House Group Approves Smaller Federal Jobless Aid Bill to Prevent Veto

WASHINGTON, May 5 (UPI)—The house banking committee, hoping to head off veto, today approved a program of federal aid for areas of chronic unemployment that was scaled down to 251 million dollars. Total was 138 million dollars more than the senate approved, but still was almost five times what President Eisenhower had proposed. 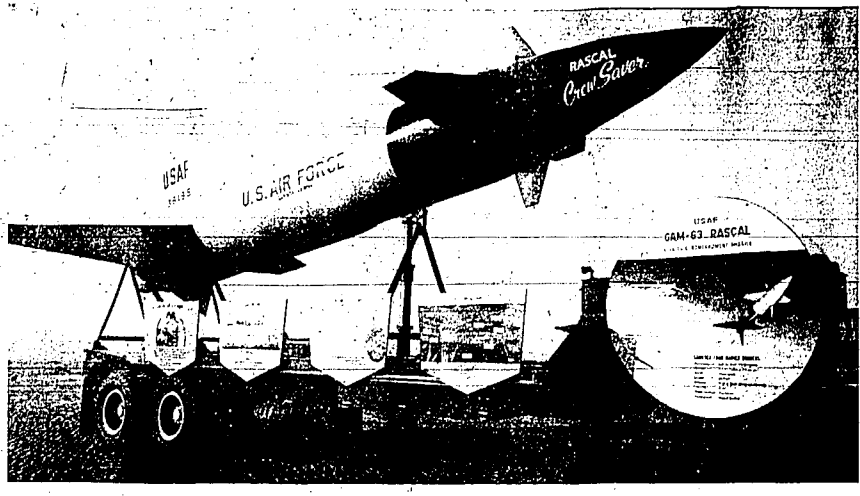
3 Sentenced for Bombing House

AEC Says Radiation Safety Levels Can Be Safe, Unsafe

WASHINGTON, May 5 (AP)—The atomic energy commission today told congress today that its safety levels for radioactive contamination of food and people are like auto speed limits — they may be either safe or unsafe.

Dr. Charles L. Dunham, chief of the AEC's division of biology and medicine, used the analogy to explain why the maximum permissible concentrations of inhaled radium 226 recently were raised 100 per cent for human beings and 25 per cent for food.

Dunham was the first witness at a special joint subcommittee on radiation opened four days of hearings on the fallout problem. He repeated previous statements that present radium 226 might cause 50 to 100 additional cases of cancer in the next 70 years.

In a lengthy prepared statement which also stressed that radiation can shorten life and cause hereditary damage, he continued:

"Neither a recommended maximum permissible dose nor a speed limit has any particular significance beyond marking a point at which an advisory group has agreed to draw a line in recommending a maximum degree of hazard."

Circuit Court Judge W. May Walker summoned the jurors to court at 9 a. m. today. Judge Hopkins told the court "some important matters have come up" and the jurors had been in recess since Dec. 11.

A 500 in full still are in jail and have made no request for bond.

New Camera Will "See" Satellites

WASHINGTON, May 5 (AP)—Development of a new type of camera for photographing Earth satellites was reported yesterday.

It was described as potentially important for spotting proposed "junk" satellites, which would be equipped with a powerful flashing light visible for thousands of miles.

They would offer a better prospect than could be used for measuring accurate measurements of the shape and size of the Earth and of distances between points on the Earth.

Truman Calls 2-Term Rule "Bad" Policy

WASHINGTON, May 5 (UPI)—Former President Harry S. Truman yesterday called for repeal of the amendment to the constitution that sets a "bad" constitutional amendment. He said it was devised to "get Roosevelt" and is now hamstringing President Eisenhower.

Truman said the ban was "a bill of goods" sold to the country by "Roosevelt flacks."

Truman told a senate judiciary subcommittee that he had "no personal axe to grind" in the hearings on repeal of the 22nd amendment adopted after the death of Franklin D. Roosevelt who was elected four times.

The amendment was initiated by the Republican-controlled 89th congress. Truman noted in a terse three and a half page prepared statement that he himself is still "eligible to run for a third term."

"Out of the 178 million people in this country," he said, "I am the only one to whom the amendment does not apply—the only one who could be elected as many times as he could get enough votes."

Truman was a witness before the senate subcommittee on constitution amendments headed by Sen. James Eastland, D., Tenn. Refusers similarly condemned the constitution's "quality of flexibility" in the constitution.

Sen. Thomas E. Hennings, D., Mo., also urged repeal of the amendment.

Truman said that what the amendment really did "was to make a 'lame duck' out of every second term president for all time in the future."

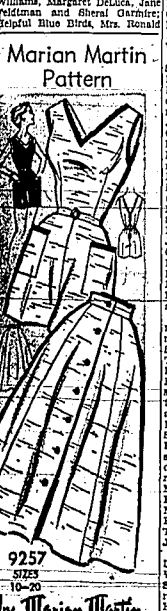

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Martha's Moods

Never Enter A Room With Words On Your Lips

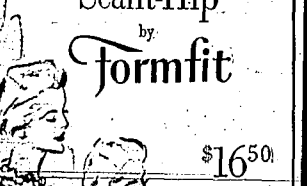

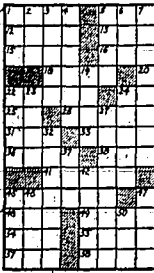

Girl OK After 10-Floors Fall

NEW YORK, May 5 (U-P)—A 12-year-old girl leaped from a 10th floor window of a Harlem apartment last night, while her mother berated her for behavior in school. She apparently escaped with minor scratches. Herschelle Williams, Negro, was in a bedroom while her mother, Porline, scolded her from another room. When the mother got no answer she went into the bedroom, found an open window, and, looking down, spotted her daughter on the ground. The girl landed in a landscaped area. An ambulance doctor could find no injuries beyond face scratches. "KICK Member."

2 Rare Booklets Found in Tacoma

TACOMA, May 5 (U-P)—Two rare booklets, printed by an associate of doctor-missionary Marcus Whitman, have been discovered in the Washington State Historical Society museum here. The booklets, written in the Nez Perce Indian language, were printed in 1838 by Henry Harmon Spalding on a small press at the Lapwai mission, in what is now Nez Perce county, Idaho. One is a Nez Perce-English dictionary and the other a translation of the Book of Matthew. Museum Director Bruce Lettrey described the booklets as "the rarest bits of Western Americana" and estimated their value at \$2,000 each.

Employe Admits Burning of Hotel

PENDELTON, May 5 (U-P)—A former employe yesterday admitted he burned down the Lehman Springs Resort hotel in August, 1957. Harold Winston Leigh, 23, Elkton, pleaded guilty in circuit court to a first-degree arson charge. He will be sentenced later. He is held in the county jail with bond set at \$10,000. State police said Leigh left the area shortly after the fire destroyed the four-story wooden structure .63 miles south of Pendleton.
