50,000 Cheer as Nixon Starts on Way to See Ike

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (AP)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon, returning from talks with Nikita Khrushchev and a tour of Poland, met today with thousands of cheering flower-throwing Poles. Nixon's tour of the Soviet Union has primed him to discuss with Eisenhower what the President faces in meeting with Khrushchev and the Soviet Union later. A full-page spread in the newspaper and a welcoming delegation headed by Acting Secretary of State C. Douglas Dillon awaited Nixon's return from his tour of Europe.

Edgar Guest, Famed Poet, Dies in Sleep

DETROIT, Mich., Aug. 5 (AP)—Edgar A. Guest, famed poet whose work was known throughout the world, died today in his sleep. He would have been 79 Aug. 20.

Cause of death was not determined immediately but physicians indicated the poet had suffered a cerebral hemorrhage.

Home Poem Famous

At the height of his popularity, Guest was among the most widely read men of his time. His name would be frequently mentioned with the first lines of one of his best known poems: "I take a house in a quiet suburb in old New England."

Guest's daily poem still appeared in the Detroit Free Press and other newspapers up to the time of his death, despite his bad health.

Often called the "poet of the plain people," he preferred to be known as a newspaperman. He was a reporter, exchange editor and columnist at the Free Press before devoting his life to poetry.

Guest was born in Birmingham, England, Aug. 20, 1881. He came to Detroit with his family while a boy. After attending public schools here he worked in a drug store and then appeared in the Detroit Free Press and was called "The Poet."

His first wife, Ellen, died in 1915. Besides his son, Guest is survived by a daughter, Janet.

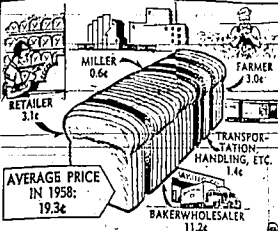

Labor Bills Creating Much Heat; Little "Light" Results

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (UPI)—An old law of politics says where the heat is generated you also may get some light. So if we didn't have a house rules committee, probably somebody would have to invent one.

The committee is a traffic cop for the house. It controls the flow of legislation from other committees to the floor. It was meeting this time to illuminate the subject of union rackets and legislation to cure them.

Rep. William M. Colmer, D. Miss., the acting chairman, said he could not witness a first what bills we were talking about.

Rep. Graham A. Barden, D. N. C., chairman of the labor committee, sighed at this, and said he reckoned he didn't have time to properly answer that question. What he meant was, just about everybody favors cleaning up the rackets in labor—and everybody has his own idea how to do it.

First there is the Kennedy-Zwinn bill, passed by the senate 60 to 1. Then there is the administration bill, introduced and disowned by Rep. Carroll Kearns, R. Pa. Then there is the bill Kearns introduced for himself. There also is the Landrum-Griffin bill, which President Eisenhower now says is a good one. There are a couple of dozen other bills introduced by other house members.

And—oh yes—there is also the Smith bill, the one drafted by Barden's labor committee and approved, 16 to 14, after 29 days of public hearings and closed door meetings.

But Barden said nobody much is for that one.

"You might say this is a funny kind of situation," Barden admitted.

Rep. Clarence J. Brown, R. O., thought that was putting it mildly. He said he was confused, and getting more so by the minute. Brown said he spent the week-end reading the committee's report, and this didn't help a bit.

He said the report's 106 pages show that only five of the committee's 30 members like the bill the committee approved. All the rest signed minority reports, additional views, dissents and supplementary statements.

Colmer said he got the impression more committee members supported the Landrum-Griffin bill than the one the committee approved.

Barden said he had been too busy to take a count on matters like that. The past few weeks have been the worst in his life, he said, and all he wants to do now is get some bill—any bill—onto the floor of the house.

"Whether it goes on a stretcher or in a limousine," he said, "I don't care."

Rep. Ray J. Madden, D. Ind., is a few hundred words, announced that he's for cleaning up rackets, but he's against "hannackbacking" labor. He said the National Association of Manufacturers would like the Hartley law, and is trying to write the one now being considered.

"Now, can you answer that question?" he asked.

Barden said he wasn't sure he detected a question.

"It was a good speech, anyhow," said Rep. Howard W. Smith, D.

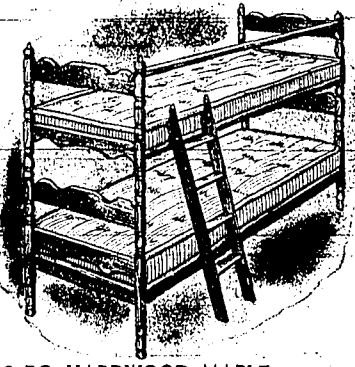

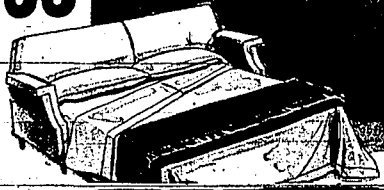

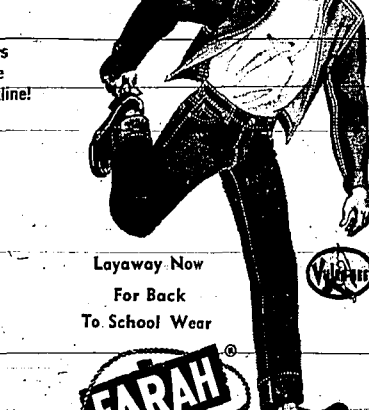

Doctors Use New Trick to Fight Cancer

STANFORD, Calif., Aug. 5 (AP)—Doctors now are attacking deep cancer with a kind of radiation which normally does not penetrate much below the skin.

