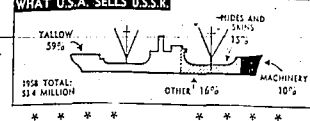
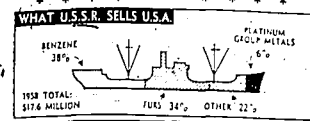
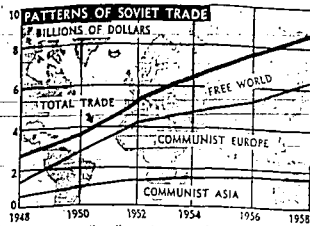

Russian Trade Grows



Russian sales to the world have grown from 250 million dollars in the late 1930's to more than four billion in 1958. Import figures for those years are about the same. But the trade trend with the United States has been quite different. U.S.S.R. imports, 22 million in 1938, dropped to \$160,000 last year. Exports to the United States have also tumbled. Reasons for this trade trend between the world's principal powers are multiple. There is little interest here in buying Russian goods because other sources have been found. Domestic industries, particularly mineral industries, resist competitive imports. Dealing commercially with Russia has proved bad public relations. Besides the uncertainty of Soviet contracts, the United States wishes to avoid trade that might feed the Russian war machine. Finally, businessmen are worried about competition from a nation that could copy and market U.S. business techniques and machines.

Rockefeller Has New Backing Urging Him as '60 Candidate

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3 (UPI)—Sen. Nelson A. Rockefeller, New York, had new support today for the GOP presidential nomination from former backers of the late Sen. Robert A. Taft.

Sen. Homer E. Capehart, R., Ind., formerly secretary of the House Republican Leader Charles A. Halleck, Ind., messenger, announced his willingness to serve eight more years as vice president, before seeking the presidential nomination.

Halleck declined to declare a preference between Nixon and Rockefeller for the top spot. However, he said he believed Nixon would win the nomination if the GOP convention were held today.

Rockefeller said at the governor's conference in San Juan, Puerto Rico, that he would not rule out the possibility of becoming a candidate for the nomination although he is not a candidate. He said Nixon was the leading candidate of the Republican conservative.

Capehart, who backed Taft for the Republican nomination in 1952, said yesterday, he had no doubt that the GOP could win next year if Rockefeller headed the ticket.

He said he hoped Nixon would accept the vice presidency again. He said Nixon was young enough to serve eight more years as vice president, before seeking the presidential nomination.

"I am fond of them both," Capehart declared, "but I'm also realistic."

Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R. N. Y., said that he believed Rockefeller would pull more votes than Nixon, Javits, who announced his support for Rockefeller earlier, said he thought the New York governor would state in the next few months whether he would seek the nomination.

GOP national chairman Thurston Morton said Nixon undoubtedly would gain "political value" from his Soviet tour but he said the trip was not "politically motivated."

A reporter suggested to Morton that Nixon might have decided to stop off in Poland on the way home for political reasons. The newsmen noted that there were more polars now in Chicago than there are in Warsaw.

Morton denied that Nixon had any political motive in visiting Poland. But he said he supposed the Warsaw stop, too, would be "politically profitable."

Capehart said the Russian trip "can't hurt" Nixon, but added: "Whether it will help him a lot depends on future events."

NATO Troops to Stay in Germany

BONN, Germany, Aug. 3 (UPI)—A seven-nation treaty on stationing of South Atlantic forces in West Germany was signed here today.

The treaty detailed conditions governing the stay in West Germany of NATO troops.

It was signed by West German Deputy Foreign Minister Hilpert von Scherpenberg and the ambassadors of the United States, Britain, France, the Netherlands, Belgium and Canada—the countries whose troops are in Germany.

