard rocket.
3. A solid-fuel rocket initially developed by Allagany ballistics laboratory, Hercules Powder company, Cumberland, Md., for the third stage of the Vanguard.

Equator Orbit Planned

NASA said it plans to use Delta to launch satellites from Cape Canaveral, Fla., on general equatorial orbits and from Point Mugu, Calif., on polar orbits, as well as for deep space missions.

The Delta combination will stand 90 feet, weigh more than 100,000 pounds, and develop more than 150,000 pounds of thrust.

Swiss Bankers Aren't Happy With Conflicts Over Secrecy

GENEVA, Switzerland, April 30—Swiss bankers are making a good thing today out of international banking and stock trading for anonymous clients.

But the Swiss aren't too happy about some of the consequences, such as conflicts with the American government and the watchdogs over American securities markets because Swiss law veils all their depositors in secrecy.

Bankers here are particularly bitter about three charges well rooted in the American public's mind:

1. That the banks often don't know who is making use of them—possibly even the communists.
2. That the banks vote proxies on American stocks they hold for anonymous clients engaged in raiding U. S. corporations.
3. That the banks offer Americans a chance to evade U. S. income taxes.

Top executives of the three largest Swiss banks have said in interviews that all Swiss banks refuse any deposits until they know who the client is and have checked on him thoroughly.

This is true, they say, even when the account is carried on the bank's book as a number rather than a name to give the depositor further secrecy from the bank's clerical staff.

But American officials point out that a known depositor could be acting as a cover-up for someone else. The Swiss reply that such a person could act similarly for any American official who is not all other in dealing with brokerage firms in the United States.

The Swiss law forbidding banks to name depositors was passed Nov. 8, 1934. The Swiss say it was because in the years of bank shake-ups a bank failure might ruin a depositor if his name were revealed.

Because of charges of corporate raiding through a proxy voting, two years ago the Swiss Bankers' association secretly directed all its members: If a depositor asks you to vote his proxies against corporate management, tell him he must show the shares openly and vote them in his own name.

American officials agree that all respectable Swiss bankers are following this directive. They say

only a few shady banks may be doing otherwise now. They add that in recent securities scandals in the United States (involving Alexander Gutierrez) the only Swiss bank mentioned was owned by an American.

Top Swiss bank officials insist that they never let corporate proxies held by their agencies in the United States.

Royal air force headquarters here announced the plane, carrying 12 men, crashed on Subhan Dagh mountain, an extinct volcano, north of Lake Van in eastern Turkey. The area is about 100 miles from the Russian border and about 25 miles off the plane's course.

It had been feared that the plane had been shot down by Soviet jets into Russia and that Soviet intelligence agents had gained access to the secret equipment aboard, which was bound for Woomera rocket range in Australia.

In addition, pork heads the federal government's plentiful to do list this month. For the first time since November, 1956, the promotional drums are beating for pork in an attempt to ease the market glut of pigs born last fall.

Beef Vegetables Listed

Just about every variety of citrus is in the best buy list among fruits. This might be expected with the latest estimates showing the total crop 11 per cent ahead of last year and three per cent above average. Other bargains are apples, pineapples and bananas.
