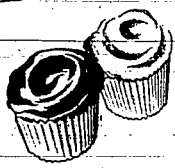

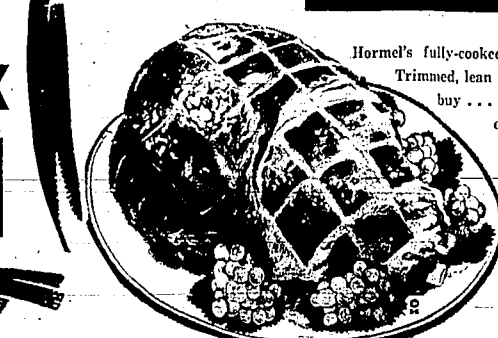

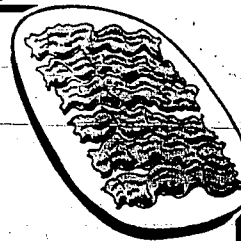

### Little Rock's Board Makes School Rules

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., July 30 (AP)—The Little Rock board of education today adopted rules and regulations for assigning pupils to public schools under the desegregation plan.

The board plans to open the four public high schools Sept. 8 on a basis of limited segregation. The plan will be used to minimize desegregation.

Gov. Orval E. Faubus closed the high schools last year to block integration.

Criteria for assignment of a pupil include such things as physical condition, ability to do the work, and the effect of a particular school on the child's education, moral standards, and the possibility of a breach of the peace if a student is assigned to a certain school.

The availability of transportation and distance the student would have to travel also will be considered, the board said.

Fifty-five Negroes have enrolled at Little Rock's three previously all-white high schools.

### Soviet Press Blasts Away At U.S. Fair

MOSCOW, July 30 (AP)—The Moscow press yesterday hammered out an "anvil chorus" of criticism of the U. S. exhibition. But the Russian people kept crowding into the grounds anyway.

The press in Moscow gave the exhibition a thumbs-down review. In the provinces, the fair got the silent treatment. Nothing about it appeared in papers received from the provincial capitals of the 14 other Soviet republics.

However, the hostile "anvil chorus" is still being reviewed. "Don't let the exhibition be a story about the Soviet Union," said "The American Way" and said, "All That Glitters Is Not Gold."

This was a reference to the golden hue of the aluminum dome that is the fair's centerpiece.

For the first time, the fair has been restricted to organized groups such as factory workers. But apparently not all the visitors agree with the restricting of the fair.

The most eagerly sought tickets were for the Moscow fair, a ticket to the fair.

Dworshak Still Hopes Three Nations Ban Fallout Testing

WASHINGTON, July 30 (AP)—Sen. Henry C. Dworshak, R., Earth's atmosphere. The senator said this week he still hopes pointed out this would improve the United States, Great Britain immediately the moral position of the United States in the world.

Both senators felt that the year-long test suspension would be a "significant" step toward a permanent test ban. Dworshak said he would like to see a test ban agreement reached by the end of the year.

Both he and Democratic Sen. Frank Church agreed the eight-month nuclear test ban conference in Geneva might still produce an enforceable agreement to stop nuclear testing.

Senator Church noted that considerable progress has been made recently by the conference toward a test ban agreement. He agreed that the test ban would create a "thrust" in the Earth's atmosphere.

Senator Dworshak, however, said that the test ban would have to contain "dependable" effective provisions to ensure compliance of the nations signing it.

The senators differed as to what the United States should do after October 30 if the three atomic powers were unable to reach any agreement.

Senator Dworshak insisted the U. S. should resume developing small weapons while continuing efforts to avoid "unnecessary radiological ill effects."

Senator Church, on the other hand, said the United States should make an offer to ban only testing within the atmosphere. He said this could be policed easily by an international commission using satellite balloons, balloons and other instruments.

He said, if all else fails the U. S. should announce this "unilaterally prepared" to makelements.

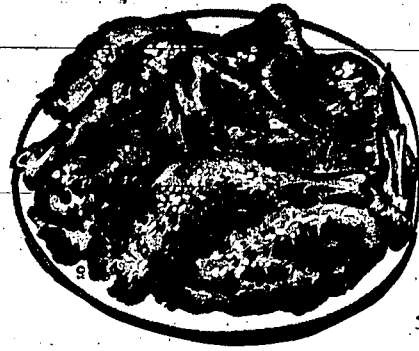