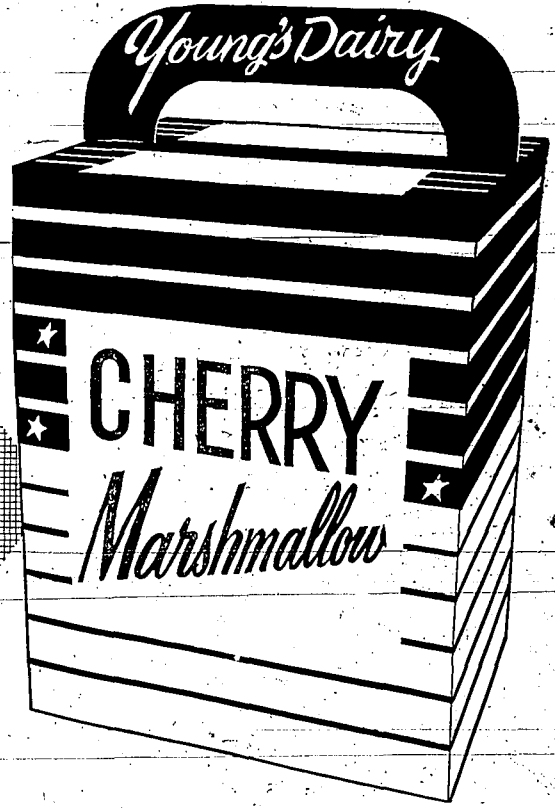
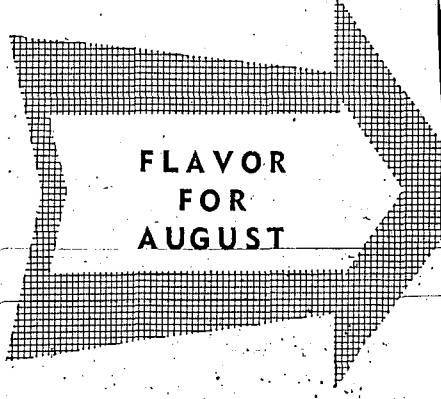

KASSEM'S LATEST MOVE

It's possible the recent Communist uprising in Iraq represented something like a desperation effort. Iraqi Premier Kassem has been unable to resist the pressures to make him a Soviet puppet.

Newest accounts suggest this attempt to overturn his "uncooperative" regime may now have failed. If this situation holds, then the West's position in the Middle East relative to Russia's may prove somewhat better than it has been for many months.

Oddly, we apparently have no reason to thank Kassem for this. He is no friendlier to us than before. Moreover, he did not take his present path of resistance to Moscow purely on his own free will.

Last March he faced another kind of revolt, from forces aligned with President Nasser of the United Arab Republic. That rebellion also failed, but it compelled Kassem to make a choice between allegiance to the Kremlin or rampant Arab nationalism.

Step by step he removed Communists from his government. Today there are no known Reds in his cabinet.

Thus Kassem has drawn away from Moscow, and we have in that sense gained. The Kremlin's rampant Arab nationalism, Nasser and Communist sources, he would appear, in theory at least, to be in a clearly independent position.

Friends Keep Pilot Looking For Survival

PAGE, ARK, Aug. 3 (AP)—All the time I kept thinking of all my personal obligations and my many friends, and I just couldn't give up.

Daniel Reisman, 44, a Salt Lake City pilot, was telling yesterday of a four-day fight for survival that began Wednesday when his light, single-engine plane was forced down on an abandoned airstrip in southeastern Utah.

Speaking from a hospital bed at a Salt Lake City hotel, Reisman told an amazing story of a two-day trek with no food and little water across a blasted desert. But I managed to ride down the turbulent Colorado river.

Fuel Gets Low
"I was forced off course by a storm and landed on a strip at an old uranium mine after nearly running out of fuel," he said.

"I knew I needed water and food, so I walked about five miles a day. But I couldn't find any, so I came back to the plane."

"I started to drift Thursday with my handkerchief and then I started to drift. I was trying to get about a cupful, then went to sleep under the wing."

River Is Seen
"I later decided to walk east, I saw the Colorado river, but couldn't get the sheer cliffs. I knew the Colorado just had to go to Glen Canyon dam."

"Friday morning I saw a wash where I got to the river. I made a raft of three logs and started floating. The raft turned over and I was a couple of times, but I held together."

