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# Geneva Talk to Be Secret After Dulles' Funeral

GENEVA, May 26 (UPI) — The Soviet and western foreign ministers agreed yesterday to start secret sessions on the Berlin and German questions Friday when they return from the funeral of John Foster Dulles in Washington.  Wheeler reported that he was looking for the highway cutoff and had turned onto a gravel driveway. He saw a woman get into a car and he wanted to turn around and become a witness.  
 Wheeler became very nervous Monday morning and returned to the police to investigate. He saw a police officer and a woman near the tire tracks. He also noticed that something had been done away from the tracks.  
 He followed the marks to a clump of sagebrush about 150 feet from the field where he found the nude body. A billfold near the body clothes were also found in the immediate area.  
 Wheeler promptly reported to Deputy Sheriff William Bunn in Wendell and the chain started that ended Monday night with Menez's arrest.  
 Charles Miller, Wendell pharmacist, who was at the scene to get a bill for a blood-antigen test, said the woman was clutching wires in her right hand and had her left hand on the back of her head.  
 "I looked like she might have been dead," Miller said. "After she might have been trying to protect herself with her hair," he said.

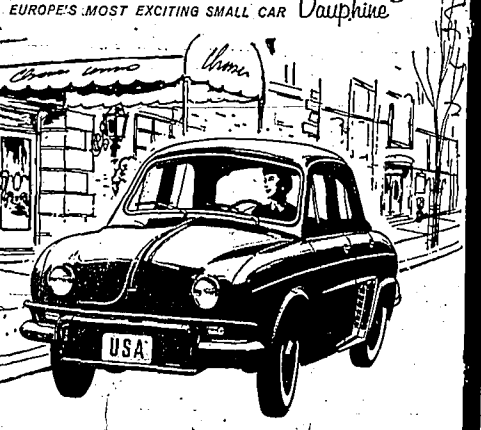

**"THE TURNPIKE KILLER"**

Considerable attention is being given to a recent article, "The Turnpike Killer," which appeared in Traffic Safety magazine. It was written by Captain Singleton Shafer, widely known as a distinguished and experienced officer of the Pennsylvania state police.

Captain Shafer's article sheds so much light on the turnpike traffic situation in the Congressional Record.

The Pennsylvania traffic officer describes the "worst tire as a killer, loose on our highways—a killer that has become a public enemy in the more auto accidents than the public realizes."

Although police are trained investigators, Captain Shafer points out that in far too many cases this "killer" slips through the net of hiding masquerading under the names of "too fast for conditions" or "lost control on curve" or "hazardous highway conditions."

"We need to strip off these disguises and identify this killer once and for all," says Shafer.

"Bluntly speaking, my stomach turns over when I see a worn tire. It brings sickening mental pictures of the many dead and injured I have seen, and I have seen many highways in their grotesque and ludicrous resting places, pinned in torn and jagged metal, horribly festooned with baggage, canned goods and children's toys. I feel the frustrating urgency of waiting for an ambulance which will whisk the broken bodies out of sight toward the merciful hands of hospital attendants. It seems all so senseless. In this peaceful country of ours that I feel so proud to call home, a moral obligation to speak out with what I know about the dangers of worn tires."

Explaining all the research in which he has had a part, including 32 years of investigating and reporting over 100 highway accidents, he has continued to gather data and experiment with remedial action. Shafer calls particular attention to the part worn tires have played in the death toll on the Pennsylvania turnpike.

1958 faulty tires accounted for 29 per cent of the fatalities on the turnpike. The relationship of good tread and weather was emphasized by the record during July and August of that year, when 88 per cent of the fatalities involved bad weather.

"Our deduction was simply that the two-month period was unusually wet, coupled with the failure of vacationists to check their tires as thoroughly as they check their fishing tackle."

"Confirmation of this suspicion came when we visited one of the largest authorized service garages for the turnpike and found that 88 per cent of the wrecked vehicles had had bad tires."

"What can be done? Our warning efforts have limitations. It's not primarily a police problem anyway. Controls must first come through proper laws in all states to prohibit the use of faulty tires. We have made laws. Why not an adequate tire law? It is not enough to make sure your own car is safe. You are still risking a shattering, bone-crushing head-on collision if the other fellow skids into your path."

Police pieced together the chain of events they found that William Hertzke, 23, and John Gibbons, 20, were returning from a dance in Hertzke's car when they spotted Mrs. Duane Trichter, 39, crossing the street, on her way home from a movie. They whistled and called to her.

Philip Schifano, 18, Mrs. Trichter's companion, took offense and followed the two men in his own car. Schifano said that when he caught up with them Hertzke made offensive remarks to him. Schifano took a .22 rifle from the back seat of his car and pointed it at Hertzke.

Schifano said it discharged accidentally and he drove off, believing no harm had been done. Hertzke, however, was shot in the abdomen. Gibbons bundled him back into his car and set out at high speed for Flushing Hospital.

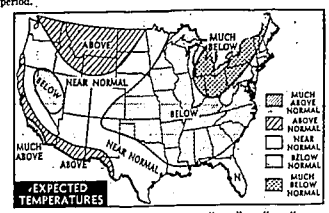
As he neared the hospital, the car collided with a taxi. Both cars mounded the sidewalk and struck a light pole. The wounded Hertzke was hurried through the windshield.

The blow to the light pole knocked out the hospital. With lights from an emergency power plant, hospital attendants treated Gibbons and the taxi driver for minor injuries.

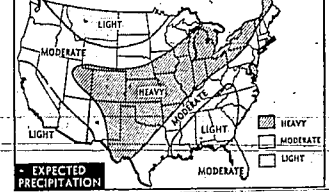
Hertzke was found to have a broken jaw and internal injuries in addition to the gunshot wound.
