Redhot Round Points Snead Toward Open Wider Goal Posts To Play Big Part In Idaho Offense

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, May 20.—"The big effect Idaho's offensive and defensive strategy will be the widening of the goal posts from 18 feet six inches to 23 feet, four inches," says Coach Skip Staley. "On this difference we shall base our tactics because we have this difference because we have a potentially fine field goal kicker in the junior class, Ron Lamm. I imagine other college coaches blessed with a lad who can kick like Lamm will plan their campaigns about as we will."

"In spring practice I made him kick five from ten, ten from ten, and ten from ten. He has hit three goals out of five, and from the 40-yard line two out of five. Now remember the goal posts are 10 yards further than the goal line."

"You can visualize what we shall plan next fall once we get possession in our opponent's territory. Certainly we shall not give up for three points rather than give up the ball by punting. I am going to let Ron Lamm kick when I say I think Idaho will be a real scoring threat any time inside the 50-yard line."

"Personally, I would have been satisfied if they had scored the goals to the goal line and not widened them. But this is the majority opinion and we shall profit by it where we can. I think the threat of an I-lam field goal will force our opponents into desperate defensive measures. It can also mean that Idaho must present a rugged defense as a portion of our own strategy."

"Now, don't get me wrong—we shall concentrate on having a fine, fairly fast, deceptive defense. We are going for the six yards at every opportunity. But when a penalty for the failure of the offense throws us into a punting situation in enemy territory we'll be ready for the three point try."