"I saw some plungers Saturday, but they didn't see me. I thought they'd given up the search. They saw the boat."

Reisman was found by Earl Johnson, a river guide who was taking a group on a charter boat up the Colorado. He had earlier took the pilot off the boat and flew him to Page.

Doctors said he was suffering from exhaustion and malnutrition, but otherwise was in good condition.

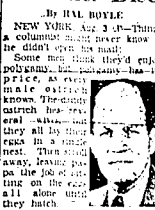

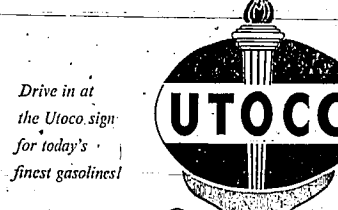

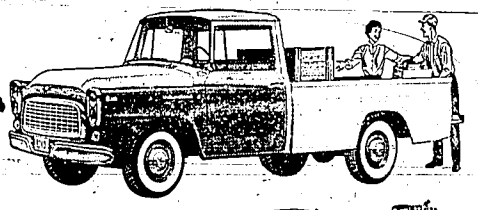

Infantry Will Get Arms to Fight Planes

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3 (UPI)—The army and marines are going to equip infantry units with a new gun-missile designed to knock down low-flying combat planes.

Partly details of the new weapon, "The Redeye," were disclosed and test models were shown as part of the Association of the U. S. Army.

Heat-seeking weapon

The Redeye looks like a World War II anti-tank bazooka. The weapon, fired from a shoulder, is made up of two parts: a firing tube which will carry it to a strapping or bombing airplane that is within range.

The Redeye and its launcher weigh 30 pounds. The weapon is not too long.

The army has awarded a six-million-dollar contract to develop the weapon. Convair is the contractor. General Dynamics Corporation, which will do the work at its Pomona, Calif., plant.

The Redeye missile contains a propellant, high explosive warhead and electronic guidance system. It is fired from a shoulder and is launched from a launcher serving as a container.

Weapon is easy to use

The army said both missile and launcher "can easily be carried by one man through underground and over terrain where no other type of anti-aircraft weapon could be transported."

The range of the weapon was not given. The army said it "is effective at altitudes and ranges commensurate with the depth of army positions and marine corps amphibious operations."

Humphrey Is Forming New U.S. Farm Bill

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3 (UPI)—Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D-Minn., plans to introduce a new farm bill, he says will provide "everything the administration needs to help the nation's farmers."

Humphrey, a member of the Senate agriculture committee, said his proposal has the support of the Democratic leadership.

He said it would be introduced as the answer to a committee by Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson that congress "has never given the support of a farm program he could properly administer."

"I will give Secretary Benson a whole lot of laboratory and field work to do the job he ought to be doing in behalf of America's farm families," Humphrey said in a statement.

Humphrey said his bill would contain "key provisions to address farm supplies to a complete foreign and domestic food program, expand farm credit and help improve farm families."

It would provide a system of marketing quotas geared to a "fair return to farmers."

The bill also would include incentives to encourage temporary movement of land and people to production and a program of government acquisition of large tracts of land for non-farming purposes.

Another section would expand use of surplus foods in school lunch programs and for distribution to needy persons.

The bill would direct the agriculture department to consider making special grants to farm families with no economic future to help them move and prepare for other means to making a living.

Outdoor Type U.S. Citizens Make Records

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3 (UPI)—Personal aquatic records recreation made a record number of visits state parks last year. The national park service reported today.

The visits exceeded 237 million, a 10% annual record, and an increase of 28 million, or nine per cent, over 1957.

Seven states reported more than 10 million visits last year. Texas, with 23 million, was followed by California with 19 million; Pennsylvania, 18 million; Michigan, 18 million; Ohio, 16 million; Oregon, 16 million, and Illinois, 16 million.

Camping increases

Tent and trailer camping attracted 24 per cent. California had the biggest camper clientele, reporting three million camper days. New York and Michigan each reported 1.8 million camper days. Other states reporting "bigger" camper patrons were Pennsylvania, Oregon, Wisconsin, Ohio and Massachusetts.

