BOISE, Aug. 4 (UPI)—Boise national forest officials ordered all available personnel to help fight a fire today in an effort to halt a fire. The blaze broke today in an area near Boise, Idaho, and is spreading rapidly in dry grass only a short distance from Boise's outskirts. It swept westward today, racing quickly over 7,500 to 10,000 acres of brushland toward the west side of the mountain ridge. The fire burned down into the heavily forested area on the north and east slopes.

The fire broke today in an area near Boise, Idaho, and is spreading rapidly in dry grass only a short distance from Boise's outskirts. It swept westward today, racing quickly over 7,500 to 10,000 acres of brushland toward the west side of the mountain ridge. The fire burned down into the heavily forested area on the north and east slopes.

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Sell Hogs at Low Weight, Benson Says

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4—Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson offers this advice to farmers: "Sell your hogs at 20 percent below their live price and you'll get even further decline."

His practice, he told a news conference yesterday, would reduce pork supplies about three per cent during the coming fall season of heavy slaughtering and raise hog prices as much as six to eight per cent above levels that otherwise would prevail.

Because of this year's greatly increased production, hog prices averaged \$12.20 a hundred pounds in mid-July compared with \$13.70 a year earlier.

To strengthen hog prices, further, Benson announced that the government is placing bids on its own surplus hogs. "This means that countries that are U. S. buyers, can buy hogs with their own currencies. Their interest buying would be expected to help bolster hog prices."

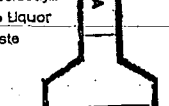

"The best art materials are the cheapest," said Dr. Howard Conant, re-affirming, "and every mother knows."

Conant, a native of Wisconsin and a member of the University of Wisconsin, is an artist who works in ink. He has two children followed in fatherly artistic tradition. He is chairman of art education at New York University, and director of the newly-acquired Children's Creative Art Foundation.

Let's be misunderstood, Conant does not advocate the use of walls as easels. Rather, he believes it should be given a place of its own for painting, with the materials already in the room. Even the basement playroom can turn him loose in a walled habitat.

"The bathtub is practical," said Conant, "because you can wash the following spilled colors at the same time."

"But we've never had any trouble with the bathtub," said Conant. "But they have a place of their own to paint. They work right up to the side in the basement attic."

Conant lives with his wife, a graduate of the University of Wisconsin, at 12, at New Rochelle, N. Y.

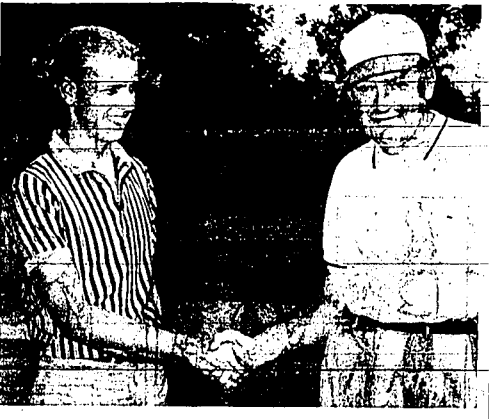
