Solon Claims Special Meet Isn't Needed

BOISE, June 16.—The chairman of the 1958 House Revenue and Taxation committee defended this year's income tax law yesterday and said a special session should not be necessary to make a technical correction.

It was unfortunate that a technical clerical error occurred in enrolling the 1958 income tax law, said Rep. W. Monroe, D. Nev. "But it should be settled through the courts or any legal avenue open to us."

Error House bills, the envelope copy of the law failed to carry an amendment which reduced the minimum tax rate from 3% per cent to three or four percent, he said. It would raise one million dollars a year more from taxpayers, he said the legislature planned.

Monroe, here in connection with an application for 1958-1959 federal income tax, said he thought the intention of the legislature was "to let it be known that everyone is so quick to attack an act of congress that it is not possible to get it passed."

As far as the 1958 income tax, he said, it is a part of an overall tax program. The new program was designed to use and exemptions not in the old law. For example, people with more dependents are better off under the new law than the old one.

Other minor corrections could wait until the next regular session in 1961, he said, adding, "I don't think this new program should get into politics."

Purchase of Property Is OK by City

City commissioners Monday night approved the purchase from Andrew Lang for \$500 of the property on which the new well is to be located. All commissioners present voted yes. Commissioner H. J. Burkhead said the property is located in the 400 block of Highland avenue east. The property was owned by Lang, who had been having difficulty in a lease agreement for access to the well. The city will purchase the property outright. The property is 75 feet fronting on Highland avenue and is 160 feet deep. He pointed out that the lot is for residential use only.

In other business, the commissioners approved extending the public utility and property tax insurance from Aug. 4 to Dec. 4. This will give the city time to submit bids to replace the insurance. The cost of the extension will be the same as the regular rates.

The commissioners granted approval of the street widening and widening of the street from 20 to 24 feet on the west end of the street. The approval was given by the engineering department and transfer of water stock.

Floods Deal Heavy Blow To Chinese

TOKYO, June 16 (AP)—China's age-old flood scourge is dealing a heavy blow to the communist regime's plans to continue the "great leap forward" in 1953.

Territorial rains have been lashing south and central China for a week. Red broadcasts admit floods have inundated 800 square miles in Kwangtung province alone, but mobilization of some three million persons to combat the menace in disaster-stricken areas is such greater.

Crops Harvested
Peiping radio said harvesting of crops is going ahead normally in other sections of the vast country. But weather forecasts for Tokyo reported that the warm air front which brought the downpour to Kwangtung has moved toward the quickly settled lower Yangtze valley.

The weathermen said a low pressure system developed over Shanghai, Nanking and other east coast areas, and that they are due for a drizzling rain.

The rains also have brought death and destruction to the adjacent British colony of Hong Kong. Tropical rainstorms have killed 45 Chinese there, and 5,000 are homeless.

6 Inches of Rain Fall
The Kwangtung rains were preceded by the heaviest rainstorm in 40 years in the 30-hour area of central China June 8. The rains reported four to six inches of rain in a 14-hour period.

Rain began falling in Kwangtung province June 11, continuing on the Tungkang and Hsuehshing basins. It reached 12 to 20 inches in a few days, and flood waters began rampaging shore the provincial capital of Canton.

A winner roast was held at the new outdoor fireplace at the Orange hall after the last dairy stock was observed by drinking milk. Serving were Bobby Schiffer, Jerry Andrews and Lewis Partridge.

Next meeting will be held at the West Point Orange hall at 3 p.m. June 25.

Women, Children Escape in Crash

PAUL, June 15—A Boise woman and her three children escaped injury in a one-car accident three miles west of Paul Friday evening.

High Atomic Bomb Effect Travels Far

WASHINGTON, June 16 (AP)—Two hydrogen bombs exploded by the United States high over the Pacific last summer disrupted radio communications in a 3,000-mile area and partially blinded animals 300 miles away.

The tests, conducted over Johnston Island, also apparently lowered the Earth's magnetic field in the middle latitudes with antipodal radiation intense enough to kill an unshielded space traveler.

First Details Reported
This was disclosed yesterday in the first detailed official report on probably "the most spectacular radio tests ever conducted by any country."

The explosions, one at more than 100 miles altitude and the other at about 20 miles, proved that:

—High nuclear shots can block out radio communications and disrupt radar early warning systems over great distances.

—Such high shots produce negligible heat and blast effects on the ground but generate fantastically huge fireballs and brighter-than-the-sun flashes of light which can blind at immense distances faster than a man can blink his eyes.

The report, issued by the atomic energy commission and defense department, covered the 30-called Test and Orange tests carried out last July 31 and Aug. 11.

1,260 Persons Pass Through Courtesy Post

The auxiliary police unit of the American Legion announced Monday afternoon that 356 cars carrying 1,260 persons passed through the courtesy roadblock at the Hotspur port of entry during 10 hours Saturday and Sunday.

T. W. Stivers, Twin Falls, a member of the unit, said that reports taken on each car passing through the roadblock showed that 257 of the 356 cars had California license plates. He said 32 other states were represented, including Alaska, and Hawaii. Canada and the Canal Zone also showed up among the cars.

The 1,260 figure was broken down by Stivers to show that 830 were adults and 430 were children under 16 years of age. The roadblock was operated for 12 hours Saturday and four hours Sunday.

Stivers said the group plans to set up roadblocks two nights this week. The Legion and state police cooperated on the project. He noted that several week-ends would be selected in the future.

Purpose of the roadblocks is to give tired travelers a break so they will be more alert as they travel throughout southern Idaho. Brochures describing scenic attractions in the area were given the traveler joining them to stay awhile and visit.

Fire Call Made
WENDELL, June 15—The Wendell rural fire department were called to Thousand Springs power plant Saturday afternoon to extinguish flames in trash piles near the power plant residential section.

E. E. Parr, fire chief, and Ed Comstock, assistant fire chief, were in charge of the call and reported fire damage amounted to approximately \$25.