By using a trick they can make this radiation reach any point in the body of the biggest, fattest patient. The trick is to make a small hole in the body of the patient. It will go just as far and no deeper.

This means that parts of the body beyond the cancer target need not be subject to damaging radiation. With X-rays, the usual kind of radiation for cancer, some of the rays inevitably go beyond the target.

Results described

First results of the work here were described to science writers by Dr. Henry S. Kaplan, head of radiology in the Stanford university medical school. The school has just moved here from San Francisco.

The new method uses electronic instead of X-rays. Electrons are tiny particles carrying negative electrical charges. Like X-rays, they kill cancer by knocking other electrons of atoms that make up the molecule or building blocks of malignant cells.

"Small Edition" Used

The electrons come from an atom smasher called a linear accelerator. For about a year Stanford has been using a small edition of this instrument, called a six-million volt X-ray. A six-million volt X-ray will go all the way through the chest or abdomen.

Dr. Kaplan and associates used a similar but more powerful machine to produce electron beams. To reach an area half way between the chest surface and the surface of the back requires electron beams of 10 to 20 million volts.

Target Gets Radiation

A slice of this radiation is taken by part of the body between the skin surface and the deep target area but most of it stops right at the target depth. By aiming the radiation into the back for a similar period, the physicians get a maximum cancer-killing effect at the target area.

The procedure, which is being tried in other cancer research centers, has been in use here a little less than a year. The Stanford group has treated eight hopeful cases. One of these still is alive with no sign of the cancer, Dr. Kaplan said.

The procedure is too new to tell what its ultimate value will be, but the first results indicate it is worth further trials, the physician added.

Changes Not Likely From Visit Swaps

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (UPI)—State department officials on Tuesday said they do not expect any changes in the coming exchange of visits between Premier Nikita Khrushchev and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

They said the talks between the two leaders might improve the climate for later negotiations but they said it would be dangerous to say whether any sudden or dramatic solutions of the problems dividing East and West.

Many Here Hope

There was some concern that the world in general, and western nations in particular, might be disappointed by the improved exchange of visits which would lead to a miraculous end to the cold war.

It was pointed out that Khrushchev himself said that he would visit the United States and American relations. To expect more, officials said, might lead to disillusionment and despair.

Eisenhower's invitation to Khrushchev to visit this country was described by officials who have dealt with Russia for years as a "calculated gamble" which might or might not result in lowering tensions.

Date Is Uncertain

Officials here want Khrushchev to go home with the best idea of the industrial power of the United States and the friendliness and peaceful desires of its people.

They are urging him to add visits to industrial plants to the farm and ranch tours for which he has expressed a preference.

Khrushchev has specified four cities he wants to visit—Washington, New York, Chicago and San Francisco. In addition, he has let it be known that he would visit Midwest farm areas, Texas cattle ranches and possibly take a look at "Big D."

Test Planned This Year for Huge Rocket

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 5 (UPI)—Rocket men hope to capture this year a huge rocket engine complex, capable of one day exploring the solar system and carrying men to and from the moon.

That's what Dr. Werner von Braun, army rocket expert, told the American Astronautical society yesterday.

"I would like to see it," he said.

The 188-foot Saturn rocket will be much bigger than the rocket that launched the Soviet artificial planet, Molnia, he said.

If unlimited funds were available, the Saturn could:

In four years, land an unmanned instrument package softly on the moon.

Launch "junk" carry two men on a trip around the moon and back to Earth.

Within 10 years, land two men on the moon and bring them back again.

Test Set for This Year

The first stage of the Saturn is the rocket engine to be tested this year at the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, Huntsville, Ala. It consists of eight rocket engines similar to the engine that powers the intermediate range ballistic missile, but more powerful.

Because of the expense of the Saturn, it will be tested extensively on the ground before it is flight tested. Von Braun said.

The first launching and operation of the Saturn rocket will be built at Cape Canaveral, Fla., may be completed next year, he said.

Farm Foods Prices Lower

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (UPI)—Retail prices of farm-produced food were an average of four per cent lower in April, May and June than in the same period last year, the agriculture department said today.

The department said about 90 per cent of the drop was caused by lower prices paid to farmers and the other 10 per cent by cheaper marketing charges.

Prices of pork, frying chickens, eggs, oranges, grapefruit and many of the fresh vegetables were much lower in the second quarter of this year than a year earlier.

The department said charges for marketing farm food products were relatively stable in the first six months of 1953, but averaged one per cent higher than in the first half of last year. Costs of performing marketing operations probably have climbed this year.

Freight rates and some other costs advanced.

Farmers received 39 cents of each dollar consumers spent for farm foods in April, May and June. This was the same as in the preceding nine months, but two cents less than in April, May and June of 1952.

Most of the agricultural products of Iran are for the domestic market. Only a small percentage is exported.

lowed to interfere. And then only for the purpose of dusting them off.
 When the two men had finished, the world would have a much better idea of how they really got along, and what they really proposed to do, than if they had haggled over an oral table for three months.
 Getting back to the washing machine incident in Moscow, I am surprised what with the quality of reporters present, that none of them felt it necessary to tell us more about the washing machine.
 What made us do? What was so more about the washing machine? Being washed? Who? The clothes? The washer? Or the soap? Did they come out whiter than while doing the black talk? Did they smell fresher than fresh? Was there a mid-air collision? Did they here to give a testimonial to his product?
