Prices Are Up at Filer Rams Sale

FILER, Aug. 6—A total of 539 Suffolk rams went through the sales ring Wednesday during the 38th annual Idaho Wool Growers sale and brought a total of \$61,797.50 at the fairgrounds here. The average for the 539 head was \$114.65 compared to \$98.87 last year. In 1958, 572 head sold for \$96,855. The top price for an individual ram was \$580 paid by Don R. Shiffway, Teton, for a yearling, 1958, folk stud owned by L. D. Warfield, Cambridge. In 1958, the top Suffolk stud sold for \$500. Four Suffolk ram lambs owned by Mrs. Fred Hezle, Buhl, sold to Urbano Toton, Brunson, for \$130 each.

Case Against Water Firm Is Receded

KECHICUM, Aug. 6—Development of the Ketchum water supply company will continue as planned, George Venable, one of the principal stockholders, said today.

A case against the private company was receded indefinitely in the Ketchum water supply hearing in the village hall today by the state department of public health.

Ketchum village officials said they were notified earlier that the hearing had been called off for a certain future date for the water system in Ketchum. A complaint against the local company which was formed in the 1920's was made up of a group of local people who were not interested in the water supply.

Dr. Terrell Carver, Boise, director of the state health department, understood the hearing had been called off by several people.

The Ketchum Spring Water Supply company was organized by a group of businessmen in the early 1920's by J. Lewis and J. W. Frank Gooding, two principal stockholders. Rights on the water from Trail creek were bought from the local company.

The village of Ketchum has used water from the company all the time. The company is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Venable, Ketchum, who now own the controlling interest in the company. The water rights which augmented their supply were bought from the local company.

They are now planning to build a dam on the water from Trail creek and divert it for other purposes and to improve the water for domestic use, Venable said.

These are the kind of warnings which James R. Hoffa's legal and political managers have delivered to the attorney and consultant of congress who favor even the mild reform legislation reported by the house education and labor committee.

The measure has so divided the senate version that Frank La Follette, Sen. R. I., McClellan has condemned it as "unassailable." They hope that it will be a political weapon on the house floor, or when it goes to conference with senate representatives. The bill seeks to soften it, while Hoffa wants it all together.

It is the major venture into capitol hill lobbying, however, was an utter failure. It showed his utter ignorance of politics and practical politics. He was not successful in bulldozing and browbeating the very members long known as extreme liberals and fast friends of the unions.

TEASER OFFICIALS' THREATS—But when they refused to approve a bill—amendments to the Federal Reserve Act—Hoffa's official brought here from St. Louis by Hoffa, the union group abandoned their legislative stunts, and went back to their own business.

Hoffa's labor friends selected by Hoffa for a gutter type of denunciation are Rep. Frank Thompson Jr., Trenton, N. J.; John Brademas, South Bend, Ind.; and Stewart L. Udall, Ariz. They are Democratic members of the house education and labor committee, which explains why they were singled out.

HOFFA'S FACILITY FOR BLUNDERING—Showing Hoffa's unrivaled facility for committing blunders in public, a committee report on the reappropriation of \$30,188,000 in unobligated balances remaining available on June 30, 1959, is a reduction of \$1,243,495, 000 below the revised budget estimate and \$30,295,000 below the authorization for 1959.

The total unexpended balance of funds available to the mutual security program as of June 30, 1959, is estimated to be \$4,871, 448,000. This balance plus the new appropriation provisions of a bill now pending provides a total of \$8,057,948,000, exclusive of local currencies, available for expenditures.

EXPENDITURES for this program in fiscal year 1960 are estimated at \$3,507,774,000.

All this has more meaning when explained by Congress as follows:

The government's 1959 fiscal year closed on June 30, at which time you will note there was \$4,871,448,000 already available for the foreign aid program. In addition, there was \$1,855,148,000 in foreign currencies also available for the foreign aid program. On the other hand, the program is still estimated to require \$3,507,774,000 in the present fiscal year and \$3,507,774,000 a figure very substantially below the amount already available.

"This same situation has existed in this program ever since I have been in congress. At the close of each fiscal year there has remained unspent enough money to operate the program for the way from 18 to 21 months without any new money being appropriated."

"In view of the fact that practically all of our domestic programs receive appropriations for only a 12-month period, I fail to understand why this program should be funded so far in advance. However, with my vote being cast in the negative, the house passed the bill, adding \$3,209,762,000 to the carry-over balance, by a vote of 270 to 135."

Senator Dworkak goes even further in calling special attention to new developments in the foreign aid program.

