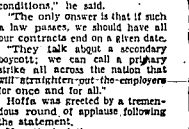

MEMPHIS, Tenn., May 19 (AP)—Gen. Lyndon B. Johnson, D. Tex., called last night for a summit meeting of the non-communist world.

The Senate, in a majority leader spoke at a banquet honoring M. B. Hardeman, Tennessee educator and minister, on his 85th birthday.

"Where the Soviet Union has sought a meeting of the free, let the United States initiate a meeting of the many," Johnson said.

"Let us—after three meetings in which we are now engaged—begin the work of preparing for a summit at the summit of the many nations of the non-communist world."

In proposing a free world summit meeting, Johnson said, "such a meeting could never do it to the concern of old orders but to the new promise that the world's future is in the hands of the young."

"The world's billions are faced with a first concern for the fundamental of human existence: the fundamental of food to eat, health to enjoy, of knowledge and ability to overcome, of play to create, of markets to develop."

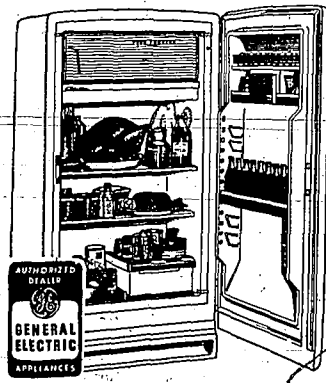

Russian Says Russ Priests Are "Agents"

WASHINGTON, May 19 (UPI)—The Senate Intelligence subcommittee released a report yesterday that Soviet churches are under control of the secret police and that many priests are secret agents.

Chairman James O. Eastland, in a statement in support of the testimony, said that the testimony of the late Senator Joseph R. McCarthy, who was a member of the Senate Intelligence committee, was the basis for the report.

The testimony was given by Peter S. Derabin, described by the committee as a former Soviet secret police officer who was attached to the Soviet embassy in Vienna, who was defected to the West in 1954. He testified that he closed down in 1957 that the policy of closing churches and selling priests was a major objective of the Soviet government.

For more than 20 years now under the policy of the state police, Soviet churches have been closed and priests have been arrested, he said.

"You are right, I would say that some of the priests who are serving as agents believe in God and they have to do it because they could not find another way how to do it," he said.

"That is right," Derabin replied.

"So that there are no priests who serve the church first—they are only agents of the state police," he said.

Rickover Blasts U.S. Education

WASHINGTON, May 19 (UPI)—Vice Adm. Hyman G. Rickover blasted yesterday the present educational system in America as Russia's "greatest secret weapon."

Rickover, controversial "father" of the nuclear submarine, told the House Science and Education committee that this country is "dissipating our mental resources."

He said Denmark has a 280-day school year compared to 180 here.

The jury returned a verdict of guilty more than six hours after the trial began.

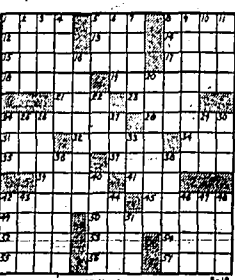

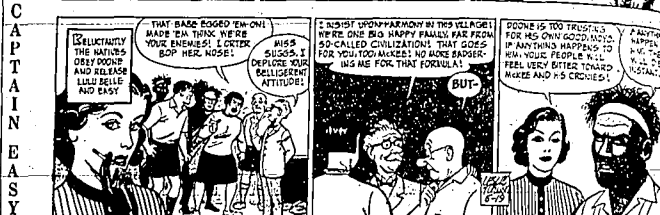
