Senate Unit Highest Interest Rate In 38 Years to Be Paid By U.S. for New Funds Water Plans

WASHINGTON, July 9 (AP)—The senate appropriations committee yesterday approved a bill carrying \$1,255,830,000 construction which started July 1. This compares with \$1,177,000 in the bill recently passed by the house and \$1,176,677,000 budgeted by President Eisenhower. The senate committee—as the house did earlier—ignored Eisenhower's recommendation that no new projects be started this year. It approved the 44 new starts voted by the house and added 58 others, involving planning and construction.

The "agency of adequate appropriations for the development of these resources in both the civil and population growth of the United States."

Funds in the bill go to the army engineers' reclamation bureau for construction and planning of flood control, reclamation, navigation and power projects.

The bill also includes appropriations for the Bonneville power administration, the Southwestern power administration and the Tennessee valley authority.

The committee added to the house-passed measure three million dollars for the 107 million dollar Yellowstone dam in Montana and one million dollars for the five million dollar Clearwater dam in Colorado.

Other additions to the house bill include a million dollars for the Colorado reclamation bureau and 3 million dollars for the Tennessee valley authority.

WASHINGTON, July 9 (AP)—The treasury announced last night it will pay the highest interest rate in 38 years—nearly 4½ percent—on a new one-year borrowing of two billion dollars. Not since Sept. 15, 1921, has the government had to pay an interest charge of this magnitude. At that time it paid five percent on the government's debt for six months. The two billion dollars will be borrowed through the sale of government securities.

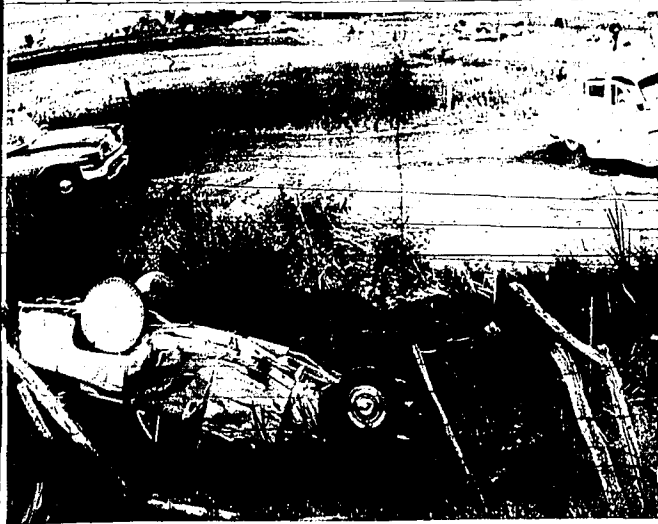

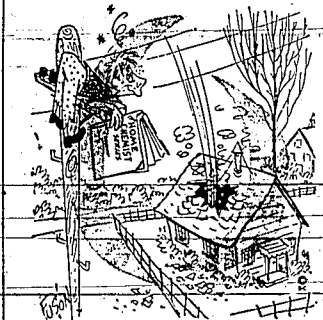

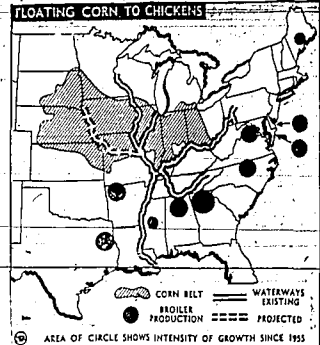

Vote on Lamb and Wool Set In September

Chairman Carl Boyd of the county agricultural stabilization commission committee announced that sheep producers will have the opportunity to vote in September on a national referendum on the question of continuing to finance a market development program for wool and lamb.

The referendum will be in effect since the 1958 marketing year and, if approved in the September referendum, will be continued for another three years. Approval requires the favorable vote of producers having two-thirds of the volume of production represented in the referendum.

Boyd said the new agreement would provide that deductions may not exceed the rates of one cent per pound for shorn wool and five cents per hundredweight for lambs that have been in effect under the original agreement.

The referendum will extend over the entire month of September to make it as easy as possible for all growers to participate, Boyd said. Ballots will be mailed to producers from the county ASU office before Sept. 1 and may be voted and returned through Sept. 30.

The referendum relates only to the wool and lamb market development program. It will not affect the continuation of the payment program under the three-year extension of the wool act last year.

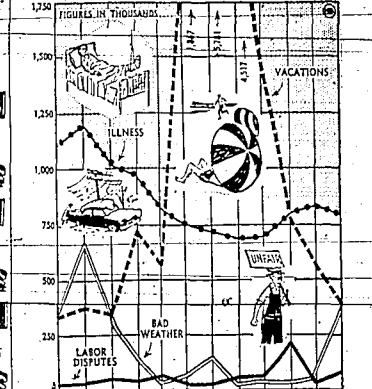

Russ Visitors Have Big Day With Camera

CHICAGO, July 9 (AP)— Soviet cameramen with First Deputy Premier I. F. Nizovskiy led a field day yesterday photographing strategic Chicago industrial areas and military squad like them.

