### Navy Orders Planes Armed In Far East

WASHINGTON, July 22—The navy has ordered all its planes within range of communist air bases to be ready to operate within 15 minutes of being called to the air.

The navy personally approved by its commander in chief, Adm. Arleigh B. Burke, chief of the naval operations, reported on the communist attack on a patrol plane over the Sea of Japan July 16.

Burke termed the attack by two MiG-type fighters as an "unprovoked, unprovoked" attack. He said that the "blame" should be placed on the communist side, and that the "entire responsibility for this attack rests with the communist side."

An investigation board was able to identify positively the aircraft of the two attacking MiG fighters.

Both jets, with communist-type markings, were said to have left from the north and returned to communist North Korea.

### Ike Changes Views About Summit Meet

President Eisenhower believes the chances for a summit conference have become dimmer in the last 10 days, that makes it true for the time being.

A part of the President's feeling is reportedly based on doubt that Nikita Khrushchev will actually attend the conference now.

He is reverting to the idea that the Berlin situation was stirred up for the purpose of emphasizing differences of opinion within the allied camp.

He also takes cognizance of the fact that since former communist expansion, the Kremlin is practicing a policy of non-interference in Germany.

This is a point toward which all attention has been directed in the background of the Berlin summit arrangements to surround a reunified Germany.

But a reunified Germany on any terms which the allies will accept would represent an end of the communist regime in East Germany. This is something never faced in the long-delayed settlement of the division of Austria and something which the Soviet Union cannot afford.

### City's Budget Increased by Hikes in Pay

economy, where revenues might decrease. If no such changes occur, the city will end the fiscal year with some cash balance on hand to begin the next fiscal year. Present committee policy is to avoid deficit spending for the year.

Total administration budget for the year will be \$102,878, compared with \$77,174 last year. Increases are in the wages, salary and improvement.

The commission budgeted \$37,071, as against \$33,028, with the increase in the maintenance and equipment.

Budgets were cut for the street department for a total of \$20,700 less than for the past year. An increase in the sanitation budget will permit another truck on the new and purchase of another truck. The new budget figure was \$87,216, compared with \$85,158 in 1958.

"Main increase for the shop department is in improvements and salaries, \$20,022 as against \$17,444 last year.

The local police budget is \$157,827, and the former figure was \$147,007. An item budgeted for improvements in the department is marked for traffic signals when the highway changes in main for Main avenue and Second avenue south and west.

Proposed for the fire department are the additions of a sub-station, an alarm system in major businesses and warehouses and purchase of an aerial ladder truck. These recommendations have been made for fire safety ratings bureau to bring a class reduction in the fire rating for Twin Falls last year's figure, \$121,465. Latimore said the possibility of fire rating also will depend on adequate water pressure, as well as a class of fire department compared to the equipment and staff.

The commission for the inspection departments will vary only a little from last year's figure, for a total of \$22,272.

Parks department budget of \$31,008 compares to \$48,078 for last year. Higher budgets for recreation and pool and for the golf course reflect salary for an assistant not yet hired in the recreation department. The \$13,003 figure for recreation and pool is about \$4,500 above that of last year.

The golf course budget of \$10,750 compares to \$12,102 for the 1958 year.

Because the water department is not included under the general fund, increases there will provide for the water utility rate of \$1.25 per well for the city. Plans call for it to be in operation in the next summer. Total for water and sewer costs are \$12,102. In 1958 the figure was \$12,102. Piller plant costs are up due to use of an effluent plant in the purification process. Total for the department is \$20,042, compared with \$22,817 last year.

Of that amount, \$60,676 is for the filter plant. The airport fund includes an amount for improvements which will be kept in a reserve until enough is saved for the additional improvements, station or surfacing of additional runway area. The airport budget total is \$1,940 up from \$1,222 for the street lighting fund, \$41,003 from \$39,000 for the bond fund, \$74,315 for bond redemption and interest fund, \$150 from \$10,000 for the reserve fund, and a reserve fund of \$16,354 for the local improvement guarantee fund.

Nikita Claims Hostility Has Delayed Tour

WARSAW, Poland, July 22 (AP) — Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev said yesterday he is not going to Scandinavia at the moment because: "When they spit in my face, a gust, why should I go?"

Western reporters asked Khrushchev about his sudden change in plans at a reception in the Soviet Embassy given to celebrate his "friendship tour" of Poland.

"There would be too much changing from one country to another," he said. "Our country and our people cannot accept a trip that only gives me a chance to change clothes. There were no talks on the program."

Khrushchev added: "Here we have had talks, Gomulka, (Wladyslaw Gomulka), chief secretary of the Polish communist party and I. There was too formal a program in Scandinavia. My visit to Scandinavia would not have been a step to peace but would have led to sharpened tensions."

"I only want to go to places where my message can be helpful. Maybe I will go later."

The Soviet government blamed an unfavorable atmosphere in notes delivered Sunday night to Sweden, Norway and Denmark, calling off his pet dog, the treaty which will be called a hostile anti-Soviet campaign.

