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H-War Would Not Kill Man, Expert States

WASHINGTON, June 24 (UPI)—A scientist gave assurance today that the human race would survive the hereditary damage of an all-out bomb war between Russia and the United States.

It might even generate "genetic" better, "stronger, smarter, wiser, gentler, healthier." But the price would be enormous, said Dr. Robert R. Ney, a geneticist at the University of California, Berkeley.

Price Would Be Large

He said the price would be a "large" or "major" fraction of the population, killed or dying within a few months; survivors carrying many radiation-induced mutations; high infant and adult mortality for many generations.

Ney, of the naval radiological defense laboratory at San Francisco, testified before a congressional atomic energy subcommittee on the effects of potential exposure to radiation in the aftermath of nuclear war.

He said that any amount of radiation, however low, can damage the genes—the reproductive cells—which transmit hereditary characteristics from generation to generation.

In the hypothetical war between the United States and Russia, perhaps 40 million Americans of all ages would be killed.

He said that the number of survivors would be 20,000 to 30,000. It has been estimated that the survivors might amount to 24 million and 600 million new mutations to their children.

This would be a "major" fraction of the population, he said, and many geneticists believe it would be.

Second View Explained

But Ney said there is another way of looking at it.

"It should not be taken as an automatic that an increase in mutation rate is bad for the human race," he said.

"It is a certain fact that the mutant genes are not necessary for health and survival, even though they do entail a certain selective mortality."

By "selective mortality" Ney was referring to the fact that in nature a species dies itself of unfavorable genes through the process of premature death.

"Fortunately," Ney said, "the human race has the capacity to learn, leaving the fallen behind and cleaning their gradually of the genetic injuries inflicted."

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Good Days Again Are Putting Americans Further Into Debt

NEW YORK, June 24 (U.S. News)—There's a good reason why Americans are buying in climbing numbers these days. It's because more people are working and making more money and are confident of holding their jobs. With times good they are willing to go in debt to have the things they want now.

Inflation psychology—fear that the dollar you save today may not buy so much next year—is also making consumers willing to buy now, before it goes up later with a cheaper dollar.

To some the big boom in consumer credit is reminiscent of 1929 when Americans went on their last big buying spree.

As in 1929 the big gain this year has been installment credit for auto purchases. But there is increased on-the-spot buying of appliances, clothing, home furnishings and repairs, and of such newcomers as books, trailers and travel.

Laird's federal reserve board figures show that April set a record for new installment debt—just short of four billion dollars. This brought the total to 34 billion dollars and total consumer credit to 45 billion dollars, or 2 1/2 billion more than a year ago.

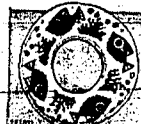
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Americans Make Hit Playing European Sports, Hank Says

By HENRY McLEMORE

VAHNINGEN—Just to see what he would say, I told the athletic director of the Seventh U.S. army in Germany that the only sport I really cared for was tug of war, and asked if there would be any chance of seeing any tugups.

The athletic director, meaning William Merrill, Cornell, '38, didn't even look surprised.

"There sure is," he said. "The Eighth infantry division has one of the best tug of war teams in Europe, and any time you want to drive over to Bad Kreuznach you can watch tug of war to your heart's content."

"What about push balls?" I asked. "I'm afraid about that game, too."

"Name it and we play it," said Merrill.

The next thing I knew he was bringing out charts and quoting figures, to show me the extent of the Seventh army's sport program.

Come to 80,000 soldiers, officers and men are continually engaged in some sport or another, and the program goes right down to platoon level.

In addition to my favorite sports—tug of war and push ball—there are football, tennis, track and field, golf, boxing, cross-country, basketball, baseball, badminton, swimming, wrestling, bowling, table tennis, weightlifting and, no help me, horseshoe pitching.

And, I almost forgot, soccer. This, the national game of Europe, is attracting more and more of our

soldiers, and they are taking to it like a bulldog to hamburger.

At first, our soccer teams were a push-over for the Europeans, but no more. A U.S. team recently defeated a picked Luftwaffe club, and a month or so back another GI outfit defeated a crack Luxembourg team, and still another played the Belgian army team to a stand still before upwards of 50,000 spectators in Brussels.

It is interesting to read the translations of the accounts of the games by the European sports-writers. Never, according to them, have men played soccer so fiercely as the Americans. What they lack in finesse, they make up in eternal charge and a willingness to take and hand out punishment.

"Time and time again," a Luxembourg sports-writer wrote. "Our smooth, coordinated attack was shattered by the willingness of the Americans to kill, or be killed, to prevent a score."

Merrill told me that of all the sports played by the GI's, soccer did the most for good relations between the Germans and the Americans.

"It delights them to see us playing their game, and they turn out by the thousands, especially since they have discovered that the GI's are capable of giving even their crack teams a tough fight. And you'd be surprised to see how many of the Germans root for the Yanks."

Baseball leagues are in full swing now, and it is top-grade baseball. Ask Ernie Banks, if you don't believe me. Ernie played for an anti-aircraft outfit when he was over here, and the best he could hit was .297.

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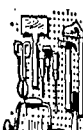
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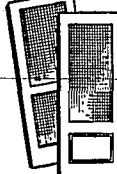
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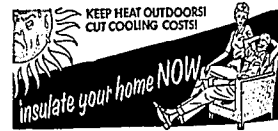
