TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The long expected attempt to revoke President Roosevelt's executive order which permitted the use of the radio as a platform for the dissemination of anti-Semitic propaganda has been put off for another week. MONSTROUS DEFICIT
The reality is always a little rougher than the more forecast. So the federal government's massive 12.5-billion-dollar deficit for the fiscal year just closed deals us all a stiff right cross.
For one thing it's nearly three times the previous peacetime peak deficit of 4.4 billion dollars, recorded in the depression year 1932. When Franklin D. Roosevelt was laying out what were then considered vast sums to shore up the business structure and ease the burdens of distress.
As a matter of fact, the huge deficit just officially placed on the books represents a larger sum than any of the total budgets in the Roosevelt era before World War II. The big gap reflects fundamentally the 1937-58 recession and the consequent fall in tax revenues from both corporate and personal incomes.
In times of economic decline, the government's problem is compounded. Besides the drop from previous levels, there is the failure to meet the needs for additional income from the "normal" 3- to 5-per-cent increase in general economic activity.
It is this growth factor, with its expected attendant rise in revenues, which is counted upon to offset the added government obligations that may be made necessary by the nation's steady population gains.
"Improving business can quickly offset a good part of even a substantial deficit like that for fiscal 1950," says a recent study issued by the Congressional Budget Commission. "But economic stagnation is being unduly cheerful when it imagines it can wipe out the entire deficit in the present fiscal year."
The government unmistakably is doing all it can to hold the new federal expenditures within bounds. Mr. Eisenhower is polishing his veto pen overhead in proper threatening style.
Nevertheless, men who are anything but pessimists limit the odds that the nation's economy's recovery will not be so complete as to bring money cascading into the treasury for an easy balance or a surplus. They see that prospect a little farther off.

What is the future hope, we must all fervently wish that 12.5-billion-dollar deficit never come to be regarded in this country as either commonplace or inevitable.
If a small dose of inflation is a shot in the arm for a staggering economy, this has to be a shot in the back.
HIGHWAY HEADACHES
The federal interstate highway program has apparently bowling along, and the Washington lawmakers can't seem to get worked up about it.
When the program was established in 1956, one of the main ideas was that it should stand on its own two feet financially. A highway trust fund was created and into this pool various types of highway user taxes. The legislators even wrote a provision into the law forbidding the use of general government revenues for this purpose.
At present the trust fund is in a state of flux, congress in its anxiety to promote recovery let the program briefly tap general funds to speed construction.
That left the program with the necessity of one day to lay out the money from the general treasury. On top of that, advancing prices had materially enlarged the program's total long-range cost.
Faced with this pinch, President Eisenhower has instructed the interstate highway building act to keep interstate road-building at full tilt. But the move brought quick protest from many sources.
Congress thus far has been sternly opposed to boosting the gas tax. This means that unless the program is allowed to dip liberally into general funds, the highly touted interstate system is bound to suffer serious delays.
Even at the fastest pace, the program is in danger of being out of the money for its vaulting traffic volume. It is now scheduled for completion by 1972. It could conceivably meet that deadline only to have the planners find United States highways almost as inadequate as they are today.
This prospect is real. Any injection or shunting of responsibility which leads to major delay is likely to compound the problem many times.

INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENTS
With the statement Geneva foreign ministers' talks in recess, and world crises taking a summer hiatus, action of the Cold War type has moved to another section of the newspapers—the women's pages.
The ladies (whom we are told never to underestimate) have taken the initiative in the East-West ideological struggle.
Recently a group of fashionably emancipated Paris models invaded Moscow. Les girls scored something less than a triumph. Soviet estimation of it all was something like, "Nice (clothes), but who needs them (the models)."
Now it's the Russians' turn in New York's Coliseum, where five pleasingly plump girls are providing—at least for male viewers—a change from the models. Americans are becoming more and more fashion-conscious. But fashionwise, the general consensus seems to be that the comrades are way out of it. Wouldn't it be nice if the best of East and West could somehow be combined?

POKERS POT SHOTS

U.S. to Move Planes From French Area

PARIS, July 8 (UPI)—The United States formally notified the North Atlantic Treaty organization that it intends to transfer its European tactical air group out of France without further delay.

The decision was relayed to the NATO permanent council by the permanent U. S. representative, H. Douglas Brown.

Supreme Allied Commander Gen. Lauris M. Norstad had hinted previously that the transfer was in the works.

The reason was tactical. As things stand at present, the fighter-bombers are based miles from their atomic warheads because of France's refusal to allow U.S. nuclear weapons to be stockpiled on French territory.

The decision to transfer the planes was thus the responsibility of Norstad. But the squadrons were units of the U.S. air force and thus the final decision had to be made by the U. S. government.

President Charles de Gaulle had refused to accept U.S. nuclear stockpiles in France unless the French government had full say in their possible use.

