association. "Registered nurses won't take the test because a lawyer has told them they might get involved in personal liability," he said. "Apparently the doctors don't want to be inconvenienced."

Judge Mosher said he is convinced that when a person is taken to the hospital for a test that officers try to contact a nurse of doctor to take the test, but the doctors usually end up doing the work.

In the Mummie case a blood test had been taken by a technician, Judge Mosher said, and consequently it could not be used as evidence.

He granted the motion for dismissal because "it did not seem likely that the test could be used as evidence."

"Many persons can drink alcohol before they get to the hospital," he said, "and if the test can't be used and the officers can't smell alcohol there is no case."

Judge Mosher also brought up the problem of sanity hearings as connected with county physicians.

"We've also had trouble getting doctors to examine mental cases," he said, "and they can't be admitted to a state hospital unless they have been examined. It's a real problem."

He also mentioned that the county has been asked to appoint a physician to examine mental cases.

## Russians Take Advantage of American Dollars, Law in Economic War on U.S.

WASHINGTON, June 22 (Special)—The Soviet Union stands to gain a world-wide propaganda victory with the help of American dollars and, ironically, this country's national defense education act, the cheap program to meet the challenge of communist scientific advancement.

That is the situation if the Soviet Union is permitted to dump without regard to its own economic loss—millions of dollars worth of instruments and apparatus for science instruction in American high schools.

Facing before the senate appropriations subcommittee on the departments of labor and health, education and welfare and related agencies, is legislation to provide some 60 million dollars in federal grants-in-aid and loans to both public and private secondary schools for purchase of teaching aids. This money, coupled with state matching funds, will triple the amount now available for such supplies and help meet the shortage of classroom equipment.

That is the situation if the Soviet Union is permitted to dump without regard to its own economic loss—millions of dollars worth of instruments and apparatus for science instruction in American high schools.

There are 147 companies—most of them small businesses—in 20 states who stand ready to meet heavy with the help of American dollars and, ironically, this country's national defense education act, the cheap program to meet the challenge of communist scientific advancement.

A newly organized American import company, however, is dealing with the Reds to bring in teaching aids at prices so far below existing American charges the U.S. firms cannot compete with them. Their futures are threatened.

The Russian price ranges from one-tenth to one-fifth the U.S. retail prices for equivalent American-made equipment. Heavy markup by importers still leave the export one-third to one-half the American-made prices.

The success of this lulling program hinges on the American taxpayers' dollars being appropriated for the national defense education act.

Senator Bridges, Republican of New Hampshire, has introduced an amendment to H.R. 6769 to prohibit the use of federal funds to purchase the Russian-made equipment.

# Congress to Try to Pass Money Bills

WASHINGTON, June 22 (UP)—Congress heads into its annual end-of-June scramble this week to pass as many as possible of its big money bills before the fiscal year begins July 1.

The house already has acted on the annual appropriations bills, but many still are ahead for the senate. Congressmen also must act on money bills also must be worked out.

Other battles coming Even after other money matters are straightened out, congress still faces political battles over such major issues as the foreign aid program, an anti-racketeering law bill, civil rights legislation and possibly some action on federal aid to education.

Threats of presidential veto already have forced Democrats to whittle off spending programs in such fields as housing and airports—a situation which brings a new wave of Democratic leaders yesterday from two liberal Democrats.

But while President Eisenhower has made it plain he will not spend in some fields, the determined Republican ranks in congress have vowed to force action on some of his requests.

Demo Support is Short Enough conservatives in Congress are willing to join the Republican to make voters stick, but not enough of them are available to get the whole tax and postal rates Eisenhower requested.

While he seems likely to get an increase in the national debt limit he has asked for, Eisenhower may have to worry along without an immediate raise in the 4% interest ceiling on long-term government bonds.
