 There are two members of the Teamsters union in congress now. They are Rep. John Francis Buckley, R-N.Y., and Rep. John E. Rankin, D., of Mississippi. Both are also anti-Hoff men. Representative Buckley is a candidate to succeed Hoff as Teamster president.

Great claims have been made for the political machine which Hoff is building up. This is being held up as a model for future Teamster political action. The recent elections has some cases when it worked with the rest of the labor movement, but not when the Teamsters tried to go it alone.

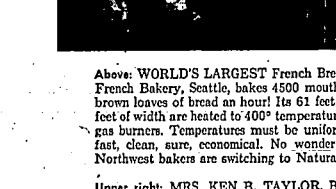

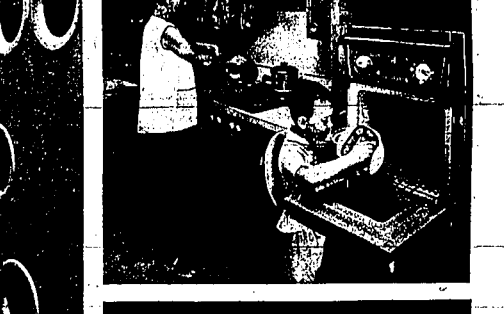

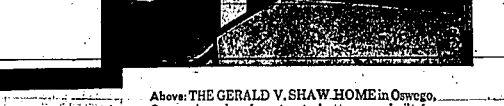

WASHINGTON, July 28.—Two power companies—Washington Water Power company and Montana Power company—say they approve of a proposal to encourage coordinated operation of hydro-electric plants on the house authorization for the house commencement of a windfall for private power companies.

Under the impact of mounting surplus of wheat, corn, oats, barley, rye and sorghum, the nation's storage capacity has increased nearly 250 per cent since 1950. Storage now available can store four billion bushels compared with about 1 billion in 1950.

The big construction program has put the government in a position where it will take a re-evaluation of its storage program, said a uniform storage agreement made with the industry in 1956.

The government is paying more than 600 million dollars a year to store its surplus grain.