It was understood that Norstad informed the NATO permanent council last month of the impending shift, immediately after he returned from Washington and consultations with top government and Pentagon officials.

Costly Rescue Is Termed Needless

HANKSVILLE, Utah, July 8 (AP)—The state aeronautics director estimated yesterday that it cost at least \$100 for a needless rescue operation while 14 amateur boatmen skinned through the worst rapids in the Colorado river on rubber rafts.

"I don't see how any of them got through," said State Aeronautics Director Herman Bertrich. "I've flown that thing and even from the air the rapids are enough to hurt your hat."

Pilot Jim Hunt, Monday spotted two of an original party of 16—Mr. and Mrs. Phillip J. Seeley, Bakersfield, Calif., stranded beside an 808 sign deep in the river's Cataract canyon.

He had no way of knowing the Seeleys had just gotten fed up with travel on rubber rafts and decided to pull out.

U. S. Puts Limit On Envoy Travel
WASHINGTON, July 8 (AP)—Following its customary ill-for-ill policy, the United States announced yesterday travel curbs on Hungarian diplomats in this country.

Less than 24 hours after the communist government of Hungary told U. S. diplomats there to stay within 24 miles of downtown Budapest unless they get special permission to journey farther, the United States replied in kind.

Under the U. S. ban, Hungarian legation diplomats will have to leave outside a 25-mile radius from Washington.

Convicts Get No Sympathy From Others

MONROE, Wash., July 8 (UPI)—The entire inmate population of the state reformatory here had turned hostile toward the four convicts who terrorized women and children hostages in a 14-hour escape attempt, Superintendent Ernest G. Timpiani said today.

"I believe the four should be transferred to the state penitentiary at Walla Walla," Timpiani said. "We've been getting reports all day that the other 844 inmates of the institution have no use for them."

Prison guards captured the four would-be fugitives yesterday through a trick and a last-minute attack. The inmates, hoping to force officials to let them escape, threatened hostages held in the reformatory visitors' room with butcher knives and huge meat forks until guards captured them in a two-minute tear gas assault.

Three of the convicts remained under guard in the reformatory hospital today, recovering from minor injuries suffered when guards beat them into submission. The fourth, David K. Owens, 19, was in solitary confinement. Those in the hospital were Richard Murray, 20; Robert Jaquin, 23; and Donald de Courcy, 22.

Timpiani said the hospitalized men who would go into solitary confinement, "probably in a couple of days" and remain there until taken into court to face whatever charges the Spokaneish county prosecutor decides upon.

Ike Wins Out as U.S. Art Critic

WASHINGTON, July 8 (AP)—President Eisenhower won out as an art critic yesterday as a panel of old-fashioned U. S. paintings exhibited in Moscow.

Gilbert Stuart's famed portrait of George Washington and George P. A. Healy's beardless Lincoln are the types of 19th century works which U. S. exhibition officials promised to assemble for air shipment to Moscow.

The 25 or 30 old-style paintings are expected to have separately from the post-World war I pictures whose selection set off the ire of some Washington officials. But exhibition authorities still plan to show the 52 newer paintings despite a congressional protest.

Rep. Francis E. Walter, D., Pa., chairman of the House committee on "un-American" activities, has complained that more than half the artists whose paintings originally were chosen have red-lined backgrounds. And caustic remarks about modern art marked a hearing his committee held on the question.

Kozlov Called 'Shrewd Man' By Governor

DETROIT, July 8.—Michigan's Gov. G. Mennen Williams says Boris First Deputy Premier of R. Kozlov is shrewd and that he will take a Yankee trader to beat him.

Williams made the appraisal last night after what he called a "knock down and drag out" verbal fight with the Russian.

The six-term Democratic governor, who has the backing of his state party, the president of the International Union of Mine Workers, said Kozlov appeared to feel he had the better of his sparring with Kozlov as he described it to a news conference.

Questions Fired
 He and Williams and Kozlov had a private conference in a Detroit hotel room following Kozlov's tour of industrial Detroit.

Williams said he fired a series of written questions at the deputy premier, then he said they argued through their own interpreters and at one point Soviet Ambassador Mikhail Menshikov got worried and intervened.

Williams said Kozlov flared up at a question of self-determination and free elections for the Soviet Union's European satellites.

Williams said Kozlov argued that the people of East Germany and other Soviet satellites had made their choice and that anything to the contrary was propaganda.

The governor said he told Kozlov that the Soviet tanks rumbled up down a revolt in East Germany six years ago.

Williams pointed out that Poland, one of the most Catholic countries in the world, had been deprived of freedom of religion, Williams said.

"I told him that in Hungary the Soviets agreed to withdraw and did, but came back with Soviet tanks and troops and imposed their will on the people. I told him the Romanian people certainly did not feel the regime represented them."

"He told me that all I heard was a lot of propaganda. I told him the American people would not believe a single word he said."