"I believe this year is significant," he says, "because foreign aid is changing direction, going from grants to loans. The protests of American people have extended to the foreign aid strategists to push the loan program to divert the heat away from our grants which are outright gifts to foreign nations. It is a questionable business procedure to have the government guaranteeing our funds at a time when the combined debt of all 70 nations which get our gratuities is far less than our national debt."

Dworkak referred to a recent series of articles by the State Department in a newspaper pointing out that we are spending \$1,000,000 a day in Viet Nam. According to these articles, we have adopted a "hands off" policy and just fork the money over to the Viet Nam government to be used to help inexperienced officials. This little country, less than half the size of New Mexico, has 600 U. S. foreign aid employees directing the distribution of \$1,000,000 per day. Yet they are not being trained in Viet Nam, but are being trained in the United States. We have now adopted this nation as a poor relative and have been keeping it for years on the dole while inflation disrupts native currency and our generosity has whatever initiative the Viet Namese may have.

Why does foreign aid have more lives than an alley cat? Senator Dworkak goes on as follows:

"I believe few people realize that much of our aid money goes to Americans who have a small army scattered around the world directing our foreign aid program. Their payrolls are special allowances (\$316 extra per month in Viet Nam for camp pay) for trenchless, American businessmen and the lion's share of orders for machinery and other goods which are sent to foreign nations."

"A great many interests have a financial stake in foreign aid."

Dworkak says he would like to believe the foreign aid strategists' plan of shifting from grants to loans may mean relief for the taxpayer, but after the examples of the past, "I have learned to watch all these programs suspiciously."

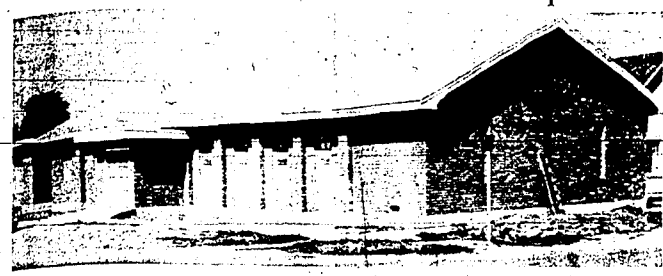

Idaho's Race For Congress Jobs Watched

BOISE, Aug. 6 (UPI)—Race in both of Idaho's congressional districts in 1960 are expected to be wide-open, although there is an indication of no opposition against incumbents if they seek reelection. Although Republican H. A. Baker and Democrat O. Francis Pflanz have not indicated that they will run for another term, it was almost certain they will. However, political observers said today that a movement is starting in southern Idaho to have Baker and Pflanz run for the U. S. Senate seat by Republican Henry Dworshak. 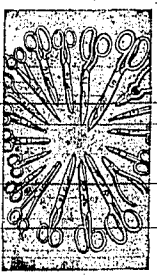

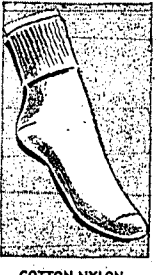

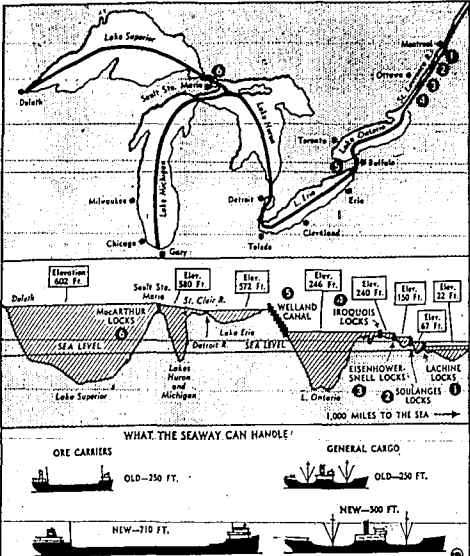

Up, it gives an overall view of the seaway, which reaches 2,300 miles from the Atlantic to Duluth, Minn. Numbers correspond to the elevating points shown in profile. center. Shipments destined as much as 80 miles to the west are shipped by rail to locks and rivers. The size of ships the seaway can handle is graphically depicted by silhouettes, bottom, contrasting old lake carriers with the ocean-going giant.

