





### Former Declo Man Injured By Gas Fumes

June 18 — A former Declo resident, Arthur Cole, is in poor condition at Quannah, Tex., after a freak accident in which he died as a result of poisonous sewer gas from a clogged pipe.

According to information received here by Mrs. Jones Leonard, sister of Cole, the city employees were cleaning a sewer that was stopped up. The other man was stuck in the top of the manhole when he fell backwards, overcame the methane, a deadly gas that comes from sewer.

One went down to bring him out and by the time the other city employee arrived he was unconscious. Both of the men who went down to bring up the unconscious man were sick from the fumes even though they wore masks.

Cole is a mechanic and supervisor at the city of Quannah. While living in Declo he was employed at the Bakery Messing ranch.

The accident occurred June 8 and Cole had still not regained consciousness, according to word received by Mrs. Leonard Wednesday.

## Gooding Gets Request for Road Reroute

GOODING, June 18—Members of the Gooding Chapter of Commerce were asked by Ernest Oomen, president of the Gooding Chamber of Commerce, during their regular meeting Tuesday night at the Gooding hotel, to request the Idaho highway department and the state of Idaho to reroute highway 80N direct along the new Pacific railroad from American Falls to Tiller. Oomen stated that Twin Falls being very inconsiderate of the mountain north of the river, when they asked that the highway reroute south of the canyon. ## Huge Machinery to Be Moved To Airport in Demonstration

Large earth moving equipment which will be demonstrated at the Twin Falls airport during the demonstration of a cross wind striping machine will be moved from the city shops to the airport Friday.

The two rubber tired Euclid scrapers will be driven under their own power but it will be necessary to haul the 60,000 pound crawler tractor on a trailer.

Tire changing could be somewhat of a problem with tires weighing over 2,000 pounds each and standing eight feet high. The giant tubular tires are four and one-half feet across and cost \$4,600. Goodrich company officials said, "The local Goodrich shop will handle any tire difficulties that may occur during a demonstration of the Euclid equipment at the airport."

The largest of the three machines, the 24-yard twin power crawler weighs more than 80,000 pounds with a 336-horsepower engine at the front and a 227-horsepower engine at the rear.

The 24-yard scraper is equipped with one front engine. Weight is 60,000 pounds. The twin power crawler tractor's twin engines deliver 425 horsepower. Overall length of the tractor is 16 feet, while the twin-engine scraper is 45 and a half feet long.

## Construction Is Increased In City Areas

Construction in Twin Falls for May showed a 156 per cent increase over the corresponding month a year ago. When in dollar value, total building last month amounted to \$266,550. Of this, \$177,000 went to erection of dwellings.

This compares with more than one and one-half millions which were spent last month in Idaho Falls which led all Idaho cities in total construction. The \$150,000 in Twin Falls spent last month is 140 per cent over that city's total building bill for May, 1938.

However, Twin Falls led all cities except Boise in dwelling construction figured on a percentage basis. The absolute increase is considerably less than that of Idaho Falls and Postville.

Boise gained 65 per cent in total construction over May, 1938, to a total of \$475,961 for last month. It increased its dwelling construction by 241 per cent, to \$184,257. In total dollars spent, however, Idaho Falls also led in building of dwellings with \$41,622 spent last month. That is an eight per cent increase from the corresponding month a year ago.

Postville had a total construction bill of \$231,251, of which \$223,100 went for dwellings.

In total construction, 10 Idaho cities ranked in this order: Idaho Falls, Alaska, Boise, Lewiston, Coeur d'Alene and Shoshone. Shoshone totaled \$64,420, a 41 per cent decrease from May, 1938.

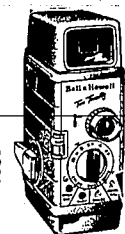

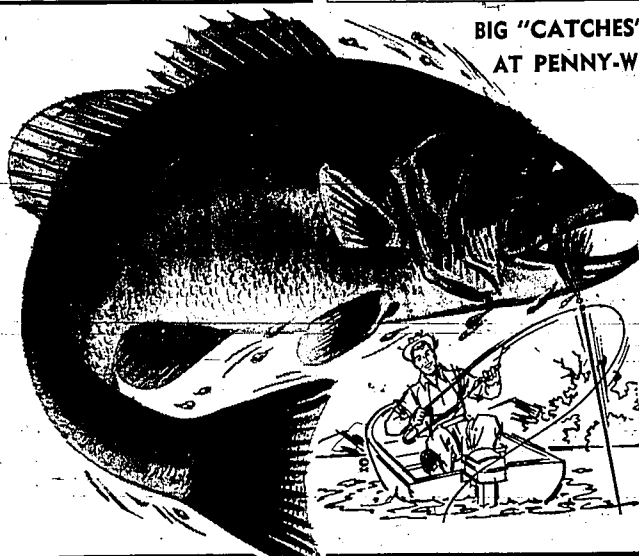

# New Burley Methodist Pastor Has Lived Under Red Regime

BURLEY, June 18 — The Rev. Edward E. Dixon, the new minister of the First Methodist church in Burley, and his wife have lived under communist domination. They said this was the darkest and worst 18 months of their lives. Mrs. Dixon's missionary work began immediately following her graduation from Willamette university, Salem, Ore., in 1923. Under the board of world missions of the Methodist church, she was appointed to teach in the mission high school for boys in Tientsin, China. When she arrived in China, she was met at the train by a tall young man, his name was the Rev. Edward Dixon and he had been doing student work on the mission field for three years. The Rev. Mr. Dixon was reared in Pennsylvania and received his schooling at Wesleyan university, Middletown, Conn. They worked for three years in their missionary work with the Chinese people and in 1926 came back to the United States to be married. After their marriage, the Rev. Mr. Dixon studied at Boston Theological seminary while Mrs. Dixon went to the school of religious education at Boston university to obtain her master's degree in religious education. The Dixons then returned to China, but this time to the border of Manchuria, 100 miles from any other white person. They remained several years carrying on their religious work as well as working with relief tents of native workers to distribute food, clothing and medicines to the destitute. After their next furlough in America, they returned to Tientsin about the time of the Japanese invasion of China. They witnessed the terrible devastation of the land and its people.