Two newscasts and one still photographer rode in a convertible with the top down. Even the vintage point their lenses had a full sweep of everything in sight. Hence, Not Photographed.

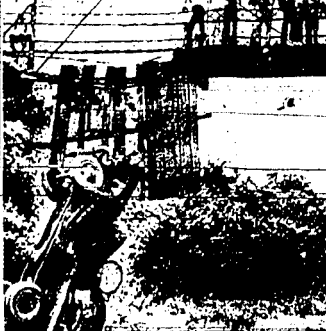

Future Space Pilots Enjoy Weight Tests

LANGLEY RESEARCH CENTER, Va., July 9 (AP)—The Mercury astronauts, after trying out for a few seconds the weightlessness of space travel, say it really is a comfortable feeling—in fact, fun.

The seven lean young men who have been picked for pioneering space trips in U.S. satellites two years hence, expressed their opinions after watching, with a group of visiting newsmen, a motion picture film of three of them undressing "zero gravity" conditions.

"This occurred in the cabin of an airplane flying part of an outside loop to produce the weightlessness condition through centrifugal force.

The astronauts floated about the padded cabin, pushing themselves off ceilings and walls, playfully showering each other into the air in what seemed slow-motion time. It was similar to the floating effect in a rain diving—while the astronauts also have experienced as part of their training.

Officials of the national aeronautics and space administration showed newsmen one of the cockpit devices in which the astronauts will ride in the capsule. An individual couch will be molded from plastic to fit the form of each man. It will protect his body during launch, acceleration and landing impact.

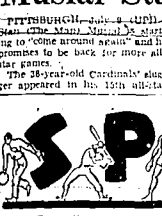

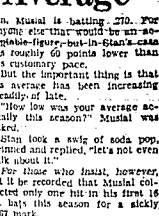

Chuck Roast Returned as Grocery Buy

By The Associated Press
Good old chuck roasts are back again in the supermarket spotlight as this week as housewives seek to balance the budget after the holidays.

More expensive roasts, such as standing ribs and top of bottom round, are featured in some stores and steak grills the call in a few places.

Pork Is Down
Pork, however, is expected to be made much in evidence for the rest of the summer. Pork chops are marked down four to 10 cents a pound over a wide area and further drops are expected.

The bargains reflect a steep, continuing climb in production. Federal figures estimate 1959 pig prices at 100,000,000, highest in 10 years. This compares with 14,000,000 in 1947. In addition, marketings this summer have been higher than for a fourth consecutive year.

Lamb Is Bargain
Lamb is also in the top bars in some areas, reflecting scalped price cuts of four to six cents a pound, while fryers command a premium again with cuts of one to four cents a pound.

Egg prices, turned downward again after a brief run, dropping one to one and a half cents over a fairly wide area.

Best vegetable buys are snap beans, nearby lettuce, yellow of green squash, yellow or green onions, spinach and tomatoes.

Good buys can be found, too, among cabbage, western lettuce, green peppers, cucumbers, eggplant, endive, escarole, broccoli, potatoes and topped carrots. Eggplant peas and celery are modestly priced.

The above recipe will make 2 1/2 lbs. of "Jellied Fresh Fruit." This recipe may be doubled, tripled, etc., by multiplying all the ingredients by the same number.

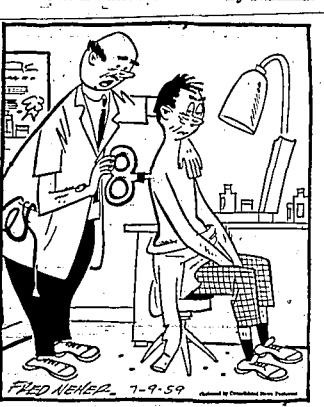

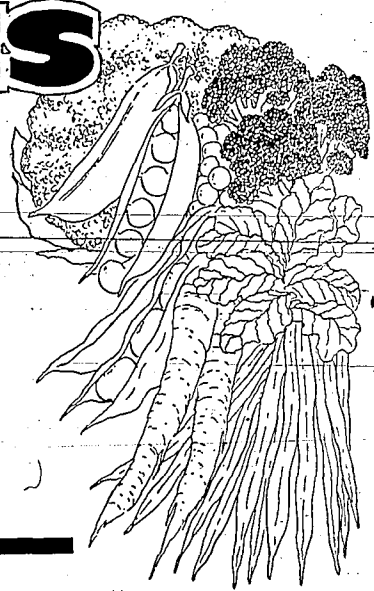