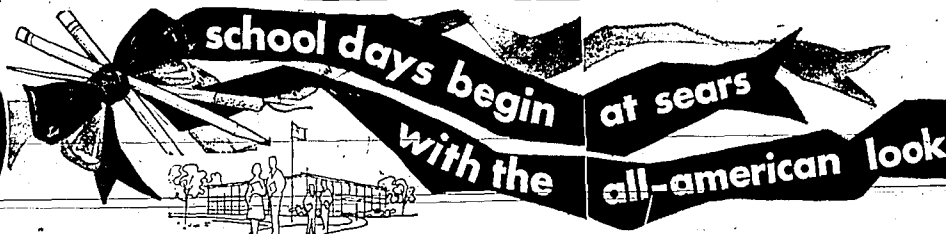

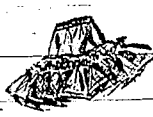

Auto exhaust fumes, including hydrocarbons and oxides of nitrogen, have been criticized by medical scientists as possible causes of lung and skin cancers as well as other diseases, but no positive link has ever been proven.

The automobile industry has spent some six million dollars in the past five years on air pollution research. 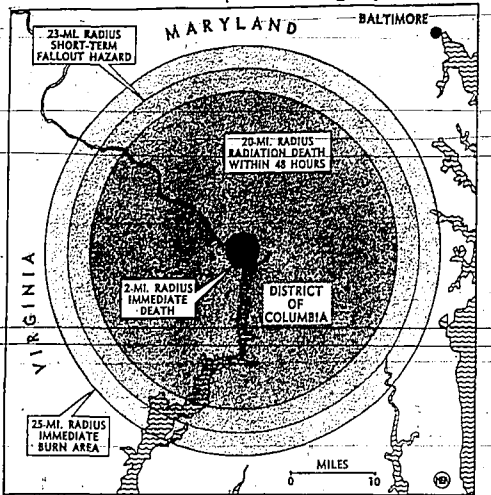

Terror of H-Bomb Is Displayed



If a 10-megaton nuclear bomb (one megaton equals one million tons of TNT) exploded above the capital building in Washington, exposed persons as far away as 25 miles would suffer second-degree burns, many more, as based on testimony by a Princeton expert. Lower level radiation alone could kill unprotected persons within a radius of two miles from ground zero. Short-term radiation would kill exposed persons in an area of 1,300 square miles within 48 hours. Short-term fallout, lasting hours, days or months, would be lethal over 1,500 square miles. Total area subject to fire-storms and burns would encompass 2,000 square miles.

Many Fail at Job Watching Missile Flight

WASHINGTON, AIR FORCE MAGS. Calif., Aug. 6 (UPI)—The mass whose split-second decision may keep a wild missile from smashing down on an unsuspecting area says at least half the men he trains for this job never make the grade.

"You have two to six seconds to decide whether to let the missile go or destroy it in flight," said Col. Marcus A. Perry, missile flight safety officer. "There's a lot of pressure and some men just can't take it."

What Does It Take?

"What does it take to make a missile flight safety officer?"

"Temperament is the main thing," said the officer. "You need a good sense of direction from Oresund, S. C. And it takes lots of studying, testing and experience. A man spends six months to a year training for the job before he gets his responsibility for destroying a million-dollar missile, and then he may not make it."

Perry, a sandy-haired man of medium size who looks like a college physics professor, sits quietly while sitting amid several million dollars' worth of electronic equipment that is perched on a job overlooking missile launch pads five or six miles away.

"Surprisingly, he doesn't look at the missile."

Instrument Report

"You just tell whether a missile is good just by looking at it," he says. "The only instrument that is from the instrument."

The few seconds in which Perry says he can put a clear down to a sub go like this:

A missile is launched and starts rising out over the ocean. It contains instruments which have started radiating information to his control area before firing. It goes to 60 different code signals strike the antennas as Perry's installation, shoot through miles of electronic wire and thousands of tubes and on various "read" instruments. At the same time, trackers are giving verbal reports on the missile's progress.

Switches Used

Perry's eyes squint over the information and his brain becomes a living extension of the computers. If it looks as if it's going wrong, Perry hits two toggle switches located about two inches apart on the control panel. One switch arms the destructive missiles in the missile, the other de-arms it.

Perry, who goes fishing to relax, says the chances of a missile going wild and falling on a nearby town before it can be destroyed are practically non-existent.

In the first place, missiles are fired over the ocean in an imaginary corridor four miles wide, tracking stations maintain a constant on-by-second watch from several angles. If the missile starts to veer off course, Perry makes his decision on whether to "shoot it" or let it if it won't fall on a populated area.

Will this happen to man next? So far the scientists have only performed these experiments on animals. They've only been able to succeed so far by actually hooking wires onto the brain. Astronomers Studying New Sun Mystery

STANFORD Calif., Aug. 6 (UP)—Radio astronomers have a new mystery on their hands—great columns of radiating particles which shoot out of the sun and past the earth.

A column of material like this may be tens of thousands of miles in diameter at the solar surface and may be ten times as dense as the gaseous material through which it extends as it reaches into space, says Prof. Howard E. Suess, radio telescope builder.