America for the safe return of her husband. Months would go by without any word from him to tell her that he was alive. She began studying for another MA degree in rural church work at the Drew Theological seminary, Madison, N. J. When the Japanese surrendered, the American government repatriated all Americans held prisoners by the Japanese. After a short period of rest, he felt compelled to return to Tientsin to carry on his work. As soon as the U. S. government would permit wives and children to follow, Mrs. Dixon and the children joined him six months later. In 1949, the communists started shelling and bombing Tientsin and finally brought the area under its rule. In 1951 they evacuated to America because it was impossible to continue Christian work under communist government. Their next appointment was to work with the Mandarin speaking Chinese in Sumatra, Indonesia, to organize a training school for Chinese ministers and Bible women. They helped to establish the North Sumatra Bible Training school for which they raised funds through appeals to the churches in America. The school is still in existence. After the next missionary furlough they remained in America and accepted an invitation to serve the Methodist church on Long Island, N. Y. They remained there two years, and this month have come to serve in Burley.

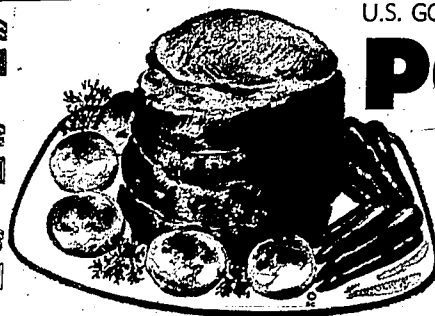

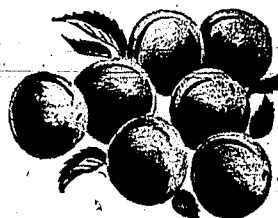

### Long's Problems Point Out Need for Rule on President

WASHINGTON, June 18.—The constitution doesn't say how mental problems of Gov. Earl W. Long or who decides on presidential disability, and the congress may enact a law providing for the removal of a president on a charge of insanity, but it still leaves unanswered questions affecting the whole country.

How could a vice president of the United States take over from a president who became too physically or mentally disabled to carry out his duties but could not or would not admit it?

The constitution isn't clear. The question has never been answered. In fact, congress throughout American history has been the question. President Eisenhower has asked congress to provide an answer, so far it has ducked.

Long's family had him flown out of Louisiana by plane to a mental hospital in Galveston, Tex.—he says he was drugged and kidnapped—and the lieutenant governor took over, signing bills and otherwise acting as governor.

Now Long is back inside Louisiana. If it asserts himself as governor, who is governor? Long or the lieutenant governor?

Under Louisiana law, the lieutenant governor can act only when the governor is outside the state. But suppose a president became deranged—perhaps only slightly—but could not or would not admit it. How then could the vice president take over? Even when the president is out of the country he still is the president, and no one is authorized to step into his place.

No legal, fool-proof way has been produced yet to show a president absent, no matter what the circumstances.

This is all the constitution says: "In case of the removal of the president from office, or of his death, resignation, or inability to discharge the powers and duties of the said office, the same shall devolve on the vice president (but

### 4-H's Get New Center

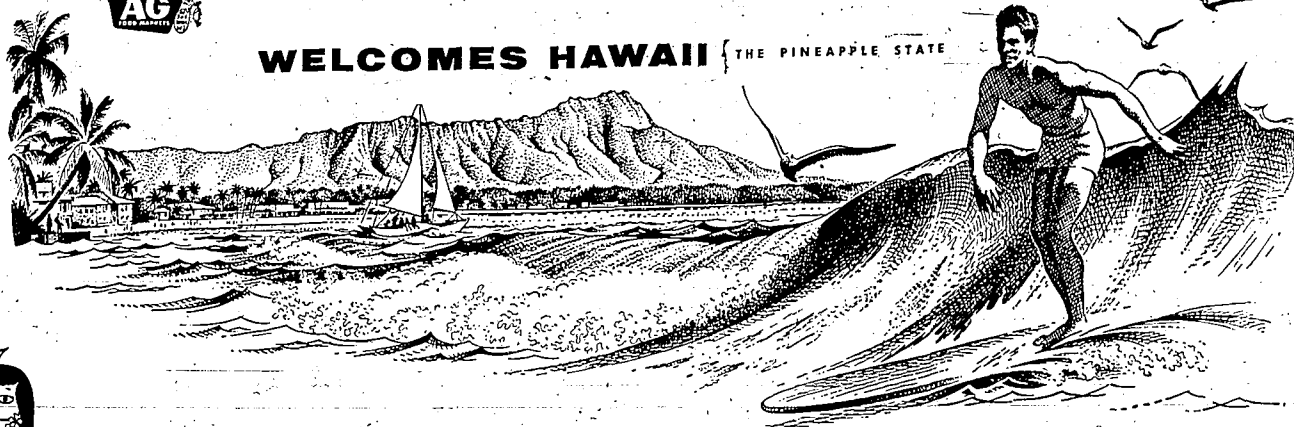