Expenditures by state park agencies totaled about 72 million dollars, down one per cent from 1957. Some 63 million dollars were spent by agencies other than those administering state parks on park roads and other projects.

Revenues increase

Revenues from state parks, including state-owned facilities, concessions, and entrance and parking fees, increased 14 per cent over 1957, totaling 182 million dollars.

The average cost to the states for each visit was 31 cents. Of that, 20 cents was for operation and maintenance, 11 cents for capital improvements. The net operating and maintenance cost, per visit, was about 12 cents, since revenues amount to about eight cents per visit.

The national park service said three per-visit costs have remained virtually the same during the past five years.

State park areas now number 2,335 with an overall acreage of 14,649,901.

Nebraska Is Battered by Heavy Rains

Rain-battered eastern Nebraska cleaned up Monday from a storm that flattened crops, knocked out power and communication lines and blocked highways.

A survey of police and fire officials indicated the violent rains that poured down on the area Sunday caused damage estimated in hundreds of thousands of dollars.

9 inches of Rain Falls

Schuyler, Neb., reported 9.00 inches of rain, with more than eight inches falling in little more than three hours. Many business places and homes were damaged by the gushing water.

One utility worker said basement walls and caved in at more than 75 homes in a small area of suburban West Omaha, which also received about nine inches of rain.

At least six bridges in the Omaha area were threatened by the swirling, debris-laden water, but there were no reports of any washouts.

Creeks Are Full

Creeks throughout eastern Nebraska were running high and spilling over into lowlands after the storm.

Wahonee was isolated when more than three inches of rain blocked all roads leading into the Nebraska city.

Scores of streets were also blocked in Omaha and in some cases the rushing water was running four feet deep and gapping holes were torn in the pavement.

Rockefeller Won't Seek Second Spot

SAN JUAN, N. M., Aug. 3 (UPI)—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, New York, yesterday emphatically ruled himself out as a Republican candidate for vice president in 1960.

Rockefeller's removal of himself as a vice presidential possibility all but killed Republican dreams of a Nixon-Rockefeller ticket.

He reiterated he had no plans to become a presidential candidate. But said he would not preclude the possibility of "completely changed circumstances" which might change his mind.

Smoke Flare Spells Rescue For Two Men

JUNEAU, Alaska, Aug. 3 (AP)—A slight smoke flare, saved for use at just the right moment, brought down a rescue plane from the mountains and saved the lives of two men who were marooned over the face of an Alaskan glacier.

The flare was sighted by a helicopter pilot participating in a search for a missing plane on the mountains and through the valley and over the rugged glacier. It was a natural monument.

One Man Killed
Although the two were saved, the body of a third man remained with the wreckage of a helicopter in which they crashed last Sunday at the 5,000-foot level of the glacier.

Dead was a Robert Baldwin, 36, of Juneau, Alaska, a geologist with the Newcomb Exploration Company, Inc., New York City.

Sheldon and Melvin Gierman, 37, of Juneau, Alaska, were also on the plane. They were with the aid of a sleeping bag and emergency food.

The first things they wanted were bath. "I got Dr. Joseph O. Burt, who treated me at the Juneau St. Anne's hospital.

"There's nothing seriously wrong," he said, "nothing a few days rest and a little medicine won't cure."

Sheldon, a geologist from Spokane, Wash., was working with Baldwin at an oil well in the vicinity of Juneau. He was on a party of geologists on a trip for the Petroleum Helicopters, Lafayette, La., working on the Clear Creek.

The men were sighted near the scene of the crash, about 50 miles from Juneau, by a helicopter pilot of the Clear Creek Exploration Company, Inc. Five men in a sandy beach, a small plane, piloted by Lt. Col. Leonard Daniel, McNeil, Ia., carried them to Juneau harbor.

Adverse winds on the flight over the glacier, it was said, caused the helicopter to crash into the glacier. The U. S. coast guard rescue center here said.