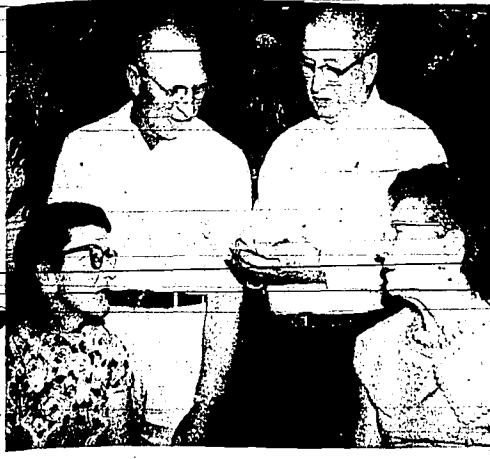

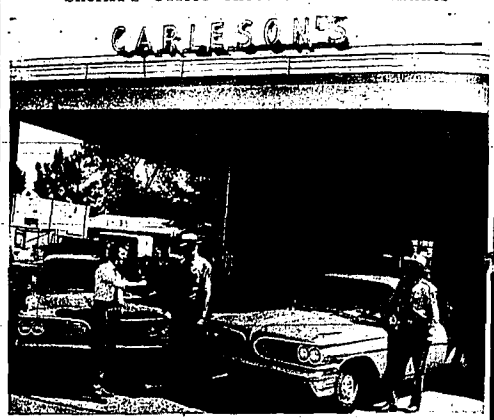

### Radiation Is Like Arithmetic Because It Keeps Adding up

NEW YORK, July 22 (UPI)—The atomic age makes radiation dangers a matter of arithmetic to people. They can take only so much penetrating radiation before their lifetimes without being harmed. If you start out with little of it, (too little to harm), but keep adding to it, you can end up with a total that hurts. Before Roentgen discovered how to generate X-rays, there was no penetrating radiation on Earth. The little there was came from radioactive minerals buried in the Earth's crust and from cosmic rays, which are of extremely tiny size. Ionizing and bombard the Earth from outer space. That was "background radiation." It was not added to it. The addition of X-rays was an addition only for the people who came in contact with them. The next addition was radium, and the same was true. It was discovered by Marie and Pierre Curie in Paris in 1898.

Radium is a radioactive "instable" element. In its natural state, it decays to "background radiation" but so slightly it is hardly detectable. In nature, it is a "element" in the mineral substances which muffles its radioactivity. The Curies extracted it and purified it and thus produced a second potent maker of penetrating radiation. They also controlled "release" with the natural phenomenon of the unstable atom, whose very instability makes it radioactive. Radium atoms are constantly breaking apart, as it were. This releases enormous energy in the form of penetrating rays. It also releases heat which forms into new and unstable elements which also emit penetrating radiation. There are other unstable atoms in nature. In fact, the atoms of all the heaviest elements are unstable to greater or lesser degree. Either they are radioactive in nature or they can be made radioactive if the delicate balance of their atomic mechanism is upset by penetrating rays from atoms which are radioactive. But in nature this occurs in only the slightest extent. The atomic bomb (and all other forms of man-made atomic energy) is based upon exploiting the instability of certain atoms in "chain reactions." In atomic reactors, these reactions are controlled. In atomic weapons, they are not and so you have "fall-out" which inevitably adds to the "background radiation" that no one can escape. The critical thing about "fall-out" is that its penetrating rays can impose instability on the atoms of metallic elements which are abundant in the Earth and which, indeed are to be found in common food stuffs and even in animal bodies. These atoms then become radioactive, and emit penetrating rays. The result is that many sections

Maladministration charges—Mansfield said Dillon that the suggestion of maladministration which is contained in this article is of such serious proportions that the committee must immediately explore the situation in Viet Nam.

He said that if the rest of the articles sustain "the serious allegations contained in the first," he will urge Chairman J. William Fulbright, D. Ark., to launch a full-scale investigation by the Senate foreign relations committee.

Mansfield said he was particularly disturbed by the following charges in the article:

—What may be excessive pay and emoluments for officers of the Viet program in Saigon . . . coupled with a surreptitious, virtually 19th century colonialist mode of assistance which can only dismay the Vietnamese people.

—Reported loss of adequate control over U.S. funds used in the program.

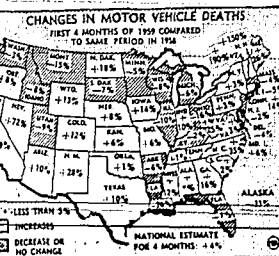
—That adverse political consequences in the country may result from "failure to administer this program in an effective and constructively oriented fashion."

### First Study for U. S. Hole in Earth Project Is Completed

By LEONARD ENGEL Copyright, 1959. BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. ADVANCED RESEARCH VESSEL VEMA, July 22 (U. S. Four United States research vessels have just completed the first survey for what promises to be one of the greatest adventures of the century.

Some 100 miles out in the Atlantic north of Puerto Rico, they have been looking for a place to drill a hole through the Earth's crust.

The hole is expected to answer such age-old questions as what the inside of the Earth is really made of. It will go all the way down to the mantle, the outer zone of rock surrounding the Earth's molten inner core.

The drilling scheme has been dubbed the Mohole project because the hole is to pierce a layer within the Earth called the Mohorovicic zone. The Mohole will be bored beneath the sea since the Earth's crust is thinner below the ocean than on land.

pitching, tossing, slippery decks in all areas of weather at any hour of the day or night.

Since there is never a moment when data is not being gathered, everyone on board ocean research vessels wants, even visitors, to stand a regular, daily watch in Vema's instrument lab, monitoring the depth recorder and other instruments. I helped move ammunition and manned a hydrophone or recorded shots during seismic shooting.

The oceans are a key factor in weather and climate. Geologists say that they are also a major arena for the forces that create continents, raise mountains and stir up volcanoes and earthquakes. The sea is home to countless

Bill, the hole will have to be several miles deep. And it will have to be drilled beneath miles-deep water—a feat never attempted before.

For several weeks, I have been aboard the "flagship" of the survey, the Columbia university research ship Vema.

The survey covered an area of the Atlantic known as the outer edge, where the water is 3 1/2 miles deep and the Earth's crust is nearly three miles thick. A possible drilling site in the Pacific off the West coast is also being surveyed. The hole will be drilled will be made later—a six-month-long project.

I found ocean research fascinating—and no game for the seafarer. It was a real thrill to see his hands on deck.
