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Starkweather Scheduled to Die in Chair

LINCOLN, Neb., May 21 (UPI)—Charles Starkweather's last chance to escape the electric chair apparently died last night when Gov. Elmer B. Brodeur rejected a plea by the man's lawyer to postpone the execution for 30 days.

Carl Pogue, 31, sentenced to life imprisonment for murder in connection with Starkweather's rampage, appealed to the governor to delay the execution to allow time for him to make arrangements to leave the state in an effort to clear his name.

The governor's refusal means Starkweather, 29, must go to his death in the electric chair as scheduled shortly after 6 a.m. (8 a.m. local time) today.

The execution will take place in a small chamber, where Starkweather's office in the Nebraska state penitentiary here where Starkweather was confined.

In a letter to the governor Carl Pogue said he was willing to accept any sentence but he could not admit to a crime that he believed he had not committed.

"I believe there is a chance he may tell the truth about what happened," Pogue said.

In a written reply, the governor said such a meeting would be held on May 22.

Starkweather, who was the state's chief witness against Carl Pogue in the trial, said he had information he might have.

Nixon Picks Californian As Assistant

WASHINGTON, May 21 (UPI)—The man who probably would be White House press secretary if Vice President Richard M. Nixon won the presidency is joining Nixon's staff as special press assistant in June.

Herbert G. Klein, 41, editor of the San Diego Union, a native Californian and long-time friend of the vice president.

Klein's appointment, timed to have him lend a hand in preparations for Nixon's July trip to Moscow, fills a gap in the vice president's staff. It also marks a turning point in Nixon's continuing buildup for the GOP presidential nomination.

Washington newspapermen covering the pre-1960 presidential candidate maneuvers have speculated that Nixon's appointment of Klein to be replaced by Nixon for 1960's "big push."

He served Nixon before the 1956 campaign and as his press secretary in the congressional campaign of 1958.

Since last December, when William O. Kaiser returned to the aviation industry after a year with Nixon, the vice president has been without a formal press secretary.

Klein has been editor of the San Diego Union since January. Before then he served as its executive editor, associate editor and editorial page editor. He is a University of Southern California graduate who now lives in La Jolla with his wife and two daughters.

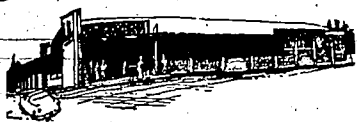

WASHINGTON, May 21 (UPI)—Among the predominantly agricultural states, California has the highest priced farm land. It is valued at an average of \$200 an acre.

Illinois ranks second among those states with land valued at \$191 per acre, followed in order by Indiana at \$185, Ohio at \$182 and Iowa at \$159.

The \$200 average value of California farm land represents a composite of many types and grades of land. Values range from less than \$50 per acre for some grazing land to more than \$5,000 per acre for certain irrigated orchards. This wide range, the Department said, results partly from the great diversity of agriculture in California.

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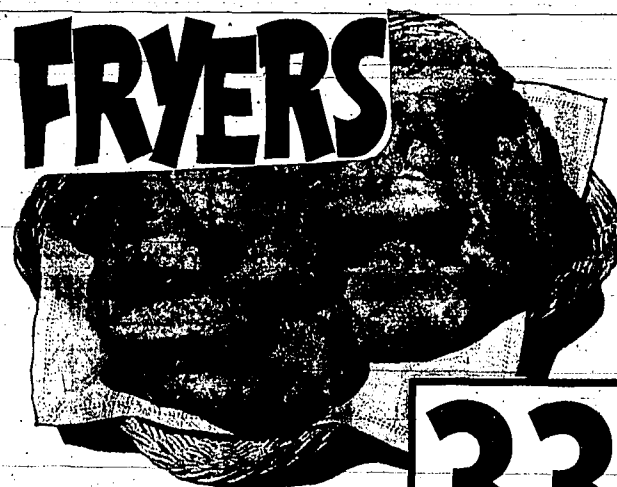

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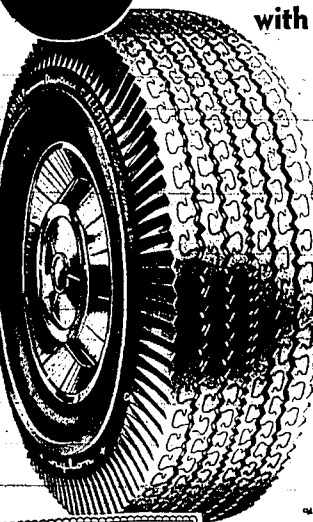

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Higher Farm Costs Likely In Next Year

WASHINGTON, May 21 (UPI)—The agriculture department said today farm costs will go higher in this year after reaching a record peak in 1957.

Economists said the group of items expected to be chiefly responsible for higher farm costs in 1959 include wage rates, taxes, farm real estate, farm machinery, motor vehicles, motor supplies, building and fencing materials, and general farm supplies.

The economists said that, although prices paid for feeder and replacement livestock rose during the first four months of 1959, little, if any, further increase is expected in the prices paid for these livestock or for feed, seed or fertilizer.

Of the 12 major groups of farm production items, nine had higher tags in 1958 than in 1957. They were: Wage rates, up nine per cent; taxes, up eight per cent; farm real estate, up eight per cent; farm machinery, up five per cent; livestock, up five per cent; motor vehicles, up three per cent; feed, up two per cent; motor supplies, up one per cent; and building and fencing materials, up one per cent.

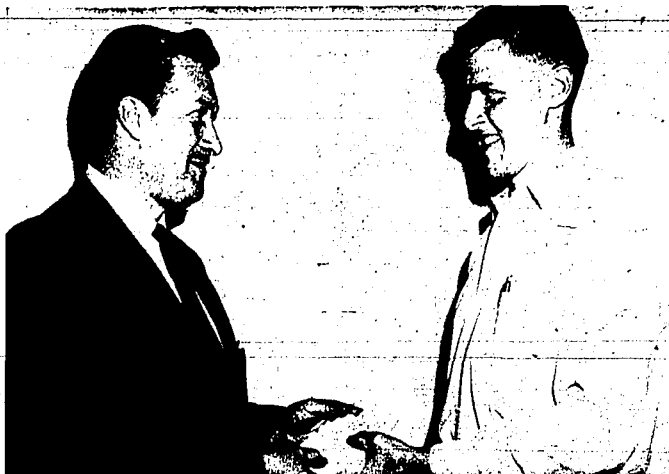