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The columns are detectable because they emit very short wave radio energy, which is picked up by the antenna in the telescope.

These spots are somewhat hotter than the surrounding surface and are about 1,000 degrees Centigrade. The corona, above the surface, is hotter than the chromosphere and the solar wind.

Astronomers study find evidence of these columns was first realized about a year ago when radio astronomers compared notes in a Paris meeting. They now are being studied by radio astronomers around the world.

The cross type of radio telescope here is basically a copy of one originated last five years ago in Australia by Dr. Y. Y. Killeen, W. N. Christiansen and Prof. Bracewell. The dish antennae are 10 feet in diameter and are set 25 feet apart. Altogether they form a cross 40 feet square.

In this shape the cross has the same resolving power, or sharpness of detail, as a dish 40 feet in diameter, which would be prohibitively expensive. The antennae are moved synchronously so that they all face the sun continuously.

In detecting the May 3 column activity the telescope here picked up evidence of a radiation band apparently encircling the sun at the equator.

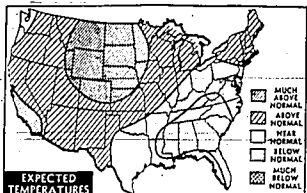

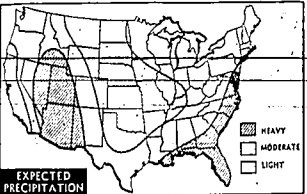

Nerve Center in Statehouse Keeps State Police in Contact

BOISE, Aug. 6 (UPI) — Surrounded by an array of telephones, teletypes, charts and a big radio console, an Idaho state police dispatcher at this moment is busy handling "routine" duties that might save your life some day. Tucked away in the cavernous basement of the statehouse is the nerve center of the whole Idaho state patrol communications system...

Ed Hester, who also is pastor of the Church of God of Prophecy, Boise, handles the midnight to 8 a.m. shift—the "graveyard" shift, in fact. "Nothing exciting happens here mostly routine stuff," Christie says, but adds that "emergency calls" for ambulances, blood or for assistance in catching escaping felons can cause things to get a little hot at times.

From Boise to Hutter, seven relays are needed all handled automatically in a matter of seconds. Shorter relays (four) are needed for the Pocatello area. Sitting at his microphone, a dispatcher in Boise can talk directly to about 28 cars, most of which answer him directly. These are in the Boise area and around Twin Falls. Otherwise, it takes a relay through one of the post-city stations or a sheriff's office.

NATO Officials Vague About Actual Strength of Its Forces

Editor's note: How long and how sharp is the NATO sword? In this article, a number of NATO members throughout the world discuss the NATO's actual strength—its real power.

HEIDELBERG, Germany, Aug. 6. —Manned aircraft and some missiles constitute the striking power—the sword—of the North Atlantic Treaty organization. When you begin asking specific questions about the length of the sword and the temper of its cutting edge, NATO officials become vague. On a month-long tour of European commands, I frequently was referred to some other echelon which usually turned out—referred me to still another in an endless chain.

What the supreme headquarters allied power, Europe, considers an adequate air umbrella for central Europe has never been announced. There are 30 short range missile battalions in Europe. The goal is 100 such battalions by 1953.

At the moment the heaviest missile contingents available in the allied air in the continent itself consists of two Redstone missile groups attached to the U. S. Army Europe, command at Heidelberg.

A Redstone group contains two battalions and each battery has a firing section. In brief, the army could launch about two Redstones with atomic warheads simultaneously and about two to three hours later could launch another four.

The U. S. air force has a squadron of Matador missiles near Benning, Germany. They are currently being replaced with the 600-mile range, subsonic Mace-A missile, a sort of unmanned bomber. In December, 1952, the NATO council agreed in principle to give Europe for push-button warfare using primarily U. S. air force intermediate range ballistic missiles of 1500 mile range.

An unknown number of such missiles now are deployed near the continent in England.

As for the rest of central Europe only the Netherlands has indicated

willingness to have ICBM launching sites built on her soil. When NATO came into being the defensive air cover for central Europe consisted of 400 aircraft, mostly jet-powered types.

Gen. Jean-Etienne Valluy, commander in chief of the allied forces in central Europe, estimates that he now can muster between 1,500 and 2,000 jet aircraft—fighter-bomber and fighter-interceptor. The ratio of interceptors to bombers is secret.

For long range striking power, the allies can bring to bear the deep penetration capabilities of the U. S. air force's strategic air command, which has bases in England, North Africa, Turkey and Spain.

