

Retired Steel Workers Ask Pay Increase

PITTSBURGH, July 29 (AP)—At least 100 retired steelworkers are demanding a 10 percent pay increase in Cleveland, Pa., yesterday to draw their demands for better pensions.

Pensioners March
The demonstrators marched to the entrance of U. S. Steel corporation's steel-bound Canton works and struck the picket area twice. They got to have a living wage in retirement as well as a pension.

Retired Leonard Pickering, president of the United Steelworkers Pensioners association, picked 15.

Pickering said the average pension was \$100 a month. He said the new rate was \$4 a month for each year of service.

Meanwhile in Ohio, Gov. Milton Eisenhower urged President Eisenhower in a telegram to end the early end to the steel strike. A study on the steel strike, said DISAIR, prominent steel worker, would severely harm more than 100,000 Ohio steelworkers.

Steel for Defense Halted
In Washington, the commerce department notified 110 steel companies that operating that the companies may call on them to divert part of their output to military construction.

As for the 500,000 striking steelworkers, some are beginning to feel a pinch in their pocketbooks. They are drawing their last full paychecks, placing them at the mercy of their own accounts.

The same goes for 78,000 workers throughout in industries allied to steel.

New Industry in Heyburn Helps Spur \$30,000 Development Project in Area

HEYBURN, July 29—After many years of quiet and inactivity, the village of Heyburn is again having a growing pains.

With the influx of large numbers of workers through the new industry and developments being built in and near Heyburn, the village board has inaugurated a program of enlarging the services offered to its residents.

The village board plans to add a decision soon for a school to serve the area. The board already has applied for federal aid to assist in the construction.

Approximately 20 acres are being added to the west end of the village, necessitating opening new streets and improving others. One through street, "O" street, just east of the main street, has been widened and a field, with flood lands being re-erected the Afrisco road at the junction of 500 west. This is a much used farm-to-market road and the newly oiled section will allow traffic to bypass the main part of town, going on south to the river, then east, coming out directly as the Snake river bridge.

This will be an advantage, especially for trucks hauling farm produce to processing plants and storage cellars, officials noted.

In improving "O" street, it is necessary to cover a lateral. Construction this summer, and plans to build a dehydration plant and other processing plants in the future.

Additional electric lines have been constructed to revise the new area being built up in the west end. Several homes are now being built with more planned new electric lines are being put in and two parks are being developed. Their homes can be constructed.

Demos Battle Over Tickets For Meetings

There were North-South overtones within the state as the backing by two factions, but the majority of the squabble also resided to Democratic party headquarters in Washington.

Fellows May Be Hurt
A check of Democratic leaders pointed the consensus that Los Angeles would not lose the convention but it was conceded there may be feelings hurt before the dispute is resolved.

On the one hand in the south, there was Edwin W. Butler, finance chairman of the host committee, who has insisted that the national committee, headed by Earl Butler, promised the host committee 5,000 tickets to take all of the seats in the state.

Butler pledged to put up \$250,000 for the convention.

Butler told the battle to Gov. Edmund G. Brown who said he may have to appoint an arbitrator.

In the midst of the strife was the Elizabeth Smith, a northerner from Kentfield and national campaign chairman for the state.

1,500 Said Enough
"I have personal knowledge of the bids on which Mr. Bailey had been promised 5,000 tickets, as personally I feel 5,000 is excessive, I'm hoping Mr. Butler will be able to conclude a contract to the hosts of 1,500 tickets. He told me in April that was the maximum to which he would agree. He has repeated it four or five times to me since. Fifteen hundred is really a fair number."

The vessel is the largest tanker constructed in the United States to date. It was built at Bethlehem's Quincy yard for Transwestern Shipping company, New York. Its sea trials were completed July 24.

The ship has a capacity of 16,500,000 gallons of oil at a speed of 16 knots. That is three times the capacity of a conventional tanker.

Paint, Glass Has Fellowship
Beads Mark Idaho Roads

BOISE, July 29 (UPI)—Some- where on Idaho's 4,000 miles of state paved highways there are state painted highways—beads and glass beads today—much to the approval of officials and motorists alike.

The trucks are working for the state highway department painting the white center line that aids drivers. Glass beads are added to the paint to give it more reflection.

Highway making has progressed a long way from the cartoon picture of one man with a paint brush. Now it takes an engineer and a truck-mounted bomb which to get the job done correctly.

Roads Painted Fast

The roads are painted each year with a highly reflective paint—57,000 gallons each year—and 230,000 pounds of glass beads that are mixed into the fast-drying liquid.

