## City Approves \$1,467,111 Budget Which Is \$88,289 Higher Than Last Year's

A \$1,467,111 budget for 1959-60, \$88,289 more than in 1958, was approved by the city commissioners Monday night during their regular meeting at the city hall. The amount compares with \$1,378,822 for the 1958-59 fiscal year. City Manager Joseph H. Lattimore pointed out that the budget figure includes appropriations for reserve funds, expense items which are not anticipated this year. Commissioners John Wolfe, Verne Riddle, W. A. Ostrander, Chester Larsen, Howard H. Burkhardt and Chairman J. Ted Davis, voted yes on the budget. Mayor Leonard Salmon was absent.

Top items in the budget are wages and salaries, \$429,862; street lighting, \$157,882; and fire, \$181,111.

Other items include sanitation, \$100,000; administration, \$28,878; airport, \$78,940; bond and interest, \$100,000; bonds, \$115,447; street lighting, \$157,882; library, \$110,000; swimming pool, \$11,000; water, \$100,000; inspection, \$27,000; airport, \$78,940; improvement district, \$27,000; water, \$100,000; and bond, \$100,000.

The figures include water, gas, and wages, maintenance and supplies, equipment and improvement.

In other business at the request of the commissioners, Chairman Lattimore suggested a major change in the vacation, leave and retirement resolution on July 1, 1959, to be effective July 1, 1959. The employment will be mandatory as of July 1, 1959.

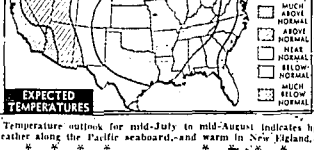

### East German Chief Called Real Threat

LOS ANGELES, July 21—Frank H. Bartholomew, president of United Press International, said today that the biggest "real threat of war" exists in the person of East Germany's communist boss of East Germany.

Bartholomew said that on a recent trip to Russia he found no indication of war preparations there were no air-raid shelters in Moscow and no air-raid sirens, he said.

"There has never been an air-raid drill," he said. "Nothing indicates that war is expected. The people are told that they can be successful in completing the five-year plan and the government will be successful in preventing a world war."

**Military Bluff Seen**

Bartholomew's opinion, then, is that we are observing the preparation of the greatest military bluff in the plan of written international history.

Bartholomew said, however, in a speech prepared for delivery to the Los Angeles Advertising Club that "a real threat of war does exist."

"A real threat of war does exist," he said, "in the person of Walter Ulbricht, secretary of the Communist party of East Germany and the communist boss of that unfortunate section of our nation."

Bartholomew believed the East German boss is a "mob-ster" and a "cold-blooded" East German empire and said he was a "cautious fellow" about whom he knew as much as possible, "because he may lose of increasing importance in our scheme of things."

**Watch Ulbricht**

"Don't take your eye off this little fellow," Bartholomew said, "because he is a bitter, sarcastic look and the ticky trigger-finger," he warned.

Bartholomew described Ulbricht as a German who has lived in the Soviet Union so long he speaks Russian easily.

Ulbricht obviously regards his present position as "impossible," Bartholomew said.

East Berlin is shabby, while West Berlin is a "city of the future," he said. "Ulbricht can't hold the East German under his thumb forever with promises of a better life. He must take a subway ride to the West and see 'what democracy really does.'"

"Ulbricht knows the only way he can perpetuate himself and his rule is with the armed might of the USSR immediately behind him, or by demolishing West Germany and disposing of his own mob-ster empire," Bartholomew said.

He has a violent disposition. Despite his belligerent disposition, Jenkins has shown patience. He had two cellmates spent 12 days pouncing a hole in the ceiling of a Philadelphia jail with a screwdriver, finally climbing through to freedom on April 30 of this year.

The trio was sent to a bar and celebrated the escape before leaving town.

The other two men later were captured, but authorities led Jenkins' trail in New York City.

Crim. Started in '41

Jenkins' criminal career dates from 1941 when he was convicted of burglary and larceny. By 1948 his record showed 26 indictments for those two offenses.

He is described as five-foot-nine-inches or 10 inches in height and weighing 200 to 210 pounds. He has hazel eyes, receding dark brown to black hair, a ruddy complexion and two faint burn scars on his right forehead.

In the past he has worn glasses with light tan tortoise-shell rims. A moderate smoker and drinker, he has worked as a welder, interior decorator, cab driver, milkman, and construction worker.

### Radiation Is All Around Us; Dangerous Types Increasing

NEW YORK, July 21 (UPI)—The atomic age has unique dangers for people not because of radiation but because it vastly increases the amount of potentially harmful radiations, such as those from the X-ray, which are in the environment, and, as a result, the science began learning how to generate radiations of lower and shorter wave lengths.

Radio and television were made possible by such knowledge of electromagnetic kind. And in 1935, Wilhelm Konrad Von Roentgen, a German physicist, discovered how to generate them. By passing an electrical current through a vacuum tube, he produced invisible rays of light which could be seen by a fluorescent screen.

Not known what they were, Roentgen called them X-rays because he was unable to determine their wavelength. Radiation of longer wave-lengths is absorbed or deflected, depending on the density of the surface it hits. These rays went through ordinary flesh as if it were air.

Bone, being denser than flesh, absorbs more of them.

Even so, visible light is much closer to the bottom of this scale than the top. At the top are wave lengths measured in miles or billions of Angstrom units. Above the band of "radio" radiation is the band of "radio" radiation. They are covered by the infra-red band which over-laps both. Ultra-violet also overlaps visible light and extends downward in wave length to merge with X-rays.

The dangers in X-rays become apparent almost at once, and many of the pioneers died of cancer or were mutilated by X-ray burns. But medical (and dental) X-rays were made safe (when done by competent persons) and all would have been well if the atomic age hadn't come along.