Some allied forces, especially American, maintain a round-the-clock alert. A certain number of planes and pilots are kept in a constant state of runway readiness. The NATO air picture was hurt by French refusal to allow atomic bombs to be stored on her soil unless she is given some knowledge and control of the bombs.

Reinforcing the NATO air forces is the fast-growing West German air force. At present the Germans have about 350 of the subsonic F84 Republic built and some P80 Lockheed jets.

The British have contributed 250 Canberra bombers and Hawker Hunter interceptors to the NATO air force.

The French have declined to integrate their air force into the NATO operation except for a few Mystere IV's and F86's in Germany. By and large, the U. S. air force equipped with "century series" aircraft—F100's through F104's—constitutes the backbone of the defensive and counter-offensive air force in central Europe, about 1100 planes.

The Dutch, Belgians and Dutch have small forces, flying mostly B4's and F86's.

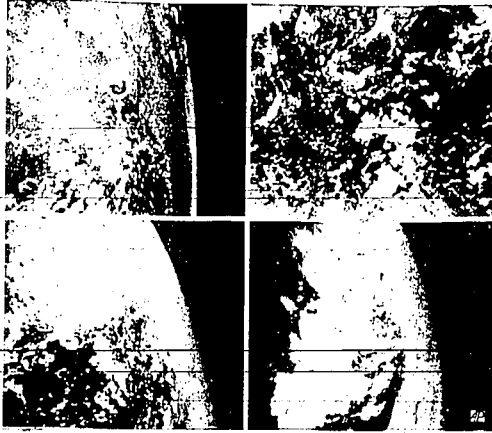

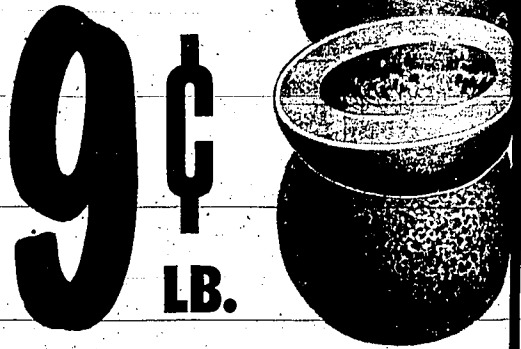

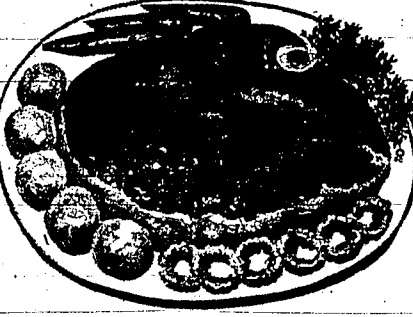

More Use of Lake Walcott Seems Likely

RUFERT, Aug. 6.—Approval for partial lifting of restrictions in the use of Lake Walcott has been announced by the Portland office of the wildlife service and the recommendations have not been sent to the department of the interior for final approval.

According to Watson Reed, regional biologist with the Portland office, there are three points to the recommendations.

Lake Walcott lake shore would be open for fishing the year round except during the waterfowl hunting season.

The area from Smith springs to Clifford springs would be open to fishing from the end of the waterfowl season to May 1. This area has been closed to motor boats and stands about nine miles along Snake river.

Boating and water skiing would be permitted as far east as Bird island from April 1 to Sept. 30. It has been closed to motor boats and stands about nine miles along Snake river.

The allocation of \$2,000 for the construction of cattle guards and road improvements was announced by Refuse Manager Bob Houser. He said that six cattle guards are planned and some improvements are set in access roads. He said three probably will be a like amount available next year for more improvements.

Most of the planned improvements will be on the north side of the lake, Houser said.

Suburbs Need Cities Close by

NEW YORK (UPI)—You can't run away from the urban problems of our cities by moving to the suburbs any more than you can avoid radio-active fallout by wearing a hat, says James H. Scheuer, president of the Citizens Housing and Planning Council of New York, Inc.

The authority on housing, urban renewal and municipal problems said in an interview that "an economically healthy suburb cannot exist independently of the core city. It is able to carry on only because of the nearby city. If it tries to be an island, it will surely become a sunken island."

"The suburb depends on the city for employment, the best jobs at every level are in the cities, and the bulk of employment opportunities are in the cities," the suburb looks to the city for entertainment for the cultural life.

"Department stores can open branches in the suburbs, but the opera, the symphony, the museums, the universities must stay where they are—in the heart of the city. They can't move out to the suburbs."

Steering Device Is Made for Jet

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The aircraft industry has developed an electronic power steering system for supersonic fighter-bombers that make takeoffs and landings at speeds of 200 miles an hour as easy as steering the family automobile.