Before the paint trucks are sent out to repave the roads, engineers line up the right-hand equipment line up the middle of the highways and mark them with white dots 100 yards apart. Then come the painting crews with the equipment for marking. The trucks have a truck-mounted bomb sight mounted just in front of the steering wheel.

The truck driver simply lines up the tiny dots through the sight and drives down the middle of the highway without error.

The paint, which takes just 30 minutes to dry under normal conditions, is sprayed from the back of the truck. The glass beads are scattered to allow the tiny bits of glass to fall into the wet paint. There they stick with no danger to drivers.

Idaho uses the broken line system for marking its highways. That calls for a 20-foot strip each 50 feet. Even with the break, it costs an average of \$10 per mile to repave the highway.

18 Men Employed

The state employs 18 men on three crews who work in three sections of the state for the marking work. Each crew is assigned a geographic area which covers about one-third of the state. As soon as they complete one part of the 400-mile strip, it is started all over again with emphasis on the heavily traveled routes.

A paint crew can average about 25 miles a day and an experienced crew can take care of up to 30 miles. The highway department crews also paint other markings on highways, such as junction points.

Strange Bad Check Passer Dies in East

WASHINGTON, July 29 (AP)— Frederick Emerson Peters, admiral of intelligence, position and reputation, so he spent a lifetime meeting them, conversing with them, and handing them worthless checks.

That lifetime came to an end Saturday in a hotel in New York City. Peters, 73, died of a cerebral hemorrhage, leaving behind a long list of checks that the press considers one of the strangest in the annals of American crime.

The record as detailed in a glib talker, Peters liked to pose as a high government official, and his ability or highborn and then pass off a check just big enough to live decently. His checks often netted him less than \$10, rarely more than \$50.

In his adventures, he used such names as Franklin Roosevelt, J. Clifford Pinckney, Theodore Roosevelt, Jr. and Philip Wylie.

Not all his activities caused damage. Being administrative secretary to the undersecretary of agriculture, he once called on an insurance firm in Rochester, N. Y., and, in the course of conversation, suggested a change in the design of a rain gauge.

The company lost \$40 to Peters on a worthless check. But after he left, it changed the design as he suggested and improved the gauge.

In his travels, Peters passed checks in almost every part of the country. He served sentences in several federal penitentiaries and state prisons.

He was born in West Salem, O.

Ike Is Urged To Have Talk With Russian

WASHINGTON, July 29 (AP)— President Eisenhower was urged by Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D-Minn., today to open the way for informal talks here with Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev as a substitute for a summit meeting.

But Sen. Styles Bridges, R-N.H., said he would oppose any visit of Khrushchev to this country, eyeing Vice President Richard M. Nixon should recommend it. Nixon indicated after his talks with the Soviet premier in Moscow he was considering such a recommendation.

Others like Opinions

The two senators' conflicting viewpoints were given in separate interviews. Others who indicated a variety of opinions about the wisdom of extending an invitation for the Soviet head of state to come to this country.

Humphrey, a member of the Senate foreign relations committee, talked eight hours with Khrushchev in Moscow last December. He said he believes more progress might be made toward establishing peace in Germany if talks between Eisenhower and Khrushchev than would be gathered in a summit conference.

"The danger of a summit conference with Khrushchev is that we might feel we had to produce something from it," Humphrey said. "Generally, where Khrushchev is concerned, if you produce something it means you have made some concession."

Personal Visits Urged

"I think President Eisenhower's greatest opportunity to contribute to world peace during the remainder of his term lies in his personal relations with and personal visits to other heads of government," Eisenhower has indicated he is ready to abandon any long visit by Khrushchev to this country. He has said he has no intention of negotiating with the Soviets in the absence of America's allies.

Briggs, who heads the senate Republican Policy committee, said he remains unconvinced that any good would come from a Khrushchev visit. He previously deplored to attend a meeting of senators with the Soviet premier, when the latter toured the United States.

PUC Drops Rail Sanitation Check

BOISE, July 29 (AP)—The Idaho public utilities commission disclosed yesterday it has dismissed a petition which had asked it to order the Union Pacific railroad to improve sanitary facilities in freight train cabooses.

The matter was the subject of legislative debate during the 1938 session. The commission said it was informed by the legislative chairman of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, which filed the petition, that the railroad had agreed to make the requested changes.

A hearing in the case had been set for yesterday but was canceled when agreement was reported.

