The bill would not get more than six favorable votes at that time. Thus the committee appeared to be as far away as ever from finding a solution to the financing problems which threaten to slow down or halt work on the 41,000-mile interstate super highway network.

Formosa Flood Toll Rises to 773 Dead

TAIPEI, Formosa, Aug. 10 (AP)—The death toll from the century's worst floods on this Nationalist Chinese island rose today to 773 by official count. Another 211 persons were listed as missing. The official casualty list also reported 1,093 injured and 169,173 homeless. The floods destroyed 15,178 houses and damaged 11,890 more, the government reported. Most of the damage occurred in isolated communities hit by flash floods that followed the island's heaviest rains in 50 years.

U.S. Hopes to Halt 'Export' Of Red Ideas

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10 (UPI)—Officials said today they hoped to convince Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev next month that he must stop trying to "export" communism.

Officials said the Soviet Union must cease its efforts to propagate communism in other areas if there is to be any real lessening of world tensions.

There also were developments in connection with the forthcoming exchange of visits between Khrushchev and President Eisenhower, who will go to Russia later this year.

"Eisenhower will fly by plane to Bonn Aug. 27 for a meeting with West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer," officials said. British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan in London Aug. 28, are expected to discuss the Paris Peace Accords in Paris Sept. 2, and then confer there with other NATO leaders.

"The President is keeping his schedule fluid," officials said. "He will meet with Khrushchev, Macmillan and De Gaulle should the occasion arise." "Eisenhower won't insist on any major break-through in the cold war as a price for a summit meeting. He feels that any indication of Soviet reasonableness, even as minor as a relaxation of trade restrictions or a willingness to respect copyright laws, would be enough to warrant a conference."

Summit Meet May Result

Undersecretary of State C. Douglas Dillon said yesterday the Eisenhower-Khrushchev exchange of visits might pave the way for a big four summit conference "toward the end of the year" perhaps in November.

House Democratic Leader John W. McCormack, Moss, said he did not think the late Secretary of State John Foster Dulles would have condoned the invitation to Khrushchev to visit the United States. Leader Charles A. Halleck, said he did not see any "reversal" of Dulles' policy.

U. S. officials said it was totally unrealistic for Khrushchev to show in the cold war while international communism is reeling from Moscow, was usually trying to subvert governments throughout the world.

They said they would regard it as a major achievement if they could sell this view to Khrushchev during his visit here.

"This is no surmise on my part. It is first-hand knowledge. On July 7, while in London, Germany, I shipped a trunk to my friend in Rome. It was a sound, leather trunk with rubber linings, and had my name and address posted only in circus-poster letters.

Today, I have another month later, the trunk has disappeared as completely as ever did Charles Dickens or Judge Crick.

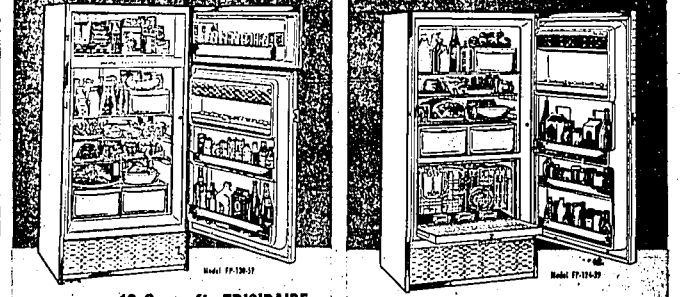

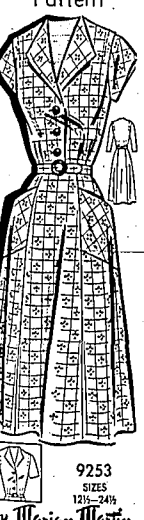

Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

This little one who has just learned to crawl has learned to travel on his feet so seemingly intoxicated by his discovery. From dirt he darts, he walks, climbs and runs seemingly without fatigue. His mother will be ready to drop but not he. He is vain he is asked to lie down and take a nap. The moment his back touches the bed he is up and away once more, "Useless" his weary mother says.

But he is not tired. The time comes when he begins to whimper. Nothing pleases him. He keeps on going until he is completely exhausted and his nerves no longer register. He lies flat on his back and doesn't know it. His mother is in for a trying time.

When the crying has been watched and so far as possible prevented from this over-tired child has been seen and caused of bad temper, naughtiness, abnormalness, when actually he was tired to be his usual cheerful self. Perhaps the best way to know when a child should cease his day of fatigue, is to watch him when he begins to tire and see that he rests on his bed for a while even if it is only for a few minutes. He may fall asleep, but if not at least he will be rested.