State Sen. George W. Warren, D-Boise, also attempted during the 1938 session to get the legislature to gain passage of laws specifying the standards for caboose sanitary facilities. Senators who opposed the proposal suggested an effort be made to gain cooperation through the Public utilities commission.

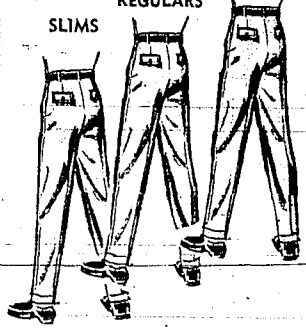

70 Millions To Be Spent On Colorado

SALT LAKE CITY, July 29 (AP)—A reclamation report said yesterday nearly 70 million dollars will be spent in fiscal year 1960 on the Colorado river storage project. Floyd E. Donahy, commissioner of the U. S. bureau of reclamation, said that \$16 million dollars will be spent on the Provo river and Weber basin projects. The largest share, \$47,367,000, will be spent for Glen Canyon dam. Planning for the dam costs 13 million dollars and the Vermont project 2 million dollars. He said \$18,000 would be expended in 1960 for advanced planning for all participating projects in five western states, a good part of the \$14 million. Another \$720,000 will be spent on engineering work. The Weber basin project gets \$2,500,000 to continue work already started, and the Provo river project \$10,000,000 on some big work.

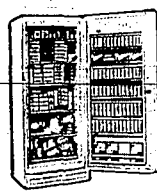

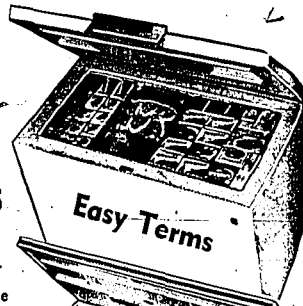

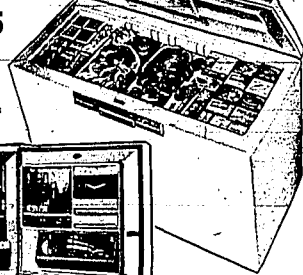

New Pro Football League To Begin Operation Next Year, Senate Group Told

WASHINGTON, July 29 (AP)—A new pro football league plans to start operating in six cities next year, commissioner Bert Bell of the National Football league said Tuesday. Bell gave out this word while testifying before the senate anti-monopoly subcommittee in favor of legislation to give professional football, baseball, basketball and hockey broad exemption from the antitrust laws. 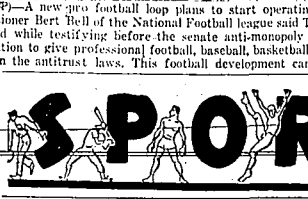

He and his family, consisting of Mrs. Arrington and their three children, James, 10, Carl Wayne, 7, and Susan, 4, returned to the United States and Twin Falls last week. They left Sunday for the university campus where he will resume his teaching and research duties at the University of Genoa.

Dr. Arrington spent the past year at the University of Genoa where he lectured in Italian to share his teaching and research in economic history. In addition he delivered more than 20 lectures to civic, educational and other public gatherings in Genoa, Milan, Rome, Naples, Palermo, Bari, and other Italian cities. The latter series was usually on some aspect of American capitalism, its achievements, problems and characteristics.

When he found that no reading material was available to students who wanted to supplement his lectures, Dr. Arrington prepared an introduction to the economic history of the United States, which was published under auspices of the Institute of Economic History of the University of Genoa and will be used as a text in Italian universities.

The two boys attended Italian public schools and "did as much as we could to understand of American life. They made many contacts in Genoa," Dr. Arrington explained. "They were the only American students who had ever attended Genoa public schools, and the teachers were thrilled to have them. They opened up many opportunities to introduce materials in

upon their arrival there, but learned rapidly and speak it now with fluency. American accents. Arrington learned the language well enough to get along with market-ling and household duties while the couple's daughter learned to converse smoothly with Italian neighbors.

How well Dr. Arrington and his family found their way into the Twin Falls high school where they help. To create friendship with them. He lives on the existing team. 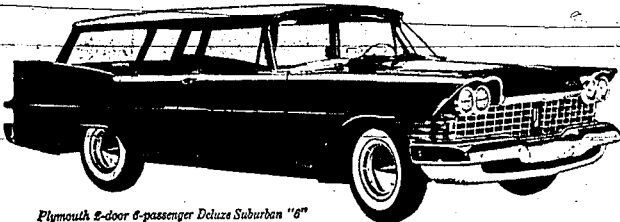