Some children will run about steadily for a couple of hours without any sign of fatigue, some only for an hour. Only by keeping a close watch on him can a mother know when to change his form of activity which is really to rest some children—by a nap, or a rest period. When a child reaches the age of 2 some even to 3 years, are likely to force his need for rest. If we do, we may have a whimpering, complaining child on our hands. These children will play beyond the stage of registered fatigue unless watched. They will protest loudly by being interrupted at their play but their mothers, having learned about how long they can stand their activity, makes a point of establishing the play and rest routine. This is not easy but it can be set so that the child gets into a rhythmic way of spending his day which makes life easier for him and his mother.

When, toward the end of a busy day, a child becomes restless, cries without reason, refuses to follow any suggestion for his comfort, he needs a warm bath, his pajamas and a bedtime. Once he is rested—and has given his mother a brief respite—he can be allowed up again to play with his family.

All little children need periods of rest in their busy day.

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Many Projects Supported by Engineer Unit

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—The controversial High Mountain Sheep dam on the Snake river has been recommended by the board of engineers for rivers and harbors.

The board recommended 14 projects to the chief of army engineers and congress. If the recommendations are approved, \$1,250,000 for the dam would be appropriated, the total cost would be \$1,250,000 for the dam and \$1,000,000 for the dam.

The largest sum would be \$1,250,000 for the High Mountain Sheep project. The exact site of this proposed project has been a controversy among lawmakers, fish and wildlife experts and power interests.

The board also recommended a 14-foot depth and 250-foot minimum width to Lime Point, Id., in the Columbia river bar navigation project.

Projects on the Columbia river basin recommended by the board and their estimated construction cost:

Long Meadows dam, Yank River, Mont., \$23,700,000; Flathead lake outlet improvement Flathead river, Mont., \$6,142,000; Kluwina dam, Flathead river, Mont., \$10,910,000.

Neaville dam, Coeur d'Alene river, Idaho, \$78,000,000; High Mountain Sheep dam, Snake river, Idaho, and Oregon, \$24,783,000.

Actions dam, Snake river, Idaho and Washington, \$125,680,000; Penny Cliff dam, middle fork Clearwater river, Idaho, \$100,000,000; Bruce Eddy dam, north fork Clearwater river, Idaho, \$127,160,000; Nimble Falls dam, Blackfoot river, Mont., \$54,823,000; and Gapen Valley Dam—dam—Payette river, Idaho, \$146,100,000.

L. H. McDonald, Dallas truck driver, discovered the setting hen in her nest atop the gas tank of his truck.

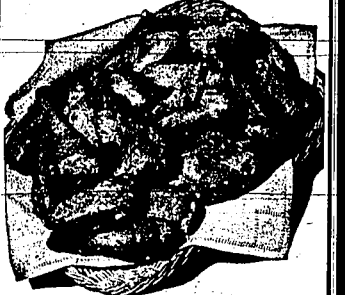

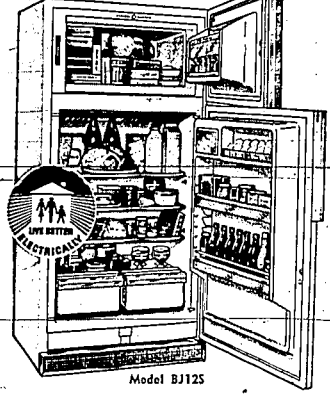

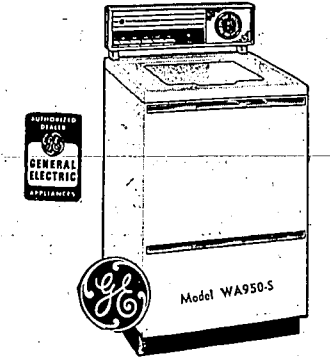

Thorium Will Be Used for Energy

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10 (UPI)—The atomic energy commission today announced a long-range program to extract nuclear power from thorium.

Thorium is heavy metal more abundant in the Earth's crust than uranium, the only existing natural source of fissionable material for atomic bombs and reactors.

Conversion of thorium into fissionable material, by treating it in a uranium reactor, would add greatly to the world's reserves of atomic fuel.

But, the AEC cautioned, the amount of known thorium ores "that can be exploited for commercial use is less than natural uranium." Sizeable supplies do, however, exist in several countries, including India, Brazil and the United States.

O'Dwyer Is Now Bandits Expert

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 10 (UPI)—A Irishman who was mayor of New York is now an expert on Mexican bandits, William O'Dwyer, 62, course.

He is chief adviser to a company making a television show tentatively scheduled to appear in the United States.

Shooting of the series begins Sept. 1. The star will be Sonny Tufts, with a cast mostly Mexican. The era portrayed is when Mexico was ruled by Emperor Maximilian in the 1860s.
